

## Tremors Shake The Panhandle

Two Distinct Earthquakes Rock Panhandle Section of Texas Early Thursday; Cities Report That Shocks Are General.

### CITIZENS FLEE FROM HOMES

Amarillo Residents Flee; Canyon, Clarendon and Miami Are Shaken; No Damage Results From Tremors; Other States Hit.

AMARILLO, July 30.—The flat panhandle section of Texas was shaken by two distinct earth tremors shortly after six o'clock today. Reports reaching here from cities and outlying towns in the panhandle indicated that the earthquake was general from the western Oklahoma line to New Mexico. No damage was reported. Quakes were recorded at Clarendon, at 6:05 and 6:10 a. m. Neither caused any damage and were of short duration. Tremors were felt at Miami, Texas, at 6:15 a. m. Canyon reported being shaken at 7:20 a. m. Amarillo was shaken for thirty seconds at 6:12 a. m.

A rapid telegraphic survey of the affected regions showed that the tremor was not felt nor recorded outside of the panhandle country. Seismograph stations at Tucson, Denver and St. Louis did not record the disturbance, according to reports received here. The undulations of the earth caused many persons to flee from their homes due to the novelty of the situation rather than fear.

#### Lawton, Okla., Shaken

LAWTON, Okla., July 30.—An earth tremor was distinctly felt here this morning at 6:15. One woman, who was in Santa Barbara, Calif., during the recent disturbance, reported that her bed rocked "just like it was being shaken by a strong man."

#### Felt In Kansas

ELKHART, Kan., July 30.—A slight quake was felt here shortly after 6 o'clock this morning.

#### Quake Was Predicted

The tremors in the panhandle Thursday arrived on time to make good the prediction of Professor Bandanti, noted Italian seismologist, whose predictions of earthquakes in recent years have been fulfilled almost without exception. Bandanti, in an announcement made July 23, predicted quakes in Alaska and in North America for July 25 and 26, also for July 30. His predictions for the July 25 and 26 tremors evidently missed, but the July 30 quake arrived on schedule.

## RAIN IS GENERAL

Large Portion of State Again Soaked By Showers Wednesday Night

Another light shower fell in Sweetwater and vicinity late Wednesday raising the total rainfall of the month and bringing further relief from the intense heat of the past several weeks. The shower here netted .05 of an inch. The Sweetwater Utilizing Co. rain gauge recorded.

Heavier rains fell in other sections of West Texas, reports received here today indicated.

A heavy rain fell in the Iatan section and at Westbrook and points south of there, the Texas and Pacific offices here reported. The rain also was heavy at Roscoe and Colorado. Light showers fell east of Abilene Wednesday afternoon.

That section or north Texas that was passed up by the general rains Tuesday received a drenching late Wednesday and during the night. Local offices of the Orient railroad reported that a heavy rain fell at Chillicothe and northward to Oklahoma. The fall in the Chillicothe section had totaled 2 1/2 inches Thursday morning, and the rain was continuing, reports received here advised. Showers were lighter from that section south to Sweetwater, with only a light sprinkle reported in the Hamlin section.

No rain fell south of the Santa Fe, but the plains section along that line was again soaked Wednesday night. The fall ranged from a quarter of an inch to two inches from Post north.

#### Days Quake Insurance Policy

AMARILLO, July 30.—At least one person took the earthquake seriously here today, and when he satisfied himself of his own safety, he took steps to protect his property. A local insurance company reported having written a quake policy at 7:20 a. m., less than an hour after the tremore had rattled pots and pans for half a minute and gave the city an early morning scare.

## GRANT EXTENSION OF MAIL SERVICE

Post Office Department Authorizes Local Post Office to Extend Free Delivery Routes

EFFECTIVE THIS WEEK

Change Starts Wednesday—Additional 150 Houses and 15 Blocks Served By Carriers Now

The Post Office department has granted the application of the local post office for an extension of the free delivery routes, and the new extensions went into effect here Wednesday, postmaster M. B. Howard announced Thursday.

