Star Lites

PRESIDENT CLINTON'S cabinet members have been much in the news for the first two years of Clinton's administration. To those of us out in the nation's heartland, the cabinet could almost be called "Misfits and Oddballs, Inc."

Perhaps never in our nation's history have we had such a collection of strange and unusual people. Oh, well: P. T. Barnum and his partner, Mr. Bailey, perhaps had a group that could outdo the current cabinet, but they were rightfully displayed as "circus freaks," and weren't empowered with the authority to run certain segments of our nation.

Texas Lloyd Bentsen, the Secretary of the Treasury, is no doubt wondering why he agreed to join this cabinet. We never have been much of a Bentsen fan, mainly because his vote always cancelled out the conservative votes of our other senators from Texas, including the late John Tower and present senator Phil Gramm.

But compared to his cohorts, Bentsen almost comes across as Thomas Jefferson.

At the present time, at least two cabinet members are under fire: Housing secretary Henry Cisneros, and Agriculture Commissioner Michael Espy.

Cisneros, the former mayor of San Antonio, is under fire for possibly misleading FBI agents about his financial arrangements with a former girlfriend, Linda Medlar of Lubbock. Late last week, Cisneros admitted that he paid Medlar \$50,000 on three occasions after he took over the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). He had denied this as recently as two months previously.

Espy is under fire for accepting unlawful contributions from private industries, such as Tyson Foods, and for illegal use of government equipment and vehicles. He has made considerable amounts of restitution in recent weeks, but many insiders feel that Espy has been hurt to the point that he may have to be replaced.

Then there is our Surgeon General, Joycelyn Elders, who has managed to insult virtually all Americans with any amount of character, in her approach to controlling teenage pregnancies. Ms. Elders feels that the best approach is to hand out free condoms in our public schools. Her own son has been arrested on drug charges, but it doesn't seem to bother her.

Ms. Elders is somewhat like the mother in New York who wanted to hold the city responsible for her son's murder, after the youth was killed by rival gang members. Never mind that he had an arrest record as long as your arm. People are going to have to admit sooner or later that the shape of our nation and its character begins at home, where the child has to receive some guidance and teaching about right vs. wrong.

Clinton made it clear that he was going to appoint cabinet members who were "politically correct." In other words, he wanted a proportionate number of blacks and other minorities represented, as well as a good women-to-men balance.

The current cabinet is an excellent example of what happens when you strictly follow the "affirmative action" theory of hiring, where you have to have a fair proportion of members of ethnic minorities, women, etc. It is becoming more blatantly apparent as times passes that many of the Clinton appointees were made more on the basis of their skin color or sex (or both) than their qualifications.

Don't get me wrong, I'm all for hiring a proportionate number of minorities and/or women. But the Cabinet, as well as the Supreme Court, is a tough place for on-the-job training.

Attorney-General Janet Reno, after shouldering much of the blame for the Waco disaster early in her term, has managed to stay mostly away from controversy, as have

It may have been late September in Friona, the first full week of fall according to the calendar, but after a few cool mornings last week, the mercury topped out at summer-like highs during the last week of the month.

Official highs at Friona's NWS station were 96 on Wednesday and 94 on Thursday. The mercury hit 90 or above four straight days through Thursday, and they were the only days all month of 90 or above.

The 96 reading is probably a record high for the date, as it was at Amarillo.

No additional moisture fell during the week, leaving September with only .72 inches of moisture. The total moisture received for the calendar year 1994 stands at 16.67 inches, close to normal.

Happy Homemaker

A number of years ago, Carrie Tatum, a native Texan, who was born near Albany in Shackelford County, began compiling a recipe collection for the use of her children, Mary, Weldon and Tommy, and grandchildren, Debbie and Mary Beth Houlette; Pam, Jackie, Terry, Weldon, Jr., Wendy and Holly Tatum.

Later, after the collection had grown very large, she was encouraged by her children and their spouses and children to publish a cookbook. Her efforts to do this was the beginning of her first cookbook, "Carrie's Cooking." "Second Helping" and "Dillingham's Cooking" were her second and third.

Carrie's maiden name was Dillingham. She and Ellis (Knotty) Tatum were married in Shackelford County and lived there until after all three of their children

were born.

The family moved to the Black community in 1950 and to her present home at 610 Arrah, where Carrie has continued to live since the death of her husband, later.

For the next few weeks, we are borrowing recipes from "Carrie's Cooking."

The first section of the book is devoted to appetizers, pickles and relishes, so we will just start there.

LEAH'S PECAN CHEESE BALL

2-8 ounce packages cream cheese
1-8 ounce can crushed pineapple
1 cup chopped pecans
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
2 tablespoons chopped onion
1 tablespoon seasoned salt
1 cup chopped pecans

Soften cream cheese; drain pineapple. Gradually stir in the pineapple, pecans, green peppers, onion and salt. Chill well. Form

into ball and roll in second cup of pecans. Chill until serving time. Garnish with twist of pineapple slices, maraschino cherries and parsley. Serve with assorted crackers.

