## MY TURN

**THE SONG GOES** "Oh, Christmas Tree... Thy branches green for-e-ver!" Well, maybe not quite forever when you purchase your Tannenbaum and it dies in the trunk of your car on the way home. Half the needles are in your trunk and the other half will be hiding in your carpet until someone walks through the room barefooted next July. Then they'll jump up and getcha!

Of course, part of the fun of having a "real" tree is the shopping and bargain hunting. Do you want a Scotch Pine, a Douglas Fir, Norway Spruce, White Pine, Red Cedar? You can spend an hour picking out just the perfect tree at the store, the tree lot or wherever, and you'll walk around studying the symmetry, height, width, etc., but when you get home it always has a few bare spots and leans toward the north.

Some people tend to take pity on the underdog and bring home the little scrawny, scraggly tree that no one else wanted. Others have no sense of size and end up having to cut off the top or the bottom of the tree that looked just perfect before they got it home.

If you're looking for "neat" with no resin on your hands and no needles to clean up, then you are the "fake tree" type person. I can remember when the first artificial trees came out. They were those tinfoil monsters that revolved, changed colors and snowed all over. After a few people electrocuted themselves with those things, the plastic tree was born. Today's fake trees claim to be "silk" but I doubt that a silk worm ever had anything to do with it.

In my younger days, I was one of those purists who said I'd never have a fake tree in my home. I wanted all the needles, the resin, the tree-tilt, the whole works... but most of all the real Christmas spirit, in my mind, was tied up with the SMELL of the evergreen boughs.

Well, all that dewy-eyed sentiment came to a screeching halt one Christmas about 25 years ago when we had new shag carpet and two baby kittens. The tree was in one of those little stands that holds water, with the optimistic thought that this would keep it fresh. The kittens went up and the tree went down three times that Christmas season and we had an electric heater going full-blast for weeks while we tried to dry out the water in the new shag carpet.

We committed to an artificial tree the following Christmas and when we sold the house to Delphine and Bobby Weid six years later, I think there were still some needles in that shag carpet from our last real tree.

When we commit to something we do it forever. We still have that same old artificial tree from 24 years ago and it goes up every year at Christmas time. The kids won't let me throw it out and get a newer, fancier one. So one year I sprayed it white, thinking that would give it a "new" look, at least. Well, the white didn't cover very good. Some of the green still shows through, but the result is, it looks more like a real pine.

The inside ends of the branches were color coded to go into certain holes in the wooden trunk. Over the years the colors have all worn off, so the branches just get stuck in wherever. This also adds to the "real" look because it isn't perfectly symmetrical anymore like most of your fake trees. In fact, the older this tree gets, the more realistic it looks.

A few years ago I found a small tree that had the same type of branches as our old one. I brought this little fellow home, sprayed it white so it would match, and stuck it up on top of the old tree. There's a high ceiling in our family room and now we have a nice tall, skinny Christmas tree with a few bare spots, that tilts a little toward the north. I buy the smell of the evergreen boughs in a spray can now and Christmas still comes around every year, same as always.

