CLEAR WEATHER FOLLOWS RAINS

Stiff Breeze from Northwest Drives Clouds Away for Long Delayed Glimpse of Sun

MUCH DAMAGE FROM HAIL

Strip Over Fifty Miles Long from Anson to Hermleigh Damaged by Aerial Missiles

With a stiff northwest breeze blowing the clouds away, the first glimpse of the sun this section has had in several days was vouchsafed Friday.

An additional .46 inch of rain was received Thursday night, bringing the total to 24.68 inches. The misty drizzle of Thursday growing brisker as day turned into night.

The rain halted the cotton movement perceptibly only a few bales being ginned here yesterday, the Brown Gin reporting 15. The Brown Gin report a total of 518 for the year, Williams and Miller 595, and the Planters 713, bringing the total for the year to 1731 bales ginned in Sweetwater, which is considerably behind that of last year.

Additional reports from the section reached by the mail show that a strip about 50 miles long, extending from east of Anson in Jones county, to near Hermleigh was more or less severely damaged. The strip varies from 15 to 25 miles in width. Open cotton knocked off from the bolls to the wet ground, with a drenching rain following, will prove a total loss, it is claimed. Cotton that would have produced around a third of a bale to the acre will have the yield materially reduced, it is reported. The hail area did not extend very far south of Sylvester, Longworth, Roby of Hermleigh.

Rain on the open cotton in this section will damage the grade to some extent but the immediate trade territory of Sweetwater is in no way hit as hard as the hail stricken section farther north.

Rain Shifts Eastward

DALLAS, Oct. 16.—Unusual rains in the last 24 hours have bracketed the state of Texas and rain was still falling today over the northern section, according to reports from the U. S. Weather Bureau here.

Rain clouds today were being rapidly driven eastward, however, and the wet spell will soon be over, the weather men said.

Rivers in the northern section of the state were on an average of six to nine feet above normal but have not reached the flood stage.

Rainfall was reported from Abilene, Amarillo, Oklahoma City, Dallas, Palestine, Taylor, Del Rio, Corpus Christi, Port Arthur and McKinney with the fall continuing in many places.

ASK ABOLITION

Federation of Labor Convention Seeks Removal of Railroad Labor Board—Attack Bell System

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 16.—Abolition of the Railroad Labor Board because of its "futility and absolute uselessness in dealing with controversies arising between men and the management of railroads" was urged in a resolution passed by the American Federation of Labor convention here today.

The convention also unanimously adopted resolutions urging a Congressional investigation of the Bell telephone system because of its "monopolistic grip" which, "has become, year by year, more arrogant."

Heavy Rains Continue

AUSTIN, Oct. 16.—Heavy rains again prevailed in this section today, over an inch having fallen by noon. Nearly 10 inches of rain have been recorded in Austin since Monday night.

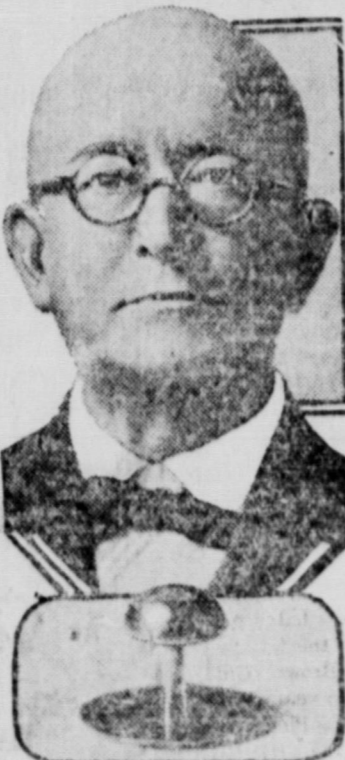

SEAMAN ON SUB TELLS OF CRASH

Dewey Kite, One of Three Men Rescued from Ill Fated S-51, Describes the Disaster

TESTIFIES BEFORE COURT

City of Rome Carried No Lighted Life Buoys, Inquiry Board is Told—Ship Sank Rapidly

BOSTON, Oct. 16.—Dewey Kite of Peoria, Miss., one of the three survivors of the submarine S-51 disaster, told a dramatic story of the collision between the ship and the City of Rome, on the witness stand when the Federal Court of inquiry reconvened at Charleston Navy Yards today.

Kite said the Savannah Line steamship, City of Rome, had no lighted life buoys so far as he knew to aid in attempts to rescue the officers and crew of the S-51 before the submarine went to the bottom off Block Island with a loss of 34 lives.

