MY FRIEND JACKIE.....
For the second time in just a few years, Ye Editor has lost a very close, personal friend.

First it was Dr. Lee Spring. Then this past week, Jackie Morgan. Each time, we were honored to serve our friend as pallbearer.

Although it's always tough to lose a close friend, this one was made harder by the fact that Jackie was a few years younger than Ye Ed, and had always been in top shape, health-wise.

Those who attended Jackie's services had to be moved by the number of people who came to pay tribute. It was mind-boggling how someone could have touched so many lives, in a relatively short time. The number of young people at his funeral was a testimony to the fact that Jackie loved young people. They were his life.

He always had a story about someone, even after they were grown and perhaps moved away. I can recall him saying things like "I had so-and-so in seventh grade football. You should have seen him then." He liked to keep up with what the kids were doing, after they had graduated, or moved on.

We first knew Jackie from his junior high coaching. Then later, our oldest two children both had driver's education under him when he moved up to high school. He was always a regular visitor to our office on Fridays, to turn in his football contest entry, and check on his standings.

That was our first realization of how well he kept track of things, and about his zeal to do the best in whatever it was he was doing. Jackie won a lot of checks on our contests down through the years, and he and his wife Dianne had each won the grand prize once.

The contest has always been a family affair with the Morgans, as it is with many others. With son Charlie, they never missed a week, and we'll always recall the time that they placed first, second and third on a weekly contest. We got a picture of the three of them with their prizes. To our knowledge, that never happened before or since.

Jackie kept a notebook with every team's schedule, and their scores as the season progressed. The Friona coaches (and anyone else who wanted to enter) had their own version of the contest, and our friend also had a stellar record in that one.

Everyone who was close to Jackie is aware of how the man loved to eat. Jackie and I had become travelling companions to out-of-town games for the past ten years or so. For both of us, the anticipation of the week's game was made even more exciting in planning where we would have our "pre-game meal." Except that over the years, we had developed our favorite places in each town, so that the site was usually no secret.

Mexican food was his favorite. Friona Superintendent Hal Ratcliff likes to tell about the time he and Jackie were at Tulia's El Camino Restaurant, which has a "dinner for two" on the menu. When the waitress came to take their orders, Jackie spoke up and ordered the dinner for two. The waitress started off, and Jackie stopped her, saying "Aren't you going to take my friend's order?"

We've often called Jackie the number one fan of the Dallas Cowboys. He, Dianne and Charlie (or just the two guys) had a tradition of going to Dallas' Thanksgiving Day games. He could tell you about the time Dallas staged its fantastic rally to beat the Redskins on a come-from-behind, as well as the famous "Clint Longley" game, when the unknown backup Cowboy QB came in for an injured Roger Staubach, and paced the win (that one also against Washington, if memory serves).

No one suffered more when the Cowboys lost, or felt better when they won.

The fact that Jackie enjoyed life

Bentley Wins For Second Time, '94

Jerry Bentley became a two-time winner for 1994 in the Friona Star's Football Contest.

Bentley was the only contestant entering the eighth week contest to correctly pick 13 of the 16 contest games.

Bentley claimed the \$10 prize after missing only the Littlefield-Shallowater, Colorado St.-Utah and Chicago-Detroit.

The Littlefield-Shallowater game was an automatic "miss," since it was a tie game.

Eleven other contestants had scores of 10, and 23 had the most popular score, nine.

Bentley's excellent score shot him into a four-point lead in the overall standings with a score of 91. Jerry Hinkle is in second place at 87, and Roddy Berend is third with a score of 85.

Tied for fourth place are Myrtle Melton, Mitchell Smiley, Jimmy R. Walker and Bobby Wied, all with scores of 84.

We have 70 girls registered in our scouting program this year which is increased from last year's numbers. And as with any program the cost of running it increases each year also.

We have expenses for building upkeep, liability insurance, repairs, and monthly utility costs.

The funds also provide the materials needed for crafts, badge workshops, and field trips related to badges earned by the girls. Our Service unit is one of the most active in our area and Caprock Council covers 18 counties.