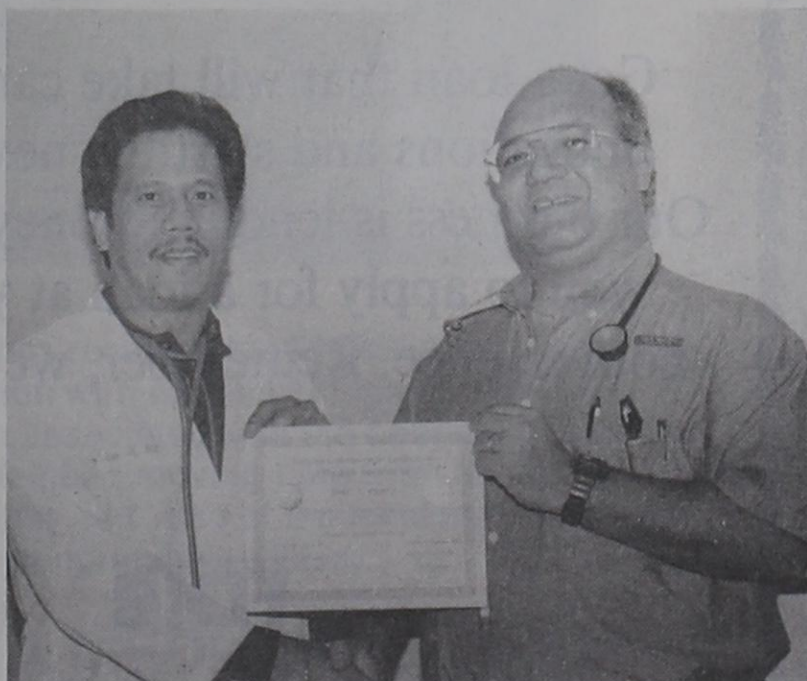
## Perez PA Certified With High Honors

## Schwan Man Incident....

An incident that created a lot of rumors this week was investigated this week by Diane Rogers of the Friona Star. According to officials, here's what really happened:

On Monday, December 12, Raymond Bachicha of Bovina came running from a house and jumped into the Schwan's Ice Cream truck driven by Doug Meredith, east of Friona.

"Bachicha was on drugs or something and hallucinating," said Parmer County Sheriff, Rex Williams. "He hid in the floorboard of the Schwan's truck and said two men were trying to kill him and to get him away from them."

The Schwan's driver, Doug Meredith was never threatened by Bachicha.

John Taylor, Friona Police Chief and Texas Trooper, Craig Hunt picked up Bachicha north of Chaney's Fertilizer and took him to the Friona Police Station.

Bachicha was charged with public intoxication and paid a fine and was later released. "We can't, as of yet, find anything else to charge him with," said Sheriff Williams. "A Trespassing charge cannot be cited if the person is in a vehicle."

## Child Welfare Bd. Benefits From UW

The Parmer County Child Welfare Board is a recipient of funds from the United Way of Friona.

Since 1979, the Parmer County Child Welfare Board has met with the Child Protective workers of the Texas Department of Human Services, now the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services to assure that all the foster children from Parmer County have all their needs met.

The Texas Department of Human Services pays the foster parents a minimum monthly amount to care for these children; however, that amount does not begin to adequately provide all the needs and necessities for each child.

"In the past our board has provided a gown for a junior-senior banquet, a senior ring for a graduating senior, orthodontics, glasses, contacts, trips to visit relatives and other necessities," said Jo Blackwell, spokesperson for the group.

"We also provide school clothing, Christmas gifts, school supplies and Easter clothing as well as emergency clothing needs when a child is placed."

It is the Parmer County Child Welfare Board's policy to strive to encourage each child to be able to present themselves in as normal dress as possible and to enrich their self-esteem while in placement.

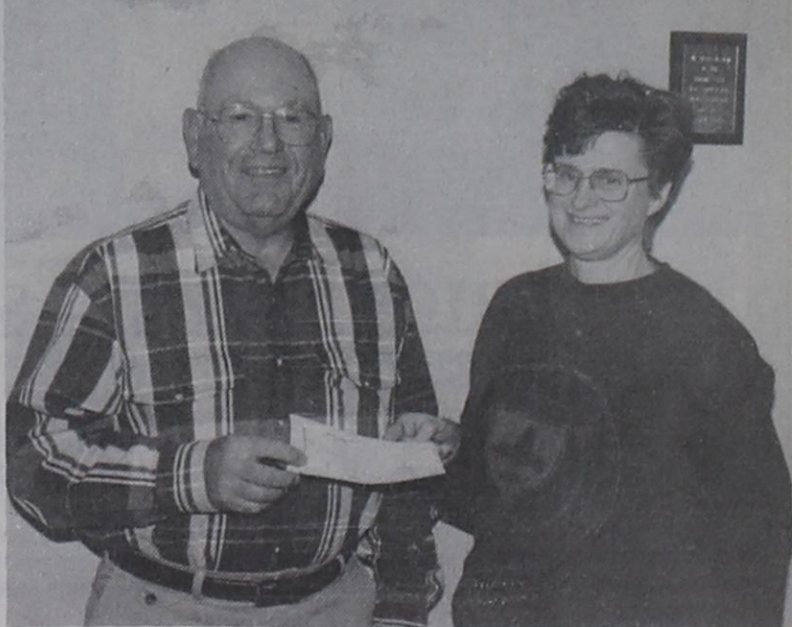
"We currently have four foster children from Parmer County in foster care. In the past, we have had as many as 15 children in care at one time," Mrs. Blackwell added.

