





Mrs. Peron gave each child a few peace. Mr. Richards gave each country some tens of millions of dollars.

During his few weeks abroad, Mr. Richards disposed of \$120 million of the taxpayers' money in gifts to some half dozen or more countries. He seems to regard this as a good start and that more scores, if not hundreds of millions, will follow.

Foreign aid was started to help our friends. It was extended to neutrals in the hope of preventing them from becoming enemies. It is now being extended to Communist nations such as Yugo-slavia and Poland, presumably with the thought that it will moderate their opposition to free government. The next and last step would

seem to be to subsidize our enemies in return for their promise not to attack us. We are perilous-ly close to doing that now. No nation that resorted to buying peace has long survived. Justice, minding its own business, and robust defense in case of attack, are the basis of national survival as they are of continuing selfgovernment and prosperity.

Top government economists tell us that we seem to be going from "creeping" to "walking" inflation. They can't be sure when it may break into run-away inflation.

Living costs, which have been going up steadily to a new all-time high, are due for another boost. Prices will be marked up for automobiles, tractors, refriger. for automobiles, tractors, refrigerators and for almost everything

else you buy.

The steel price rise triggered the increased pace of inflation, but it will be helped along by higher transportation costs and, almost certainly, another round of wage increases.
Inflation pinches hardest when your

costs rise more rapidly than your income. Farmers, small business-men, and retired people on fixed incomes, are hit first and hardest. Those who have saved for their

old age, or to buy a farm, a home or a business find their savings worth less. Life insurance bought years ago with "hard" dollars deereases in value.
We've been having "creeping" inflation now for almost 20 years. A dollar will buy less than half as much now as it did just prior

to World War II.

Wages and prices have been playing leap-frog for years. They are like the chicken and the egg; no one knows for sure which comes first.

Labor demands higher wages because prices are higher and

because prices are higher and living costs are up, and industry raises prices becauses wages and other costs go up.

Government costs go up and tax rates increase. Taxes for local, state and Federal agencies take roughly 25 cents out of every dollar earned. That adds to inflationary pressures.

lar earned That adds to inflationary pressures.

Inflation can give a false sense of prosperity. Production of goods and services for useful purposes is the only true measure of prosperity. We are producing more goods for use than ever before. We have tremendous national prosperity, although not shared equally by all people. We are buying more automobiles, refrigerators, tractors, homes and other things than at any time before the end of World War II.

Prosperity hides, for r time, the dangers that he back of inflation, but inflation carries its own seeds of destruction—deflation and depression. If we cannot prevent inflation how can we hope to avoid the havoc of depression?

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



SQUABBLING DOGS by Bob Bartos

Some dogs seem to be born scrappers. There's nothing they like better than to put up their ruffs and fight. There's much you can do with a dog who shows evidence of a belligerent nature. You can see that he stays in his own back yard in the country and that he doesn't get within leash length of an-

other dog in the city. Obedience training helps in most cases. When the meaning of the word "no" is firmly es-



tablished and it's repeated firmly at the sight of another dog, you may be successful in curb-

ing the habit. Sometimes a dog develops a dislike for one particular dog or one particular breed of dogs. It sometimes helps to muzzle two unfriendly fellows and to leave them alone in a closedin area. There they can work out their differences without damaging each other physi-

cally.

Most dogs when left alone respect one another and seldom actually fight unless a third factor enters into the situation (the owner, a child, a bone), causing the emotions of jealousy, protection and possession.

The best general advice is to keep your dog under control at all times in a yard or shortleashed in the city and under supervision in the country. Should a fight break out and

your pet is one of the contestants, what should you do? Don't try grabbing either dog by the collar. You're certain to get bitten. Get hold of the aggressor by the hind leg or tail, lift him off the ground and throw him as far as you can. Scold the bully in harsh tones and plant yourself between the two until help arrives.



All would eventually be repaid, according to the plan, by revenue from sale of power and water.