SAUSAGE BALLS

1 pound sharp Cheddar cheese
1 pound sausage (hot if desired)
3 cups Bisquick mix
6 drops Tabasco sauce (more if desired)

Grate cheese. Mix all ingredients together well and shape into small balls. Bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes. These freeze well.

CHEESE KRISPIES

2 cups grated Cheddar cheese
2 sticks margarine
2 cups Rice Krispies
Cayenne, salt and Tabasco sauce to taste

Cream first two ingredients. Add to Rice Krispies and mix well. Add cayenne, salt and Tabasco sauce. Make into small balls and place on ungreased cookie sheet. With fork, gently mash down. Bake at 275 degrees for 10 minutes--no longer.

CHEESE GRITS

6 cups water
2 teaspoons salt
1-1/2 cups long cooking grits
3 eggs
1 pound Longhorn cheese
3 teaspoons savory salt
Dash Tabasco sauce
Dash paprika
1 stick butter

Bring water to a boil; add grits slowly and cook 30 minutes or until done. Add salt, grated cheese, remaining ingredients and beaten eggs. Stir well and put in oblong Pyrex dish. Bake at 250 degrees for 1-1/2 to 2 hours. Good served with barbecued ribs or chicken and a tossed salad for a backyard supper.

SAUSAGE CHEESE BALLS

1-1/2 pounds mild sausage
2 cups Sharp cheese, grated
1 teaspoon cayenne pepper
2 cups biscuit mix
2 tablespoons water

Fry sausage in a skillet, stirring until crumbly and well cooked. Drain. Combine sausage, cheese, pepper and biscuit mix; add water and mix well. Form into one inch balls. Bake on greased cookie sheet at 375 degrees for 15 minutes or until light brown. Yields five dozen. Can be frozen.

CHEESE STICKS

Butter and sprinkle Parmesan cheese on slices of fresh white bread. Cut into sticks. Heat oven to 400 degrees. Turn heat off. Set bread in oven and leave overnight. Sprinkle with garlic salt.

HOT DOG RELISH

4 cups ground onions
1 medium head cabbage or 4 cups ground cabbage
10 medium green tomatoes or 4 cups ground tomatoes
12 green peppers
6 red peppers
1-2/3 cups sugar
1 tablespoon celery seed
2 tablespoons mustard seed
1-1/2 teaspoons turmeric
4 cups cider vinegar
2 cups water

Grind vegetables. Sprinkle 1/2 cup salt over them and let stand overnight. Rinse and drain. Combine remaining ingredients.