The application was sent in to the post office department July 15, and was granted immediately. A map of the city showing the present routes of the two mail carriers and the proposed extension accompanied the application to Washington, and the extension of free delivery was granted exactly as requested.

About 15 blocks and approximately 150 residences are included in the changes which went into effect this week.

Additions of blocks to be served by free mail delivery include four blocks on Crane street, three blocks on Pine, 3 blocks along Walnut street on the west side, and portions of Lamar, Alabama, South Fifth, South Third and Pettus streets on the south side.

No additional expense, and no longer hours for carriers will result from the extension, it was pointed out. The rapid growth of the residential section and the construction of many new sidewalks resulted in the delivery extension.

## MUST KILL

Herd of 100 Head on Jacob Ranch Suffer Foot and Mouth Disease—To Kill Today

HOUSTON, July 30.—United States expert, Dr. Marion Ives of Washington announced today that the cattle on the Dr. William States Jacob ranch were suffering of the foot and mouth disease.

He has ordered that the original herd of 100 head be killed and their bodies burned today.

A strict quarantine on cattle in Harris county has been ordered.

Federal and state experts say they believe the plague has been confined to the Jacob herd.

## JUDGE YARDS IN FIRST RAIL LAIN ANNUAL CONTEST IN NEW TOWN

Committees From Auxiliary to B. C. D. Touring City Today to Select Most Beautiful Yards

WILL SELECT WINNERS

Afternoon Session Scheduled for Selection of Winning Yards—Prizes Over \$60

Judging of yards and premises over the city to select the winners in the B. C. D. Annual Beautiful Yards contest was started Thursday and committees who are selecting the most beautiful yards in the city were expected to complete the work this afternoon.

The contest opened several weeks ago and is to close August first.

The Ladies Auxiliary to the Board of City Development are the active sponsors of the contest, and committees from that organization were inspecting yards over the city today to select the winners.

A meeting of the judges was scheduled for 4 o'clock this afternoon, at which time the winners will be decided. The committees have each taken a division of the city and each committee will inspect the yards in its district.

At the meeting Thursday afternoon the first work of the committee will be to select the most beautiful yard in the entire city, after which the various committees will select the prettiest yards in each of the three districts.

The city was divided into three parts for the contests, and a set of prizes will be given each division.

The prizes total \$60 and are divided as follows: First prize \$15 and second prize \$10 for the two most beautiful yards in the entire city. Prizes amounting to \$15 in each of the three divisions for new yards started in 1925, and for the most beautiful back yards.

The judges will probably announce the winners Friday.

## PAVING ON FIRST STREET SPEEDED

Workmen Surfacing South First This Week—New Pavement May Be Opened By Sunday

NORTH FIRST NEXT

Construction to Start on E. N. 1st St. Soon—Tracks Are Raised Over T-P Bridge

The paving of South First street, for which a contract was let some time ago by the city to the West Texas Construction Co. in connection with an extensive paving program in that section of town under an agreement with the Texas and Pacific railroad which is to construct an underground pass at Musgrove street, is progressing rapidly, and officials of the company stated Thursday that the street would probably be opened for traffic by Sunday.

The project includes the paving of South First street from Orange to Musgrove. The concrete base for the paving of that street was completed last week by construction crews of the West Texas Construction Co.

The surfacing work commenced the first of this week. Three blocks on the street had been surfaced up to Thursday. It is believed, barring unexpected delays, the paving will be completed by the last of the week.

Recent rains have not interfered with paving work along First street, officials of the paving company said today. The work has been carried on steadily and speedily, and when completed, the street will mark the fourth important thoroughfare to be paved here recently.

The city engineer was setting the grade for paving on North First st. Thursday. Construction work will begin on this street immediately after South First is completed. North First is to be paved from the Lamar street crossing to Musgrove street.