The troops have fund-raisers throughout the year to help for some of our special activities but the bulk of the funding comes from our local United Way.

We have our own Day Camp program in Friona that is run by local leaders and parent volunteers. Friona has for the last two years been holding their own badge workshops. This helps to give the girls a wider opportunity of learning and earning badges at the same time.

Other special events like Father/Daughter banquet, Halloween carnival, Christmas caroling, community service projects, and Maize Days float are just a few of our activities. We are very proud of our volunteer leaders and our community.

All United Way money is kept locally except for \$250 that is sent to our Council in Lubbock to help them cover the cost of training for our leaders and mail-out information cost.

The rest of the funds are used to build a program that Friona can be proud of and the impact on the girls is immeasurable. Thank you for your support!

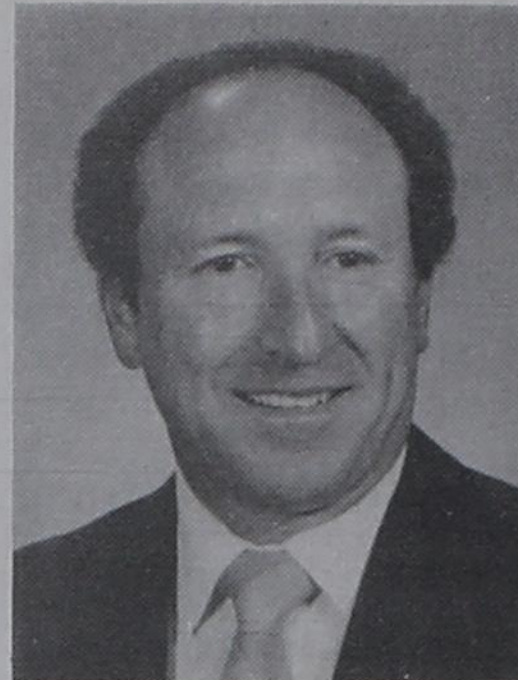

Did You Know?

Harry S. Truman was the 33rd President of the United States. He served from 1945-1953. Two of his statements: "We believe that all men are created equal because they are created in the image of God."

"The fundamental basis of this nation's laws was given to Moses on the mount. The fundamental basis of our Bill of Rights comes from the teachings we get from Exodus and St. Matthew, from Isaiah and St. Paul. I don't think we emphasize that enough these days. Services Held Here For Jackie Morgan

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon, October 23, at First Baptist Church for Jackie Morgan, 52, a longtime employee of the Friona Independent School District.

Officiating were Rev. Charles Broadhurst, pastor, and Rev. Geary Brogden, minister of music and youth.

Burial was in the DeLeon Cemetery Monday afternoon. Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home of Friona was in charge of local arrangements.

Morgan passed away Friday, October 21 at the High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo after a lengthy illness.

He was born September 3, 1942 in Gorman, but grew up in DeLeon, where he played halfback on the football team.

Morgan married Dianne Clearman at the First Baptist Church of Summerfield.

He received his bachelor's degree from Howard-Payne University, Brownwood, in 1966. He joined the FUSD staff in 1966. He received his master's degree from WTSU in 1975, and earned his counselor's certificate from Eastern New Mexico University, Portales, in 1984.

Morgan began as a junior high

coach and science instructor. He later moved to the high school, where he taught driver's education, physical education and coached golf. He organized the girls' golf program at Friona, and in the ten years he served as coach, his teams qualified for the regional tournament nine times.

During his tenure as high school counselor, 75 per cent of the seniors went on to college or to post-high school training.

An avid golfer, he was a member of Friona's First Baptist Church, and the Texas Association of Counseling and Development. He took medical retirement from the FUSD last May after 28 years with the system.

Survivors include his wife, Dianne, of the home, a son, Charlie Morgan of Dallas; his parents, Charles and Mae Morgan of DeLeon, and a sister, Xandra Carter of DeLeon.

