Will Go Caroling

In my younger days, I was one of those purists who said I'd never have a fake tree in my home. I wanted all the needles, the resin, the tree-tilt, the whole works. . .but most of all the real Christmas spirit, in my mind, was tied up with the SMELL of the evergreen boughs.

Well, all that dewy-eyed sentiment came to a screeching halt one Christmas about 25 years ago when we had new shag carpet and two baby kittens. The tree was in one of those little stands that holds water, with the optimistic thought that this would keep it fresh. The kittens went up and the tree went down three times that Christmas season and we had an electric heater going full-blast for weeks while we tried to dry out the water in the new shag carpet.

We committed to a artificial tree the following Christmas and when we sold the house to Delphine and Bobby Weid six years later, I think there were still some needles in that shag carpet from our last real tree.

When we commit to something we do it forever. We still have that same old artificial tree from 24 years ago and it goes up every year at Christmas time. The kids won't let me throw it out and get a newer, fancier one. So one year I sprayed it white, thinking that would give it a "new" look, at least. Well, the white didn't cover very good. Some of the green still shows through, but the result is, it looks more like a real pine.

The inside ends of the branches were color coded to go into certain holes in the wooden trunk. Over the years the colors have all worn off, so the branches just get stuck in wherever. This also adds to the "real" look because it isn't perfectly symmetrical anymore like most of your fake trees. In fact, the older this tree gets, the more realistic it looks.

A few years ago I found a small tree that had the same type of branches as our old one. I brought this little fellow home, sprayed it white so it would match, and stuck it up on top of the old tree. There's a high ceiling in our family room and now we have a nice tall, skinny Christmas tree with a few bare spots, that tilts a little toward the north. I buy the smell of the evergreen boughs in a spray can now and Christmas still comes around every year, same as always.

An incident that created a lot of rumors this week was investigated this week by Diane Rogers of the Friona Star. According to officials, here's what really happened:

On Monday, December 12, Raymond Bachicha of Bovina came running from a house and jumped into the Schwan's Ice Cream truck driven by Doug Meredith, east of Friona.

"Bachicha was on drugs or something and hallucinating," said Parmer County Sheriff, Rex Williams. "He hid in the floorboard of the Schwan's truck and said two men were trying to kill him and to get him away from them."

The Schwan's driver, Doug Meredith was never threatened by Bachicha.

John Taylor, Friona Police Chief and Texas Trooper, Craig Hunt picked up Bachicha north of Chaney's Fertilizer and took him to the Friona Police Station.

Bachicha was charged with public intoxication and paid a fine and was later released. "We can't, as of yet, find anything else to charge him with," said Sheriff Williams. "A Trespassing charge cannot be cited if the person is in a vehicle."

PEANUT BRITTLE 1 cup white corn syrup 2 cups sugar 1/2 cup water 2 cups raw peanuts 2 tablespoons butter or margarine 2 teaspoons baking soda 2 tablespoons water

water in an iron skillet and cook to soft ball stage. Add the peanuts. Stir and cook to the crack stage. Remove from heat. Stir in the butter, baking soda and vanilla. Pour onto a greased platter. Turn quickly and stretch until very thin. When cool, break into pieces. * * * *

2 cups sugar

3/4 cup water

3 egg whites, beaten stiff 1/8 teaspoon salt 2 teaspoons vanilla

1/2 cup whole walnuts Stir sugar, water and syrup over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Cook until soft ball stage. Pour beaten egg whites into syrup, stirring constantly. Add salt. Place over boiling water and beat until mixture stands up in peaks. Remove from heat and add the vanilla and mix. Spread on a greased platter. Cut into squares and mash 1/2 walnut in center of each square.

