## MY TURN

I DON'T READ ANYTHING in the daily papers anymore that makes me feel good about the direction we are heading. I do believe that the majority of Americans are decent, well-meaning people. However, there is so much ignorance, crime and immorality around, topped off by the government trying to protect us from ourselves, which just ends up causing more encroachment into our personal freedoms. This certainly adds to the feeling of being slightly off-balance as we go through our daily lives.

And so, meeting with our Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison last Saturday was like a breath of fresh air. Mrs. Hutchison said she is committed to protecting the citizens from federally unfunded mandates handed down by the EPA, the Education Department, HUD, and other bureaucratic agencies which have been given too much regulatory governmental power. She was less than pleased about the passage of the crime bill. "The crime bill the Senate approved last November would have made a real difference in the fight to take back our streets and communities," the Senator said. "However, the crime bill which was approved last week will do less to help communities and police departments stem the tide of violent crime, but will add \$13 billion to the federal deficit in order to finance a wide variety of social programs that have nothing to do with crime."

She also expressed her concern over the subject that Bill discussed in his column here last week, which was on "The Environmental Protection Agency's attempt to undermine personal property rights by giving priority status to so-called endangered species."

Senator Kay says that we have the capability of gathering up the warblers, the foxes, the salamanders, and any other endangered animals and re-inhabiting them in our national forests and wildlife refuges without encroaching on personal property. She says the only species which aren't on the EPA's "endangered" list are human beings. Perhaps they should be.

Hutchison also noted that the EPA, which is now under the Department of Interior, is seeking to establish its own cabinet post, which would give this group a lot more power. "The issue of environmental reforms will be the government's next big project," she said. She is co-sponsoring a bill, "The Private Property Rights Act," with Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole to protect homeowners, farmers, ranchers and business owners from arbitrary government action. This bill will add more emphasis to the fifth amendment which states that private property cannot be taken for public use without just compensation.

The Senator, who serves on the Armed Services Committee in Washington, says she believes that we are dismantling our military too fast, with an aim toward turning our U.S. troops over to the U.N. in the future. She wants to see that the young men and women in the military get what they need to defend our country effectively. We currently have an alarming situation in North Korea involving the build-up of nuclear weapons with the possibility of those weapons being sold to "terrorist" groups.

She pointed out that the administration complains about Republicans being the cause of bills not getting passed. But with Democrats controlling both the House and Senate, the President should have no trouble getting the bills he wants. It is encouraging to learn that Democrats in both houses, as well as Republicans, are showing a reluctance to pass bills that are not in the best interest of the people.

Senator Hutchison's opponent has made the statement that he wants to get elected so he can go to Washington and help support the President. But Kay says she went to Washington to help support the people of Texas.

## Friona ISD: Tax Rate Same As '93

The Friona ISD Board of Trustees met in a special called session on August 31, to conduct a public hearing on the proposed 1994-95 school budget, and set the tax rate for 1994-95.

The board voted to set the tax rate at \$1.09 per \$100 valuation, which is the same rate as last year.

Friona's rate of \$1.09 is the lowest tax rate of any AAA school district in the Panhandle-South Plains area. Rates range from

Friona's low to \$1.54 per \$100 valuation at River Road.

The board was able to keep the rate the same thanks in great measure to the agreement Superintendent Hal Ratcliff worked out with the Canadian ISD, which benefits Friona by over \$400,000 in monies above their allotment from the state.

In other business, the board adopted the final 1993-94 amended budget.

