ONE OF MY CHRISTMAS gifts was a book entitled "The Top 10 of Everything." Wife Carol gave it to Ye Editor, figuring he might be running low on column material. As you could tell from her last week's effort, she will never run low on material as long as she has Ye Editor around!

For instance, did you know that the earth's moon is only the fifth largest planetary moon in our solar system? Jupiter's moon, Ganymede, is about 50 per cent larger than our moon. Two other Jupiter moons, Callisto and Io, and Saturn's Titan are top ranked ahead of our own moon. Bet none of theirs is as pretty as our moon was this past Monday evening.

When it comes to the top food producers in the U.S., who would you choose? Probably not the Philip Morris Company, but it's number one, as a producer of cereals, cheese and beer. Conagra, which produces frozen foods, processed meats and potato products, is second, followed by Sara Lee and IBP, whom you'll recognize as a beef and pork producer.

The rest of the food list is as follows: 5. Archer Daniels Midland (refined oils, food additives); 6. General Mills; 7. Ralston Purina; 8. H.J. Heinz; 9. CPC International (sweeteners, corn oil, mayo, pasta and peanut butter) and 10. Borden.

If you watch much television or read newspapers or magazines, the following "top ten" probably won't be very surprising. It's the top ten advertisers of food and drink in the U.S. Kellogg's, led by Tony the Tiger, is number one, followed by: 2. McDonald's; 3. Budweiser; 4. Kraft; 5. General Mills Cereals; 6. Coke/Diet Coke; 7. Pizza Hut; 8. Miller Beer; 9. Post Cereals; and 10. Burger King.

The only food company that appeared on both of the above lists was General Mills, and it had basically the same ranking in both lists. Don't know for sure what that proves!

Did you Dallas Cowboys fans realize that your favorite team was the all-time most successful? Based on Super Bowl wins (four) and runnerup (three), the Cowboys lead every other team in the NFL. You all know that they missed by one win this year of adding to this lead, so the 49ers will be a close second after they win Super Bowl XXIX.

Baseball fans realize that there had been a World Series for 90 consecutive years before the strike of 1994 deprived the fans of their usual fall "sports fix." Ty Cobb had the most hits: 4,191, and highest batting average: .367; and Babe Ruth tied for ninth on both lists, with 2,873 hits and a .342 average.

Oldest stadiums currently in the major leagues are Tiger Stadium in Detroit and Fenway Park in Boston, both completed in 1914. The newest one, The Ballpark at Arlington, was used for just over a half season, so if anyone wants to buy a stadium, it should be in near-mint condition.

We saw a list of the longest highways in the U.S., and our first thought was "Do you suppose that I-40 (the old U.S. '66') made it. The answer was "no." However, an even bigger surprise was that our own U.S. Highway 60 DID make the list. It stands in seventh place overall at 2,748 miles. Nearby Highway 70, which goes through Muleshoe and Plainview, is next in eighth place, at 2,728 miles.

Speaking of highways, it should come as no surprise that Texas leads all states with the greatest network of roads, with 293,317 miles of roads. That's 43 per cent more than the second-place state, California.

California did lead the nation in licensed drivers, with almost twice as many as Texas, which stands in second place. So, with half as many drivers and 43 per cent more GOOD roads, where would you rather live?

Special Meeting Is Scheduled Monday

A special meeting to discuss the City of Friona's truck ordinance, is scheduled for Monday, January 23, at the American Legion Hall, on the corner of Sixth and Euclid Streets. The meeting will begin at 7 p.m.

The meeting is an outgrowth of the last regular meeting of the Friona City Council on January 9, at which a delegation appeared to air their grievances with the city on matters of truck traffic, and how it is being handled by city's rules, regulations and the city patrolmen.

"The statement last week that truckers have been harassed by the city is completely false. The city issued less than 20 citations to truckers during the last calendar year, out of more than 2,000 traffic violations it issued," stated Friona Mayor Clarence Monroe.

