Billis TWAS UTOPIA and we didn't we know it. Tve often wondered why people are so drawn to the "fifties" era. Growing up in the 1950s was fun, but we didn't think it was anything extra-special until out, forty years later. Tractically every city of any size today has at least one restaurant or today has at least one the totage to own one of those lovely old vonsiders it to be their most cherished possession. . . the big ency, the fins, all that chrome. They really were unique autos. Two radio stations now play nothing but music from the fifties and sixtites. We've seen a lot of today's TV shows and movies set in that time period. Friona's recent us entertainment from that decade. We had it all! A chicken in reasoline was 19/e a gallon. Cokes were a nickel, and you could get ap erfectly good hamburger for 25. Most kids got a quarter a week as an allowance. With that, you could yo to the Saturday movie, get poor and a Coke and still have five cents left over to buy a comic five cents left over to buy a comic book at the drug store after the show

book at the drug store after the show. Television had been around for awhile but it was just becoming affordable for the average family in the early fifties... black and white, of course, and we watched everything that moved. Variety shows with comedy skits and music were the major fare at first. The quiz shows, situation comedies and dramas came a little later. There was a lot of "local" programming which was pretty bad, and this filled up the daytime hours, since the main network shows aired only in the evenings. The "Hit Parade" was a countdown of the top ten most popular songs each week and you tuned in to see the little skits they'd worked around each song. I guess this was the forerunner of today's music videos.

music videos. Backyard cookouts were just beginning to be popular. But you couldn't go out and buy a barbeque grill and there were no bags of charcoal briquettes at the grocery store. The dads would construct a

store. The dads would construct a barbeque of mortar and bricks out in the yard and you used wood chips and kindling for the fire. Only wealthy folks had cars with automatic transmissions and air conditioners. These became more affordable in the late fifties and early sixties. Those who wanted to stay cool in the car could buy a little tacky tank-like affair that hooked onto the window of the car. You put water and/or ice in this thing and the wind blew through it as you were driving down the road and the wind blew infough it as you were driving down the road and it was supposed to cool you.... sort of like a traveling swamp-cooler. You could stay just about as cool by riding around with the indexney liked area.

windows rolled down. When thinking about fashions in the fifties, pony tails, poole skirts and penny-loafers usually come to mind. Some of the other styles of that time were: fuzzy angora sweaters and wool plaid skirts, Bermuda shorts and knee socks, a hundred yards of ruffled net peticoats under those full-circle skirts. Sometimes you had a hard time fitting a girl with all those petticoats into a car. Putting white polish on your saddle oxfords every night was no fun, but you didn't go to school the next day unless they were dazzling white.

There was a school dance gym after every football game with some local group like "Johnny Flash and the Weasels" providing the music. At a sock-hop, you took off your shoes and danced in your socks. The Debate Club pondered such weighty questions as "Does rock and roll music con-tribute to juvenile delinquency?"

Those guys with the greasy hair, who rolled a cigarette package up in their t-shirt sleeves, were known as "toughs" and daddies didn't let their little daughters go out on dates with that sort of fellow.

Compound Your Earnings With Dividend Reinvestment

Albert Einstein once observed Albert Einstein once observed that the most powerful force is not atomic energy, but the compounding of money. Compounding occurs when investors put the interest and dividends earned on investments back into their investments. This back into their investments to technique allows investments to grow more quickly than if investors

were to take their earnings in cash. Compounding is familiar to many mutual fund shareholders, many mutual fund shareholders, who often take advantage of a mutual fund service called automatic reinvestment. With this service, the mutual fund uses a fund's dividends and capital gains to purchase more fund shares for the investor's account. In essence, investor's account. However, and capital gains on top of dividends and capital gains. However, many people who own common stocks are unaware that they, too, can put the power of

own common stocks are unaware that they, too, can put the power of compounding to work through automatic reinvestment. Typically, these investors simply pocket their quarterly dividend checks. What they may not know is that many publicly owned companies offer plans that allow shareholders to reinvest their dividends into additional shares of stock. These plans are usually easy to

These plans are usually easy to join, requiring only the shareholder's approval. Investors typically must own at least one share of a company's stock to participate in dividend reinvestment, and some companies may charge

share of a company's stock to participate in dividend reinvestment, and some companies may charge a small fee for this service. To illustrate how dividend reinvestment works, suppose you are due a \$100 dividend on stock that you own. Rather than sending you a check, the company will use your dividend to purchase additional shares. To compute how many shares your dividend can buy, the company uses the average trading price of your stock on the dividend pay date. In this example, assume the average price is 10.1250. With dividend would be used to add 9.8765 shares to your account (\$100 divided by 10.1250). This is all handled automatically by the company. company.

It's not uncommon for individuals who reinvest dividends for years to accumulate more shares through reinvestment than they originally purchased. Not only is dividend reinvestment a great way to compound your investment, it's also a means of dollar-cost averaging. Put simply, dollar-cost averaging: Fut simply, total cost averaging is regularly investing the same amount of money in a stock or mutual fund. In this way, investors continuously build their investment while averaging out the ups and downs in the price of a stock or mutual fund.

EKE STEVENS If dividend reinvestment interests you, first select a stock that you would like to own for a long time. Make sure the company has a favorable history of dividend

payments, and find out if it offers dividend reinvestment. After you've made your purchase, call the company and ask for its dividend reinvestment package. Usually a simple application will start you on r way. Remember, however, that even your

though you don't receive your dividends in cash, you still owe income tax on them. Be sure to keep accurate records of dividends reinvested. This will become part of your cost basis and is not taxed if you eventually sell your shares.

Reinvesting your mutual fund and stock earnings: You don't have to be Einstein to see how this basic technique can help compound the value of your financial future.


FHS Student **Is Honored**