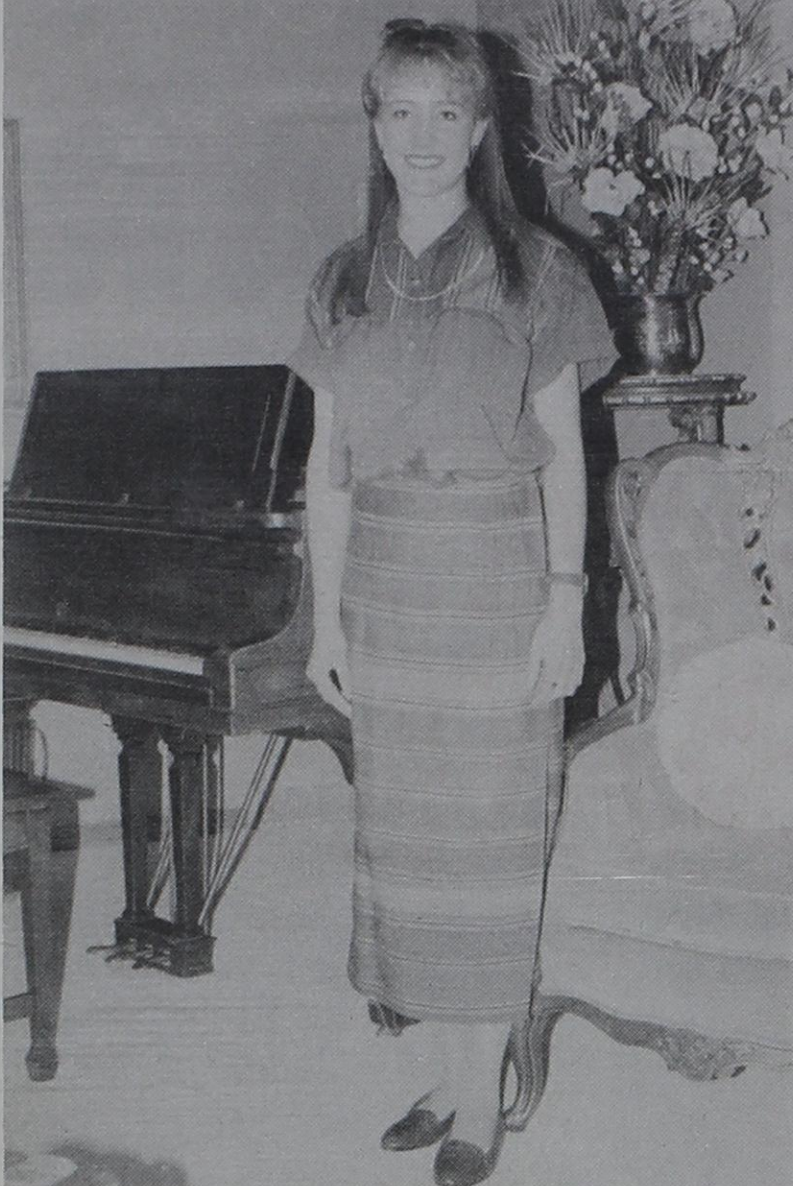


LITTLE MISS...Breann Barnett was the 1993 Little Miss Friona. She will help crown the 1994 winner on Tuesday.

## Anna Ostapenko Exchange Student Here From Russia

A new face in the halls and classrooms of Friona High School this fall is that of Anna Ostapenko, who came here from Zarechny, which is in the Penza region of Russia.

Anna, the daughter of Valerei and Antonina Ostapenko, grew up in the city of Zarechny, which has a population of about 80,000.

Her father is a public school teacher and teaches woodworking. "Like Mr. Carr," Anna reported.

Her mother, a technologist, is an employee of a manufacturing plant.

A brother, Igor, who is 29 is her only sibling. He is an airport employee.

In Russia, public school begins at the age of six and continues through eleven years. Anna attended public school her first nine years, then the last two she was a student in a private school, from which she graduated last spring.

As a senior in Friona High School, she is studying English III, English IV, government and history and plans to graduate in the spring of 1995. Her long-range goal is to become an English translator.

She speaks Russian fluently and is learning the English language rapidly. Her interest in becoming a foreign exchange student through the Freedom Support Act was encouraged by her parents and brother and she's looking forward to an enjoyable year here.

