**TIMING IS EVERYTHING**, a wise person once said. If it wasn't for the fact that we've heard that adage for a good part of our life, we might swear the sooth-sayer was talking about the 1994 election, concluded this past Tuesday.

In particular, the statement applies to the sudden emergence of George W. Bush, who was swept into the Texas governor's office in the anti-Clinton, anti-incumbent tidal wave on Tuesday.

For instance, consider the fact that in the only other political race of Bush's career, he was fairly soundly defeated in 1982 by Kent Hance, when the pair locked horns to become the replacement of longtime Congressman George Mahon of Lubbock, who had just retired.

Hance, of course, was the good 'ole boy from Dimmitt who had made quite a name for himself as a state senator from the Lubbock area. That had given him the reputation and connections for his win over Bush, who came out of a Midland background.

The very idea, anyone trying to get elected in this area on the Republican ticket. No wonder Bush was defeated. Didn't he know folks in this area only vote in the Democratic column? He had a lot to learn.

What Ye Editor remembers most about the Bush-Hance race of 1982 was when the then future president's son scheduled a meeting in Bovina, where he hoped to meet the folks of Parmer County and discuss the issues.

Ye Editor was in his Bovina Blade office the day advertised for Bush's appearance, and at the appointed hour, picked up his camera and sauntered over to the Bank's community room to help George W. greet his public.

Bush was there, putting out his pre-printed materials, as I came in and introduced myself. About five or ten minutes later, Bovinian Fred O'Hair came wandering into the room, and although we didn't realize it at the time, that was the crowd!

Naturally we were embarrassed by the lack of a turnout, even if Bovina voters hadn't planned to vote for Bush (which they didn't--Parmer County gave a landslide to their Dimmitt neighbor).

But we recall that Bush was unshaken, and spent the entire time visiting with Fred and myself, and when it was about time for him to depart, I snapped a picture of the candidate with his audience, for that week's Bovina Blade.

George W. could have stayed a few minutes, and told the two of us, "Well, thanks for coming by, fellows, but I think I'll head on up to Hereford." But he didn't. Just like the old story about the Baptist minister on the snowy Sunday morning in the rural church with one brave soul able to make it to the church, Bush gave us his "whole sermon."

Someone should have told the young politician when he was scheduling the stop that Bovina didn't usually vote in the Republican column. However, this week they gave Bush a margin of 193 to 138 over Ann Richards, and for longtime Democratic voters, that's a pretty good about-face.

I suppose that politicians take the bad along with the good, and that they schedule many stops that turn out like our one-table discussion at the Bovina bank. Probably our governor-elect doesn't even remember that day, which might have been typical of his ill-fated race against Kent Hance.

But maybe we could invite the new governor to come back, perhaps for a Chamber of Commerce banquet, and we'll promise up front to try to do better in the attendance department. I know next time I'll insist that Carol come along. And we'll stop and get Scooter and Jim. I'm sure that Fred O'Hair would be there.

## Local Hospital District Shows Recent Growth and Progress

The future looks good for health care in Parmer County according to Hospital Administrator Bill Neely and Clinic Administrator Marilyn Watson.

Since the new hospital district went into effect in early 1990, replacement of old equipment and recruitment of more doctors and PAs have been the primary targets for both the hospital and clinics.

Parmer County Hospital and the Rural Health Clinics are separate entities, but they work together in offering the finest possible health care to residents of this area.

Both administrators feel that the recent re-opening of the Bovina Clinic is a great stride forward in offering better service to the people.

The hospital, being one of the largest employers in the county, has 71 employees with a payroll of a million and a quarter in 1993. The Friona and Bovina Rural Health Clinics employ 19 people, including three doctors and two PAs.

Dr. Bob Alexander is the "granddaddy" of the physicians' staff, having been in Friona for nearly 30 years. Physician's Assistant Linda Conlee has been here two years. Dr. Felipe Jubay and Dr. Anthony Orme have both been with the staff for one year. PA Jose Perez is the newest member of the group, having been here for just a few months.

