By United Press. CHICAGO, July 25.-Famous alienists will be summoned to show that Russell Scott, former millionaire, who has twice escaped the gallows, is suffering from prison psychosis, William Scott Stewart, chief defense attorney, declared today.

Stewart has persuaded Scott to co-operate with him. Following a conference with Stewart, Scott said to newspaper men:

"I'm crazy, that's what I am. How could any man be locked up in this jail 19 months and not get a screw loose?"