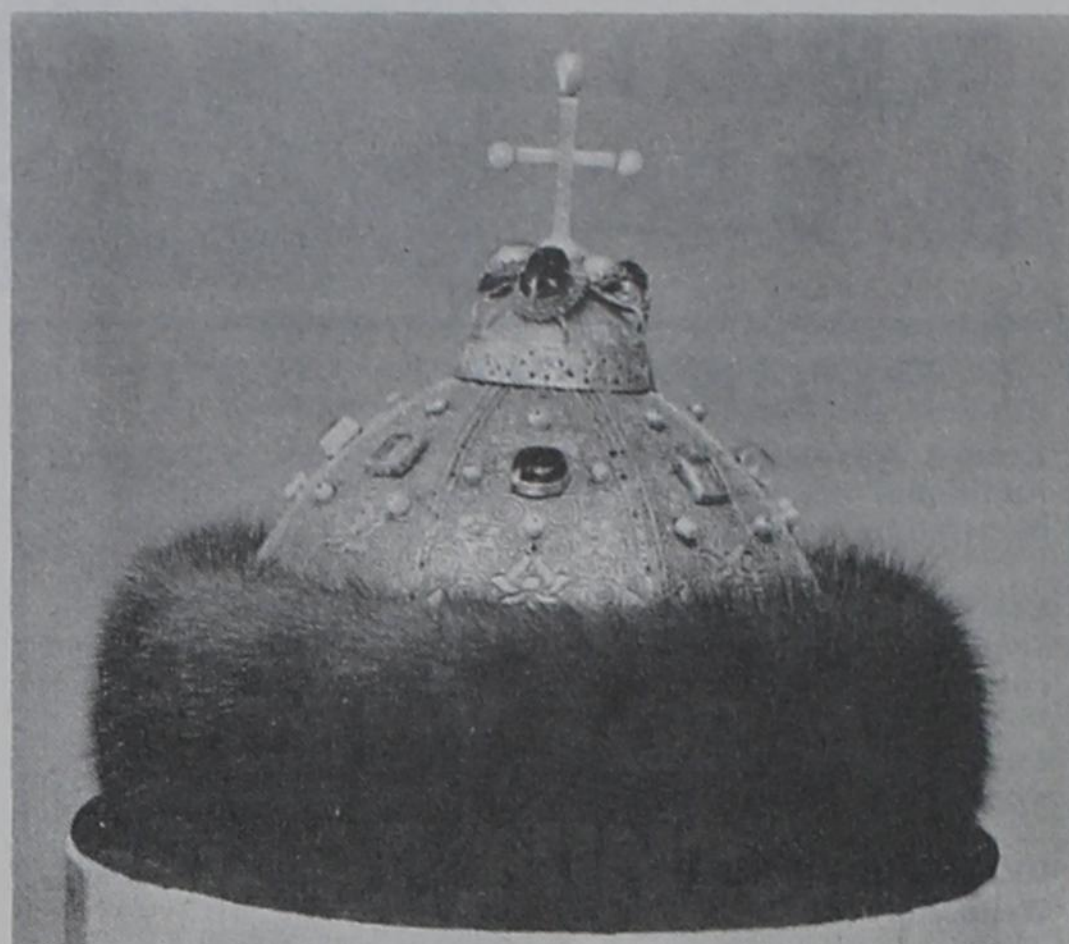
Anna's American family is Paul J. and Cynthia Smith and daughters, Jennifer, a junior at Texas Tech University and Jessica, a senior at Friona High School.

In making the trip from her home country to Friona, Anna flew from Moscow to New York then to Dallas and Amarillo, where she was met by the Smith family at Amarillo Airport.

One of the most popular sports in Russia is called "football" but the rules are very similar to the ones Americans play soccer by.

Anna's favorite sport is tennis. During her stay in Friona she should be able to improve her skills since the Smith home is very near the Friona High School tennis courts.