He testified that he saw only two life buoys in the water following the collision and that neither of these were lighted.

"I was rudely awakened by the crash," Kite said. "A piece of cork flew from the bulkhead and hit me in the face. Upon jumping out of my bunk I found the deck covered with several feet of water. I waded thru the water to the torpedo room door. It stuck and I could not close it.

"Then I went through the water to the C. O. C. headquarters. I closed the door after me and climbed to the conning tower to the bridge. I was swept off the bridge almost immediately.

"At that time the City of Rome appeared not more than 30 feet from the submarine. The S-51 went down about fifteen seconds after I reached deck. It seemed to be sinking from under me."

WILL EXHIBIT

TOLD TO CANCEL ROAD CONTRACTS

Dan Moody, Attorney General, Sends Letter to Members Highway Commission Today

LOW BIDDERS DISREGARDED

Moody Declares Work not Properly Advertised Nor Let to the Low Bidders

AUSTIN, Oct. 15.—In a letter sent to each member of the State Highway Commission, Attorney General Dan Moody called for the cancellation of highway maintenance contracts in 35 counties, the Attorney General alleging that in each instance the contracts were let to bidding contractors who submitted bids higher than the lowest bids offered.

The contracts asked to be cancelled amounted to \$1,034,112. Lower bids, which were not accepted, totaled \$872,976.

The Attorney General said in the letter that "I am advised that in letting maintenance contracts there were no advertisements for bids, but that persons invited to make bids for the maintenance of designated highways in various counties of Texas.

"It is my position," the letter says "that where you have invited contractors to bid, which necessarily implies confidence in their responsibility, and add bids were on the same form, and same specifications and terms and each bidder agreed to furnish the same bond, it is not within your discretion arbitrarily to reject the lowest bid for one submitted that is higher, and especially is such an act not within your discretion when you are awarding such low bidders contracts covering other counties."

Woman Pleas for Pastor to Share Penalty of Sins

SPRINGFIELD, Oct. 16.—A lone woman, without legal training, faced a group of experienced attorneys in the state Supreme Court today in a dramatic plea to have Rev. C. J. Case, Chicago minister, branded publicly as her "partner in sin."

Mrs. Charlotte Leland, whose husband divorced her because she pined a note to her pillow admitting she had been intimate with the pastor, appeared in person against Dr. Case in a move to set the divorce aside.

"I have not been all alone. I must not bear the full brunt of this folly. Dr. Case must stay with me, and he must pay, too," she declared.

Her appearance before the court in behalf of the brief that she herself prepared, and which was read and filed, broke all precedents in the state's highest tribunal.

Negro Invasion Chicago Suburb Met With Bomb

By United Press. CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—Another act of violence marked the negro "invasion" of the fashionable South Side today.

The Bethesda Baptist Church, colored, a quarter of a million dollar structure vacated several months ago thru consolidation with two Jewish temples was wrecked by a bomb. Damage is estimated at \$125,000.

The entire south side was shaken by the blast.

For several years wealthy negroes have been making inroads on the south side district, formerly occupied exclusively by wealthy families.

A smaller bomb exploded in the church shortly after the new owners had taken possession but did only minor violence.

AUSTIN IS AGAIN SOAKED BY RAIN

Capitol City Gets Total of 12 Inches Rain Since Monday of This Week—Squall Hits

COLORADO RIVER RISING

Another Rise Expected to Put Stream Out of Banks at Columbus—Rio Grande Is Up

AUSTIN, Oct. 16.—After nearly five days of continuous rain, another squall accompanied by an electrical display struck here today.

One residence was damaged by a lightning bolt.

Many families were marooned for hours when two inches of the down-pour flooded the lowlands where water was still standing from yesterday's rain.

The rain fall since Monday totals nearly 12 inches.

Ten feet above normal, the Colorado river is rising rapidly from the lower river section, and is sure of another rise from the upper tributaries. It is expected that the rise will put the stream out of banks at Columbus where a stage of 33 feet above normal is reported.

WHO IS TO BLAME?

When investigators were trying to run down facts surrounding the alleged intoxication of a number of football players at a party here, some of the players, said to have been in the affair, asked "Why do we get into so much trouble over this when some of the leading citizens of the town are making the stuff in their own homes?" or words to that effect.