"We also work with the local community and schools to encourage foster parent participation and education."

"We feel privileged to be a part of the great gift of giving that the Friona United Way represents," she continued.

# Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

**65 Yrs. Ago--Dec. 20, 1929**  
Six Friona citizens, H. L. Vance, J. B. McFarland, E. B. Whitefield, L. F. Lillard, F. N. Welch and F. W. Reeve, motored to Tulsa last Friday to attend a meeting in interest of the Wheat Growers.

County Commissioner D. H. Meade reports that the stretch of road leading south from Friona to The Hub is now in prime condition, he having just completed thoroughly grading it.

**60 Yrs. Ago--Dec. 21, 1934**  
Quite a number of people were in Amarillo on Thursday of last week, representing the various communities and towns of Parmer County at the big Chamber of Commerce meeting that was called at that city on that date. Those attending from Friona were Mayor F. W. Reeve, George A. Heath, T. J. Crawford, Howard Morris, Otho Whitefield, Milford Alexander and County and District Clerk, V. Rushing and County Judge Elect, Walter Lander.

**55 Yrs. Ago--Dec. 22, 1939**  
Last Thursday, Friday and Saturday, one of the best basketball tournaments ever held in the Friona gym was staged. There were ten boys' teams and eight girls' teams entered. In all there were twenty-three basketball games played. Mr. Ezell and Wilbur Meade said that they had never officiated in a tournament where more sportsmanship was shown. Dimmitt won first place, Canyon second and Springlake third in the boys' division. Lazbuddie won first place, Dimmitt second and Oklahoma Lane third place in the girls' division.

**50 Yrs. Ago--Dec. 22, 1944**  
J. H. Hinds has announced that he will open his grocery store in the Warren building on Sixth Street, to be known as "Friona Food Market," on December 22. Mr. Hinds is experienced in the management of grocery and food stores, and has his store furnished with all modern equipment. He

will have a meat market in connection with his regular grocery business. He has lived in Friona for several years and was formerly employed with the Cashway Grocery and Market here.

**40 Yrs. Ago--Dec. 16, 1954**  
Jackie Rule and Jimmy Norwood were hospitalized early this morning after the car in which they were riding plunged into a highline pole just north of Hub. Neither of the boys was believed injured seriously. Norwood suffered two broken ribs and both had numerous cuts and bruises. Investigating officers believed a blowout might have caused the Norwood car to leave the pavement. The impact of the vehicle on the pole break an insulator allowing wires to touch, throwing Friona out of electricity for some three hours after the 4 a.m. collision.

**30 Yrs. Ago--Dec. 7, 1964**  
Ground was broken and the foundation poured this week on a building which will house the Friona Star and Graphic Arts Printing. The building, which is to be located between Southwestern Public Service Company and Production Credit Association, will be ready sometime early in 1965.

**25 Yrs. Ago--Dec. 18, 1969**  
Friona's outstanding citizens for 1969 were honored last Saturday night at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Banquet. Louis Welch was honored as the Chamber's "Man of the Year." Sarah Alexander was chosen "Woman of the Year," and Mrs. Cleo Guana of Gib's cleaners was cited as "Most Courteous Employee." The committee which selected the "Teacher of the Year" from the Friona School System came up with a novel choice when both Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Hodgson were chosen.