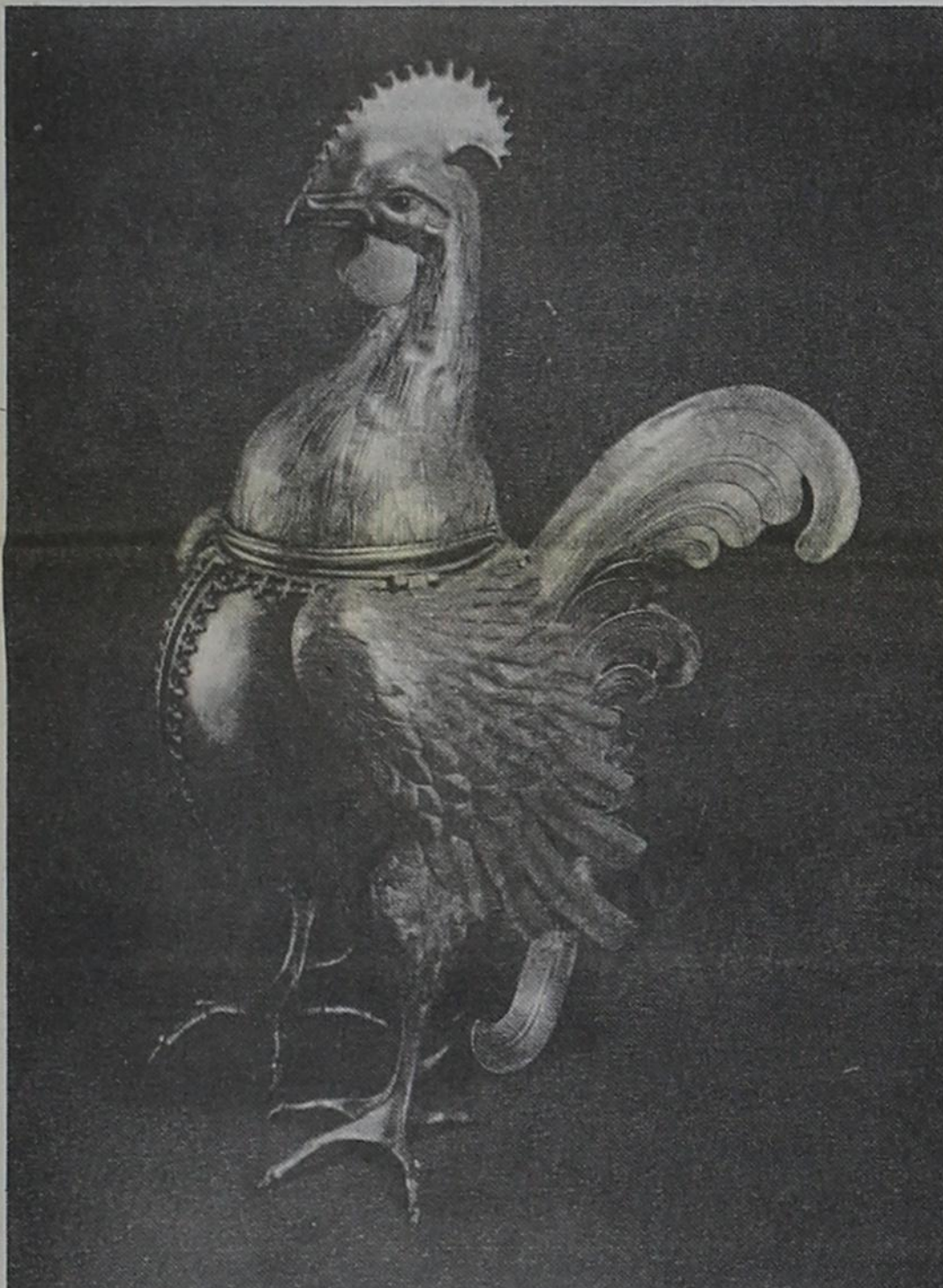
"I like Friona very much and am very happy here," was Anna's parting remark.



