HAVE YOU NOTICED that the nation's chief executive has been noticeably absent ever since the November 8 election?

Bill Clinton took off to an Asian trade conference, hoping those leaders hadn't noticed the complete and utter defeat that Clinton's Democrats suffered on election day in his homeland.

And when he surfaced this past week in Hawaii for a "vacation," Uncle Bill was still trying to put a "spin" on the election results that would favor him during his coming lame duck session.

"What I think the American people were saying was that they want us to work together to change our country," Clinton said in one of his rare media contacts since the election.

This prompted a popular radio talk-show host to comment: "He still doesn't get it. The American people want change, all right, but they definitely said on November 8 that they didn't want Clinton to be a part of this change."

One poll indicated that 69 percent of the American people say the nation is heading in the wrong direction. And most of them indicate that the Clintons and their liberalistic stance, are the main reason for the country's straying down the wrong path.

When you recall that the president's first big effort was to force the issue on gays in the military, then the appointment of a surgeon general who pushes the program to distribute free condoms to our young people and hints that she favors the legalization of some illegal drugs and an Attorney-General who orchestrated the brutal murder of 80 people in Waco, it's not too hard to see why the silent majority rose up on November 8 and knocked down almost every Democrat that was on the ballot.

One of the few Clinton programs passed during his first two years, the crime bill, has been ridiculed as being woefully lax in punishment, and being far too much of a welfare-state bill, with one of its main features being the "Midnight Basketball" proposal, which makes about as much sense as applying Vicks Salve to a raging cancer.

Clinton's appointees have tried to weaken child pornography laws and to strike down the death penalty.

As we see it, voters took a long look at the Clinton presidency, his programs and appointees, and said in effect, "Enough is enough."

Clinton can remain in denial if he wants to--and many political experts feel that as an incumbent he will still be the Democratic nominee in the 1996 presidential election. That's well and good.

Clinton, like charismatic leaders Jim Jones and David Koresh, won't mind leading his fellow Democrats into an utter and complete suicide as he continues down the path of liberalism.

As one writer said this week, if Clinton can cause as many Democrats to lose as they did this past November 8, without being on the ballot himself, think of what will happen when his name is at the top of the list in 1996!

A number of Americans may have indicated they wanted change when they voted for Clinton in 1992, but we feel sure that they didn't have in mind a complete 180-degree about-face for the occupant of the oval office.

And as they evidenced in the recent polling process, the Silent Majority isn't likely to sit at home and not vote as they may have in 1992.

Many states passed amendments or propositions favoring term limitations during the November 8 election. And the American electorate, by and large, reminded the politicians that in the end, the voters can effect their own version of term limitations, when their hired help continues to go against their wishes.

Race Tightens In Football Contest

With just one week left in the Friona Star's Football Contest, the race for the grand prize suddenly tightened up.

Jerry Bentley, who had a four-point lead just two weeks earlier, found his lead trimmed to just one point.

Bentley has a score of 129. Right behind him are Jerry Hinkle and Mitchell Smiley at 128.

Tied for third place are Roddy Berend and Tonya Gartin with scores of 127. Courtney Carthel, Cliff Daniel, Jimmy R. Walker and Bobby Wied are next at 125.

In the 12th week's regular contest, only four contestants managed scores of 12 or more, and they captured the three weekly cash prizes.

Mrs. Gartin's misses were Rice-Navy and Philadelphia-Arizona.

Mitchell Smiley likewise was the only contestant to pick 13 games right, and he took the second weekly prize of \$7.50 cash. Smiley also moved to within a point of the overall leader. His misses were Michigan-Ohio State, Minnesota-New York Jets and Philadelphia-Arizona.

Two contestants had scores of 12, and of these, Landon Martin took third place on the basis of the tie-breaker system. Tim Elmore of Kemp, Texas, was the other entrant to pick 12 games.

Martin missed Rice-Navy, Auburn-Alabama, the Eagles-Cardinals and Cincinnati-Indianapolis. He missed the Dallas-Washington score by ten points, picking the Cowboys, 27-13.

