NAVY MANEUVERS CAUSE SUSPICION

Statements From Washington and London Fail to Satisfy Japanese Opinion of Practice

BELIEVE MILITARY GESTURE

Think Pacific Maneuvers Silent Demonstration to World of U. S. Naval Strength

By United Press.

TOKYO, Aug. 4.—Reassuring state ments from Washington and London have by no means satisfied Japanese TO TESTIFY public opinion that American naval maneuvers in the Pacific are not in the nature of a military gesture by the United States.

Japan still feels keenly the humiliation she suffered through the immigration law and many observers see in the naval maneuvers a silent demonstration by the Washington government that it is able to back up its stand on immigration by force if nec Tells Jury of Scott's Career and Sud

Holding of the naval maneuvers ng after the anti-Japanese im aigration law by congress was ex ely unfortunate," says the Oska Mainichi, one of the most powerful of Japanese dailies.

"It was on so large a scale as to invite suspicion," the newspaper as serts, and cannot but be regarded in this country as a "brazen attempt to study naval warfare with Japan as ar imaginary enemy."

The journal answers arguments forward in justification of the maneuvers by American and British publicists by asserting that these "do not touch the fundamentals of the question of peace." It points out that Sir Her bert Russell is one British naval cr. tic who admits the real reason for the tests in his statement that "the fleet is too large for visiting other powers (Australia) merely for the purpose of international courtesy."

"Yes, he is insane," was the flat statement he made in answering a question by William Scott Stewart, chief attorney for the defense.

Scott suffered delusions of "reference"; delusions of suspicion, conspiracy and persecution, Dr. Hulbert said. By "reference" Dr. Hulbert said he meant conspiracy and persecution were directed toward him. Scott is under the delusion that the Canadian people conspired against him.

HATCHERY BADLY DAMAGED BY FIRE

Blaze Discovered Aboue 2 O'clock Tuesday Morning Burns Portion of Sweetwater Hatchery

FIREMEN SAVE BUILDING

Quick and Efficient Work By Department Saves Big Property Loss -Had Insurance

The Sweetwater Hatchery, corner First and Ash streets, was badly damaged by flames that started in the attic and burned through the roof and ceiling, in an early morning fire Tuesabout 2 o'clock a. m. Tucsday, and two trucks from the fire station respond- Rio Grande Is Settling Down After ed to the alarm.

A second alarm a few minutes later brought out a third truck and addition al firemen, but the fire boys, however, had the flames under control almost as soon as they arrived at the fire. Quick and efficient work by the firemen doubtless prevented a big fire loss to the hatchery and adjoining buildings.

The blaze started in the attic over the incubator room and is believed to have originated from electric light felt along a 100 mile stretch between wires, according to M. T. Mauzey and here and Fabens, Texas, where the George Lackey, managers at the building. Mauzey is directly in charge of ening to overrun hundreds of acres of the hatchery. The same building, fertile farm land. however, houses a large stock of farm implements, twine and wind mills handled by George Lackey. In the poultry pens in the rear of the buildng were scores of fryers and hens, but the poultry was not hurt by flames or water.

The two huge incubators were damged considerably by water, as were also other contents of the building. The loss was estimated at \$1,500, fully covered with insurance.


