Congressman Larry Combest threatened. Since the Haitian lives were threatened," he military wears civilian clothes, plus the possibility of snipers, our losses would have been phenominal," he commented.

The congressman praised the work of the trio on behalf of the administration, but expressed his wonder that this avenue was begun at such a late hour. "The use of Gen. Powell and Carter was suggested to the administration months ago, and they waited until the 11th hour--which was almost too late," he said.

Combest warned that the "occupation" by our troops in Haiti Blade publisher Bill Ellis may turn out to be a marathon event. "By no stretch of the imagination are we out of the woods yet. The potential for death (of our troops) has been substantially reduced, but this is not totally without risk."

He said the use of American troops in this situation brings up the question: Is this an acceptable type of role for our military? "Could it have been accomplished, for instance, by the Red Cross?" he questioned.

The U.S. has never before gone into another country to restore

democracy, Combest explained. "Usually it's been that our national security was threatened, or Americans'

Asked what the cost might be to American taxpayers, Rep. Combest gave a two word answer: "A bunch. We don't know how long we'll be involved, nor the numbers we'll send. In addition, we'll pour in endless amounts of humanitarian aid. The Haitians have believed for a long time that we'd be able to come in and solve their problems, but I'm not sure we can. The cost will be significant, and the U.S. citizens will have to provide it."

He said that the Clinton administration got itself "in a box" on the Haiti matter. If the mediation had not succeeded, we would have had to invade Haiti, or suffer a tremendous loss of "face."



Cong. Combest said he had never supported any legislation to provide funding for situations such as this Haiti matter. "I opposed the Somalian situation, and it was instigated by the Bush administration, so I'm not just against the Clinton administration in this regard. "We have tried to be the world's bankers, their police force and their bailers-out of trouble, and we just can't continue to do this," the congressman stated.

Ellis asked the congressman if the president shouldn't go before congress on foreign policy matters that involved American

troop invasion. "Yes, very definitely; and the congress was opposed to the invasion. (After the president indicated that he would not seek congress' blessing) We tried to bring the matter up, on our own-but the Democrats, led by Speaker Foley, were adamently opposed to the matter being brought before the House--and the same thing was true in the Senate," the congressman continued.

It was pointed out that President Clinton moved the invasion date up a day (to Sunday), so that Congress, which was to re-convene on Monday, would not have a chance to pass a bill denying funding for the mission.

Combest praised the Carter team for staying beyond the time limit given them by President Clinton, until they got a deal worked out.

"But it's a pretty costly poker game when your ante is American lives--and residents of the Panhandle and South Plains are out there on some of those ships," he concluded.



State-Ranked S-E Blitzes Chiefs





State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director election, a person must own agricultural land within the election district. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years of age or older.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age or older and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and water conservation district directors serve fouryear terms of office.

Zone 1 of the district is all of the land in the Rhea and Bovina School district. Zone 2 of the district is all of the land in the north Friona and Black school districts.



Our mammography machine is certified by the American College of Radiology ensuring a quality film.

The American Cancer Society urges all women to have their first mammogram by age 40. Those who have a close relative with breast cancer or other risk factors may be asked by their doctor to have a mammogram at an earlier

Plans Are Progressing For Electric Generating Plant

Cooperative has filed with the Texas Public Utility Commission a notice of intent to apply for a certificate of convenience and necessity for construction of a new 400 megawatt generating plant.

Scheduled for initial operation in early 1998, the plant would consist of four 100 megawatt, simple cycle gas turbine powered generating units. Natural gas will be used as the primary fuel.

A final site selection has not been made, but two preferred sites are currently under consideration. One site is located in Moore County south of Sunray, and the other site involves properties in Yoakum and Gaines counties east of Denver City.

Approval by the Texas Public Utility Commission of the notice of intent will only give Golden Spread the right to file an application for a certificate of convenience and necessity, which is the authorization needed before the project could be constructed.

In its filing, Golden Spread advised the Commission that it also intends to solicit proposals from other utilities and independent power suppliers for both new capacity and demand side control Finley, 66, of San Angelo, were options. The solicitation will be made in about three months and will include a request for purchased

Golden Spread currently purchases wholesale power from Graveside rites were held in Southwestern Public Service Company and from West Texas Utilities Company. SPS' 1993 load and capacity resource forecast, which includes the Golden Spread loads, shows a need to construct 486 megawatts of new gas turbine generating capacity to serve area loads.

Golden Spread President Robert W. Bryant, said, "Our proposal does not duplicate any existing generating facilities. It simply means that SPS can defer the Survivors include one brother, construction of additional generating plants on its system, and that will benefit SPS retail consumers."



Is 20/20 Perfect Vision?

To qualify for pilot training, Air Force candidates have to have 20/20 vision, we are told. Does that mean that 20/20 signifies perfect vision? Not necessarily. All that

20/20 measures is visual acuity: that the individual can see clearly, at a distance of 20 feet, the objects or letters on a chart that most people with normal vision can. But there are other visual skills that are needed as well. For example:

*Can you see clearly and comfortably holding reading matter at the usual distance, 14 to 20 inches away?

*Can you change focus quickly from distant to near vision?

*Do you see clearly from the right or the left side?

*How's your depth perception?

*Can your eyes "track" a moving object?

Many children who test 20/20 have vision-related learning problems. There may be deficiencies in other visual skills that can be corrected if they are properly identified by an eye professional.

Stock Market Volatility Is Not On The Rise

Some investors avoid the stock market because they think it is too volatile. Daily fluctuations make them uncomfortable.

an international research and money management group.

The report found that, through 1993, the annualized rate of monthly volatility for the Standard & Poor's 500 was about 5 per cent--less than half the 40-year average of 11 per cent. In fact, when the study was made, monthly volatility was at a 75-year low.

Media attention to unusual volatility typically centers on individual stocks. Drastic drops in a stock's market value are usually caused by negative developments such as lower earnings, dividend cuts or unfavorable events at the company. Such short-term drops look dramatic, but they have little impact on the overall stock market.

Individual stock volatility is common in actively traded markets. The more radical movements typically occur with smaller company stocks rather than large, blue-chip corporations. These smaller companies often represent popular "glamour" industries such as gambling casinos, computer software and biotechnology. Such stocks often make major advances based mainly on trader speculation, which drives the market value far in excess of the company's earning

The Babson study reminds us that we are investing in a market of stocks, not in a stock market. There will always be individual stocks that go contrary to the market and are more volatile than Stock market movement is the market as a whole. These unpredictable, but is the stock isolated examples should not be market more volatile today than in confused with overall market years past? No, according to a direction. During periods of report by David L. Babson & Co. prolonged advances or declines in the market, the study found that occasional high volatility overall typically returned to the 5 per cent to 12 per cent range.

In addition, the percentage of a market movement is much more important than the actual number of points. For example, from about 1965 through 1983, the Dow Jones Industrial Average bounced between 500 and 1000. A change of 50 points represented as much as 10 per cent at that time, which is in the upper level of the historical volatility range.

With the Dow Jones Industrial Average at 3800, a 50-point change would represent less than 2 per cent. The market would have to move 380 points to register the same 10 per cent rate of volatility. Compare this to the bond market, which many people consider to be the more stable of the two security markets. A 1 per cent change in interest rates can affect the market value of a long-term bond as much

as 10 per cent. Financial experts agree that volatility in the stock market has not increased. In fact, not only is volatility low today, but studies of the market's performance back to 1920 show no indication of a trend toward increased volatility.



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
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