Pallbearers were Mickey Griffin, Mike Meyer, Donald Herbert, Tommy Singleton, Wade Freeman, David Hutson, Mike Hutson, Hal Ratcliff, Bobby Drake and Bill Ellis.

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Happy Homemaker

Since I've been visiting in the home of my son-in-law and daughter, John and Geneva Osborn, in Tipton, Oklahoma, I've enjoyed browsing through a very unique cookbook.

It is entitled "Heavenly Recipes" and was compiled by the Dimmitt Chapter of Lubbock Christian College Associates.

Many of the recipes were contributed by former Friona or Parmer County residents, so I'm borrowing some of them for Happy Homemaker.

This week a native Friona, Murna Welch Miller, is being featured. She and her husband, Jack Miller, a Dimmitt native, lived in Dimmitt many years and raised their family there.

REFRIGERATOR ROLLS
2-1/2 packages yeast
1 teaspoon sugar
1 cup warm water
2 cups milk (scalded and cooled)
2 cups corn oil 3/4 cup sugar
2 teaspoons salt 2 beaten eggs

10-11 cups flour
Mix together yeast, sugar and water. In mixer bowl, mix milk, corn oil, sugar, salt and eggs. Add yeast water. Beat well and slowly, adding 10 to 11 cups flour. Pour out on floured board. Let rest 10 minutes. Knead and place in greased bowl in refrigerator. Keep punched down until cold. Cover with plastic wrap. Take out desired amount to use. Make into rolls or use for sweet breads. Bake in 375 degree oven 15 to 20 minutes.

CINNAMON ROLLS
1/4 recipe refrigerator rolls Sugar Butter (about 1/4 lb.) Cinnamon
Roll dough out into large rectangle (about 20"x16"). Slice thin slices of butter and place all over dough. Cover with thin coating of sugar and sprinkle cinnamon all over. Roll into roll, punching edges together. Slice 1" thick and place in pans to rise until doubled. Cook in 350 degree oven for about 20 minutes. Glaze should be put on immediately after removing from oven.

GLAZE
1/2 cup powdered sugar
Add half and half to make a thick paste
(Start with a few teaspoons.)
CHEESE ROLLS
2 cups warm water 1 package yeast
1/2 cup sugar 1 teaspoon salt
1/3 cup corn oil 1 egg, beaten
6 cups flour
1 to 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese
Mix water and yeast. Let set. In mixer bowl, add sugar, salt, corn oil and egg. Add yeast mixture and 3 cups flour. Beat until smooth. Add remaining flour and cheese. Let rise in warm spot one hour.

Punch down and place in refrigerator. Cover tightly. Use at will. Bake at 37 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes.

JEANIE'S CHICKEN ENCHILADAS
2 chickens, boiled, boned and chopped
6-8 tortillas 1 onion, chopped
1 teaspoon chili powder
1-10 ounce can cream of chicken soup
1-10 ounce can cream of mushroom soup
1/2 pound grated cheddar cheese
1/2 can Ro-Tel tomatoes
Cook tortillas in chicken broth

until tender. Line bottom of large casserole dish with tortillas, then layer chicken, onion, chili powder, soups, cheese and tomatoes. Bake at 350 degrees 35-45 minutes. Serves 8-10.

MOTHER'S CARAMEL PIE
1/2 cup sugar 3 egg yolks
1 cup sugar 3 tablespoons flour
1/3 cup milk 2/3 cup milk
1/2 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla flavoring
3 tablespoons butter
1/4 teaspoon salt
Baked 9" pie shell, cooled

Cook 1/2 cup sugar over very low heat, stirring constantly until melted and light brown. Beat egg yolks slightly. Sift sugar and flour together and add to egg yolks. Then add 1/3 cup milk, mix well; add 2/3 cup milk and mix well; then add 1/2 cup milk and mix well. Add this to browned sugar in skillet (this mixture will be very hard and lumpy). Continue stirring over low heat until smooth and thick. Add vanilla, butter and salt. Stir well. Cool. Pour into cooled pie shell. Top with meringue and cook at 350 degrees 10-15 minutes.