Elmore, who missed Rice-Navy, the Vikings-Jets, Eagles-Cardinals and Bengals-Colts, missed the tiebreaker by 17 points, picking the Cowboys, 24-17.

Eight contestants had scores of 11: Claire Brown, Daniel Hernandez, Wayne Amstutz, Jerry Gossett, Larry Rogers, Martha Clements, Bobby Wied and Eddie Gauna.

The money contributed to the Kids, Incorporated program from the Friona United Way, goes into a general fund.

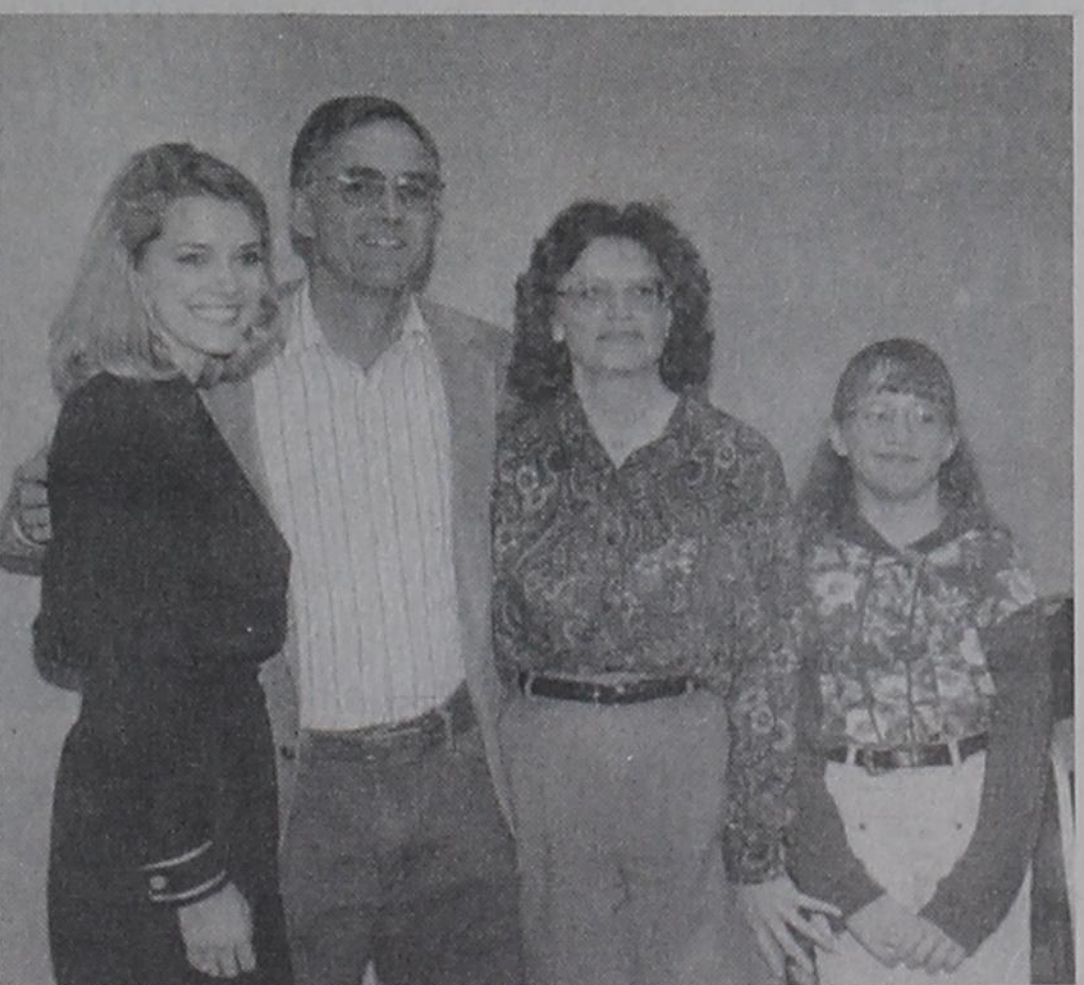

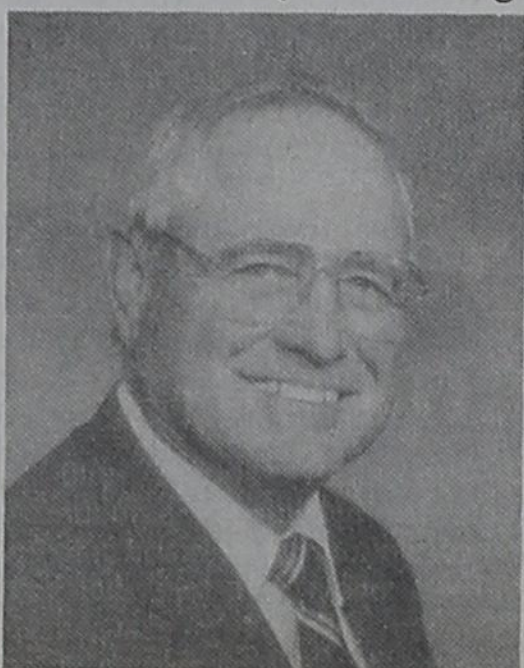

Included in the collection are John Glenn's historic spaceflight in which he became the first American to orbit the earth; Neil Armstrong's walk on the moon; the Challenger disaster; the first four missions of the space shuttle, the world's first reusable spacecraft; and "The Universe," which dramatizes the mysterious and incredibly violent universe in which we live (narrated by William Shatner).

The 30 videos were produced from the original NASA film archives by Houston based Talas Enterprises. Shepard, the first American in space, praised the inspirational value of the video. "The videos provide a most comprehensive account of history, with the triumphs and tragedies, of the U. S. space program."

"These videos will fit right in with our science and social studies program," said Tonya Gober, curriculum director at FUSD.

School officials also indicated that they would share the videos with clubs or community residents interested in seeing them.

The videos were made available by the Texas Association of Independent Bankers, of which Friona State Bank is a member.

Bivins Sets Meeting Here December 1

65 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 29, 1929

What might have been a most destructive fire at the gin Tuesday evening was averted by wise management and presence of mind of the overseer, Mr. Waddell. Some cotton became ignited, and Mr. Waddell kept the machinery in motion until the burning cotton reached the press, where it was covered with other lint and bound up in a bale and discharged so that the only loss was the bale of cotton.

60 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 30, 1934

