Capital Investment, Lots of Sweat and Much Patience Told As Qualifications for Entering Dairy Business, Say Owners

About a \$30,000 investment, lots of sweat and a world of Local Newsman patience pretty well cover the qualifications of anyone want- For Next President ing to get into the dairy business, according to Mr. and Mrs. James Burnett, who are dairying just west of here.

Though the "milkmaid" of the family said she could not estimate how much they have invested in the business since they started in 1946, Mrs. Burnett said it requires a minimum


of \$30,000 to get started now. The high school science teacher and his wife expanded their dairy operations this year to include a new walk-in milking parlor.

"We had to make the expansion to stay in business," explained Mrs. Burnett. "Our creamery last summer told us we would have to convert to bulk tank container by this September 1 or get out of the business-so we converted."

Bulk Tank Arriving Conversion is not complete because the company does not have tank trucks available for pick-ups yet. "They are supposed to have the trucks available Sept. 1, so we won't have the bulk tank

Shows Little Jump Over 1956-57 Costs

Tax Rate Same Since 1952; Change Forecast

Trustees approved Tuesday the 1957-58 operating budget for Brownfield Independent School District. Total: \$881,354.

The final action of approval was taken soon after a public hearing in Brownfield High School

During the Tuesday session the tax rate again was set at \$1.45 per \$100 valuation. (The tax rate each year is at the discretion of the trustees. Legal limit, however, is \$1.50.)

Trustees explained that the school tax rate in the district has remained unchanged since 1952. Property in Terry which is assessed for school taxes currently is valued at \$36,580,000 of which some \$22 million is oil property.

Since 1952, a total of \$900,000 bonds have been voted for construction in the district.

Although the rate has renained unchanged since 1952 the board noted that the "status quo" hardly could be maintained much longer.

In the next school year every available room, with the possible exception of one, in the five schools comprising the district will be occupied. The number of scholastics in the district is increasing yearly trustees pointed out, and expansion appears inevitable. And expansion probably will require some increase in the school tax


rate. The board also noted that the schools were operated in the 1956-57 year on some \$5,000 less than was provided in that bud-

"In other words." said a spokesman, "we concluded that budget year with \$5,015.37 to the good - operating within about one per cent of the total approved.'

To be effective Sept. 1, the budget approved Tuesday contains approximately 85 items ranging from salaries for teachers to textbooks to transportation to food to utilties. In gist, the budget picture for the next school year looks like this: For administration, \$37,225. For instruction of white pupils, \$531,359. For instruction of Negro students, \$17,484. U. S. tourists are just discovering the advantages of Colombia where a travel budget is considered. In the capital of Bogota, or in the Atlantic port cities of Barranguilla or Cartagena, a single room in a luxury hotel is about \$5. A full course dinner with wine and filet mignon is seldom over \$1.75.

At more modest establishments, prices are much lower and the beef just as tasty; for Colombia is also a big cattle producing country.

Favorite time for moviegoers in Colombia is 6 p.m., because the dinner hour usually begins around 9 p.m. Tickets average between 25 and 40 cents to the best theatres, where first-run U. S. color features in wide screen compete small shops where, in the continental fashion, women's clothes are designed in high couturier styles.

One of the most typical Colombian products is the wool "ruana" or poncho. It is worn in the city although it originated in the rural areas of the country. The plainly cut ruana in natural or brilliant colors is about \$6, while the dressier, hooded one for town wear is about twice that price.