3 cups cake flour, sifted
Dash of salt
1-1/2 teaspoons vanilla flavoring
Sprinkle 1/2 cup pecans in greased and floured 10" tube pan. Set aside. Cream butter and cream cheese gradually adding sugar. Beat until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time beating well after each addition. Add flour and salt, stirring until combined. Then add vanilla and remaining 1 cup pecans. Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 1-1/2 hours or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan 10 minutes. Remove from pan and cool completely on rack.

HOMEMADE CHOCOLATE ICE CREAM
5 eggs 1-1/2 cups sugar
1-3 1/2 ounce package chocolate instant pudding mix
1 heaping tablespoon cocoa
2 quarts light cream
2 teaspoons vanilla flavoring
Beat eggs and sugar then add pudding mix and cocoa (sift into mixture). Add cream and vanilla. Freeze in a 1-1/2 gallon electric freezer.

MY FAVORITE POUND CAKE
1-1/2 cups chopped pecans, divided
1-1/2 cups butter, softened
1-8 ounce package cream cheese, softened
3 cups sugar
6 eggs (room temperature)

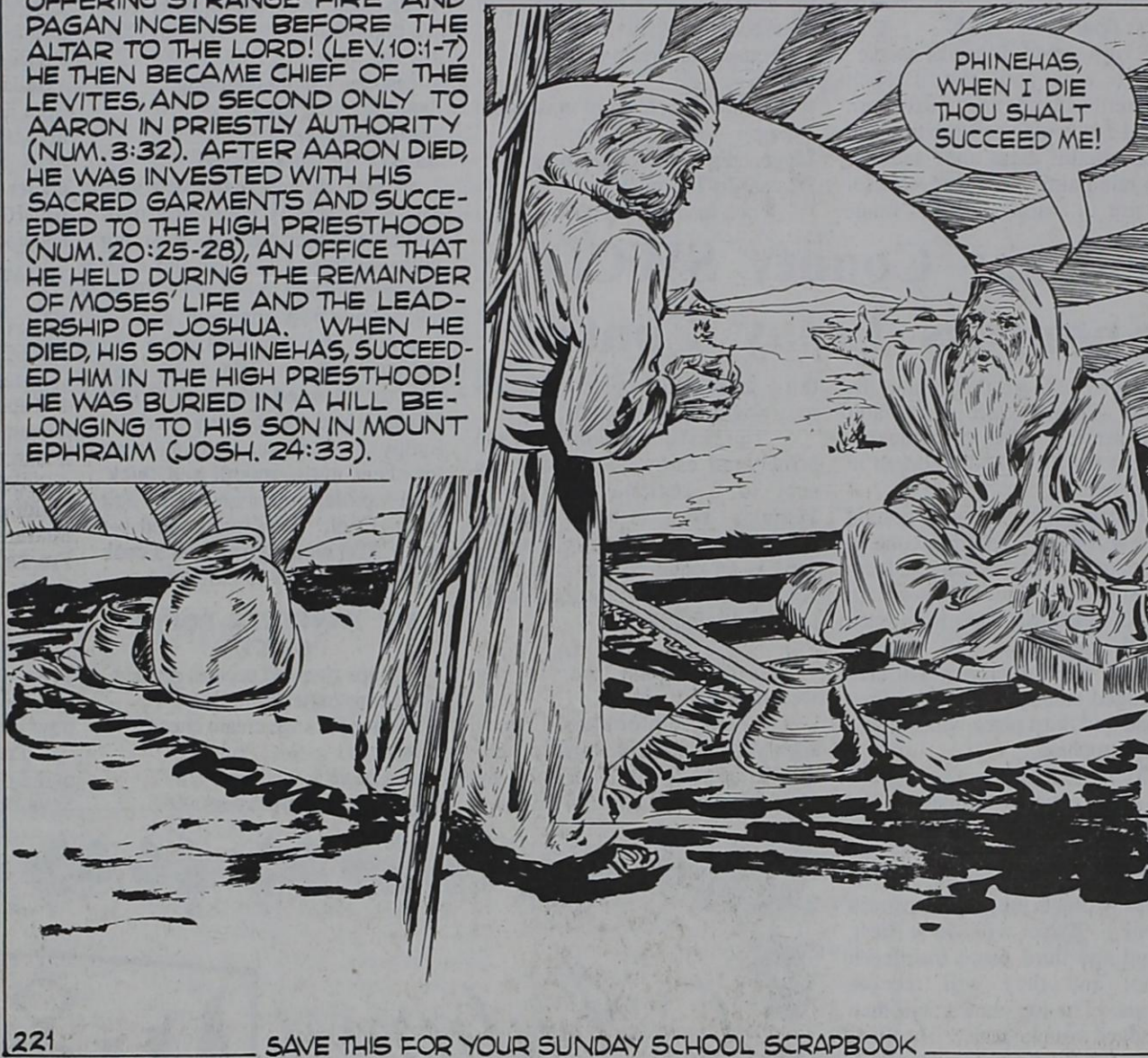

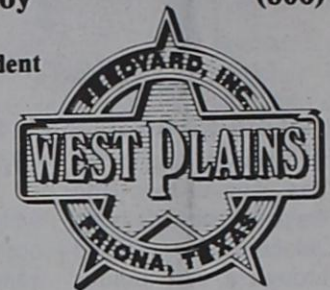

Chiefs Edge 'Cats; Rare Win At Dimmitt

"We won! That's all that matters!" said Josh Snead. That seemed to be the prevailing feeling after last Friday's 14-12 win over the Dimmitt Bobcats. The Chiefs remain undefeated in district play.

It was Friona's first win over the Bobcats on their home turf since 1973, and only the fourth Chieftain win at Dimmitt in the entire series, which was renewed for the 58th time since 1930.

Chieftain scores came off in short runs by Chris Hanna and Jay Belcher in the second and fourth quarters. The two point-after kicks by Kit Preston proved to be the difference in the game.

"Ball control was much better this week," said Coach James Morton. "But we can still improve somewhat."

The ground attack was led by Juan Gamboa who had 141 yards on 15 carries. "The line blocked well for Juan," said Jay Belcher. Chris Hanna added 88 yards on 17 tries, Lance Looper had 29 on three, and Belcher added 25 on seven.

