How the bulls of Bashan do bellow since a person went among them taking notes as to their methods of conducting the abbatoir business. The Drover' Journal calls it "baseless twaddle," but the people call the practices which the dressed beef men are engaged in detestible.

An alarming evil to our ranges appears in the number and hungriness of the wolves which, since the cold weath er in the north two years ago, are over running the land. If there are any more choice blessings in store for the cattle industry, we trust they may a be bestowed during the present year.

ThE big four are frank enough to say that they don't want inspection laws. In this instance it seems to be about 60 millions of people against a half dozen men. The laws, will be passed, however, as the people thoroughly understand how the public health is imperilled by the cupidity of Armour et als.

THE butchers' associations throughout the east are doing most effective work to correct the evils foisted upon their industry by the Chicago dressed beef men. Their position, influence and the efforts they are making to regulate the business of meat handling will be seen in all its power at the St. Louis
conference. The butchers only ask of the big four equality as a basis of trade. The big four politely suggest to the butchers that they warm their shinbones in sheol.
It requires considerable bull dog tenacity to hold on to range cattle raising under the many discouragements now surrounding the business. This kind of grit, however, will carry him who possesses it through to success in due time. It should not be forgotten that the population of the United States will have been increased this year of grace fully one million of souls by immigration. There will be at the lowest computation fully two milions fewer cattle in the country by Januaiy next than there were at the beginaing of this year. The beef producer may confidently expeot in the near future much easier sailing than he has been accustomed to for many months.
IdAHo cattlemen have begun shipping steers in the new improved palace car to the Atlantic sea board, 380 head of 1350 lbs . steers belonging to the Soda Springs Land and Cattle company having been sent forward this week. The stock is fed and watered in transit. A time schedule of twenty-five miles an hour has been figured, which should dejiver the stock in New York in less than 190 hours, fresh from the Idaho ranches 2500 miles distant. It is intended to establish a regular rapid transit line, each asain being equipped with a dining and sleeping car, in charge of a train master and special crew. The stock will not be unloaded, and the only delays will be one or two hours in replenishing the water tanks. The animals will be feed ing at all hours on the journey. And thus is it attempted to evade the un righteous tolls of the Chicago beef combine.

Are live stock inspection laws an injury to honest men who look upon the meat industry as a legitimate enterprise for the proper employment of capital and brains? Then why did Armour Swift, Hammond \& Co. send Elmer Washburne, president of the Chicago Stock Yards company, to Pittsburgh, to induce the common council not to make laws prohibiting the sale of Chicago dressed beef in that city ? The Chicago four know that they have it within their power to close every independent butcher shop in the land and force the people to buy their diseased meats: The contest should not cease until the rights of the people in this matter are supreme. It remains with the people whether Armour and
his friends strengthen their position or become amenable to laws that will pro tect the public from their rapacity. The big four will go down in the end.

THE bankers of the western country are particularly requested by one of the leading members of the banking industry, as will be found elsewhere in this issue, to lend their assistance, by their presence, to the St. Louis conference of Novernber 20th, in order to carry to a successful issue the plan put under way to correct some of the abuses which are now a paty of the business of beef production. Mr. Raynolds' address is broad, most earnest in spirit, moderate in tone, and shows clearly how deeply the evils from which so many classes or business men are suffering, by the direct as well as indirect operations of the handful of men who have throttled the beef producing and meat handling industry, are rooted in the hearts of the business community. The ways of the dressed beef men are reprehensible, and the combined efforts of all who are injuriously affected will be necessary to break away from their grasp. There is no question of vaster importance be fore the people of the United States today in its correlative influence upon their interests than the beef question. It touches the home life of every man, woman and child in the country. And it has now come to that point whether those whose interests are so sensibly affected shall submit further to grievgus wrongs or by active and intelligent resistence remove the causes which produce them. The nib of the call to the bankers is contained in the words, "The burdens of monopolistic oppression should be removed." And we hope to be able to respond in due time to the Macedonian cry of Mr. Raynolds, They are removed.

