OPEN FOURTH DAY TRIAL

Defense Planning to Delve into Many Phases Army and Navy Administration

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 .- An imposing array of witnesses, including cabinet officers and other high government, army and navy officials, was demanded by the defense when the court martial of Col. Wm. Mitchell convened for its fourth day's session today.

Subpoenas for 78 witnesses was asked, indicating efforts of counsel for Mitchell to delve into every phase of military and naval administration as well as revive the subject of recent naval disasters.







Deformed Feet.

Deformities of the feet, such as outward turned big toe and overlap ping, can, in many cases, be successfully treated by the various appliances which can be bought in stores selling orthopedic supplies

For instance, there can be pur-chased a splint which is attached to the inner side of the foot with a strap and to which is strapped the big toe. This aplint keeps the toe in proper position. It can be worn at night, and, if persisted in, will sometimes straighten the abnormality.