**20 Yrs. Ago--Dec. 15, 1974**  
Five new directors have been named, plus officers for the 1975 Friona Chamber of Commerce. Elected in recent mail balloting by

the Chamber members for two-year terms on the Chamber's board of directors were Jerry Brownd, Gary Cook, Jay Beene, David Lee Carson and Jim Johnston. Selected to lead the 1975 Chamber as president was George Rushing. Jerry Brownd will serve as vice president, and Jim Johnston will be secretary-treasurer.

The 1974 Project Christmas Card will attempt to raise around \$3,000 to purchase an anesthetic machine for use by Parmer County Community Hospital, it was announced this week.

**15 Yrs. Ago--Dec. 16, 1979**

**10 Yrs. Ago--Dec. 16, 1984**  
A 54-year-old Friona man was critically injured Wednesday in an accident at Elgin, two miles south of Friona. Carl Brewer sustained a severely cut left leg, a broken left arm and punctured lungs after being caught in the equipment for about 15 minutes.

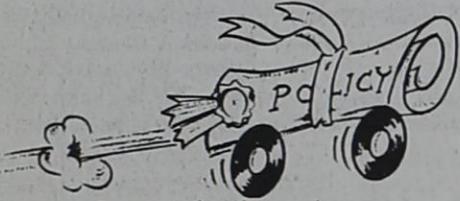
The Friona FFA senior farm skills team placed second in the state leadership contests recently. Members of the team were Gena Wright, Dana Berend and Corrie Lundy.

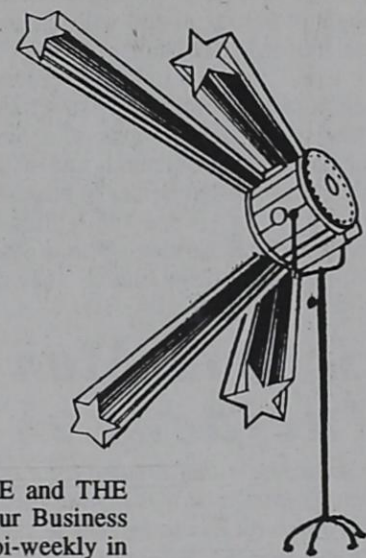

# Happy Homemaker

Food gifts are sure to make a hit with just about anyone on your list, especially for persons who are older and live alone. The following recipes were some of Clessy's favorites:

### PEANUT BRITTLE

- 1 cup white corn syrup
- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 cups raw peanuts
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 2 tablespoons water

Place the syrup, sugar and water in an iron skillet and cook to soft ball stage. Add the peanuts. Stir and cook to the crack stage. Remove from heat. Stir in the butter, baking soda and vanilla. Pour onto a greased platter. Turn quickly and stretch until very thin. When cool, break into pieces.

### DIVINITY

- 2 cups sugar
- 3/4 cup water

- 3/4 cup light corn syrup
  - 3 egg whites, beaten stiff
  - 1/8 teaspoon salt
  - 2 teaspoons vanilla
  - 1/2 cup whole walnuts
- Stir sugar, water and syrup over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Cook until soft ball stage. Pour beaten egg whites into syrup, stirring constantly. Add salt. Place over boiling water and beat until mixture stands up in peaks. Remove from heat and add the vanilla and mix. Spread on a greased platter. Cut into squares and mash 1/2 walnut in center of each square.

### CHOCOLATE FUDGE

- 2 ounces unsweetened chocolate
- 2 cups sugar
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup cream
- 2 tablespoons corn syrup
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 cup nuts, chopped

Cook the first five ingredients

over low heat until soft ball forms when dropped in cup of cold water. Stir frequently. Remove from heat and add the butter. Beat until the fudge begins to harden. Add the vanilla and nuts. Pour onto buttered platter. Cut into squares.

### OATMEAL COOKIES

- 1 cup brown sugar
- 2/3 cup butter
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon cloves
- 1/2 teaspoon ginger
- 2 cups oatmeal
- 1 cup seeded raisins
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 2 teaspoons vanilla

Beat sugar and butter until fluffy. Beat in egg. Combine dry ingredients and add alternately with milk. When mixed, add vanilla. Drop dough by small spoonfuls onto greased sheet and bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees or until light brown.