There is much food for thought in that statement. The boys, dropped from the team temporarily, carried through a few days of strenuous investigation and finally asked to apologize before the student body, have had their fling at what was probably a new experience and are likely convinced now that it doesn't pay. They broke training rules and were suspended from their football team—probably the most severe punishment that could be given a group of football players.

"The boys can't be blamed so much" one school official stated, "with the example that is set for them by some citizens of this town."

The incident created quite a stir and the long tongues of scandal lovers were working over time to magnify and spread twisted facts about the affair. But if it is true that many so-called respectable families have a little brewery in their home, who can blame a bunch of high school lads with the example they had to follow. The main difference was that the youths were "caught" while Mr. Respectable Citizen in question makes and sips the stuff in secret behind the doors of his home and then faces the world as a clean, law-abiding and pious resident who is horrified at the wildness of modern youth. It is not Sweetwater in particular; it is every little village and hamlet and city everywhere.

Instead of becoming horrified when a circumstance like this occurs, the citizens of the city should ask themselves if the examples they have set have been such that a young man should follow. They should ask themselves if they have ever taken an interest in high school boys; mixed or mingled with them; talked with them, or made any effort in any shape, form or fashion to impart to the coming manhood of the city principles that are worthy and clean and helpful.

Angels are lacking, of course, in the citizenship of any community. But if there is a so-called respectable citizen whose natural goodness in the city, whose principles of living and whose habits and acts are not fit for the youth of his city to know about—much less follow—the worthy citizens of the community could not do a better deed for the coming generation than to buy that man a ticket out of town.

ILLEGITIMATES INCREASE

Iowa Registers Large Increase Births Out of Wedlock

DES MOINES, Ia., Oct. 16.—Illegitimate births in Iowa tripled in 1924 as compared with 1915, according to records in the office of Dr. Don M. Griswold, state health commissioner.

Comparing the years following the World War with the period prior to it reveals an increase of 100 to 200 per cent in the number of children born out of wedlock in Iowa during the more recent years.

In 1915 the number of illegitimate births reported to the state health department was 216. In 1920 it was 649. A high record was set in the past year, reports for 1924 showing 723 cases of illegitimacy. The year 1921 had 494, 1922 had 687 and 1923 showed 598.

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HOUSEHOLD HINTS

BAKING GOOD BISCUITS

The ability of a housewife as a cook is very often judged by the biscuits she makes, but they are really very simple to make. If the materials used are of the very best, the recipe followed carefully and measurements are made accurately, only a little experience is required to produce excellent biscuits.

The principal requirement in making baking powder biscuits is, of course, that a reliable brand of baking powder is used and used correctly. Bread dough, biscuit dough and pie dough are examples of this degree of stiffness.

All breads are divided into two classes—1. quick breads; 2. yeast breads. Quick breads are made in a shorter time than is required for making yeast breads, and are generally served hot.

A quick bread requires the following ingredients: flour, a liquid, salt and a leavening agent. To these may be added some other ingredients, not necessary, but often desired, such as shortening, sweetening, flavoring and eggs.

There are some points to emphasize

which cannot be repeated too often.

When mixing fat into a dough such as biscuits, it is preferable to add the fat in solid form and mix into the dry ingredients, either with a knife or with the tips of the fingers.

Although it is possible to make a good soft dough using a spoon for mixing, the beginner, however, must be careful not to stir the dough so as to toughen it as is often the case with the first biscuits a person makes.

Sweetening, raisins, currants, and spice are often added separately of combined and added to biscuit dough after part of the milk is added.

Baking powder is used in place of yeast to make a flour mixture rise. When the mixture is of liquid and a good, plain, straight flour, and is stiff enough to knead, it is called a dough. Bread dough, biscuit dough and pie dough are examples of this degree of stiffness.

A biscuit dough can be used in making many delicious variations. By adding grated cheese to flour a delightful change to serve with salads is the result. Roll these biscuits thinner and cut smaller than the usual biscuits. Thinly rolled biscuit dough sprinkled with sugar and sliced bananas, rolled and baked as a jelly roll makes an excellent dessert. Serve with a lemon sauce.

Thin biscuits may be split, buttered and served with tea, while larger ones may be served with breakfast or luncheon. In order to utilize left over biscuits of this kind, they may be split, toasted or dipped quickly in boiling water and baked in a quick oven until the surface is dry.

When you do bake good biscuits—don't waste time on inferior products. A good flour and a reliable baking powder, a hot oven and your family will appreciate your efforts. Try these recipes:

Baking Powder Biscuits
4 cups pastry flour, 4 level table-spoons baking powder, 4 level table-spoons butter or lard, 1 1/2 cups milk, 4 level teaspoon salt.