Many farmers of this locality are still busy sowing wheat; the rain that fell two weeks ago delayed planting. Some of these farmers had been waiting for the moisture to complete their seeding operations; others had not sown any, and still others find themselves obliged to resow much of their acreage that had already been sown earlier but failed to get a stand on account of lack of moisture.

55 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 24, 1939

Reports reaching the Star office are to the effect that work on the Parmer County REA project is progressing at a most satisfactory rate, and that present indications are that the lines will be ready for energizing by the early part of December. Workmen are busy wiring homes of the subscribers so as to be ready for the current as soon as the lines are ready to receive it.

50 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 24, 1944

The biggest crowd in Friona's history is expected for the district title game which will be played on Thanksgiving Day in Friona between Friona and Hereford. Friona and Hereford won the right to play last week when the executive committee of the district met. Three teams, Friona, Hereford and Tulia, tied for the district's co-championship, but Hereford and Friona drew the right to play to see who represents the district in bi-district play.

45 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 24, 1949

The Rev. George Meyer of Baker, Montana, will arrive here during the week, and will preach at the Congregational Church Sunday morning. Rev. Meyer is coming here to look over the situation with

a possible view to accepting a call to locate here as pastor of the church.

40 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 26, 1954

Less than \$9,000 stands in the way for construction planning for the new Parmer County Community Hospital, manager Jimmie Baxter said this week. The organized drive is still underway to secure the needed funds in the next few days, and over one-third of the contacts remain to be made in Friona alone. At last accounting, \$32,594 was in hand on the project with another \$8,688 on the books as pledged.