Looper almost scored in the fourth quarter, with a break through middle, but the run was called back due to a clipping penalty.

"I thought that I was gonna score, then I saw a yellow flag, and I was so mad," said Looper. "They always get me at the goal line."

"In the last three games, he's almost scored," said Rusty Simmons.

Leading the defense was Jerard Lafuente with 20 tackles. Cory Hamilton followed with 15, and Dale Perez had 12. "The special teams kept them inside the ten two times," said Jay Belcher.

The Chiefs intercepted three Bobcat passes: Lafuente, Hanna and Roy Hendley each snagged one. It was clearly another defensive game.

Belcher scored from seven yards out on a quarterback draw play on the first play of the fourth quarter. The run climaxed a crisp Friona drive for its score.

Hendley's interception in the last two minutes of play killed the final drive, as the Bobcats had to

abandon their ground game and try to pass to get the winning score. A Chieftain punt that was killed at the Dimmitt five had backed the Bobcats up prior to their desperation series.

"The runningback from Dimmitt, Derrick Thomas, is as good as any we have or will face this year," said Morton. "Other than an 80 yard run, the defense kept him pretty quiet for the night."

"I was proud of the way they hung in there and did what they had to do," said high school principal, Frank Belcher. "They showed a lot of discipline, especially against a back like Thomas."

This Friday, the game is against Littlefield, and it's going to be a tough one. "It's the game of our life," said Lance Looper. "We haven't beat Littlefield since '76."

They're a formidable obstacle to the Chieftains capturing the district title. "It's gonna be another defensive game," said Josh Snead.

"We're going to have to play smart," said Rusty Simmons. You can bet the stands will be jam-packed for this one!

Mark Galan was the leading rusher with 45 yards, and Ellis had 42. Fidel Rodriguez added 18 yards.

