Crew PN-9 Rescued Alive

RAINS SOAK BIG AREA OVER WEST

Thursday Night Showers Cover Western Half of State—Precipitation Is 1.65 Inch Here

HEAVY RAINFALL NORTH Extends Along Orient to Oklahoma—Plains Country Soaked—Rains East to Baird—Heavy West

General rains that fell throughout the western half of Texas Thursday night, extending north into Oklahoma and the Panhandle and to points over a wide territory east and south, served to delay the movement of cotton in this section, but put a splendid season in the ground for fall grains and pasturage. Cotton bolls have been opening rapidly in this section for the past several days, but the heavy rainfall last night will slow up picking in this territory.

Sweetwater came in for a total of 1.65 inches during the night, the Sweetwater vulcanizing rain gauge revealed early Friday. Light sprinkles continued for several hours during the morning. The fall brought the total for the year to 20.41 inches.

The south plains and the Panhandle section was soaked against by all night rains, according to the Santa Fe offices here. That entire district got rain during the night, and the fall extended far south on the Santa Fe, Brownwood and Coleman reported good rains which extended south to Mullin, below Brownwood.

That section north of Sweetwater along the Orient was standing in water Friday morning as the results of one of the heaviest rains received there in several months, the Orient office reported. The rain extended or into Oklahoma and Kansas along that railroad. The rain was exceedingly heavy in the Benjamin section where 5 inches well during the night. Orient offices reported lighter rains south.

The Texas and Pacific offices here reported heavy rains west to Toyah and east to Baird where the Callahan County Fair was rained out. Rain was especially heavy at Roscoe and Colorado, it was reported. Heavy rains fell about Lake Trammell during the night, it was reported, although there was no report of the amount of water caught in the lake.

Both the City and Santa Fe lakes were running around Friday morning with a heavy volume of water going over the spillways.

Traffic over the Bankhead Highway came to a sudden halt when Sweetwater Creek rose over the temporary bridge installed east of town by the Gypsum plant. Work on the new bridge at this point is proceeding as rapidly as possible but had not progressed sufficiently to be used.

MITCHELL COOL

Former Assistant Air Chief Plans Wolf Hunt in Bandera County Despite Inspector

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 11.—Notwithstanding the expected arrival of Col. George A. Nugent, Inspector General, to investigate the severe criticism of the War and Navy departments with relation to their conduct of aviation affairs, Col. Wm. Mitchell is preparing for a week end wolf hunt in the Bandera County hills 40 miles northwest of here.

Col. Nugent was expected to arrive last night but failed to put in an appearance this morning. He is expected to show up some time today. His investigation is likely to be short and will consist of a few questions to Mitchell, as to whether the latter said what he is reported to have said.

MIDNIGHT VISITOR IS BULLET PROOF

Nashville's Mysterious Marauder Again Escapes Valley of Bullets By Steel Vest

MAKES RETURN VISIT Visits Scene of Crimes—Is Intercepted By Police—Eludes Them—Is Fired Upon

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Sept. 11.—Nashville's midnight marauder, wearing his bullet proof vest, paid his nocturnal visit to the scene of his brutal crimes early today, but no attacks were made, police announced. As on previous nights, the steel jacket he wore saved the prowler from capture and possible death.

A policeman, detectives, and citizens guarding the northern district of Nashville, fired a volley of shots at the fleeing figure but the bullets glanced off the man's back and fell to the ground flattened. Shots were fired at a range of less than 100 yards, and the fugitive was seen to stagger several times from the force of the bullets, but he finally escaped when the detectives' automatics were empty.

The detectives had been hiding in an alley in anticipation of the prowler's coming. The tall figure approached rapidly. He may have worn a mask, but detectives were not sure. A detective challenged the man who turned on his heels and dashed away at a remarkable speed.

Later, in the early hours of morning, a taxi-cab driver reported he responded to a call and heard a voice say "If I am leaving here I will be suspected as the prowler." The taxi driver said he met the man according to plans and carried him downtown. After questioning the driver, admitted the passenger's description and movements fitted those of the desperately sought marauder.

UP TO COOLIDGE

Resident Cloaked With Army and Navy Heads Ament Criticism of Co. Wm. Mitchell

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—President Coolidge on his first day at the White House after his return from his vacation, dealt with the Mitchell aircraft controversy.