30 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 26, 1964

Nine members of the 1964 Friona Chieftain Football Team were named to the all-district teams chosen by District 3-AA coaches at a meeting Monday at Olton. Four of the players, tackle, Dale Milner; fullback, Doug Dodd; tackle, Gene Weatherly; and halfback, Milton Hargus, were selected to the first teams. In addition, halfback, Danny Murphree; tackle, Ray Braxton, guard, Bob Sims; center, Bing Bingham and end, Larry Buckley, were named to the second teams.

25 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 27, 1969

Lazbuddie's Longhorns, out for their second straight class B bi-district championship, will face a Groom team bent on revenge when the two meet Friday night at 7:30 p.m. at Panhandle.

The last service to be conducted at the old building of the Union Congregational Church will be held next Sunday morning at 11 a.m. The adobe building, which the members of the church have been using for 47 years, will see its last use as a place of formal worship on this date.

20 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 24, 1974

Boswell and Crafton, Inc., Contractor, has begun construction on the first section of State Highway 214 from the Bailey County line, north to Clay's Corner. Work will include the

Happy Homemaker

About fifteen years ago, someone in the family of the late J.W. and Mary Baxter came up with the idea of publishing a family cookbook.

The outcome of this idea was an attractive book with a lot of helpful information pertaining to cooking as well as many many good recipes.

At the time the books were distributed at an annual family reunion, Calvin and Ann Martin were our across the street neighbors. They gave me one for a birthday present.

I've been using "Cookbook-Favorite Recipes From Our Best Cooks" since that time and am happy to share some of the recipes with our readers.

I can wholeheartedly recommend the first four recipes this week. Ann Martin, who is presently living in Creston, Iowa,

was a wonderful cook and made cookies often. She was also a good neighbor and shared samples of her baking with all of us in the neighborhood.

DREAM BARS

Ann Martin

- 1/2 cup oleo
- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- Blend with a pastry blender or fingertips as for pie crust. Press or pat in an unbuttered 9"x13" pan. Bake until light brown, about 10 minutes, in moderate oven at 350 degrees.
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup white sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/4 teaspoon soda or 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- Pinch of salt
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

- 1-1/2 cups coconut
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- Beat eggs slightly, add brown sugar. Now, add flour, soda and salt. Fold vanilla, nuts and coconut into the mixture. Remove flour and butter mixture from the oven, immediately pour second mixture on the top of the first, spreading evenly. Bake 20-25 minutes in 350 degree oven. Cool and cut in squares.

CRISP OATMEAL COOKIES

- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup shortening
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups oatmeal
- 1 cup nuts or coconut or both
- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups Wheaties
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Cream sugar and shortening. Add eggs and dry ingredients; lastly oatmeal, Wheaties, coconut and nuts. Roll in a ball about the size of a walnut and bake on ungreased cookie sheet about 20 minutes or until brown.

APPLE BARS

- 1/2 cup oleo
- 1-1/2 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 3 cup apples, chopped fine
- 1 teaspoon burnt sugar flavoring
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1-1/2 cup flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 cup nuts
- Cream sugar, shortening and vanilla. Add beaten eggs and dry ingredients. Pour into a 9"x13" greased pan and bake at 350 degrees 25-30 minutes. Frost with powdered sugar frosting while warm.

SUGAR COOKIES

- 1-1/2 cups sugar
- 1 cup shortening
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon cream of tartar
- Cream sugar, shortening and vanilla until fluffy. Add beaten eggs. Sift flour, soda and cream of tartar together. Add flour mixture to creamed mixture. Drop batter by teaspoonfuls on a cookie sheet and press with a fork. Bake in 350

degree oven 10 or 15 minutes or until brown.

Another former Friona resident and member of this family, Janiece Bock Baxter, contributed the following recipe:

DATE SKILLET COOKIES

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 stick oleo
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Dash of salt
- 1 cup chopped dates
- 2 eggs, beaten
- Angel flake coconut
- 2 cups Rice Krispies
- 1 cup chopped pecans

Combine first four items and cook, stirring constantly, until thick. Remove from heat, add Rice Krispies and nuts. Let cool. Butter hands and form mixture into small balls. Roll in coconut and refrigerate until firm.