"We care about truckers, and understand their problems. But there are two sides to every question," said Monroe, who urged people on "both sides" of the issue to attend Monday's meeting.

The mayor explained that the city's truck ordinance was enacted after trucks became a problem with city residents and the city's streets.

"Some truckers were parking in residential districts. They would go out at an early hour and start their truck and let it idle for an hour or more to warm up. The noise, as well as the exhaust fumes, were a problem for neighbors," Monroe said.

The highway from Roswell to El Paso may eventually be widened to four lanes, and this would really encourage more traffic."

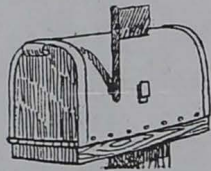

type of comments from time to time as do all law enforcement officers and we learn to let these comments slide away as they are made in anger. First of all, let me say that the Friona Police Department is supportive of our community, our businesses and all truckers. ANTI-TRUCK is not the issue.

I was surprised to see that you allowed "anonymous" quotes of harassment and supposed discrimination. I would be happy to address any specific situation with anyone, concerning an enforcement action they were unhappy with. No complaints of these topics have ever been made with the Friona Police Department but unknown spokesmen and business representatives make statements about harassment in the paper.

As far as parking on U. S. 60, within the City Limits of Friona this has been a law for a long time. It is in place for a very good reason. There are no shoulders to pull off the roadway and the vehicles, trucks or not, would be parked in a traffic lane. People entering onto U. S. 60 from side intersecting streets, have their vision blocked, from vehicles, especially trucks, which are parked in the traffic lanes.

The Police Department reminds many, many truckers both verbally and with warnings about this every year. Many vehicles have parked adjacent to a "No Parking" sign, on the highway, just to go into a convenience store for a coke. We have even stopped many vehicles, especially trucks, who just stop in the turning lane to go into a convenience store!

It is unfortunate that there is little to no parking for the trucks in convenience store parking lots. The police officers do use judgment and common sense when issuing citations. Stranded motorists and special circumstances are always taken into consideration.

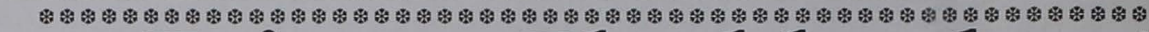
Trucks are welcome. We work with them in every way possible but the police department is entrusted with the job of enforcing the laws and we try to do our job professionally and correctly. This involves the parking on U. S. 60 and the ordinances. Sometimes efforts to warn and remind people about the compliance with these traffic laws meet with no results and enforcement action must be taken to ensure compliance.

The ordinance limiting trucks from city streets has its reasons. Regardless of these reasons, the ordinance exists and it is the department's job to enforce this ordinance. Over the last year, warnings were down and citations are up for this violation. Warnings were not gaining the necessary compliance with the ordinance.

Although I do have an opinion supporting the ordinance, my response is directed to allegations of harassment which I believe do not exist. All complaints that anyone wishes to bring to our attention will be thoroughly investigated.

And in closing, let me say that complaints are not all that is received by the police department. I regularly receive positive comments and even compliments on my officers and the work that they do. Yes, even last month, we received a hand-written thank you letter from a trucker, thanking and complimenting an officer for helping him in his time of need while traveling through Friona. Our job is not always the popular job but we do the best we can.

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital will again conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic in Friona at Parmer County Hospital, 1307 Cleveland on February 15 from 10 a.m.-2:30 p.m.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to boosting your chances of winning the battle against cancer are early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing breast self-exam each month.

Each participant at our screening will receive a breast exam and one-to-one instruction in breast self-examination by a Registered Nurse specially trained in breast cancer detection, and a mammogram by a mammography technician. Our program is certified by the FDA, American College of Radiology and the State Health Departments of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

The American Cancer Society urges all women to have their first mammogram by age 40. Those who have a close relative with breast cancer or other risk factors may be asked by their doctor to have a mammogram at an earlier age.