CHOCOLATE FUDGE 2 ounces unsweetened chocolate 2 cups sugar 1/8 teaspoon salt 1 cup cream 2 tablespoons corn syrup 3 tablespoons butter 2 teaspoons vanilla 1 cup nuts, chopped Cook the first five ingredients over low heat until soft ball forms when dropped in cup of cold water. Stir frequently. Remove from heat and add the butter. Beat until the fudge begins to harden. Add the vanilla and nuts. Pour onto buttered platter. Cut into squares.

OATMEAL COOKIES 1 cup brown sugar 2/3 cup butter 1 egg 1/2 cup buttermilk 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon baking soda 2 teaspoons cinnamon 1 teaspoon cloves 1/2 teaspoon ginger 2 cups oatmeal 1 cup seeded raisins 1 cup chopped nuts 2 teaspoons vanilla

Beat sugar and butter until fluffy. Beat in egg. Combine dry ingredients and add alternately with milk. When mixed, add vanilla. Drop dough by small spoonfuls onto greased sheet and bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees or until light brown. * * * * *

Continue to boil and stir--about 18 minutes, or until mixture turns light brown (hard ball stage). Remove from heat and add vanilla. Pour over the popcorn and nuts and mix well. Spread out on cookie sheet and cool. When cool, break apart and store in tightly sealed containers. Decorate.

egg yolks and beat until fluffy. Sift 2 cups flour with the cinnamon, allspice, clove, nutmeg, baking soda and salt. Add the sifted ingredients to the butter mixture alternately with the wine, molasses and sour milk. Sprinkle the fruit with the remaining 1/2 cup flour and add the vanilla. Fold the egg whites and salt into the batter mixture. Place the dough in greased loaf pans lined with a layer of heavy wax paper. Line the bottom of the oven with pans of hot water and bake loaves in a 300 degree oven about 2-1/2 hours or until done. Remove the wax paper and wrap the loaves in fresh wax paper and store the cakes in tightly covered tin boxes. Soak the cakes every 3 days with 2 tablespoons wine. Place 1/2 apple in box with the cake to prevent drying. Note: I make this recipe several

times about 3 or 4 weeks before Christmas. I have learned that making about six pounds at a time gets better results and is easier to mix.

IKE STEVENS Mutual funds that invest in bonds react in much the same way as individual bonds. When interest rates rise, they fall in value because the bonds are less attractive than newly issued bonds. Because bond

funds are priced daily, any price fluctuation is seen immediately by those who monitor the bonds. These price fluctuations often go unnoticed by individual investors because they seldom monitor their bonds on a daily basis.

One major difference between individual bonds and bond funds is that the interest earned on bond funds can fluctuate. If interest rates rise for an extended period of time, bond-fund investors will gradually see an increase in their monthly income. This is because fund managers are investing in newly issued, higher-interest bonds with proceeds from maturing bonds and new money coming into the fund.


This opportunity for adjustable income is one of the benefits of investing in bond mutual funds. It's important, however, to realize that the opposite also can occur. If interest rates fall over a period of time, fund managers will eventually be forced to invest in lower-yielding bonds, and your monthly income will decrease. Another major difference between individual bonds and bond mutual funds is that bond mutual funds have no maturity date. Unlike an individual bond, which pays back principal at maturity, the only way to obtain the principal from a bond fund is to sell your shares of the fund. Bonds offer an attractive alternative to lower-yielding, more traditional investments, but they also involve different types and levels of risk. Ask your financial adviser to explain the risks and rewards of bond investing, and make sure you fully understand them before committing your dollars.

If interest rates decline before your bond matures, you'll continue to receive the promised amount of interest. However, if you have to sell your bond before maturity, it may be worth more than what you originally paid because it carries a higher interest rate than newly issued bonds On the other hand, if interest rates increase before your bond matures, again you'll still receive the promised amount of interest, even though other bonds are now paying a higher rate of interest. This makes your bond worth less than newly issued bonds.

Of course, if you plan to hold the bond until it matures, these fluctuations should be of little concern. After all, you'll still continue to earn your promised rate of interest, and you'll still receive your principal when the bond matures.
