## Mrs. B. L. McPherson Was Pioneer Mother

Almost to the day, Mrs. B. L. McPherson of 202 W. Broadway has been a resident of Terry County for 55 years. And not only does she know just about everybody in the county, she knows just about everything about the county.

Mrs. Mac (or Lilly, as many call her) came to the county May 7, 1902 as a girl with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. H. F. Adams, from Brownwood. "That means the coun-

ty, too," she says. There was no Brownfield at the time, but Gomez was a thriving little place.

### Married in 1906

Married Dec. 19, 1906 to B. L. McPherson, Mrs. Mac had six children, five of whom are living. They are Mrs. Lela Mae Brown of Lubbock, Mrs. Frances Craig of Farmington, N. M., J. W. McPherson of Cheyenne Wells, Colo., Barton McPherson of Saratoga, Brazil, and Ulee of 1415 East Buckley. Thelma died in 1930.

All phases of the growth of Terry County and Brownfield are clearly remembered by Mrs. Mac and she relates incidents with a large dose of humor. Showing a picture of a big snowstorm that hit the county back in the early 1900s (with a group of people in a mule-drawn sleigh) Mrs. Mac said, "I'll never forget that snowstorm. It stayed with us for six long weeks."

### Was Practical

Not only is Mrs. Mac a familiar figure around Brownfield, but she has probably stretched out a helping hand to more people than you could "shake a stick at" (to use one of her own phrases). Although not as active in practical nursing duties as she has previously been, almost everybody knows they "can get Mrs. Mac" if they get in a tight and need special care for themselves or a member of their family. Her ready smile and her eagerness to lend aid to young and old alike make her one of Brownfield's most popular residents.

As evidenced by her position as Noble Grand of the Rebekah Society, Mrs. Mac is a great-grandmother and great-great-grandmother.

## Friday Rites Held For Plains Rancher

PLAINS, May 9 (Special) — Walter Morman, 85, retired Plains ranchman and peace officer, died in Treadaway-Daniell Hospital here about 4:30 p.m. Thursday following an extended illness.

## Cub Game Is Slated

The 1957 edition of the Brownfield High School Cubs will go on display in a full-dress game in Cub Stadium at 8 p.m. Tuesday, according to Coach Doug Cox.

The game, which will mark the wind-up of spring training, is open to Cub fans without charge, said Cox. "This will give us a last look at what we have accomplished in the training period, and will give the fans a look at next year's team," the coach reported.

Starting players on the two teams which clash Tuesday will not necessarily be the starters next season, Cox noted. "We haven't selected the first two teams as yet," he said, "because there is a lot of competition for several positions."

Cox stated the squad has been divided as nearly equal as possible in order to make Tuesday's game as close as possible. "It does not represent the starters by any means," he said.

"We think the kids have shown a lot of improvement during spring training," the coach stated, "and indicate they really want to play football." The staff pointed out the squad will still be small and inexperienced when the season opens next fall, but they might pull a few surprises due to their desire to play.

Team defense still is likely to be a sore spot when the season opens next fall, the staff indicated, but continued improvement may change the picture by then.

Noted improvement has been in tackles Garry White, Johnnie Jones and Gus Foshee. Jim Rogers, guard, and Bob Cloe, an end, were also noted for their improvement during the 21-day training period.

Cox said the quarterback picture has improved steadily with the work of Joe Oswell and Ken Willis. "They've shown a lot of improvement and are very capable of handling their job," Coach Cox stated. "In fact, we might have

## City-County Airport To Be Pushed on Tuesday

Plans for the City-County Airport to be established four miles east of Brownfield are expected to go forward Tuesday when A. E. Dyatt, district airport engineer for the Civil Aeronautics Administration arrives here to discuss the project with Terry County commissioners; Earl Jones, aviation committee head, and other interested citizens.

The CAA engineer made the

announcement of his intended visit in a meeting with Joe Satterwhite, Chamber of Commerce manager, while the manager was in Fort Worth Wednesday.

