



Face Covering Sets

Face covering long has been eral cities. an important selection factor in breeding fine wool Rambouillet sheep. Now, animal husbandmen at the Sonora Experiment Station affix definite values up to \$5 a head for sheep with medium face covering over those with nearcomplete coverings which pose serious wool-blindness threats.

Proper selection of ewes with an intermediate amount of wool-covering on the face can mean a difference of 5 to 9 pounds more lamb weight than either those heavily-covered or open-faced. The extra weight is due almost entirely to a higher percentage of weaned lamb

Ewes with an excessive amount of wool on the face also tend to be much more susceptible to screwworm strikes in lachrymal pits below the eyes. It's a good management practice, therefore, to cull pot-entially wool-blind sheep at birth or as found in the flock.



Sudan Is Production Leader For Forage

Sudangrass looks like the Texas champion in the annual forage crop division! Even Millett, formerly a high-ranking contender for the title, appears to have been replaced to a large extent in recent years by Sudan.

Sudan successfully defended its claim to the throne at the Denton Agricultural Experiment Station in 1954-56 tests. Eleven varieties of this African-imported grass were credited with an average of 4,320 pounds of air-dry forage per acre, compared with 2,285 pounds for Pearl Millet varieties. Millets lack the ability to recover following harvest, says Station Superintendent D. I. Dudley, and were severely affected by the drouth. German Millet was tested only in 1956, and produced a 2,135 pound per acre yield.

Highest-yielding annuals of the Denton experiment were Sudangrass Tift, Piper, Sweet 372 (S-1) and Common. Best records in the perennial division were posted by SJI Johnsongrass, Persistent Johnsongrass and sorghum almum. Tift, highest yielding annual variety with a 5,040 pounds per acre 3-year average, was only 1,100 pounds above the lowest yield of 3,875 pounds recorded by Lahoma Sudan. Plantings in 40-inch rows yielded more than those in 12-inch rows.

stricken ranges. In the past, many promising grasses have failed to withstand the ravages of drouth satisfactorily or to respond properly under necessary range management practices. Extension Range Specialist A. H. Walker says stock farmers not only need drouth resistant pastures, but also must have grasses capable of setting good seed; producing plenty of leaves; and establishing themselves quickly.

Walker says the improved native varieties will probably lend themselves to more economical seeding and land preparation than grasses introduced in the past.

Four years of breeding and selection has produced a sideoats grama, a blue grama and a hairy grama-all with runners like buffalograss. Over 200 varieties of sideoats grama are now being tested, one of which can set plenty of good quality seed and hold it long enough for a single combining opera-