### SUGAR COOKIES

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1-1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 cup sour cream

Cream sugar and butter. Add egg and vanilla. Combine baking soda, salt and flour. Add flour mixture alternately with sour cream. Chill dough for about 1 day. Roll and cut into shapes like Christmas trees or stars. You may decorate with red and green sugar.

### DREAM BARS

- Crust--
  - 1 cup flour
  - 1/2 cup butter
- Blend flour and butter until smooth. Spread mixture in a 9x13 pan. Bake in 350 degree oven for 12 minutes.
- 2 eggs, beaten
  - 2 cups brown sugar
  - 1 cup coconut
  - 1 cup chopped pecans
  - 2 tablespoons flour
  - 1 teaspoon baking powder
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/8 teaspoon baking soda
  - 2 teaspoons vanilla
- Mix the above ingredients and spread on the crust and bake in a 350 degree oven for 25 minutes. Cut cookies in small squares.

### SUGARED POPCORN

- 2 quarts popped popcorn
- 2 cups pecan halves
- 1 cup almonds
- 1-1/2 cups sugar
- 1 cup butter
- 1/2 cup white syrup
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix popcorn and nuts on a cookie sheet. Combine sugar, butter and syrup in a saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Continue to boil and stir--about 18 minutes, or until mixture turns light brown (hard ball stage). Remove from heat and add vanilla. Pour over the popcorn and nuts and mix well. Spread out on cookie sheet and cool. When cool, break apart and store in tightly sealed containers. Decorate.

### FRUIT CAKE

- (About six pounds)
- 1/2 pound butter
- 1 pound brown sugar, sifted
- 6 beaten egg yolks
- 2-1/2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon allspice
- 1 teaspoon cloves
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup wine, whiskey or grape juice
- 1/2 cup molasses
- 1/2 cup sour milk
- 1/2 pound maraschino cherries
- 1 pound seeded raisins
- 1 pound chopped candied fruit
- 1 pound pecan pieces

- 1 tablespoon vanilla
- 6 stiffly beaten egg whites
- 1/8 teaspoon salt

Cream butter and sugar; add egg yolks and beat until fluffy. Sift 2 cups flour with the cinnamon, allspice, clove, nutmeg, baking soda and salt. Add the sifted ingredients to the butter mixture alternately with the wine, molasses and sour milk. Sprinkle the fruit with the remaining 1/2 cup flour and add the vanilla. Fold the egg whites and salt into the batter mixture. Place the dough in greased loaf pans lined with a layer of heavy wax paper. Line the bottom of the oven with pans of hot water and bake loaves in a 300 degree oven about 2-1/2 hours or until done. Remove the wax paper and wrap the loaves in fresh wax paper and store the cakes in tightly covered tin boxes. Soak the cakes every 3 days with 2 tablespoons wine. Place 1/2 apple in box with the cake to prevent drying.

Note: I make this recipe several

times about 3 or 4 weeks before Christmas. I have learned that making about six pounds at a time gets better results and is easier to mix.

### PARTY MIX

- 1 cup butter, melted
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 2 teaspoons Accent
- 1 cup pecans
- 1 cup peanuts
- 4 cups Rice Chex
- 4 cups Wheat Chex

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Place melted butter in bottom of 9"x13" baking pan. Add other ingredients and place in oven for 15 minutes. Stir or toss at 5 minute intervals. Cool before packaging.