## BASELESS TWADDLE.

The Chicago Drover's Journal of September 17 th contained an editorial entitled "Baseless Twaddle," in which it refers to the papers both east and west which for the last two or three years have been waging war against the big four. The substance of the article referred to is in the nature of an apology for the big four. This is to be expected from the Drover's Journal, which apparently from its expressions at different times has tried to straddle both sides of the fence. It was only a short time ago that the Drover's Journal contained a short original paragraph condeming in the strongest possible terms monoplies and combines which was very generally commended, and which placed that pa-
per on the side of the fence where cattle raisers, cattle feeders, butchers and the beef consumers of the UnitedStates stand. The article in the-Drover's Journal under the head of "Baseless Twaddle" is as strong in the interests of the big four and in condemnation of the efforts that the live stock papers of the country, and in fact the press generally, are making against dressed beef men in the interest of the people of the United States, as if it had been written by some member of the beef combine and paid for at so much a line. The article referred to calls attention to the advance in prices paid for cattle about the 1st of June, and tries to make it appear that if the big four could fix prices of cattle to suit themselves that "they could have kept the price down in June instead of letting the market get away with them." This sophistry of the Drover's Journal has been answered time and time again by the live stock papers of the country, and was especially knocked out by Major A. W. Hillard, vice-president of the International Rarige association, in a recent interview in the Dallas Necs, in which he said in substance that whenever the big four permitted the market to get away from them, as the Drover's Journal says, it is simply because they want to bait cattle finto their toll mills, the same as the spider baited the poor fly into his web. The big four do not want to "kill the goope that lays the golden egg." They have the power to keep prices down all the time if they chose to exercise it, that is, until the people would arise in their might and pass laws curtailing their poseers, which the people are now about to do. Whenever the big four permit cattle to advance a little in price, they take a dollar off the price of cattle a few days latter for every 50 cents they pay for cattle during these spurts in the market. When we consider that some of the members of the big four are selling animal fats, cotton seed oil and their com. pounds under the label of "refined lard," we need not expect them to begoverned by any high moral principles in their treatment of the cattle producers of the country. They, in short, are running their business for every dollar there is in it, and the commercial methods which they are pursuing in order to make the most money out of their business, would naturally cause them to operate together for the purpose of depressing prices of cattle on hof with out lowering the prices of the cattle products which they sell. The Drovert Journal about two years ago contained occasional truthful statements show-
ing the evil effect of the operations of the Armour crowd on the Chicago mar: ket. Western journals used to keep prominently displayed in their columns in large type these statements from the Drover's Journal, which were very annoying to that paper, when it chose to take the other side of the fight. If there ever has been any "Baseless Twaddle" in any papers in the United States in relation to the beef question, accareful examination of thę files of the Drooer's Journal would show more "Baseless Twaddle" on both sides of the question then is contained in all other papers combined.

IMFORTATION.WANTED ABOUT WESTERN CATTLE.
The request made by Secretary Taylor, of the International Range association, at the instance of the commissioner of agriculture, of the cattlemen of the west for more complete information as to the number and value of bovine stock upon our ranges than is furnished by the assessment rolls, is in line with an often expressed wish of the Stock Grower and other journals in the range country. In estimating the extent of the range cattle industry as respects values and numbers, we do not know where it has ever been done except approximately. We do not believe that such a condition of unreliable statistics attaches to any other industry in the United States of equal importance with ours. It is to the discredit of the cattle business that there is no agency in the distinctive range cattle growing states and territories from which accurate data respecting the industry can be supplied. The subject of organizing a bureau for the more complete handling of this important question, was brought up about one year ago by Dr. Ames, of the Consolidated Cattle Growers' association of the United States, but like most matters pertaining to western cattle interests taken up by that association, it has been allowed to drop into helpless dependency. In the rearrangement of range cattle raising now going on, the progressive
men of the industry should set themmen of the industry shoyld set themselves to the task of erme ascertainment of facts which shall have the merit of giving trustshall have the merit of giving trustevery feature of cattle raising. We hope that the work inaugurated by the commissioner of agriculture will be taken up by the cattlemen and prosecuted until such information as is wanted by him is a matter of record and is no longer left to the approximation which guesses alone afford. Upon this matter the Fort Worth Gazette aptly says:

Don't Spay Old Range Cows. An interesting revelation as to the
sults of spaying old cows upon their ma ket value, is afforded by the experience of the Cedar Valley Land \& Cattle company, who recently shipped a train load of cows to the Kansas City market, the shipment being divided between two firms, the dry other. Both lots brought the same price $\$ 1.95$ per cwt., but the spayed cows were thirty-four pounds per head lighter than the unspayed. This has demonstrated to
the management the important economic point that nothing is gained by spaying old cows; in fact, that it is rather a detriment to this portion of the herd and pro ductive of loss, as their lessened weight, When marketed, from the foregoing shows.
It is also noticed among range herds that old cows spayed in the spring are not fit to ship the following fall, but have to be held over until the fall of the succeeding year. Again, if they are spayed while in
milk they don't dry up, and, like a Kathleen Mavourneen note, runion in milk for years, being followed by two generations of calves until they go to protest by being suepked down. Mr. Grierson, manager of the aforenamed company, hás therefore reported to the London directors against the utility of spaying old cows, and sug.
gests as a better way and one which will gests as a better way and one which will
result in all the profit that can be had from this class of stock, that the anclent and demure mothers be permitted to breed, sending the calf to market as veal,
for which from $\$ 4$ to $\$ 6$ can be obtained, and have a fat cow for the fall marknt. This plan saves the expense of spaying which averages about thirty-three cents
are obviated, and time is gained from Which returns are had in selling them for beef.

For this reason I would ask western banker to be present at the conference of the seb ate committee, appointed to investigate the beef question, the cattiemen, cattle feeders and butchers, which will be held at St. Louls, Mo., on November 20th. ## To the Stock Grow

Mr. Holman's bill to suspend the opere tion of the public land laws, which form ed the subject of my last letter, has not yet emerged from the room of the com t the time of its introduction.
Whether it will be passed by the house representatives or not is an open ques on, soune members expressing the opinon that it will, while others assert the rary. One member of the coummitte bill will be defeated in the committee room, and those baving the interests of the great northwest at heart should hope hat his opinion will prove correct.

## The Corn Orop.

The Cincinati Price-Current, in its issue of last Thursday, presents its annual estimate of the corn crop of the country. The Price-Current is accepted as the highest unofficial authority on this subject, and its conclusions are therefore of special interest. It modestly does not claim for its estimates "consideration above those of the official bureays," but submits the fruit of its independent inquires "as evidence additional to that submitted ofticially,'
Its general conclusion is that the present season's crop will reach the unprecedented total of $2,015,000,000$ bushels. The largest crop ever yet gathered was $1,936,176,060$ in 1885 , as officially reported, or $78,224,000$ less than the estimate for this year. The present crop is nearly 40 per cent. greater than that of last year, which was exceptionally small owing to drouth in the western states. In the seven surplis states-Ohio, Indiana, braska-the estimate is nearly 67 per cent. above last jear's crop as oftcially reported.
The Price-Current says that "the bulk of the crop is secure from injury from hard frosts, and but little damage has resulted from this pause, outside of unimportant districts, mainly in New England states and Michifan. The returns suggest that from 15 to $2 /$ per cent. of the crop in Ohio, Indiana, If iois, Iowa and Nebraska was in need of another week to be since Thuraday have been favorable and since Thursday have been favorable and cellent prospect that the fall crop will ex cellent p
secured.
The estimates for Illinois and Iowa are the same- $270,000,000$ bushels each-and Missouri stands third, with $210,000,000$ bushels to its credit. Illinois has hereto rore stood at the head as a corn producing state, 1884 and 1887 having been excepcional years, in which Iowa took the lead surpassing Illinois by $8,000,000$ bushels in the former and by $42,400,000$ bushels in tue latter year. Illinois produces this ear 15,000,000 bushels more than Ohio and indians together, and Ohio and IIli twelve southern and six New England states.
Of the seven surplus states, Indians makes the largest relative gain over last ear, $60,000,000$ bushels, or nearly 100 per ent; Illinois gains $129,000,000$ bushels, or 47 per cent.; Iowa, $86,000,000$ busheis, ls, or 49 per cent.; Kansas, $71,000,000$ bushels, or 92 per cent.; Nebraska, 54 . 000,000 bushels, or 58 per cent., and Ohio $41,000,000$ bushels, or 55 per cent.