Between 40 to 75 patients are seen per day in the clinics during the regular work week, according to Marilyn Watson.

Bill Neely indicates that, as the newer physicians build a good patient base, the hospital will be more in use in the future. Currently, the 34 bed hospital has an average of four patients per day. Government regulations affect the

expenses of running the hospital regardless of the number of patients in the facility at any one time.

New hospital equipment and services are now making it possible for area residents to be treated at the local facility more often, instead of being transferred to hospitals in larger cities.

For instance, proceeds from the recent charity golf tournament went to purchase a portable X-ray machine, which can be used in the trauma unit or taken to patient rooms when the patient is too ill to be moved to the X-ray room. The hospital is expecting delivery of the portable X-ray in the near future.

A traveling portable CAT-scan unit is brought to Friona two days each week and has been a great diagnostic aid to the physicians' staff. The hospital now has the facilities to do ultra-sound exams, plus a tele-radiography element enables the doctors to transmit the

## Voters Join Nation In 'Throwing Bums Out'

Friona and Parmer County voters turned out in record numbers for a mid-term election on Tuesday, to join those across the state and nation in their anti-Democratic and anti-incumbent mood.

Local voters even extended this trend to the one contested county-wide race, where incumbent Marjorie Watkins was edged by challenger Sandra Warren, 1285 to 1173 in the race for Parmer County District Clerk.


One exception was in Friona's justice of the peace race, where incumbent Frances Euler won re-election with a 785-355 win over Republican challenger Reba Holt.

George W. Bush, who defeated incumbent Ann Richards in the governor's race with surprising ease state-wide, got an even heftier margin locally.

Bush won the three Friona voting boxes, 622-235, or 72.4 per cent. He won at Bovina, 184-137, a 57.3 per cent edge. In county totals, Bush received 1,726 votes to 794 for Richards, a 68.3 per cent margin.

Local voters also went overwhelmingly for Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison in her re-election bid over Richard Fisher. Ms. Hutchison, who had a campaign stop in Friona, won in that community, 714-106, or a whopping 86.7 per cent margin. She won in Bovina, 257-82, or 75.8. Her margin countywide was 2,040-422, which is an 82.6 per cent margin.

Second only to Sen. Hutchison's vote margin in Parmer County, incumbent state Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry polled 1,880 votes to 462 for Gregory and

12 for Garland.

Perry also has made visits to Parmer County, including serving as a Chamber of Commerce speaker. His margin in the county was 79.8 per cent. Perry's margin in Friona was 668-122, an eye-popping 84.5 per cent margin.

In her race for re-election, Mrs. Watkins won boxes at Bovina, 183-157, Farwell, 275-176, and Rhea, 23-21. But she lost all three Friona boxes, by a combined 468-348 margin, and also was edged at Oklahoma Lane, Lazbuddie and in the early voting box.

A total of 2588 Parmer County residents cast votes on Tuesday, which was 64.2 of the registered voter strength of 4031.

One of the higher voting

turnouts was in Friona's precinct 201, where 768 residents voted (including early voting), a commendable 69.5 per cent turnout. The statewide turnout was estimated at around 55 per cent of the registered voters.

Parmer County's voter turnout in 1990, the last "mid-term" election, was 2,164. That figure amounted to 56.3 per cent of the total.

The precinct totals and percentages listed in the individual races above do not include the early voters, which are all lumped together as such.

# Friona Flashbacks

65 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 15, 1929

On Friday and Saturday of last week this vicinity was visited with one of the finest snows we have ever had, owing to the fact that it did not drift badly and contained an abundance of moisture. The temperature did not drop much below freezing.

The new laundry equipment which was purchased by Dr. McElroy for his laundry in the north part of town arrived last Saturday, and will be installed as rapidly as possible.

60 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 16, 1934

The high school auditorium was filled to capacity last Sunday night for the special Armistice Day program. Mayor F. W. Reeve was master of ceremonies, and gave the opening address.

