toward the main camp, the land slopes upward and finally, in the distance, rises into a range of rugged hills. The camp is located in the beauty spot of West Texas.

When Scout officials joined Executive Barcus and other leaders at Camp Rudd Thursday and Friday of this week, the tentative program for the ten days was worked out.

Scouts will begin arriving at Camp Rudd Monday and up to Monday night. Where only a portion of a troop from a town attends camp it will be thrown with another troop, and it is expected that about five troops will be formed in all for duration of the camp.

A full corps of Scout leaders, men trained in Scouting, camping and woodcraft, and fully capable of training boys in all forms of Scout activities, will have charge of the various departments of camp schedules. During camp, the boys will receive special training in all tests which they will endeavor to pass; they will have ample opportunity to put into practice things they have learned about camp life, signaling, stalking, trailing, map

making, cooking, first aid, woodcraft and other Scouting principles.

In addition, the boys will learn manliness how to take care of themselves, according to Scout officials.

"We expect to send these boys home more self reliant, better prepared to care for themselves, and more healthy," Scout Executive Barcus said.

Each day's program will be carried out on schedule, and in addition to the routine work, and practice of Scouting subjects, the boys will have ample time for run and frolic, and for the twice daily swim. The camp fire program will be held around the embers is the most impressive and enjoyable of the entire day's activities.

The parents of the boys are urged to visit the camp at any time, Scout officials said, and all others interested in the work are invited to Camp Rudd. Scout leaders are anxious for citizens from throughout the council to see what the Scouts are doing, it was declared, and visitors will be welcomed at all times. At the conference held in camp Thursday night, it was arranged to serve meals to all visitors at the rate of 35 cents each. Parents are also urged not to send food to their boys in camp. Candy,

cakes and pies are especially not wanted, it was declared.

"We will feed the boys, and none will go away hungry," one official state. "There will be plenty to eat during camp, and the diet for the 10 days has been studied out and is based on scientific principles."

On Thursday the Sweetwater Club will be guests of Camp Rudd and on one day during the camp the Lions club from Colorado and Snyder will visit the camp. A barbecue for the Scouts will be given on the Jones ranch, adjoining the Rudd ranch one day of the camp. An over night hike will be made by each troop during the camp. The troop will pack camping supplies on the hike, setting out from the main camp, go through hills and woods until nightfall, camp for the night, and return the next day.

Throughout the entire camp, Scouts will be under close supervision of the experienced leaders, and in view of this and the Scouts' own experience and knowledge of camp life, no serious injuries, accidents or trouble are expected or likely to come. Minor scratches, bruises and accidents will occur, of course, officials declared, but a hospital tent, complete first aid equipment, and leaders and Scouts experienced in first aid work, will care for these injuries. Sweetwater and Roscoe physicians will visit the camp daily, probably, it was stated, and inspect sanitary conditions there. The

drinking water will be tested by chemists at the laboratory of the local filtration plant.

On Sunday church and Sunday school classes will be held. Both will be held in the afternoon, Sunday school at 3 and church at 4 o'clock, in the open air. Church services will be conducted by a well known Boy Scout preacher, 18 years old, and the Sunday school lesson will be taken from the International Sunday School lesson of Daily Reporters will be sent to supplement to the Reporter. 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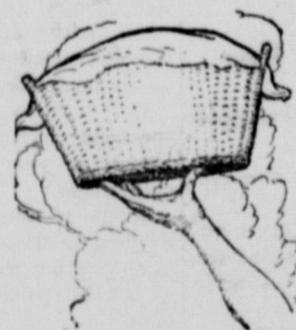