Terry County voters authorized modernization of the airport by approving a \$100,000 bond issue last Dec. 19. The government has set aside \$94,625 as its part of the project, according to a telegram from Rep. George Mahon.

## Cotton Review Plan Nearing Final Stage For May 17-18 Event

Final plans for the 1957 Terry County "Cotton Review" are beginning to take shape, committee chairmen reported this week.

Mrs. Billy McCallister, chairman of the review, said nearly all divisions of the review were filled before the deadline and that there will be about six candidates for the maid title.

The review Friday and Saturday nights will cap the week's activities as approximately 85 maids and matrons appear in the high school auditorium. Tentative plans call for four age groups to appear on stage Friday night: 6-10, 11-13, 14-15 and 16-18. Other divisions, including Maid of Cotton candidates, will appear Saturday.

Tickets, which are \$1 and good for both nights, went on sale last week. Children under 12 will be admitted free if accompanied by their parents.

A parade, scheduled for 4:30 p.m. Friday, will feature the cotton economy with floats, Maid of Cotton contestants, and equipment. BHS band will head the parade, which will form at Co-op Gin and end at the high school.

Emcee for both nights will be the popular KDUB-TV announcer, Jimmie Isaacs. Isaacs is the Lubbock station's vice-president and general sales manager.

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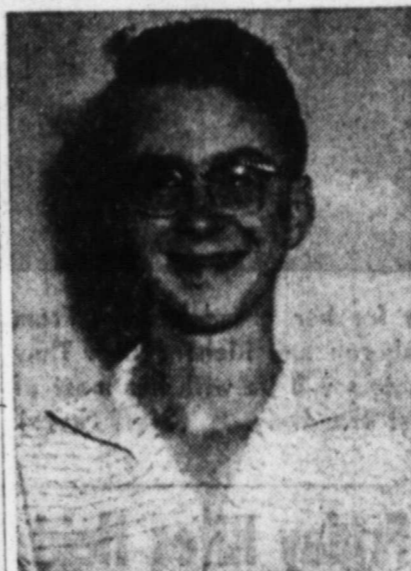
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TO ATTEND TECH COURSE

BHS Students Named

Two Brownfield High School juniors have been selected to attend a five-week physics course for talented science students at Texas Tech this summer, according to Dr. Robert Hoey, BHS counselor.

attend the course, which will run from June 10 to July 12.

The program, which instructors say is not intended to replace high school or college courses but to increase enthusiasm for science, will include several field trips to scientific installations, in addition to a series of lectures and demonstrations by Tech professors and visiting scientists.

The Tech course is one of five being conducted in Texas. Others are scheduled at Texas University, chemistry; Rice Institute, mathematics; Southern Methodist University, mathematics, and Texas A&M biology.

Coastal Bermudagrass under irrigation must have heavy applications of nitrogen to obtain maximum return on costs for irrigation.

Tests at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Crystal City produced 26,600

pounds of air-dry forage on an acre after 600 pounds of nitrogen (1800 pounds of ammonium nitrate) per acre compared with only 5,770 pounds of air-dry forage per acre where nitrogen was not applied.

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### Notary Public Applications Accepted

Any person not now a notary public who desires appointment should apply to his county clerk between May 1, 1957 and May 20, 1957. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of re-appointing present notaries.

Secretary of State Zollie Steakley further pointed out that each person applying for

a commission as a notary public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

This I believe, outside of the spiritual value one has absorbed, the greatest influence in our lives has been the character and personality of our mothers. 'Tis unfortunate, but true, that most of our mothers were not accurately valued by us until we also became parents. Only then did our vision become clearer, our judgement sounder. Suddenly, mother became much wiser and kinder.

Unfortunately, I never told my mother this, and I deem it a privilege to say it in print. By encouraging my abilities and attempting to strengthen my weakness, she sowed the seeds that developed into what I am today.