The schools, churches, women's clubs, city and Chamber of Commerce supported the local American Legion in a patriotic observance of the day.

55 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 10, 1939

A representative of the Southwestern Associated Telephone Company, was in Friona on Monday afternoon interviewing the executive committee of the

Chamber of Commerce, relative to installing the dial system of telephones in Friona. It seems an unusual fact that the new system will be installed just as soon as the necessary work can be done by the company, which is estimated to take about six months.

45 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 11, 1949

Mrs. Lindley Shields was found dead near her home four miles north of Black last Thursday, after apparently suffering a heart attack. She apparently became ill while feeding her child, and was found about 300 yards from her home, with her year-old daughter asleep in her arms.

40 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 12, 1954

Concentrated drive to secure all needed funds to start construction of a new building for Parmer County Community Hospital will be launched this Friday night at a county workers dinner in the Friona school cafeteria.

Manager Jimmie Baxter stated today that of \$50,000 for commencement of construction, \$25,500 had been given in cash, at this time, with \$10,000 in pledges on the books.

35 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 12, 1959

Friona's annual Community Chest drive will get underway Tuesday in an effort to raise a budget calling for some \$5565, to be used by charity and other community betterment used during the coming year.

Steve Bavousett and J.C. Claborn will serve as co-chairmen of the drive, which kicks off with a breakfast at the Friona Methodist Church.

30 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 12, 1964

The Friona Chieftains go to Floydada on Friday seeking a win that would give them their first district championship since 1957, and send them into the Class AA playoffs for the first time. The meeting will be the first in history between the two schools in football.

20 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 10, 1974

In what was considered a good turnout due to the lack of contested races, Friona and Parmer county voters went to the polls in ideal weather Tuesday to elect leaders for the next four years. The local voters went to the polls to give Friona's Paul Fortenberry a big sendoff by electing him as the next county judge. Fortenberry's name was marked by 730 of the 780 who voted in the Friona precinct.

Friona will have a local savings and loan office around January 1, 1975, it was announced this week. The Friona branch of Tri-County Savings & Loan Association received its approval some months ago by the Savings & Loan

Commissioner of Texas.

15 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 14, 1979

Benny Pryor, vocational agriculture instructor and FFA advisor at Friona High School, has been nominated to receive the FFA's Honorary American Farmer Degree.

10 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 11, 1984


Eclectic Ideas is a new place of business on Main Street, owned by Carmen Rape and Roxanne Hurst.


5 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 11, 1989

# Chas. Broadhurst Is Honored Locally

Friends and family joined together in a surprise gathering honoring Charles Broadhurst, pastor of First Baptist Church in Friona, on Sunday, October 30.

Members of the church organized a "This Is Your Life" celebration and the event was held at the church following a church wide luncheon.

Family members and friends from some of the churches that Broadhurst had pastored in the past, shared some of their experiences.

Charles Broadhurst was born in Lockney and his mother shared that she knew early on that he would someday become a preacher. The cost of his delivery totaled \$25.00 and according to his father, only \$10.00 was paid at the time and \$15.00 is still owed!

He grew up in Gruver, Texas, and at the age of seven, accepted Jesus as his Lord and savior. At the age of 14, he felt the call to preach the gospel and began his service soon after that. He was licensed to preach at his home church in Gruver.

The licensing was accidentally excluded from the morning service and thus took place immediately afterward outside under the trees.

He was called to preach in Paducah in 1957 at Valley View Church and was paid \$25.00 for each Sunday. The second church was First Baptist Church in Lockney, where he went in 1958.

It was while in Lockney that the first two Broadhurst children, Leslie and Ladonna, were born.

Then in March of 1961, he was called to Aurora, Colorado, where he served in one of the most fruitful ministries of his calling. The church grew from a membership of 100 to 350. An educational building was also built.

There he served as associational moderator of the Denver Association and served on the executive board of the Baptist General Convention of Colorado.

Lance was born while he was ministering in Colorado.

