TEXAS NATIONAL GUARD THREATENED

How About It, Governor?

Destruction of the National Guard, threatened by arbitrary decision of the Pentagon brass to require six months active duty of all National Guard enlistees, may have been averted by the intemperate and uninformed "draftdodging" commentary of Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson before the House Armed Services committee.

Facing up at long last to the failure of heir costly reserve program, it would seem hat the Army heads convinced Mr. Wilson that the Guard was standing in the way by offering a young man the opportunity of becoming 'citizen soldier" (as General Washington called the militiaman) without scrapping his civilian career.

Having decided on the six-months-training nolicy for the Guard, Mr. Wilson and his adisors then called in the Reserve Forces Policy Board of the Defense Department and the General Staff Committee on National Guard and army Reserve Policy to rubber stamp the decisions already taken.

Fortunately for the country at large, as well is for the National Guard and the prestige of the individual states, Mr. Wilson's charge that the Guard became a refuge for draft dodgers during the Korean War has stirred up a fullscale tempest. It is not likely to subside until the Army's Reserve plan flasco and the profestional soldier's animosity toward the Guard are fully exposed.

Maj. Gen. Ellard A. Walsh, president of the National Guard Association, immediately branded the Wilson accusation "a damn lie". He reminded the nation that every enlistee was immediately liable to active ser-ice, that both the Army National Guard nd the Air National Guard urged their comlete mobilization immediately at the outset of the Korean emergency. And while the

Government said no, it was only a "police action", 37 percent of the Army National Guard and 84 percent of the Air National Guard were soon mobilized.

With regard to the six months training period demanded by the Pentagon, Gen. Walsh reminds us that the Reserve Forces Act of 1955 provides for active duty training periods of three to six months, and that the National Guard Association has urged a mandatory three months program.

This is not my dunghill", said Mr. Wilson the other day, referring to the White House. And we wonder if the same remark might not apply to the executive mansions of the 48 states - since the Governors thereof are, nominally at least, the commanders-in-chief of their respective National Guard units.

Will the States stand by while the Federal government absorbs their historic and valiant constabularies - as they have stood by while the Washington bureaucrats took over welfare at the state level, and as they are standing by while federalization of their schools is being formulated? Perhaps it is time for another Governors' Conference?