Low-Interest Loans Available Locally

Low-interest Agricultural Water Conservation loans to purchase and install water conserving irrigation equipment are available to farmers and ranchers.

The loans, along with information about the program, may be available through your local underground water conservation districts, soil and water conservation districts, and irrigation districts.

The districts can loan this money directly to individual farmers to cover the cost of improving water use efficiency of existing irrigation systems or replacing it with modern water-conserving equipment such as Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) systems.

Other loan applications include converting irrigated acreage to dryland farming and purchasing equipment for furrow dikes and water harvesting. The board can

also provide a loan to a district to improve its irrigation facilities.

Agricultural Water Conservation loans are made available to local districts by the Texas Water Development Board. These loans carry a very competitive interest rate as a result of currently being bought down by a multi-million dollar U.S. Department of Energy Oil Overcharge grant provided to the board by the state's General Services Commission.

Since the program was approved by the Texas Legislature in 1986, \$22.8 million in 32 low-interest loans have been made to 12 districts, saving 10 to 20 per cent of the water supplied through the improved irrigation systems.

Your Income Tax Refund May Be Late This Year

If you want to file your income tax electronically this year, everyone (even children under age one) listed on your tax return will need valid Social Security numbers. What's more, the name and Social Security number of each person listed on your tax return must correspond with information on file with the Social Security Administration.

These requirements result from new IRS electronic filing procedures and may affect you in one or more of the following situations:

- (1) You have recently had a child and have not yet applied for or received his or her Social Security number.
- (2) You have changed your name because of marriage or divorce and have not informed the Social Security Administration of the change. The same is true for anyone else listed on your tax return, such as your spouse or your dependents.
- (3) Someone listed on your tax return does not have a Social Security number for one reason or another.

"To avoid refund delays in 1995, we're advising taxpayers to fix any Social Security number issues now," says Dale Hart, manager of the H&R Block office at Friona. If you think that you may have difficulty with Social Security numbers when filing your 1994 tax return electronically, take the following steps now:

- (1) Apply for Social Security numbers for those who don't have them. Individuals should use Form SS-5 to apply for a Social Security number.
- (2) Check your Social Security card and that of your spouse (if you're married) and make sure the names and numbers the Social Security Administration has on file match the information that will appear on your tax return. Inform the Social Security Administration of name changes on Form SS-5.
- (3) Check the Social Security card information for everyone else

that will be listed on your tax return.
 "By checking your records and acting immediately to resolve problems with Social Security information, you'll be making your life a lot easier at tax time," Hart advised.

You may get Form SS-5 from your local Social Security Administration or by calling 1-800-772-1213. H&R Block will be happy to assist--free of charge--with completing Form SS-5. H&R Block is available year around to answer tax-related questions and help solve tax problems.

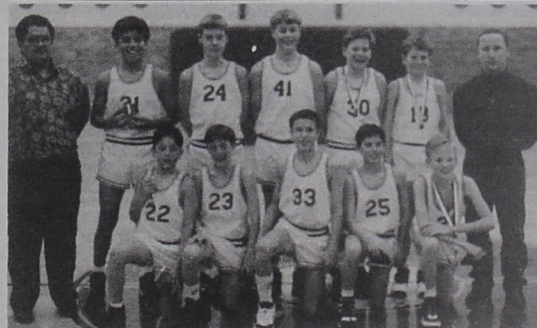

Tenn., is owner of 104.3 FM.