In December of 1963, the Broadhursts moved to Hale Center, where he pastored the First Baptist Church there. A tornado destroyed the church in 1965, but out of a tragedy, the church found unity. The church was rebuilt and an open house was held in June of 1966.

Borger was the next home for Charles and his family. They moved there in 1966 and remained until 1970, when he was called to Friona.

It was during this time in Friona that a great revival took place. Calvary Baptist, Temple

Bautista and churches from Bovina, Summerfield and Farwell participated in Encounter '72.

An average of 1,000 people attended the churches each night held at Chieftain Stadium with 105 people saved and well over 100 other decisions were made for Christ.

Other highlights from that time included a mission trip to Germany, the beginning of the bus ministry, the children's church and the remodeling of the sanctuary.

Following his service in Friona, he went to Southcrest Baptist Church in Lubbock, in May of 1974. Then in 1977, he moved to Littlefield, where he served in the First Baptist Church there.

The Broadhurst family returned to Friona in 1989. Since that time, he has implemented a new discipleship training program, began the prayer ministry and has been involved in the Promise Keepers activities.

Accomplishments were presented by personal appearances of long-time friends, family and church members, also, by recorded messages and letters by those who were unable to attend.

Those participating and in the order in which they shared, were Mr. and Mrs. W.R. Broadhurst, parents of the honoree; Geraldine Dooley of Borger, sister; and Jim Broadhurst of Oklahoma City, younger brother; Carolynn Broadhurst and Betty Lewellen.

Also, Chester O'Brian of Gruver, Leota Hargrove of Plainview, Gary Sides of Lockney, Leslie and Ladonna, children of the Broadhursts, Milt and Millie Whitson of Aurora, Colorado, Lance Broadhurst, youngest son of the Broadhursts, Juanita Ekstrand of Borger, Dub and Virginia Cleveland, Jimmy and Barbara Maynard, Doyce and Mary Joyce Barnett and Carolyn Wiseman, all members of the team making the trip to Germany.

Also, Jean Murphree, former secretary and now a resident of Comanche, Aubrey Neill of Lubbock, Glenn Batson of Littlefield, Lisa McLellan, Gertie Murphree, Alan Monroe and Geary Brogden, all of Friona.

It was noted that Charles participated in civic and community activities, as well as the ministry. Included were the Rotary Club and Lion's Club, in which he received the "Lion of the Year" award.

Following the appreciation service, Charles and Carolynn were presented with a money basket and a scrapbook made up of cards, letters and other souvenirs of the event.



So it is that power corrupts and total power corrupts totally. As the Russian people once again give up their freedom and their power to a dictator he will grow in power. He will once again become corrupt

thus giving them the tyrant William Penn warned would come to those people who are not governed by God.

The people of Russia must learn what James Madison, one of the authors of the United States Constitution once wrote. He had explained that instead of a powerful government, he and the fellow founders had based the future of the United States upon the ability of our citizens to govern themselves according to the Ten Commandments.

Thus, government could be small in the United States, could be checked and balanced and could have its powers separated and divided. This would only be true if the people were self-governed. In other words, the people should do for themselves.

**YOUR EYES**

**Lazy Eye**



Amblyopia, or "lazy eye," occurs when one eye does not send as good a "picture" to the brain as the other; in time, the brain ignores the image from that eye and relies more on the good one. It is vital to diagnose this condition and treat it as early as possible.

Here's why. In a young child's developing brain, there are cells that respond to each eye individually and some that need stimuli from both. For the visual system to mature properly, both kinds of cells require continuous input. In time, there can be an actual loss of brain cells serving the amblyopic eye.

The child doesn't know there is another way he or she is supposed to see, so there are rarely any complaints or symptoms. It may be that a family doctor will detect or suspect an abnormality, but a complete optometric examination is recommended. The eye professional is trained to spot amblyopia and its underlying causes and to initiate treatment--often a patch over the good eye to "exercise" the other one.