MONOMACHOS' CAP OF STATE, a relic of the time connected with the creation of the Russian centralized state and the growth of its power is a hereditary crown of the Russian Tsars. The cap was made in the East in the thirteenth or fourteenth century. Its gold crown is decorated with refined filigree. Gems and the precious sable band emphasize the magnificence of the Tsar's crown.



KAFTAN AND SUIT FOR COURT WEAR...By a special decree issued in 1700, Peter the Great obliged the Russian nobility to wear dresses of Western fashion. The ceremonial man dress displayed here was owned by Peter II when he was fifteen years old. It consists of a kaftan and a suit. The dress was made of scarlet cloth; the sleeves, pockets and flaps of the suit are decorated with magnificent silver embroidery.



COCK GOBLET.....According to the rules of diplomatic etiquette, foreign envoys on coming to Moscow presented the Tsar with their gifts. As far as in the fifteenth to sixteenth centuries, a wonderful collection of West European silver came into existence with the Tsar's treasury. The wine goblet, called "cock" in the ancient manuscripts, is a splendid artwork from the fifteenth century. An enamel inscription on the cover of the vessel indicates that it was made for Ivan III, the grand prince of Moscow.

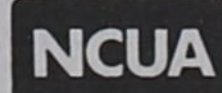

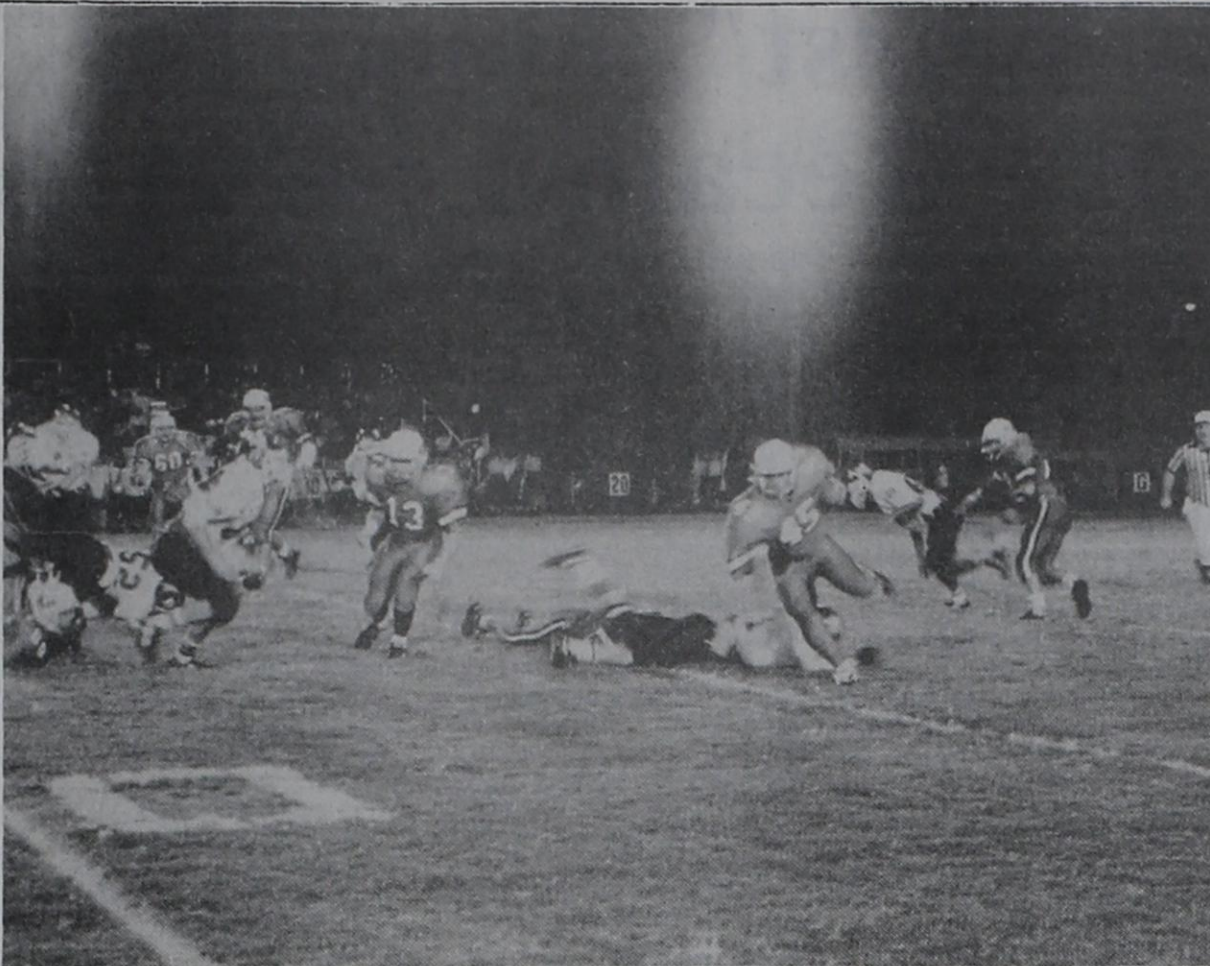

## Chieftains Put Scare Into Cats By 27-20

It happened again. The River Road Wildcats pulled off another final seconds win against the Friona Chiefs. Last year, it happened with four seconds remaining. This year, they did it in the last 1:10.