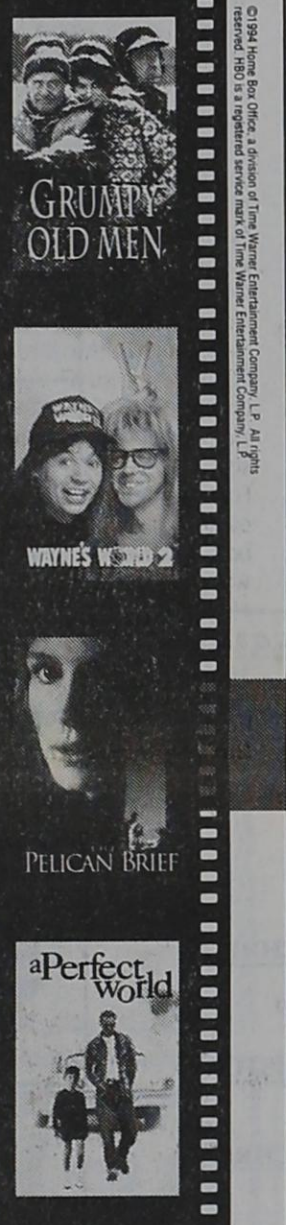
#### Bovina hires new coach

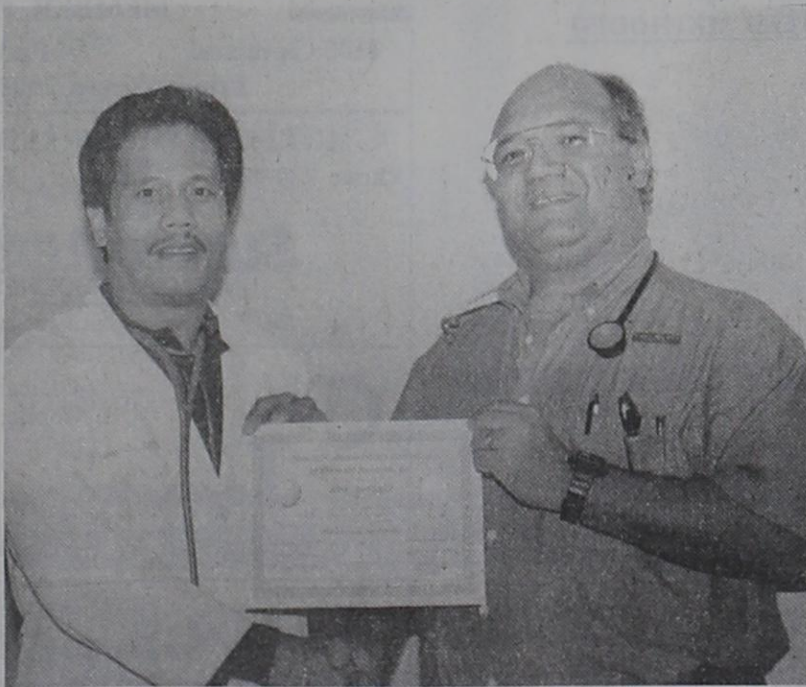

## Sen. Bivins Appointed Committee Chairman

State Sen. Teel Bivins (R-Amarillo) this week was named chairman of the Senate Nominations Committee by Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

The Senate is required to vote to confirm appointees to state boards and commissions by the governor. The Nominations Committee is the first step in the Senate confirmation process.

"Since Texas' many state agencies are run by the people appointed by the governor, it's an important responsibility to oversee the committee that will screen these appointees," Bivins said. "As chairman, my duty will be to insure that appointees meet all legal requirements for service on boards

and commissions."

"The Lieutenant Governor's selection of a Republican as chairman of nominations is a clear message that he respects the new governor's constitutional duties to appoint Texans that George Bush believes will serve the state well," Bivins said.

Bush is expected to appoint approximately three thousand Texans to boards and commissions during his term as governor. A majority of the appointments will require confirmation by the Senate.

Bivins also was reappointed to the Senate Finance, Education, and Natural Resources committees. He also will serve on the Agriculture Subcommittee.