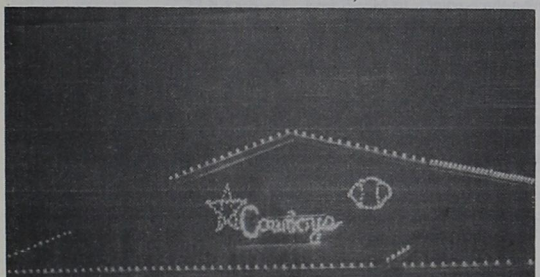

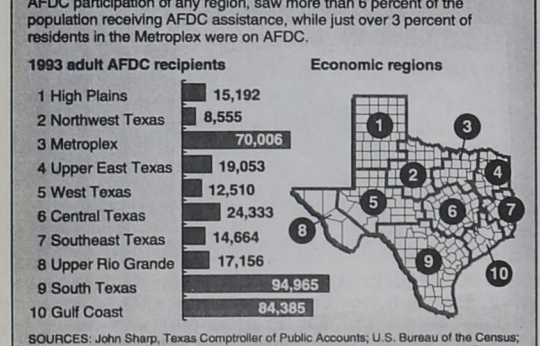

Below-Average Rainfall Locally Prompts Maximum Efficiency

Below-average precipitation during the past three years has caused many Parmer County residents to wonder if both agricultural and urban water use practices should be re-evaluated in order to maximize efficiency.

"As a result of the drought conditions during the past three years, heavier-than-normal pumping by agricultural and urban users has increased the rate of decline in the water table. This has caused above-average decreases in well yields during the pumping season in some parts of the county," says A. Wayne Wyatt, general manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in Lubbock. "It is during times of drought that people stop and wonder if more can be done to achieve maximum water use efficiency."

The volume of ground water in storage within the Ogallala Aquifer in Parmer County was calculated at 10.62 million acre-feet in 1990. The net depletion of the ground water in the county from 1990 to 2000 was expected to be about 1.64 million acre-feet, or 164,000 acre-feet per year, based upon previous water use trends. However, because of the drought, the amount of net depletion may be greater than previously expected due to the extra pumping and lack of precipitation for aquifer recharge.

At a recent meeting of the Water District's Parmer County Committee, it was concluded that changes in water use practices must be made if residents of the county are going to have enough water to continue to maintain a profitable economy.

The five-member county committee concluded that: "Efforts need to be made to ensure maximum use of every drop of precipitation that falls within the county."

"Irrigation practices should be re-evaluated to determine if water losses can be further reduced or eliminated. For example, producers can convert their partial dropline center pivot sprinkler to a Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) pivot and cut water losses by 15 per cent."

"Water losses resulting from irrigation tailwater escaping from fields must be eliminated."

"Producers should consider planting lower water-use crops."

"Producers should try to achieve the most profitable crop

yield per inch of water pumped--rather than irrigating for maximum crop yield."

"Recent research in precipitation enhancement should be evaluated to determine if such a program could be implemented within the county or region to increase precipitation."

In addition, the county committee indicated that homeowners, business owners and industries should share in the water conservation effort.

"Industry should reuse waste water whenever possible."

"Low-flow showerheads, low-flow lavatory faucets, flow restrictors, low-flush toilets, and other water conservation bathroom fixtures should be installed in homes, schools and apartment complexes within the county."

"Urban irrigation systems should be designed for maximum efficiency."

"Drought tolerant, native vegetation should be used whenever possible in yards."

Representatives from each of the fifteen county committees of the Water District plan to meet as a group in early January 1995 to determine a plan of action to maximize water use efficiency to counteract the problems brought on by the recent drought conditions.

"Parmer County residents have made tremendous progress in improving their irrigation efficiency during the past ten years," says Wyatt. "In 1993, a survey by the Water District found 1,258 center pivot irrigation systems in operation within the county. Based upon the reported irrigated acreage in Parmer County, approximately 73.6 per cent of the county was being irrigated with center pivot sprinkler systems. Even with this great success, there are still more opportunities for urban and

agricultural water conservation within Parmer County," says Wyatt.