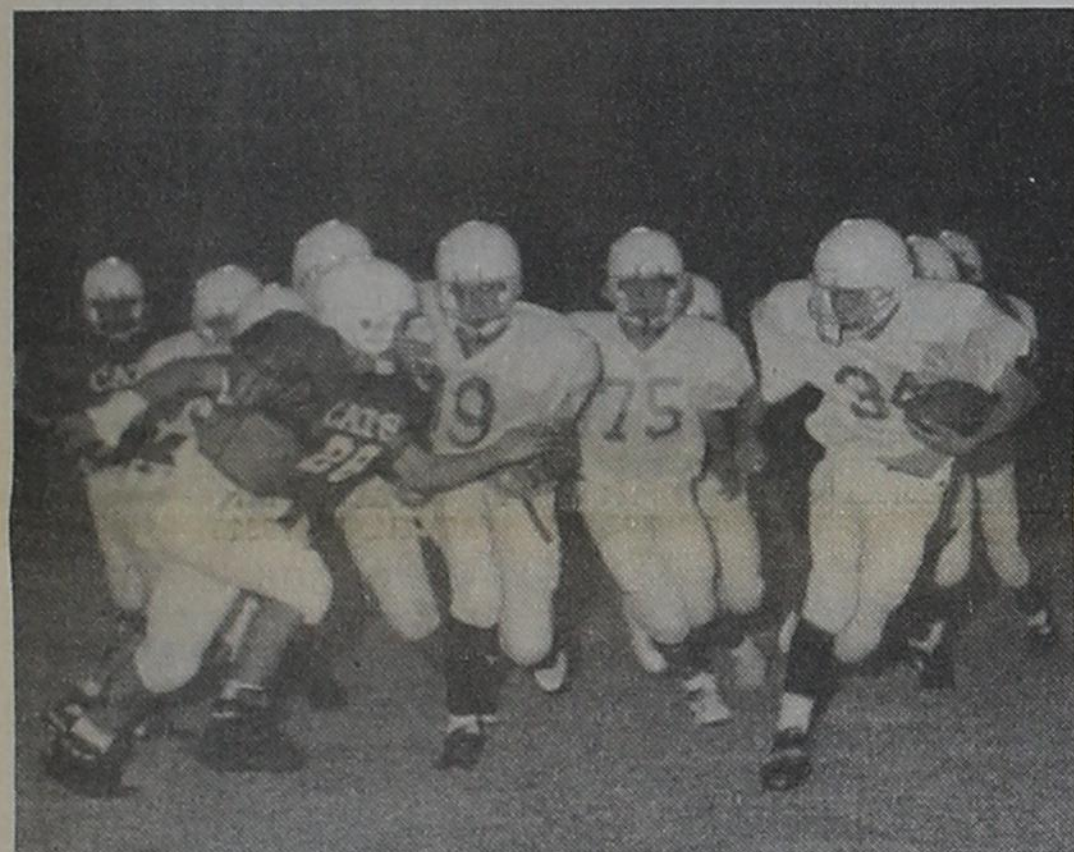
Kyle Grimsley completed six of six passing attempts for 85 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

The running of Cuevas and Sammy Perez paced the Chiefs' offensive attack. Friona racked up a total offense of 194 yards.