Marilou Truitt Baxter, widow of Charlie Baxter, often baked cookies for her children, grandchildren and others. One of her favorite recipes which appeared in the book was for:

NO BAKE OATMEAL COOKIES

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup milk
- 4 tablespoons cocoa
- 1 stick oleo
- 3 cups quick oats
- 3/4 cup nuts or coconut

Boil sugar, cocoa, milk and oleo for 1 minute. Remove from heat. Add oats, nuts and coconut if desired with vanilla and salt. Drop by teaspoonfuls on waxed paper. Makes 3-4 dozen.

Sandy Massey submitted a recipe which is sure to make a hit with beginning cooks--or more experienced ones who desire to make something different. However, this isn't something you will want to start if you are short on time.

Her husband, Ted, was born

here, but moved to South Dakota with his parents, Marvin and Dorothy Robbins Massey, when he was small.

CEREAL COOKIES

- Melt in slow oven--200 degrees--in a covered pan for two hours:
- 1 package almond bark
- Remove from oven and add
- 2 cups Captain Crunch cereal
- 2 cups Rice Chex
- 2 cups Spanish peanuts
- 2 cups mini-marshmallows
- Mix well and drop by teaspoonfuls on waxed paper.

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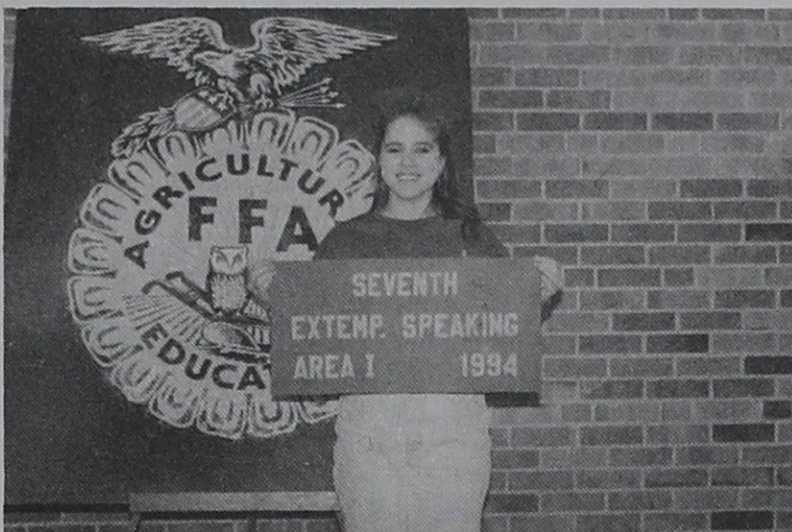

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ACHIEVEMENTS LISTED

1994 Chiefs Snap Several Old Marks

(Researched and compiled by Bill Ellis, from Friona Star files and University Interscholastic League records)

The 1994 Friona High School Chieftains broke a number of "losing streaks" in the process of building their 7-3-1 season record, which included the school's first trip to the playoffs since 1986 and only the sixth team since 1944 to participate in post-season play.

For openers, the team won the district title for the first time since 1965. It was Friona's first district title since their classification was changed to 3A. When the 1965 team won its championship, Friona was in conference 2A. They were in district three, along with Dimmitt, Lockney, Abernathy, Olton and Floydada.

That 1965 team, coached by Don Light, lost four of its first five games before posting a 5-0 record in district play.

This year's district title is only the fourth outright title in the school's history. Other than 1965, gold footballs were won by the 1952 team coached by Raymond Cook (7-3 record) and the 1957 team, coached by Colie Huffman (6-3-1 record).

Co-championships were won by Friona in 1944 under Buck Short and Kenneth Houlette and in 1964 under Light.

The seven wins posted by the 1994 Chieftains made them tied for the fifth-best record for Friona teams on the gridiron since 1927.

Friona's 1986 team, coached by Tommy Moss, had the most wins, nine, as it scored Friona's first and only post-season win and advanced to the area round as the district's second-seeded team in the playoffs. The '86 Chieftains finished 9-3.