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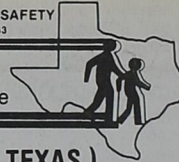
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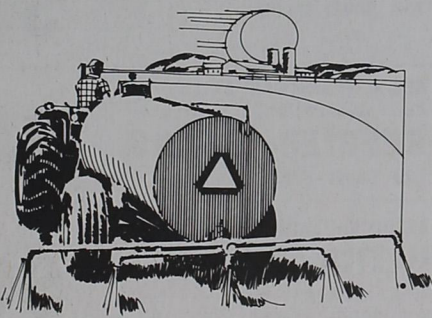

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There's a special group of mutual funds called world, global, international or foreign. They may have different names, but one thing they all have in common is that the fund managers go outside the United States to look for investment values.

By whatever name you call it, global investing requires broader financial acumen. Not only must a foreign corporation be evaluated on its merits, but also factors such as currency exchange, political and economic conditions, and world markets also must be considered.

Where do fund managers get this information? Many funds that do not have international expertise among in-house analysts buy their information from research firms or major world banking institutions. Although this may be an economically sound approach, it could limit the fund's ability to obtain complete and specific information. Often the same research data is bought by investment managers whose funds have different objectives. The fund manager may be forced to make investment decisions on information that is not as complete as he or she would like.

Other global funds have their own research analysts who are proficient in world economics. These analysts often visit companies and countries where they plan to invest. This hands-on evaluation, in addition to statistical data typically bought from research firms, enables them to make better-informed investment decisions.

Finally, there are funds with management operations scattered around the world. Although their headquarters may be in the United States, their overseas offices and research centers cover the globe. Their research comes from analysts who live and work in the countries where they report. These mutual-fund managers have established research operations in the United States as well as Europe, Asia and the Pacific Rim.

Of course, world exposure alone does not guarantee investment results. On the other hand, when you consider international investing, it is prudent to look for mutual-fund managers who have the widest experience.

When selecting a mutual fund, many investors mistakenly focus on short-term performance. This can be particularly dangerous with international funds. Many of these funds are relatively new, without the experience of investing in a world economy. Over time, the funds with the best research, foreign expertise and world-management experience are likely to be the ones that protect your capital the best.

A mutual fund's management and research is important. With world funds, it's vital.

Windbreak Trees Are Available

Windbreak trees and trickle irrigation systems can still be ordered through the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District through March 1, 1995.

The technician can help you with your design and give you an estimate of cost. The service is free of charge.

Although we are running out of some species, the district offers shrubs such as honeysuckle, lilac, cherry, plum, and many more.

They offer deciduous trees such as ash, oak, willow, cottonwood, hackberry, Russian olive and more.

Of course, they offer evergreens such as pines, spruces, and junipers.

This year the district is also offering "wildlife packets." These consist of four species totaling 100 seedlings. The packets are for quail and pheasants, deer, turkey, or squirrel.

A windbreak can be as lovely as

it is useful. We also are offering one gallon and five gallon potted trees such as keteleer juniper and Austrian pine. These are very limited.

Windbreaks furnish a nesting place for numerous types of birds as well as other wildlife.

A windbreak may reduce wind speed to one-third its normal velocity thus saving up to 30 percent on home heating and cooling costs. This will also help prevent wind damage by protecting homes, gardens, and livestock.

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Seeing spots before your eyes? They may be what we call "floaters"--the visual perception that something is floating in the field of vision. Generally these are just shadows cast on the retina by small structures within the vitreous humor--that is, the "jelly" that fills the eyeball. Occasionally some changes may cause the perception of flashing lights, or "flashers." In older people, the vitreous humor may develop cloudy spots or small bits floating free.

Rest assured that floaters and flashers are usually not serious though they are annoying.

However, when they appear together--when a shower of floaters is accompanied by flashing lights in the periphery of vision--they may indicate retinal detachment--which is an emergency situation. See your eye doctor right away. Up-and-down flashing lights that persist, a sense of a "veil" over the eye or a decrease in the visual field are also signs to see your eye doctor.

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
