AUSTIN, Aug. 10 .- A white man, whose identity officers did not divulge, was secreted in the county jail for investigation today in connection with the slaying of three persons at Delvalle near re early Sunday. The prisoner, a neighbor of E. T. Engler, 60, was arrested during the morning by officers working on the theory that revenge prompted the mur-

Engler, his wife, 65, and an adopted daughter, 25, were found shot to death Sunday. Bullets found in the home of the suspect corresponded with those taken from the bodies of the slain, officers said.

Further investigation resulted in the lenial of earlier reports that the girl had been attacked and there are no indications to support a robbery theory officers said.

Feeling is running high in the south section of the county, where the slaying occurred, and it is not generally known of the suspect's imprisonment here. Officers indicated that the suspect would be moved from Austin in event of mob violence threatening.

No alienist will be ass enough (unless he is paid well for an adverse opinion) to answer this in the affirmative. The normal man, in his normal mental condition, shrinks from the thought of killing an instinctively as he shrinks from contact with a snake.

The mere fact of his having committed a murder is evidence of his hav ing been abnormal at the time of the deed. The question then resolves it self into this:

Because a man is in an extraordinary condition of mind when he kills, shall all murderers be set free?