Neely also notes that they are now able to take advantage of the commodity food program and that a hospice service has been in effect for the past two years. Plus, the Home Health Service is now a little over a year old and over 700 visits per month are being made through this service.

He indicates that support from Friona, Bovina and the other communities throughout the county, have been most beneficial to the progress made at the hospital. For instance, the lighted and paved parking lot, helio-pad and lighted wind sock, came about through assistance from the EMS and Friona City employees.

"We're a lot better able to serve the patients now than we were in 1990," Neely said. "A great deal of this is due to the support of the community and, in time, other changes will come to pass that will be of further progress."

He also indicates that members of the Hospital Board of Directors have put in a lot of time and effort in effecting many of these changes and advancements. Wendell Gresham serves as president of the board, Dr. Dale Schueler of Rhea is vice president, and Dennis Anthony is secretary. Board members are Anne Com of Bovina and Danny Kendrick of Friona.

When asked if the hospital sees a goal of resuming surgery services or delivering babies in the future, Neely said "Not at the present time, but we are certainly open to that if a physician comes to us and requests it."

He feels that the recruitment of the new doctors and PAs is, by far, the greatest recent accomplishment of the hospital and clinics.

Employees of the Friona and Bovina Rural Health Clinics are: Dr. Robert Alexander, Dr. Felipe Jubay, Dr. Anthony Orme, PA Jose Perez and PA Linda Conlee, who serves the Bovina Clinic. Also, Marilyn Watson, clerical administrator; Joy Osborn clerical insurance and medical records; Elizabeth Granger, clerical billing and collecting; Jonell Hand, receptionist and data entry. Lisa Alaniz, Christina Crutchfield and Norma Mendoza are medical assistants but are known as "the office nurses" by the public. Carolyn Ship transcribes dictation for both clinics and Andrea Escobedo is employed as a DECA student after school and through the summer months.

In the Bovina Clinic, Monia Ann Wilson is the L.V.N. Javier Martinez serves as receptionist and office nurse at Bovina. Andy Cruz is the maintenance person and Sue

Smith acts as Quality Assurance Coordinator for both clinics.

At Parmer County Community Hospital, the Director of Nursing is Lynn Nelson and the Registered Nurses are: Joan Ahrhart, Cathy Anderson, Lenora Fought, Pat Holland, Nadine O'Connor, Sue Smith, Mary Lou Venhaus and Celestine Wilson. 

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

## Last-Minute Score Brings 21-20 Win

"Somebody came up to me after the game and said, 'Well, Coach, they showed you they have character,' I said 'I KNOW they have character. They don't have to prove that anymore. I just want them to win the game!'" said coach James Morton after a nerve-racking 21-20 comeback win over Floydada last Friday at Floydada.

With the win, the Friona Chieftains clinched the district 2-AAA football title. It was Friona's first district championship in football since 1965.

It was a long, intense game. Rain greeted Friona fans as they packed into Whirlwind stadium, and the mud seemed to dampen the spirits of the Chieftains in the first half.

Floydada scored twice before the Chiefs could get it together. However, Whirlwind two-point conversion attempts were downed by the Chieftains goal line defense.

Then, just before the half Jay Belcher hit Chris Hanna with a 19-yard scoring pass, and Kit Preston added the P.A.T. Friona fans were anxious, but optimistic, at halftime when the Chiefs headed to the locker room with a 7-12 deficit hanging over their heads.

The Chiefs came out after halftime ready to play, but turnovers and penalties stopped offensive drives and frustrated players and fans alike.

"You get tired, but you try to get the job done," said Josh Snead. "That's when we get penalties." Friona soon trailed 7-20.

Anyone who had not been a die-hard Chieftain fan might have given up. But not these fans. "They were standing up, and they were excited!" said senior cheerleader Jodi Looper. "You could tell they really wanted to win!"

And not these players. "Heck no, we didn't give up!" said Charlie Pope. "We never give up!"

"We knew we could come back because the coaches weren't panicked," said Dale Perez. "They just kept calm, calling the plays."