The Chiefs started the scoring with a 27-yard pass from Jay Belcher to Roy Hendley. In fact, the Chiefs had possession of the ball for most of the first quarter, and the touchdown left the Wildcats a little shaken, but not terribly disturbed.

So, before the half, River Road got on the ball. Two touchdowns made the score 14-7, in the Wildcats' favor, at the buzzer.

It would have been easy for the Chiefs to lay down and give up, but according to Coach James Morton,

"They came back from much adversity."

By the fourth quarter, the score was tied at 20-20. Both River Road and Friona had missed extra points that would have pulled them ahead.

With 1:50 on the clock, the Chieftains had the ball on their own 30 yard line and were making a steady drive toward another goal, when a fumble gave the ball back to River Road.

The Wildcats got the ball back, and turned the advantage into a winning drive, scoring with just

1:10 remaining. Quarterback Jeff Davis slipped through the Chieftain defense for a 60 yard run that left Friona fans and players nauseated. They had done it to us again.

However, good things did happen for the Chiefs on the field. "The Chiefs moved the ball downfield with some outstanding performances led by a 33 yard catch by Cory Hamilton from Jay Belcher. However, the drive was stopped short by the clock," said Coach James Morton. There were

The ceremony will be at the recently dedicated Veterans' Memorial on the South side of the Courthouse in Farwell, Texas.

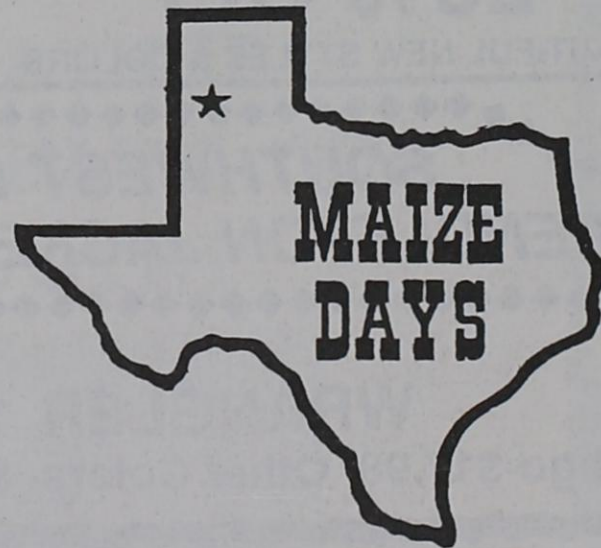
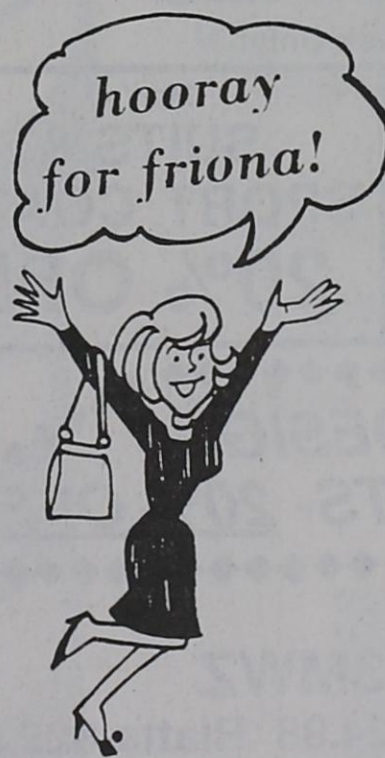