Texas and Pacific workmen have already raised the tracks over the wooden trestle over Musgrove street in preparation for the concrete sub-way which is to be constructed there.

## WOMAN SEES HER HUSBAND KILLED

Strong Arms Grasp New York Woman At Dawn—Held While Hammer Blows Thud on Mate's Head

WAS A MISTAKE

Early Morning Murderers Beat Husband to Death Then Discover They Had Killed Wrong Man

NEW YORK, July 30.—Two shadowy outlines appeared in a window of the apartment of Mr. and Mrs. Louise Leonardi early today.

Mrs. Leonardi was aroused by the noise and was terrified.

A moment later, strong arms held her powerless, while in the dim light she saw her husband beaten to death with a hammer, heard the thud of the blows as one of the murderers attacked her mate.

Then suddenly, she told police, one of the men exclaimed: "My God, Jim, we've made a mistake. We are on the wrong floor!"

Police are investigating the killing.

## Texans Figure In Big Robbery

Cherokee Indian Cowboy, and Two Others From Lone Star State Participate In Hotel Robbery and Gun Battle.

### THREE MEN ARE SLAIN

Tex Court, Chicago Gangster, and Hotel Clerk Shot During Spectacular Raid; Said to Be From Sweetwater Ranch.

CHICAGO, July 30.—James Woods, leader of the 5 desperadoes that yesterday afternoon perpetrated Chicago's most spectacular robbery and gun battle, was taken into custody today and confessed. Woods was arrested when he walked into a hospital and asked to be treated for bullet wounds. He was the second to be captured alive. Two were shot to death by police, and one is still at large.

Two Texas cowboys, one of them a full blood Cherokee Indian, swaggering about in drunken bravado; two Chicago had men brandishing pistols and shot guns; women knocked down and fainting; wealthy hotel guests running to cover; police firing at the fleeing bandits; an auto chase thru seven miles of congested traffic—these incidents were related to police today by witnesses to the holdup and series of gun battles.

#### Bandits Unknown Here

Neither Tex Court, alias the "Texas Kid," nor J. W. Holmes are known in this section, and ranchmen in the Sweetwater territory know of no KK ranch. The Cherokee Indian, Tex Court is said to have figured before in robberies in various sections. Old timers here declared that both names were unfamiliar and that the pair had never been employer on ranches in this section.

F. B. Rodkey, hotel clerk, was shot down by Tex Court, the Indian, in the hotel office. Witnesses said Rodkey offered no resistance and was shot simply because of the fact that Court had been enraged by a girl who slammed a door in his face.

"We're From Texas"

Soggy with wine, the Indian thrust a gun through the grating of the clerk's window.

"We're from Texas," he bellowed, "and everybody put your hands up."

The holdup combined the elements of the wild west and the daring and gunning of Chicago gangsters.

From Sweetwater Section

Tex Court, the Cherokee Indian, and Joe Holmes, a cowboy from the K K ranch near Sweetwater, Texas, came to Chicago and planned the robbery with Woods, Eric Nelson and another "bad man." Court was slain by police bullets as he was about to flee.

Holmes was beaten into insensibility and captured in the hotel kitchen as he tried to escape.

Texan's Gun Jammed

Only the fact that his gun jammed prevented the wounding and possible killing of the two officers who trapped him.

Nelson was killed in the basement of a house 7 miles away after a mad auto chase along the Sheridan Road and on North Clark Street. Woods was captured this morning without offering resistance when he appeared at a hospital and asked for medical treatment.

Hundreds of police and detectives hunted the city today for "Con" Mellenback, 24, of New York, the fifth member of the bandit gang. Woods said the fifth man was Mellenback.

Indicted for Murder

CHICAGO, July 30.—Working with express speed, the county grand jury met today and returned true bills charging Jack Wilson, alias Woods, and J. W. Holmes, both of Texas, and William Mellenback of New York with murder in connection with the spectacular Drake hotel late yesterday. They are charged with the murder of Frank Rodkey, clerk in the hotel.