Three FHS teams have won eight games, and finished at 8-2. These were the 1963 and 1964 teams coached by Light, and the 1974 team coached by Bob Owen.

The 1994 Chieftains were the seventh in the school's history to win seven games. Others came in the fall seasons of 1940, 1951, 1952, 1967, 1968 and 1987. The 1940, 1952, 1967 and 1968 teams were 7-3 for the season. The 1951 team was 7-2; and 1987 team was 7-2-1, prior to this year's 7-3-1.

The Chieftains broke the longest losing streak against a current opponent, which had lasted 17 consecutive years, when they erupted for their 35-21 win over Littlefield here on October 28.

Friona had never scored more than 26 points against the Wildcats in earning their fourth win overall over the perennial 'bullies' from Lamb County. Included in the Wildcats' 17 straight wins were seven shutout wins. During that stretch, Littlefield scored 30 or more points against Chieftain teams eight times, 40 or more five times (including 40-0 in 1990 and 47-0 in 1980) and rang up 68 points in a 68-20 win here in 1992.

The Chieftains won the first game they ever played against Littlefield, 13-0 in 1970. They also won, 21-14 in 1974, and 26-6 in 1976. At that point, the Wildcats held a meager 4-3 lead in the series, which they now lead 21-4. Friona has never beaten the 'Cats in Littlefield.

The 1994 Chieftains won over the Dalhart Wolves on their home field for the first time ever with their 22-13 win on September 23. Dalhart had won 11 straight home games over Friona dating back to 1945.

Friona's 14-12 win at Dimmitt on October 21 was their first win on the Bobcats' home turf since 1986, and only the fourth one overall at Dimmitt in the 59-game series, which dates back to at least 1930.

Likewise, the Chiefs' 21-20 win at Floydada November 4 was their first there since 1986, and only the fourth in games played in Floyd County in 11 attempts.

Their 9-6 win over Muleshoe here October 14 not only started a four-game district winning streak, but gave Friona a 22-21-1 lead in the Muleshoe series for the first time since the early 1930s. The first recorded Friona-Muleshoe game was in the fall of 1926, making it the earliest rivalry, although the Mules haven't been played as often as Dimmitt, which has been played practically every year since 1934, and almost always as a district opponent.

While researching the all-time Friona football records this week, it was discovered that the 1993 team's 7-0 win over the Canyon Eagles last fall was the first-ever for Friona over their Randall County neighbors. Canyon had won 14 of the first 15 meetings, with the 1941 outing ending in a 0-0 tie.

Canyon was a district opponent in 1941, 1946, 1947, and 1958 through 1961. The teams didn't meet on the gridiron for a 17-year stretch, when the series was resumed in 1988. It was dropped again beginning this year when the Eagles moved back up to conference 4A, although the two teams did meet in a pre-season scrimmage, which Friona also won.