### Ex-Friona Resident Receives AFI Award

Craig N. Coon, a former Friona resident, received the American Feed Industry Association Research Award on August 11 at the Poultry Science Association Meetings held on the campus of Mississippi State University in Starkville, Mississippi.

The award is for distinctive, sound, and original nutrition research published during the ten preceding calendar years. Dr. Coon received a plaque and \$1,500 from the feed Association for this national honor.

Dr. Coon was recognized for his research in amino acid metabolism, calcium utilization, effects of the environment on nutritional requirements, developing laboratory methods to evaluate feed nutritional quality, and discovering processing technology for removing oligosaccharide carbohydrates from soybeans to improve the nutritional value of soybean meal.

Dr. Coon was also recognized for his large number of invited presentations as a speaker at locations all over the world. He is

a professor in the Department of Animal Science at the University of Minnesota.

Dr. Coon attended school at Flower Grove (south of Lamesa) from the first through the fifth grade and then moved to Friona in 1955. Craig graduated from Friona High School in 1962 and received his B.S. degree from Texas A & M in 1966.

Craig enlisted in the Marine Corps after graduation and served a 13-month tour in Vietnam in 1967-68. Dr. Coon returned to Texas A & M after his service duties and completed his Ph.D. in Biochemistry and Biophysics in 1973.

He is married to the former Jean Ann Scholl from McQueeney, Texas and the couple has two boys Steven (19) and Michael (15).

Dr. Coon and family presently live at 1837 Howell North, St. Paul, Minnesota 55113. Dr. Coon is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. N. Coon and is the brother of Rickey Coon both of Seminole.

# "Worst" Flood In County Is Recalled By Native

Sunday, August 29, 1932 is a day many in Bovina and Friona will never forget. It was in the afternoon that it began to rain and didn't stop until more than fifteen inches fell and in the days to follow four people lost their lives.

Clyde Blalock recalls the events when the 'big rains came'. He was only nineteen years old and said the clouds rolled in from the southwest and rained sheets of water. He said there wasn't much wind and no hail, only heavy rain.

The Blalocks lived north of Bovina by the Tom Griffin place. He had walked to town that day and had on his Sunday clothes. He said he stood under the edge of the old drugstore and watched it come down. He was waiting for a ride home and about 5:30 p.m., a neighbor, Coy Bates, came by and took him home.

At that time the highway was located where the Main Street of Bovina is now and joined the highway going to Hub. The deep water was about where the roping arena is now located. Blalock said people were wading halfway to their knees on level ground.

During the afternoon, a young couple from Friona was traveling back toward Friona when they reached the deep water and their car drowned out.

The man took their tiny infant to safety and laid her on higher ground even though the rain was still falling hard. He turned to go back for his wife and two other little girls only to see the car washing down the draw. He was unable to get to them, because by then, the water was chest deep. The family was named Waddell and he operated a gin in Friona.