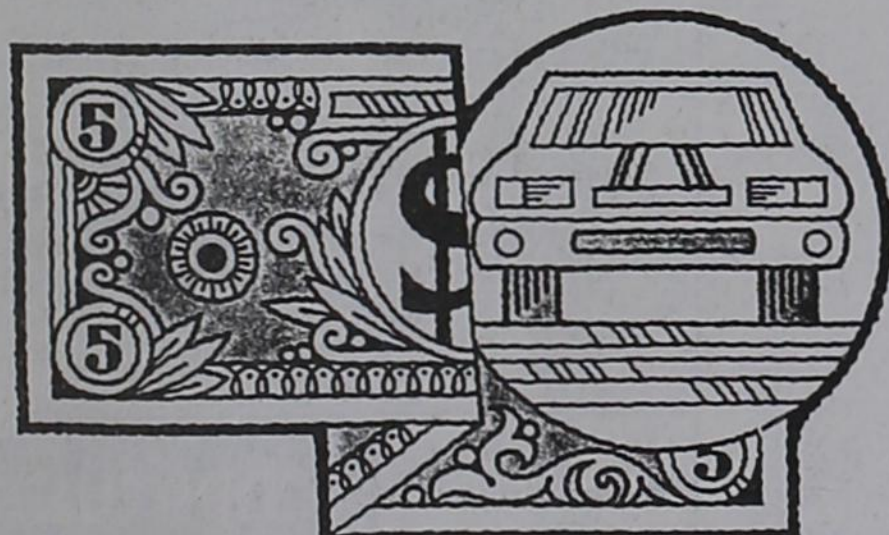

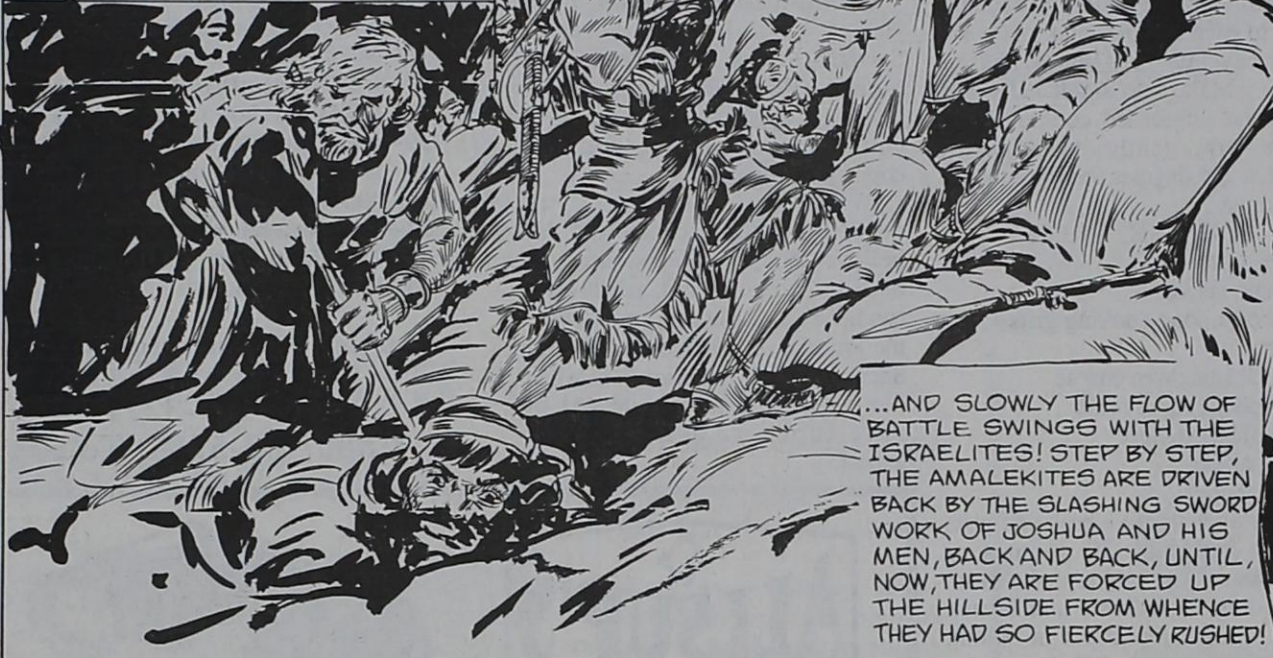

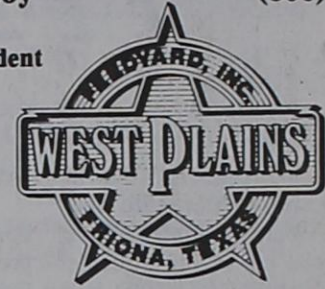

Understanding Bonds

As interest rates on certificates of deposit and money-market accounts have dropped during the past decade, record amounts have been invested into individual bonds and bond mutual funds. According to the Investment Company Institute, in 1982 there were 219 bond funds with assets of \$26.3 billion. Ten years later, there were 1,630 bond funds with \$580.9 billion in assets.

Most of this increase came from traditional savers who needed more income from their investments. With individual bonds and bond funds, however, like any other investment, it is important to understand the risk.

A bond is a loan. It is an I.O.U. issued by a borrower to a lender. Private companies, municipalities, states and government agencies issue bonds to raise money. When you buy a bond, you loan money to the borrower, or issuer. The amount you loan is the principal.

The issuer promises to return your principal at a specified future date (the maturity) and to pay you regular interest for the use of your principal. For example, when you invest \$10,000 in a 5 per cent bond that matures on Jan. 1, 1999, the issuer promises that you will receive your \$10,000 principal on that date. The issuer also promises to pay you \$500 in interest each year for the use of your principal. Bond interest is typically paid semi-annually.

You can sell your bond to

another investor before maturity. A broker handles this transaction in the secondary market. The market price you receive may be more or less than the bond's face value—your original principal. This fluctuating market price is related to the movement of interest rates in the economy.

The largest issuer of bonds is the federal government, which sells bonds through the Treasury or other federal agencies. States and municipalities sell bonds to finance roads, schools, sanitation and a host of other public projects. Corporations sell bonds to expand operations, finance long-term debt or pay for other capital projects.

A bond's quality is a major consideration. Independent research services such as Standard & Poor's and Moody's give bond ratings based on the issuer's ability to make timely interest payments and repay the principal when due. Your broker can give you the quality rating on any bond.

The maturity, or length of time until the principal is repaid, affects the interest rate. Generally, the longer the maturity, the more interest a bond pays. Typically, bonds are categorized into short-term (less than five years), intermediate-term (five to 15 years), and long term (more than 15 years).

Bonds and bond funds can be the answer if you're seeking higher income from your serious money. However, to be comfortable with your investment, you should understand the risks and rewards of bonds.