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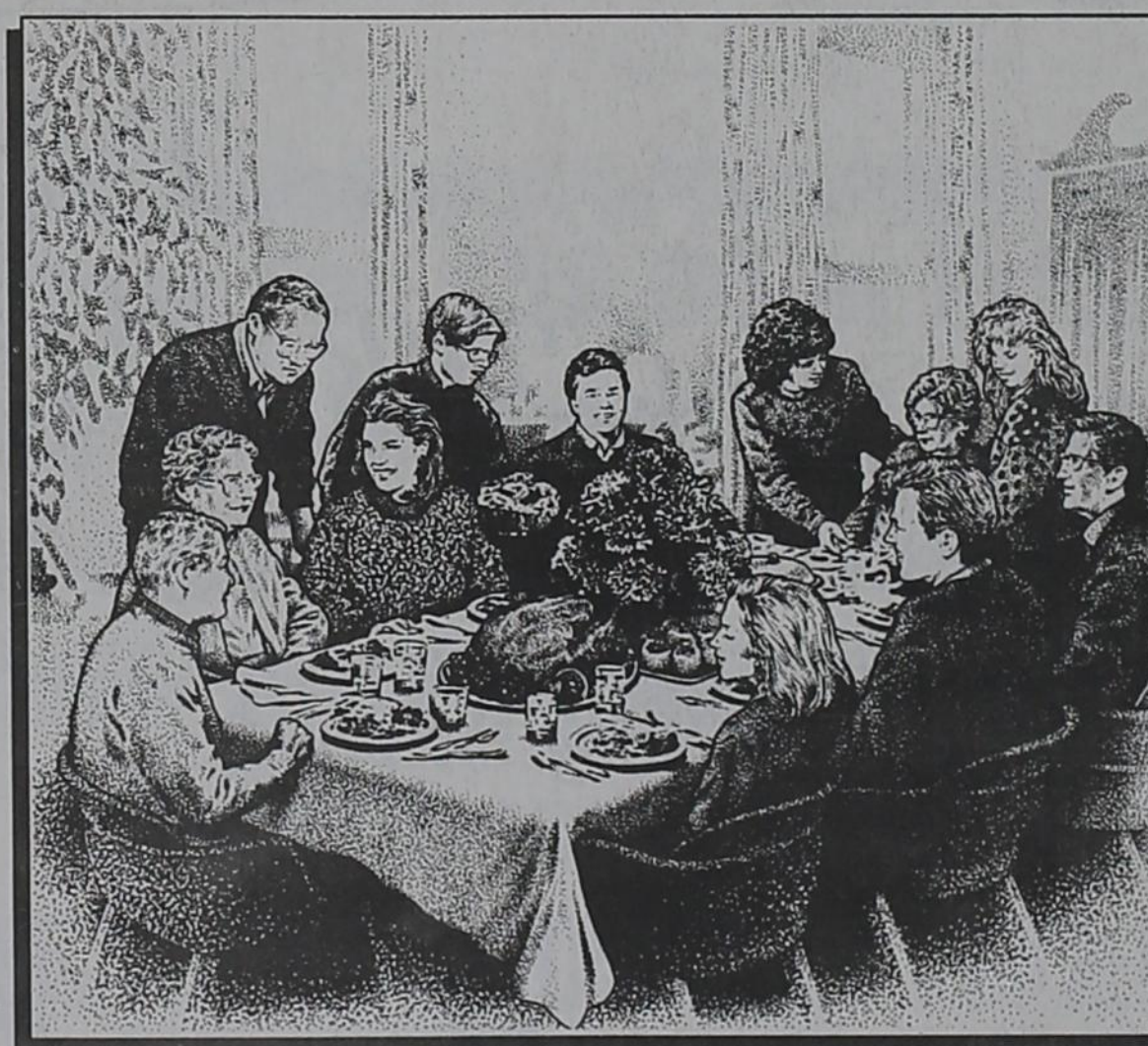