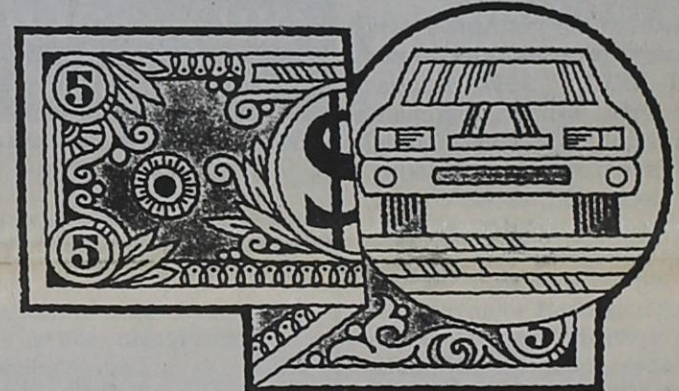

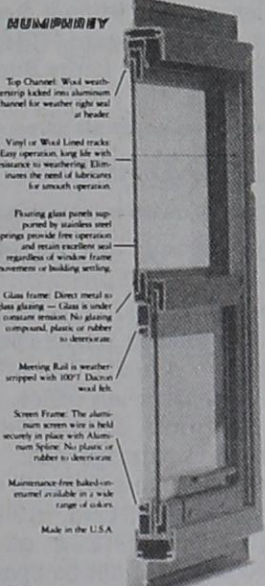

- Check all cords for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Test lights before stringing.
- Unplug lights before making any repairs or replacing light bulbs.
- Don't overload circuits with too many plugs!
- No lights on metallic trees.
- Keep your tree fresh by trimming the base and keeping plenty of water in the tree stand.
- Turn off all lights before leaving or going to bed.
- Don't use indoor lights outside.
- Avoid outdoor electrical lines when hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees.

### Bonds Offer Risks As Well As Rewards (Part 1 of a two-part series)

Bonds are an attractive alternative for investors seeking regular income. The interest paid on bonds can provide an excellent source of regular income that can be used to pay monthly bills, to build a sizeable nest egg or to reinvest.

Like all investments, however, bonds offer risks as well as rewards. Those who choose to invest in bonds rather than more traditional savings accounts and certificates of deposit must understand the trade-off between stable principal and low income vs. fluctuating principal and higher income. Once the difference is understood, the transition from savings to investing can be rewarding.

When you purchase a bond, the issuer of the bond promises to pay you a set amount of interest each year until the bond matures. At that time, your principal—the amount you initially invested—is returned to you.

If interest rates decline before your bond matures, you'll continue to receive the promised amount of interest. However, if you have to sell your bond before maturity, it may be worth more than what you originally paid because it carries a higher interest rate than newly issued bonds. On the other hand, if interest rates increase before your bond matures, again you'll still receive the promised amount of interest, even though other bonds are now paying a higher rate of interest. This makes your bond worth less than newly issued bonds.

Of course, if you plan to hold the bond until it matures, these fluctuations should be of little concern. After all, you'll still continue to earn your promised rate of interest, and you'll still receive your principal when the bond matures.

Mutual funds that invest in bonds react in much the same way as individual bonds. When interest rates rise, they fall in value because the bonds are less attractive than newly issued bonds. Because bond funds are priced daily, any price fluctuation is seen immediately by those who monitor the bonds. These price fluctuations often go unnoticed by individual investors because they seldom monitor their bonds on a daily basis.

One major difference between individual bonds and bond funds is that the interest earned on bond funds can fluctuate. If interest rates rise for an extended period of time, bond-fund investors will gradually see an increase in their monthly income. This is because fund managers are investing in newly issued, higher-interest bonds with proceeds from maturing bonds and new money coming into the fund.

This opportunity for adjustable income is one of the benefits of investing in bond mutual funds. It's important, however, to realize that the opposite also can occur. If interest rates fall over a period of time, fund managers will eventually be forced to invest in lower-yielding bonds, and your monthly income will decrease.

Another major difference between individual bonds and bond mutual funds is that bond mutual funds have no maturity date. Unlike an individual bond, which pays back principal at maturity, the only way to obtain the principal from a bond fund is to sell your shares of the fund.

Bonds offer an attractive alternative to lower-yielding, more traditional investments, but they also involve different types and levels of risk. Ask your financial adviser to explain the risks and rewards of bond investing, and make sure you fully understand them before committing your dollars.