At the age of 24 she had six children — and on the farm during the depression years life wasn't easy. She must have

had the patience of Job, the strength of Samson and the wisdom of Solomon. Nope — I "ain't" go what she had.

Mrs. Annie Laura Hale of Goldthwaite, 70-year-old mother of Orville Hale, teacher in Brownfield High School, was named Texas Baptist Mother of the Year this week. She was selected by the Baptist General Convention, because of the dedicated motherhood exemplified while raising and educating 14 children and for her consistent Christian work through the years.

I think she summed up the sentiment of every mother when she said, "I wouldn't take a million dollars each for my 14 children. There is a lot of pleasure in raising a family, but there also is a lot of heartache and worry. It's worth it though. I wouldn't trade places with anybody."

Congratulations, Mr. Hale, for having such a fine mother. Our mothers didn't receive a reward, but none of us would trade them for a million like yours.

**Misconception Still Holds**  
Last week being Mental Health Week, the larger cities conducted financial drives for assisting in research and promotion. Authorities say mental health research has progressed to where cancer was 20 years ago. Twenty years ago, the majority believed mentally ill meant one and the same as INSANITY, and I dare say 50 per cent today are so unfamiliar with the subject that they still hold to this misconception.

According to Dr. William Menninger, president of the Menninger Foundation, of Kansas City, "There is not one person on the face of the earth who either has not had, will not, or does not have mental illness sometime during life. A vast majority will never be

come bad enough to be hospitalized but already one out of ten hospital beds are filled with mental cases, and for every patient in the hospital with mental illness there are ten on the outside who should be hospitalized."

It's a shame so much fun is poked, by high-salaried comedians about mental illness and psychiatrists. I have had personal experience with "nerves", and they are no laughing matter. I can imagine what would happen to Bob Hope's rating if he made a crack about cancer or a heart ailment. It's no wonder people hesitate to seek early attention, which would avoid a serious breakdown. We need to acquaint ourselves with what mental illness actually is: tension, headaches, insomnia, fatigue — all early stages of mental illness.

## Homemakers Lack Nutrition Intuition, Late Survey Shows

Most Americans get enough or too much food, but not always the right kind. Three of every four homemakers have only a scanty knowledge of nutrition, a recent study in New York State shows.

The other fourth of the homemakers surveyed had only a "fair" knowledge of nutrition as related to feeding their families. Surveys are now being conducted in 12 sample Texas counties which will reveal some of the eating habits and meal planning techniques used by Texas homemakers.

The younger, better educated group know most about food values but also expressed more need for help with problems of planning, buying and preparing food. Meal planning was the most common problem reported.

Women want help on planning meals that their families will enjoy. They also want the satisfaction of knowing that family meals are properly balanced and provide the nutrients needed for good health.

"Good Meals Everyday" — a new, colorful publication by extension foods and nutrition specialists, gives up-to-date information on planning balanced daily meals, on buying and preparing food.

Also included are sections devoted to special needs of certain family members, infants, teen-agers, over-weight and under-weight members.

## Dr. Robert L. Rouse Speaks To Maids and Matrons on Automation

Dr. Robert L. Rouse, professor of economics and finance at Texas Tech in Lubbeck, was guest speaker at a regular meeting of Maids and Matrons Study Club Tuesday at Seleta Jane Brownfield clubhouse.

"Automation — The New Industrial Revolution" was Dr. Rouse's subject. He told the

group, "Automation is the use of a machine to control operation. The best example of automation is in our own homes, by use of light switch, telephone, stove, etc."

Dr. Rouse told the group that automation appears in our armed forces, but the biggest splurge in automation has oc-

curred in business and industry. The biggest development is the computer, or electronic brain as it is called.

Four effects of automation were given by Dr. Rouse: employment, the long range view, in which employment is not hurt as the unemployed will eventually be absorbed in op-

erating, maintaining or the building of these new machines; structure of labor force, with more trained workers; effects on business with the trend toward bigger businesses; and effects on standard of living, with more leisure time better spent.