Sift flour once, then measure, add salt and baking powder and sift three times, rub in shortening with fork or spoon, add milk, mix lightly, turn out on a well floured board and roll or pat one inch thick, cut and bake in quick oven fifteen to seventeen minutes.

THE GOOD COOK SAYS:
A custard that gurdles in cooking can be made smooth by placing over cold water and beating with an egg beater.

For cleaning wall paper, mix together one tablespoon salt, one table-spoon kerosene, two of vinegar, two of ammonia, one-half cup warm water and one cup flour. Cook together thoroughly, stirring constantly. Then knead until dough is smooth. Break into bits and rub soiled wall paper as if it were a rubber eraser.

If a few shavings of candle are added to starch, the clothes will shine and be easily ironed.

A brass curtain rod should be rubbed occasionally with paraffin—on a soft cloth so that the rings will run smoothly.

Never put an egg beater to soak, and never let the eggs get wet.

A meat grinding machine should be cleaned by running a piece of stale bread through it to collect the residue of fat and meats.

If boiled ham is to be served cold, let it cool in water in which it has been cooked. It will be lovely and juicy and have more flavor than if removed while hot.

For a breakfast cereal cook rice in evaporated milk diluted with an equal quantity of water and serve with salt and butter, or sweeten it slightly if preferred.

Waxed or oiled cloths should be washed in soda solution and rinsed thoroughly.

DUCK SEASON OPENS

Good Weather Proves to be Hunting Feathered Tribe—Lakes Full

"Well, it's great weather for ducks" was the comment heard on the streets Thursday as the northern and rain hit the country. None of the feathered tribe had put in their appearance before, but the sportsmen say that they are expecting them in large numbers as their advent is always accompanied by a cold weather flurry such as that reaching this section early Thursday morning. The lakes are filled with water and the season for the hunting of these sporting birds from the north should be especially good this year, it was pointed out.

The open season for ducks of all kinds excepting wild wood ducks, and for wild geese, wild snipe, wild quail, wild gallinules and wild coot or mud hen begins here today, October 16, and extends through January 31. The bag limit for geese and

brant of all kinds is four in any one day and a weekly limit of twelve. For ducks of all kinds, the statutory maximum is twenty five daily, with a weekly bag limit of fifty.

For shooting birds out of season or for exceeding the bag limit the fine is \$10 to \$100 and each bird taken "shall constitute a separate offense."

The quail season opens just a month from today, or November 16.

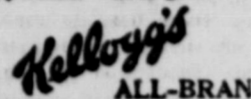

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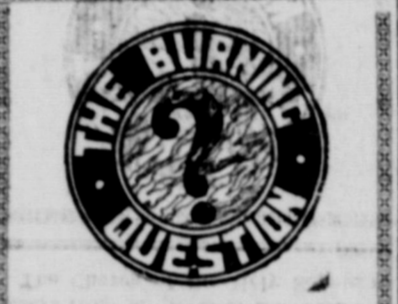

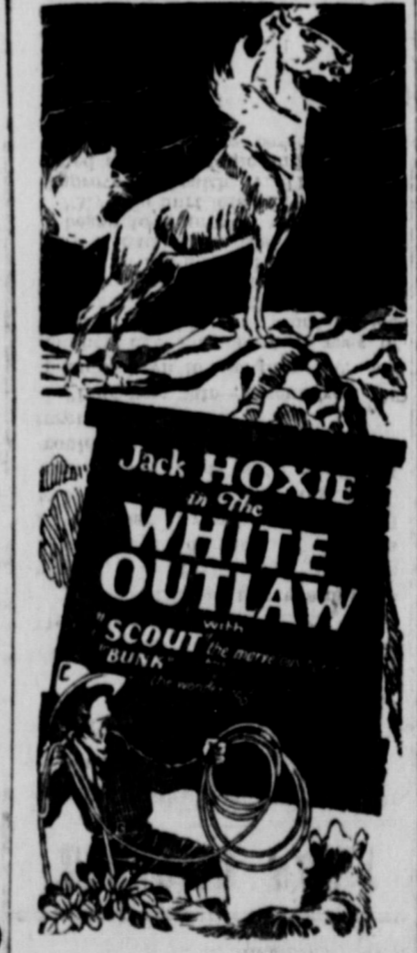