Mellenback is still at large while Wilson and Holmes have confessed participation in the robbery.

Witnesses told the grand jury that Holmes fired the fatal shot and not Ted "Texas Kid" Court, the full blood Cherokee Indian.

Recover Loot

Considerable of the loot has been recovered police said. Hotel officials estimated the loss at between \$7,000 and \$10,000.

State attorney Crowe has promised a triple hanging as an object lesson to criminals whose bold lawlessness have given Chicago the name of "The Crime Capital of the World."

"We'll get Mellenback within 24 hours," Crowe said. "Then we will rush the case to trial while the crime is still fresh on the public mind, and send these three men to the gallows. This dastardly crime is the climax to the greatest era of crime in this city."

Question Russell Scott

Police questioned Russell Scott, twice granted eleventh hour reprieves from hanging for murder, to see if there was any connection between Russell, his brother, Robert Scott, and the Drake bandits. An unmailed postcard signed "R. Scott" was found in Wilson's pocket. Wilson said he does not know Scott and that the suit he wore belonged to Mellenback.

## GOVERNOR SILENT

Has Not Announced Whether She Will Interfere In Valles Sentence—To Hang Soon

AUSTIN, July 30.—With the time set for the electrocution of Arnolfo Valles, killer of an El Paso officer, only 12 hours away, Governor Miriam A. Ferguson today had not announced whether she would interfere in the case.

Rumors persisted that the governor will not commute the death sentence.

#### Remove Prisoner

Sheriff Terry, and a deputy of Fisher county were in Sweetwater Thursday morning to take into custody a man who gave the name of Brooks and who is wanted on charges of giving worthless checks. He was arrested here by local officers.

The passing of William Jennings Bryan takes away a leader of a huge following—following whose cause he championed as only few could have done. The whole world was shocked and grieved at his death, and solemnly read with interest, the last simple tributes for the departed soldier, statesman and fighter for his beliefs. It is to any man's honor to say that he stood for what he considered right and just, and who fought for his beliefs and labored for an honorable cause. This can be said of the Commoner, who died in action.

HOPE FLEETS AGAIN

Europe's dream of international peace by the league of nations route has struck another snag. Movement was under way to bring Germany into the league, admitting her to whatever glory and profit there might be in such a belated endorsement of the covenant of debt and loss and territory imposed at Versailles. In humiliation that nation's present rulers assented to this new submission. But all of a sudden they turn up with lively opposition to swallowing Article 16, which gives France the right to send troops and munitions across German territory to the relief of Poland should the latter ever be attacked by Russia.

In spite of the explanation brought about by Germany's note to the league council on March 13 last, there is danger that after its entrance into the league of nations Germany, disarmed and surrounded by powerfully armed neighbors, situated in the center of Europe and having in the course of history, served as the theater of great wars, would be drawn into conflicts between third states.

This in terms is the note expressing the Germans' fear of stirring the anger of Russia by helping France to aid Poland.

Under this new tangle is unraveled hope of European peace by agreement goes into discard. Indeed, in its present temper there was never real ground for hope; not at any rate while so many treaties, secret and otherwise exist, by which any offended or threatened power can bring another free for all brawl upon the head of civilization. Until the nations most concerned come to better harmony of future action, they will whistle in vain for any life-saving expeditions from America. Note how they are turning the cold shoulder to this nation's last suggestion for another disarmament conference.

Invest Money

PHILADELPHIA, July 30.—The American public is investing its money in public utilities securities at the rate of \$3,500 a minute, according to a compilation by H. C. Bell, president of the American Gas Association.

Statistics for the first four months this year show investments of \$5,000,000 a day the total new money received by public service companies from sale of securities totaling \$611,000,000.