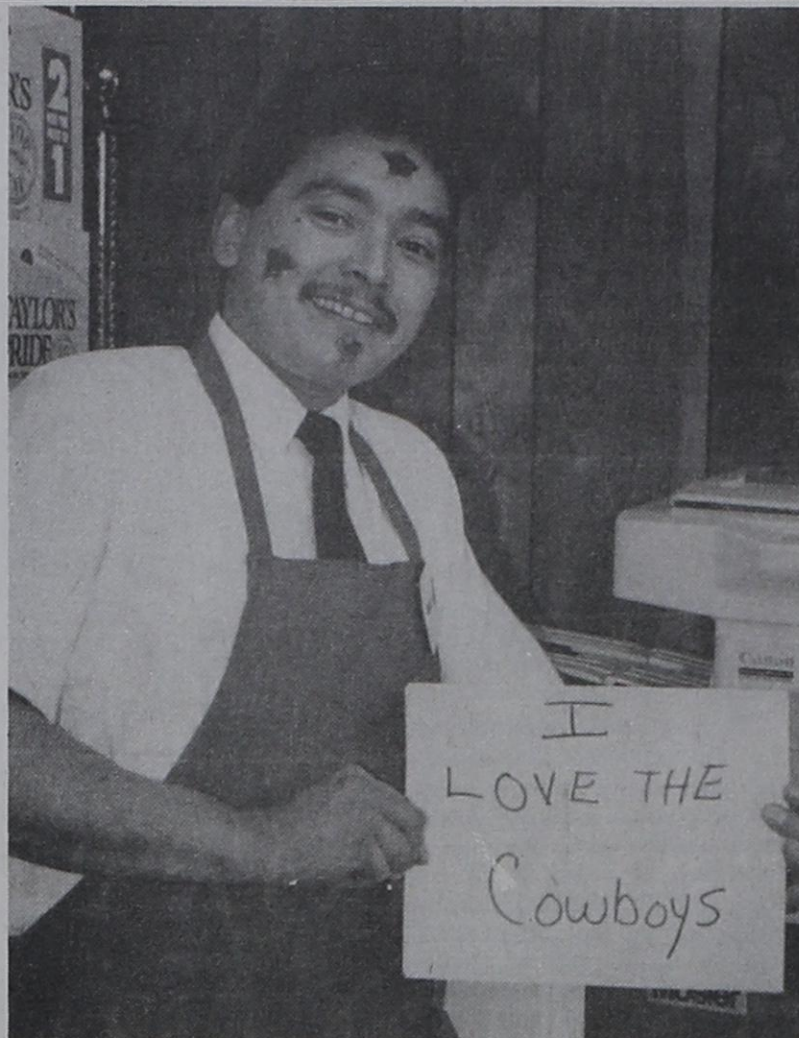
Friend, the Gospel of Jesus Christ really is Good News, and it is a free gift. What have you done with it?

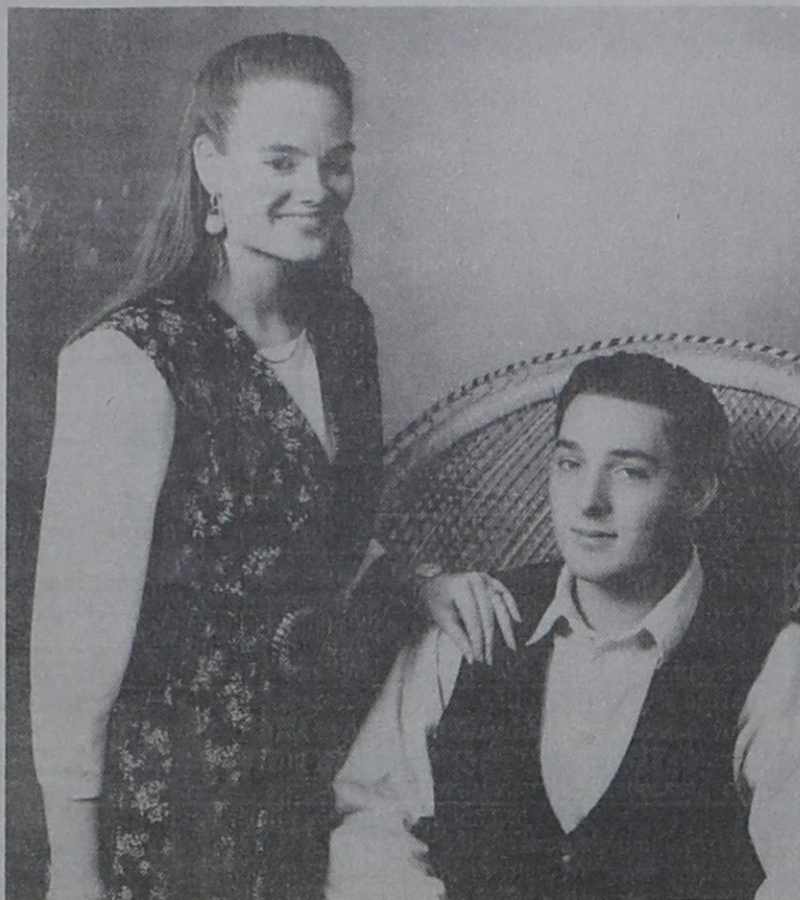

IRA Consolidation Simplifies Retirement Planning