Following a full cabinet meeting, the president was closeted in a long conference with Secretary of the Navy Vilbur and acting Secretary of War Davis, whose departments Colonel Mitchell has charged with criminal negligence.

Shreveport Fire Makes 1200 Homeless



Nearly 1200 persons were made homeless by a fire at Shreveport, La., which destroyed 200 dwellings and caused a property loss estimated from \$750,000 to \$1,000,000. The flames ate away a strip of the residential section 2000 feet long and 1000 feet wide. Six persons were injured fighting the fire. Here is one part of the devastated section.

FLOODS MENACE NEAR HARLENGEN

Lower Rio Grande Valley Threatened With Inundation—35.8 Feet at Brownsville

STRENGTHEN LEVELS With Crest of Flood Yet to Come Workmen Busy Trying to Prevent Inundation

By United Press. SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 11.—With the Rio Grande rising at all points in the lower valley, workers were employed between Brownsville and Harlingen in strengthening the levees to prevent inundation to farm land.

Two serious breaks in the embankment above Harlingen's pumping plant occurred late Thursday, but repairs had been made by today and the levee was further strengthened to prevent a repetition of the damage.

The city of Brownsville had a taste of flood water when a break occurred at 15th street, but the gap was soon closed, and the water retreated. The river is about 35.8 feet at Brownsville and 26 feet above normal at San Benito with the crest of the flood yet to come.

INVITE GERMANY

Allied German Security Pact Conference is Proposed

By United Press. GENEVA, Switzerland, Sept. 11.—British Foreign Secretary Austen Chamberlain announced today that a note had been drafted inviting Germany to a conference of ministers over the proposed Allied-German security pact.

The time and place has not been decided.

SHIPS GASOLINE

Solid Trainload Leaves Amarillo Field For Export

AMARILLO, Sept. 11.—Amarillo as an oil production city is a realization. With enough gas to supply several cities of her size, and with a production of refined oils that already supplies a large domestic territory, Amarillo has now entered the foreign market.

An Amarillo refining company shipped a solid trainload of gasoline from the Amarillo crude, a few days ago to a Louisiana port for export to Europe. The thirty-one car train carried a quarter-million gallons of gasoline valued at \$50,000.

BUY STOLEN GOODS

Cigars and Cigarettes Being Peddled in Ranger

Ranger Sept. 11.—That there is being spent in Ranger something like \$5,000 a month for cigars, cigarettes and tobacco bought from peddlers and that the practice of selling stolen produce has grown to ponderous proportions elsewhere and threatens to spread over this section unless street hawking is stopped, were the sensational charges made by W. C. Hickey, Ranger wholesaler, and Sam Lipschitz, produce dealer, before the Ranger city commission at its meeting recently.

Tires on Fire Trucks Prevent Lightning Damage

Only the rubber tires on the fire trucks in the station here Thursday night prevented them from being wrecked by a bolt of lightning that struck the fire station about midnight, according to fire boys who today told of the excitement caused by the terrific crash.

The lightning is believed to have struck the siren wire where it enters the station, and leaped to the fire trucks. Fire boys brought out of their beds by the crash told seeing the lightning play about the three trucks. Tires on the trucks prevented the lightning from being grounded, and consequently saved the trucks from being badly damaged.

Residents throughout the city were startled by the crash, which was followed shortly after by a second. The first bolt, however, was apparently the only one that struck in the city.

TAYLOR PLANS ROADS

Specifications on Bankhead Ready for State

ABILENE, Sept. 11.—L. C. McCannles, resident state engineer, will leave here Monday with plans and specifications on two sections of State Highway No. 1 in Taylor county. After they have been examined and passed by the State Highway Engineer's department there and sent to Fort Worth for examination by the Federal engineer and returned to Austin, advertisement for bids for construction of a hard-surfaced highway will be made.

Plans on the sections of Highway No. 1, or the south loop of the Bankhead Highway from Abilene to Callahan county line and those for that section of the same highway from Trent west to the Nolan county line were inspected by State Engineer Franklin here recently. He also went over the entire route of that highway in this county and made suggestions for the plans that are being drawn for improvement of a fine road from Abilene west to Trent. These plans can be finished now by the time those to be taken to Austin Monday are approved, Mr. McCannles stated.

