The project runs from U.S. 62 at Wellman, south to Loop, and from U.S. 62 at Brownfield, south to the Gaines, a distance or 23.6 miles.



During the war she turned out innumerable sweaters for the Army and Navy . . . "I have no idea how many" . . . as well as garments for herself. Mr. Herod, her son, Billy Mack, who is a student at Baylor Dental School in Dallas this year, and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Downing of 315

Tahoka Road. "I even took those sweaters to the picture show with me," she recalls. "Once you learn the stitch sequence, there's no need to look at what you're doing, so I killed two birds with one stone." Feeding Tests Show Ground Mesquite Is Good Cattle Ration

Mesquite wood ground into a meal is a source of bulk in rations for cattle when other roughages are scarce and re latively high in price.

Yearling steers fed a ration containing 7.2 pounds of ground mesquite wood gained 2.2 pounds per head daily in feeding tests at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Spur, said P. T. Marion, station superintendent. Similar steers fed cottonseed hulls instead of mesquite meal gained 2.29 pounds daily. The feeding period was 140 days.

In a more recent test lasting 112 days yearling steers fed a ration containing 12.23 pounds of ground mesquite wood per head daily gained an average of 2.54 pounds daily, compared with 2.71 pounds gained daily by steers fed a silage ration, he
