## 'Tragic Toll' Unnecessary

The staggering and tragic toll of lives taken in U. S. traffic accidents was described here Monday by Fred Marshall, district director for Texas Department of Public

Said Marshall, speaking at the weekly luncheon of Brownfield Jaycees:

"There have been more persons killed in automobile mishaps in the United States since the automobile came into being than there have been soldiers killed in all our wars since Columbus discovered America."

The Jaycees recognized their newest member. James Tippitt, Brownfield chief of police. Guests were Don Hewitt of Cities Service Oil Company's Brownfield office and Dick Yindley, General Telephone employee.

Marshall, who is concerned with a 23-county district, also told the Jaycees: "In Texas last year, a total of 2,611 persons died in traffic smash-ups. The average was 7 a day for 365 days."

Bible Comment:

#### Words of Christ **Gave His Disciples** Their Duties' Scope

WITH the reappearance of Christ after His resurrection, the disciples knew that His message of salvation was not directed toward a limited number of people at a particular crisisin their history. For the first time there came to them the vision of a kingdom which would encompass the earth and all the men

This must have been forming very clearly in their minds, but these words of Christ brought a. sudden clarity to the situation: "Go ve therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the son and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world.

We have been familiar for generations with Christianity as a world religion and we have seen the missionary enterprise of the church so widespread and so effective in the modern world. It is difficult to place ourselves in the position of those who heard this message from Christ.

What a vast world of vision and enterprise these words opened up-a limitless field for those who believed that they had a gospel of good news to proclaim. Here was a great task of teaching in which men could learn the principles of true character and sound relationships in daily living.