It was impossible to get to the

lady and little girls and night was coming on, so the search was halted until the next morning.

On Tuesday morning two men brought saddle horses at the side of the draw and one was on one side and one on the other. They stretched a rope across the deep water which was about thirty feet across and chest high.

Clyde joined the twenty or thirty men who held onto the ropes and dug their feet in hopes to find the bodies. They searched all day Monday and it was Tuesday before they were found when the water began to run off. Clyde said, "Back then there were no dams so the water didn't do anything but come down and run off." He said the homes were never flooded because of the fast run-off.

When the bodies were discovered, they were ten or twelve

miles from where the car first stalled and it was south of Hub.

Mrs. Waddell's body was found at the bridge which had just been built where the Runningwater Draw crosses what is now State Highway 214, about five miles south of Hub. One of the children's bodies was discovered two or three miles further east of that spot.

On Monday, one of Bovina's young men, Richard Caldwell, joined the group who were searching for the bodies and he, too lost his life. He was only twenty years old and had just finished college that spring. He had a job teaching in the fall and was excited about it. He was the oldest son of E. T. and Margaret Caldwell.

Blalock said Caldwell was all dressed in his 'riding habit' with riding pants, blousy shirt, boots and hat. Caldwell slid off the horse

he was riding with intentions of helping with the search but lost his balance and drowned. His brothers were George and Tolbert and his sister was Rita. He was a cousin to Tom and Bedford Caldwell. This tragedy affected many people.

When asked how they knew exactly how much rain fell without rain gauges to measure it, Blalock said, "Well, George Trimble had a stock tank that was fifteen inches deep and it was dry when the rain began and by the time it quit, it was running over."

Clyde said he was glad he wasn't there on Tuesday walking in the water when the bodies were found because he didn't think he would have ever gotten over it.

Even though it has been sixty-two years, Clyde had tears in his eyes as he told the story.

## Stop-loss Orders Are For Traders

The stop-loss order is a stock-market trading technique that can be used to limit losses or to protect profits.

For example, suppose you buy a stock at \$50 a share and want to protect yourself from more than a 10 per cent loss. You can enter a stop-loss order for \$45 with your broker. If your stock's price drops to \$45, it becomes a market order and automatically sells at the next trade price. You have protected yourself from a continued drop in market value and limited your loss; however, the next trade could be below the stop price.

You also can use a stop-loss order to protect profits. Assume you bought a stock at \$50, and it has risen to \$75. Now you face the decision to either sell your stock and take your profits, or hold it and risk a price decline. A stop-loss order for \$65, for example, would protect a large portion of your profits yet allow you to keep the stock if its price remains high.

According to Kenneth S. Janke, Sr. of the National Association of Investors Corp., stop-loss orders are generally for traders, not long-term investors.

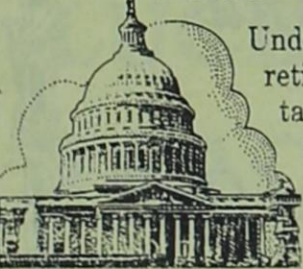
Investors who follow his Stock Selection Guide know that even if a stock's market value drops in the short term, its fundamental value can be unchanged. In fact, lower prices often make stocks more attractive.

Janke illustrated his point with an example from an investment club whose members decided to place a stop-loss order of 10 per cent on the club's entire portfolio. If any stock dropped 10 per cent, regardless of its fundamental value, it was sold.

One member disagreed with the stop-loss order. He believed that, when a stock's market value declines, if its fundamental value remains unchanged, it makes more sense to buy rather than to sell. So, every time the club's stop-loss order caused a stock to be sold, he told his broker to purchase 100 shares of the same stock for his personal account. The result? He made money, and the club didn't. The club members eventually voted to eliminate the use of stop-loss orders.

Stop-loss orders may be useful for in-and-out traders, but for long-term investors, slight decreases or increases in stock prices should be meaningless if the fundamental value of the stock hasn't changed.