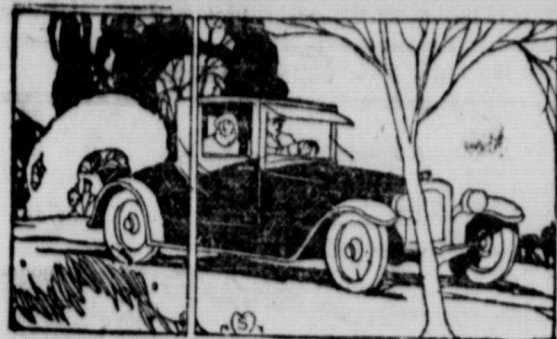

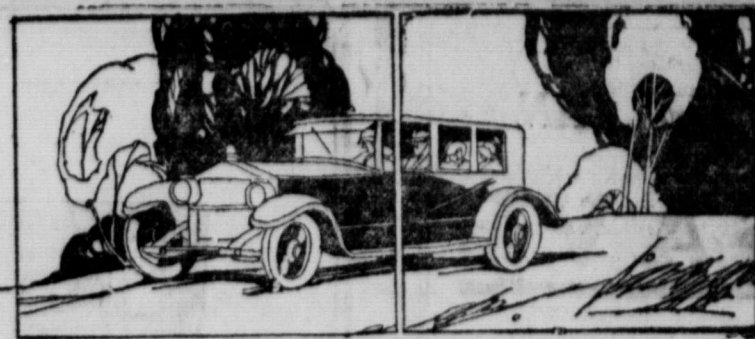

built and then disappeared after a few years with nothing left to show for the huge expense.

For that reason, the question is now recognized as of vital importance, and Texas now has an association that will make a deeper study of the question and which will, without doubt, result in solving important problems of practical, successful and economic road maintenance.

"I'm sure the cause of the association is so little known that the average good roads enthusiast has never dreamed of the power this association may obtain," declared the association's first president. "For this reason, the next meeting was called so soon. We can at once adopt by-laws and regulations, and any official or citizen who did not attend the meeting here may get in the association at the next meet-

ing, and be prepared for the first work of the organization."

Mauzey believes the attendance at the San Angelo meeting December 3 and 4 will be much greater than the Sweetwater meeting, and that representatives from the four corners of the state will attend. "The entire state was well represented at the Sweetwater meeting, but the membership of the association is largely made up of West Texas and plains counties. There are approximately 200 charter members of the association, and within a short time this number is expected to be doubled and trebled, with officials from all over the state becoming members. Roadmen from east Texas, south east and northeast Texas are especially expected in greater numbers at the San Angelo meeting.

All private citizens may join the association, it was pointed out. Men who are really interested in road main-

tenance are invited to join.

"All private citizens may join," Mauzey said. "We have no fear of the membership becoming so large or unwieldy as the association has no private interest and no chance for personal gain."

It is probable that new officers will be elected each year, Mauzey said and that a new meeting place be selected at every session. Meetings in the future will probably go to south and East Texas cities as well as towns in West Texas.

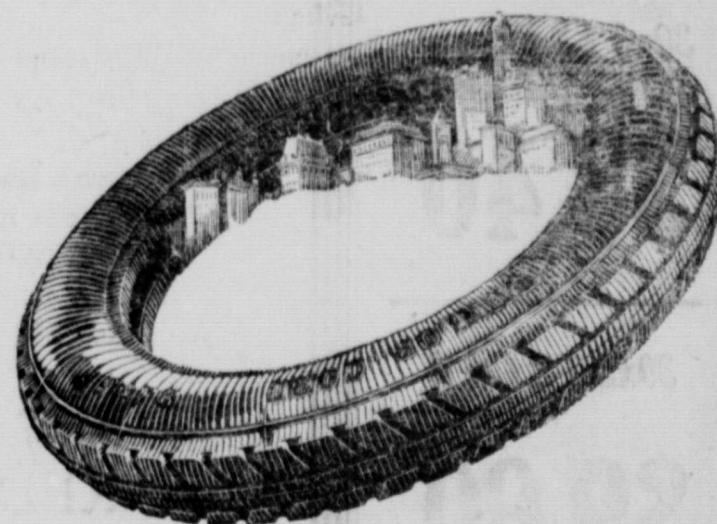

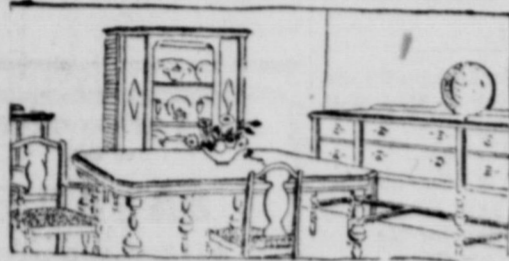