The Chiefs finally got rolling in the fourth quarter on a long drive capped off by Jay Belcher on a one-yard run. Reliable Kit Preston added the P.A.T. So, with a little more than five minutes left to play the score was 14-20.

That was enough to rattle Floydada. A costly penalty brought back a Whirlwind 70-yard touchdown run. The Chiefs held them and took over.

With only 56 seconds left in the game, Juan Gamboa rambled one yard for the touchdown. As always, Preston and his golden foot came through for the P.A.T., which made the score 21-20.

Floydada had one more chance to drive the ball the length of the field to win, but the Chiefs weren't about to let that happen.

On the kickoff, Floydada burned up a valuable 20 seconds with a scramble. "He was looking for a hole and he couldn't find it," said Davy Hamilton. The attempt to avoid the inevitable tackle by Colby Carthel was futile. On the next play, an interception by Chris Hanna sealed the win.

"It's strange," said Chris Hanna. "We can't play unless we're down."

"It was the same as every other district game," said Jay Belcher.

"These kids never give up," said Coach Bryan Hanna. "They keep plugging along, because that's the way they've been trained. The fourth quarter has been ours because we've done so much conditioning."

And so it was another nail-biter for us. But the Chiefs continued

their "Never Give Up" legacy, and the District Championship was the reward.

A large group of Friona fans went to the game on two chartered Greyhound buses. Also, the team had their own chartered bus to Floydada. The fans and team members alike had a great time, especially after the heroic win.

Friona finishes the season with a 7-2-1 record, and will play Childress (8-2) at Plainview Friday night for their bi-district game.

Childress barely lost to River Road last week, so they will certainly be a challenge. "They have a bunch of big guys," said Chris Hanna. "They're real physical."

"It's gonna be up to the offensive and defensive lines," said Brent Beene.

"It's gonna come down to who controls the line of scrimmage," said Colby Carthel.

This Friday the Chieftains will truly have to play to their potential. But with the Chiefs' "Never Give Up" attitude, Childress will have their hands full.



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



### The World of Municipal Bonds

Municipal bonds are issued by states, counties, cities and villages to raise funds for building and maintaining public facilities such as highways, bridges and airports.

Municipal bonds also can be issued by public agencies and districts, such as water commissions or school districts, for projects such as upgrading local water lines or building new high schools.

Because the projects financed by these bonds are used for the good of the public, investors don't pay federal taxes on any income they earn from the bonds. However, because of this tax exemption, these bonds typically pay a lower rate of interest than taxable bonds of comparable quality and maturity, although the after-tax return of

municipal bonds may exceed that of similar taxable bonds.

Before a municipal bond is available for investors to purchase, it goes through the lengthy process of being issued. Here's basically how the process works:

When funds are needed for a public project, the proper authority typically begins by seeking public permission before issuing and selling bonds. This is accomplished through a local election. If voters approve the issue, the authority then seeks the help of an investment banking firm. This firm acts as a liaison between the authority that wishes to issue the bonds and the investing public.

The underwriter helps the issuing authority prepare the bonds for sale. Its associates prepare the official statement needed to market the bonds and they price the bonds.

In most cases, the underwriter simply buys the entire bond issue, less expenses and charges, from the issuing authority. It can then sell the entire bond issue itself, or it can form what is called a syndicate by inviting other investment-banking firms or broker-dealers to commit to a portion of the bond issue. These firms or dealers then can sell the bonds directly to investors or have other broker-dealers sell the bonds. This market, in which issues are offered to investors for the first time, is called the primary market.

Once the entire issue has been sold, the bonds are available only when someone decides to sell one through the secondary market. The underwriter and participating broker-dealers often will make a secondary market in the bonds by buying or selling them at publicly quoted prices. This price is determined primarily by current interest rates.

Many higher-income investors have already discovered the benefits of municipal bonds, and many experts believe more investors will seek these bonds as taxes continue to rise. However, if you plan to invest in municipal bonds, make sure you have a basic understanding of how they work before committing any money.