FIRE WIPES OUT SMALL VILLAGE

Prairie Dell, Near Georgetown, Ravaged by Flames Which Sweep Business Section

NO ESTIMATE DAMAGE Firemen from Georgetown Hasten to Aid Stricken Town But Unable to Help Situation

By United Press. GEORGETOWN, Texas, Sept. 11.—The entire business section of the little town of Prairie Dell near here was burned at midnight last night and 8 stores and shops were completely ravaged by the flames.

Several members of the local fire company went to Prairie Dell to fight the flames, but the fire was beyond control when they arrived.

FILE COMPLAINTS

Charges Filed County Court Against Drs. Canfil, Dan and Elliott—To Trial in November

Complaints have been filed against Dr. A. W. Canfil, Dr. W. A. Dan and Dr. C. H. Elliott, charging illegal practice of medicine in connection with the operation of the Grogan Wells Sanatorium here.

Five charges were contained in the complaint against Canfil, and two charges each against Dan and Elliott. The complaints were filed by county attorney R. D. Cox in County Court.

Fixing of bonds for defendants' appearance in the November term of County Court were expected to be made today.

PLAYS AT TRINITY

Sweetwater Boy Member Promising Football Squad

WAXAHACHE, Sept. 11.—General Whitaker of Sweetwater is attending the Trinity University football camp in progress here, and promises to become one of the most valuable members of Coach Holton's team.

Whitaker played on the Tiger eleven last year, and although weak defensively at the beginning of the season, developed into one of the best offensive players of the club. He was the outstanding offensive star of the Thanksgiving game with the North Texas State Teachers College.

As a member of the Strawn high school team in 1923, Whitaker was selected all state quarterback.

ROTARIANS MEET

A report of the President-Secretary Convention of Rotarians of the 41st District at Vernon the first of the week by Secretary J. A. McCurdy, featured the regular Friday noon meet at the Hotel Wright. Louie Galbraith of the Sweetwater Rotary Club at presided as toastmaster.

Ben McLain reported for the committee in charge of procuring playground equipment being furnished by the Rotary Club. Materials had been purchased, he stated, and the boys of the manual training department were at work constructing the seesaws, supports for basketball goals, etc.

Crew of Trans-Pacific Seaplane Picked Up By United States Submarine R-4 and Taken to Lihue for Rest.

HAD DRIFTED FOR TEN DAYS Commander Rodgers and Men without Food While Vessel Drifted Over 400 Miles—Towing Seaplane to Harbor.

By United Press. HONOLULU, Sept. 11.—With nine days of terror behind them, the crew of the Seaplane PN-9 No. 1 were landed at Lihue on the island of Kauai, northwest of Honolulu shortly before midnight, according to radio dispatches received here.

Refusing to leave the craft until it was tied up safely in the harbor at Lihue, Commander Rodgers and his men were taken to a hotel and put to bed.

Each member of the crew was in as good shape as could be expected after the hardships to which they had been exposed. Their faces showed the strain and they were visibly near exhaustion. "We saw one merchant ship and glimpsed an airplane," Commander Rodgers said while enroute to the hotel. "The worst weather was on the third day when it rained torrents. The plane rode the waves well and aside from a wetting we did not suffer. We spread a canvas to catch water to drink. We had no food after the fourth day as we did not stint ourselves on the emergency rations we carried. We were at all times confident of rescue. That's about all there is to it."

PROMOTE RODGERS By United Press. WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—Commander John Rodgers of the PN-9 No. 1 will be appointed assistant chief of the Navy Bureau of aeronautics to succeed Capt. A. W. Johnson who asked for sea duty, Secretary of the Navy Wilbur announced today.

Radio Was Useless "The second day we sighted a merchant vessel and our hopes arose, but it failed to see our signals and when it passed out of sight we felt rather weak, Rodgers continued.

O. C. Stantz, chief radio man, was the most helpless man in the party. With a perfectly good radio set before him, he was unable to send out a message giving the plane's location, due to the fact that the craft's aerial was dragging under water.

"I could hear the many messages searching ships sent out, but we could not do anything to help them," Stantz said.

"You can't give Commander Rodgers too much credit for the way we came through it all," said machinist mate William Bowlin. "He didn't have much chance to steer the bus while we were bounding about over the water, but he did a lot to keep our spirits up. Things looked pretty gloomy at the time we were drenched by a rain storm, but the showers benefited us as they furnished drinking water."

Rescued by Submarine By United Press. HONOLULU, Sept. 11.—Exhausted, but alive and safe, the crew of the trans-Pacific seaplane PN-9 No. 1 were picked up by a submarine late Thursday afternoon after drifting for ten days and taken to Lihue on the island of Kauai today.