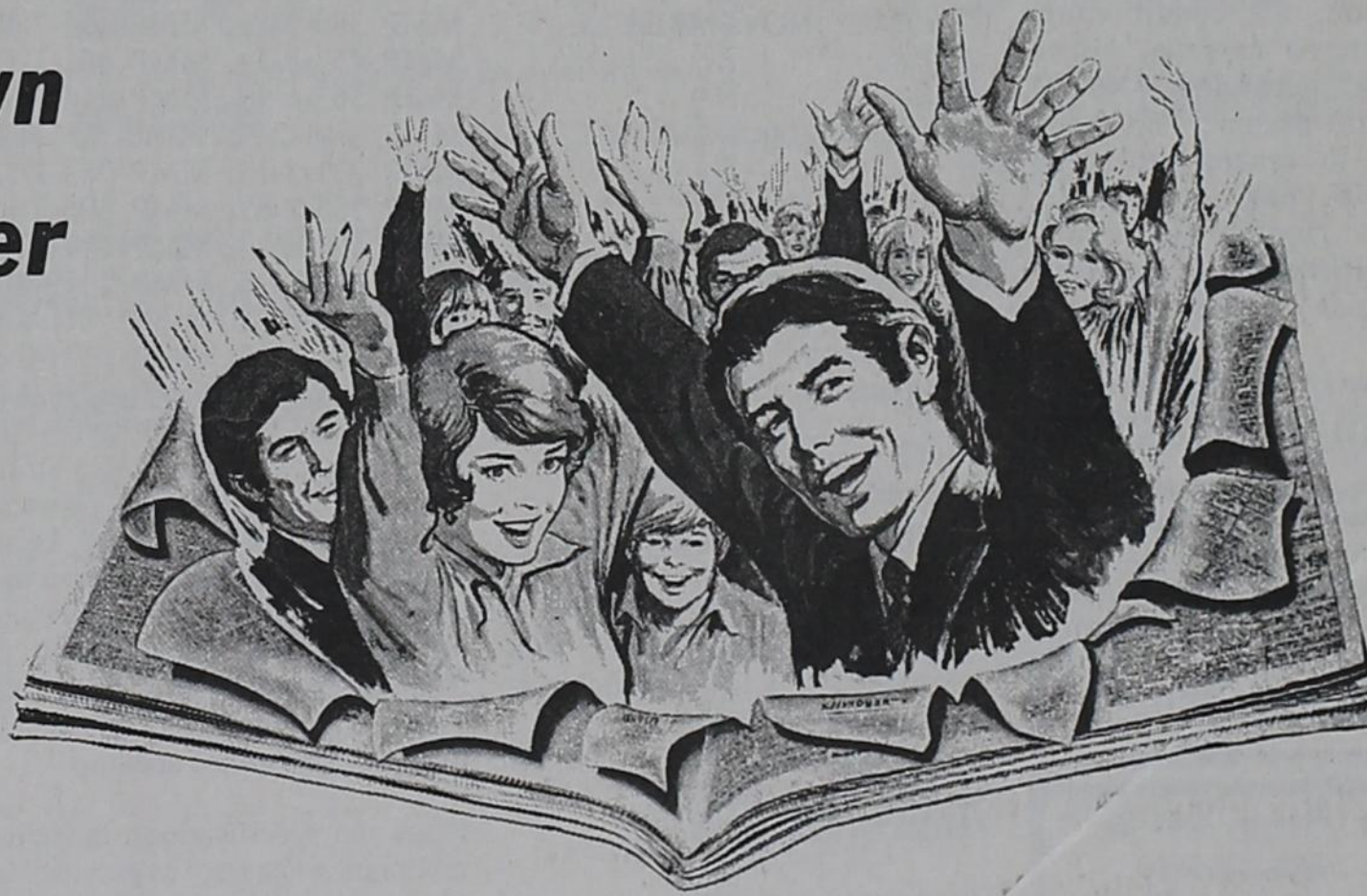
Coaches credited the great line play, especially on defense, where Friona successfully made three goal-line stands to turn back potential Dimmitt scores.