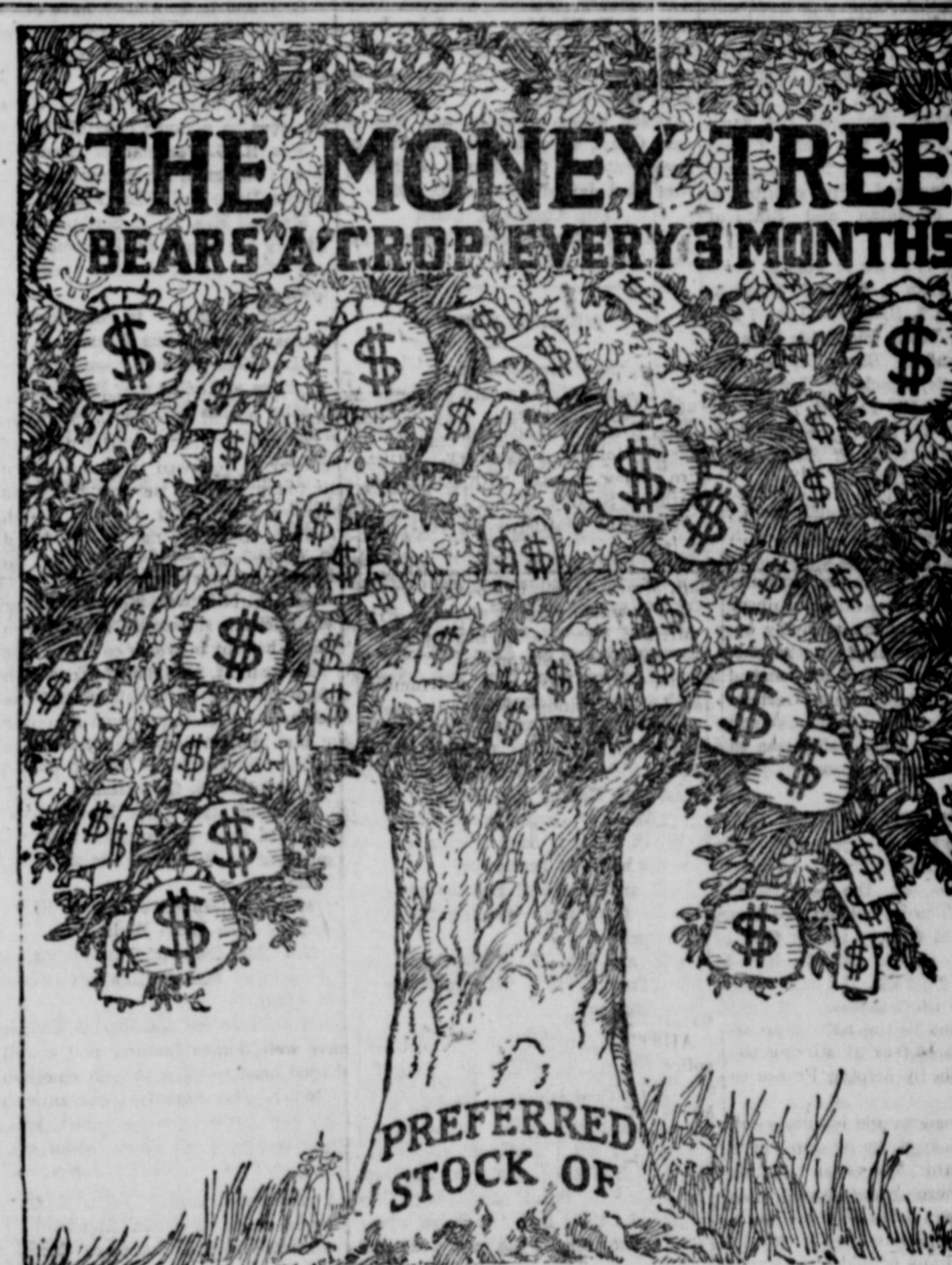