An intercepted radio message brought word that Commander John Rodgers and his crew of four, saved after all hope for their ever being found alive had been virtually abandoned, were nearly broken down by their terrible experience.

The birdmen had drifted 400 miles since September 1, when they were swallowed up in the wastes of the Pacific after making a forced landing. The men were taken to Lihue for a needed rest before they came to Honolulu.

Had they drifted another 24 hours without being sighted they would have passed the island group and out into the Pacific where they would have perished from exhaustion.

Those saved besides Commander John Rodgers were: Lt. Byron J. Connel, assistant pilot, IPTsburgh; Otis C. Stantz, chief radio operator; Terre Harbo, Ind; Stiles N. Pobe, Jackson, Tenn.; Wm. H. Bowlin, chief machinist mate, Richmond, Ind.

The exact location in which the PN-9 was discovered was given as Longitude 53.30 West, Latitude 24 north. This is approximately 50 miles north west of Nawiliwili on the island of Kauai.

Drifting for 10 days, riding out rains and stormy weather that distressed searchers, the PN-9 set a record for seagoing stability never before equaled.

Commander Rodgers and his crew, however, are in good health considering their experience.

Honolulu became a city intoxicated with joy when it was learned the flyers were safe and the streets were given over to an impromptu carnival.

MEXICAN PATRIOTISM

Nothing awakens enthusiasm in a people so much as the remembrance of brilliant pages of their own history and the history of their country; the deeds of their heroes, the sacrifices and the trials they have suffered for liberty.

Hidalgo, Allende, Morelos, Guerrero and many other heroes of the history of the Republic of Mexico are memories which awaken with the nearing of September 16, Mexican Independence Day. Nothing except the spirit of patriotism and love of country can be attached to the motive behind the celebration planned for the observance of September 16 and all that date stands for. Mexicans from over West Texas have chosen Sweetwater as the scene of their celebration activity on the birthday of Mexican independence. Their patriotism, even though in a foreign land, is to be admired, and it will not be amiss for Americans here to lend co-operation when the Mexicans stage their fiesta in Sweetwater next week.

TO MR. BUTLER

In a recent letter, C. Y. Butler, member of Nolan, takes the Reporter to task in connection with a story of "Roads to the South" printed in a recent issue as the result of an investigation by a committee of business men in company with county officials and at the same time quotes some comparisons between this city and others in the county relative to supply of arsenic, etc.

Mr. Butler says the roads from Sweetwater through the Bitter Creek canyon is "anything but good." The Reporter did not say it was a paved road. It was never intended to be. It is only a temporary route, to be used until the main highway south is

completed, and which is promised this fall. The county road program is under way but 175 miles of good roads, paved and lateral cannot be built in a short time. The temporary route is as good as any other route to the Divide country, according to the testimony of the committee who traveled it.

W. H. Jobe, at whose warehouse the carload of arsenic was stored to await use by Nolan County farmers, states that there is ample supply of that poison there yet, and that the supply was never exhausted.

Relative to comparative prices, a fair comparison will doubtless show that Sweetwater prices are in line with those at other points, all commodities considered. If merchants who advance credit to farmers for the purchase of supplies take a hale of cotton from that farmer to apply on his account, they could quote him a lower price on his merchandise or allow him several points above the market and still have their margin of profit in the goods already sold, whereas the cash cotton buyer of Sweetwater has no such margin to operate on and must pay what the current quotations permit him to sell at. Sweetwater merchants are also thus handicapped. The Reporter does not say that this is always the case, but is merely suggested as one reason why so-called prices may be thought to be out of

line when as a matter of fact they are not. Exchange of commodities cannot be compared with a cash transaction, either in the purchase of merchandise or sale thereof.

Sweetwater merchants are too good business men to expect trade with prices so much out of line as Mr. Butler would have us believe.

Regarding leaf worm poison, Sweetwater firms are charging:
Lime to farmers (regular price 66c) —40c sack.
Paris Green—25c to 30c pound.
White arsenic—10c to 12 1/2c pound.
Calcium arsenate—10c pound.

All of these are being sold at from 2c to 3c above wholesale cost in Dallas and Fort Worth.