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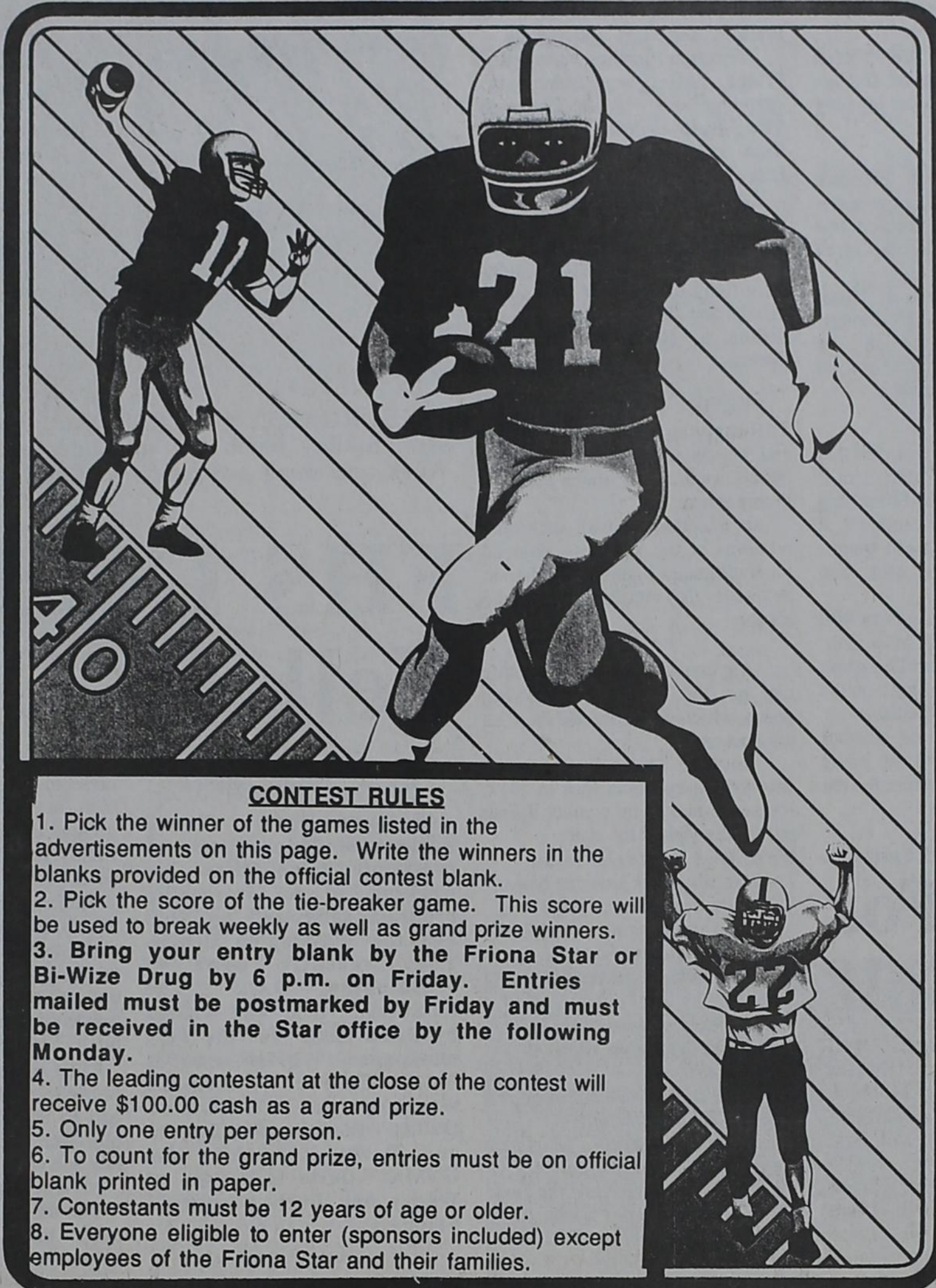

Women And Their Contact Lenses

When women report discomfort with their contact lenses, the problem may be related to their menstrual cycles. Researchers at the University of Houston studied the relationship between such discomfort and hormonal changes

that occur during menstruation and menopause.

For example, one of the common complaints is dry eyes and blurred vision. This has been attributed to increased tear evaporation during the menstrual period. Conversely, thickening of the cornea during the premenstrual phase of the cycle is due to the sodium and water retention common at that time. In addition, there is often increased irritation from lenses through the menstrual period. Pregnant women, too, may find wearing their lenses uncomfortable.

If you are experiencing any discomfort, check with your optometrist. The first response to ease eye irritation is usually prescribed or over-the-counter eye drops. In some cases, it may be necessary to switch to eye-glasses for a while.