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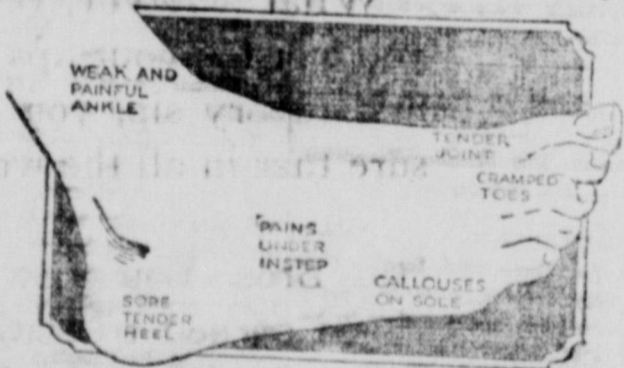

Houston exported 66,893 bales during August last year, just about half of this year's figures.

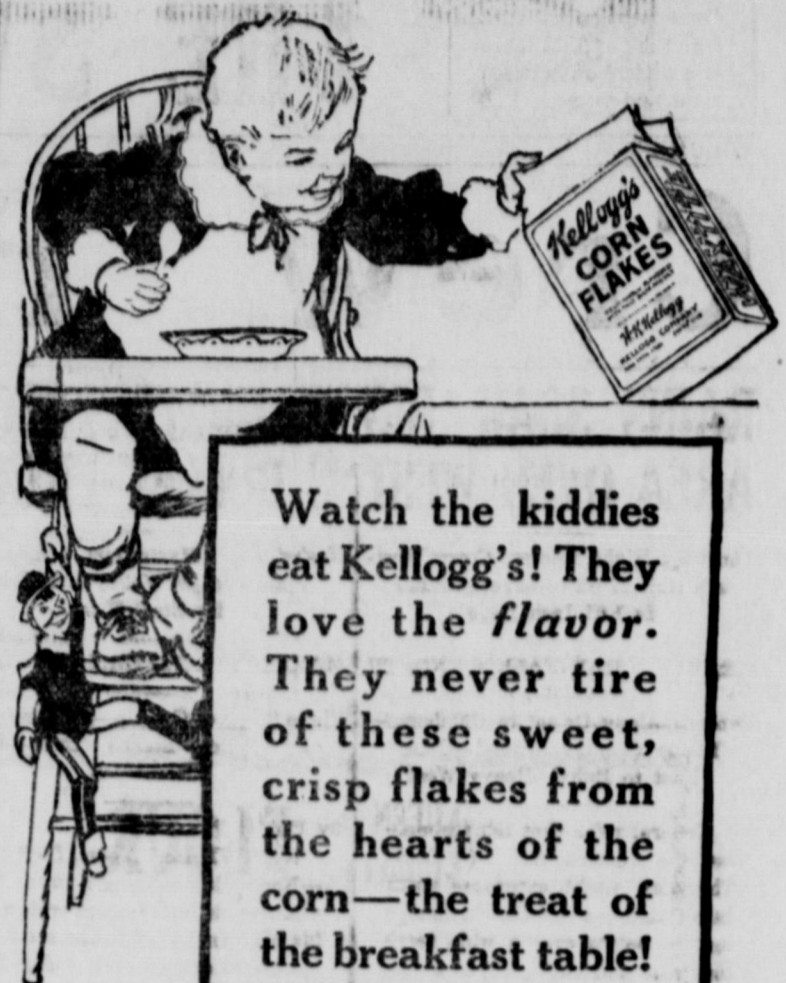

 Melt shortening and add molasses, egg well beaten, flour mixed and sifted with soda, salt, ginger and sour milk. Beat vigorously, turn into a buttered and floured dripping pan and bake in moderate oven 25 minutes. Remove from pan, cut in halves crosswise, and put marshmallows between layers. Put in oven and let stand three minutes. Remove to serving dish, cool slightly, cut in squares and serve with whipped cream, sweetened and flavored with vanilla.

Candle Salad
 2 slices pineapple, 2 tsp. mayonnaise, 2 lettuce leaves, 2 cherries, 1

banana, 2 tsp. chopped nuts.

Gold Cake
 1-2 cup butter (scant), 3 tsp. baking powder, 2 cups flour, yolks 4 eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1 2 cup milk.

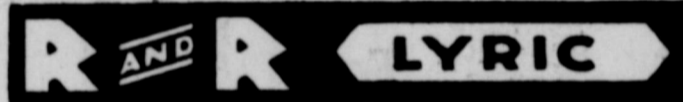
