**Water Sports And Safety Go Together, Advises Specialist**

More and more Texans are taking to the water. Swimming, fishing and boating are among the most popular recreational activities.

But with the increased participation in these activities has also come the chance for more accidents, warns Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist.

But Cooper points out that boating can be much safer if certain precautions are observed.

First, advises the specialist, never overload a boat with passengers. Always find out how many passengers the boat can safely carry. Wear shoes and clothing that can be easily removed in case the boat sinks or capsizes. Have a life preserver for each passenger in the boat, especially non-swimmers.

If a motor is to be used, make certain that it is the proper size or horsepower for your particular boat. Be as cautious when steering a boat as you would steering a car.

Learn and observe the rules of the water such as speed limits, yielding right of way, forbidden zones, etc. And, continues Cooper, be certain you ask an informed person about hazards in the lake or stream such as location of swift water, whirlpools, hidden obstructions, etc., before leaving shore.

Don't stand in a small boat unless necessary and be careful of your balance when doing so. Always have an extra paddle in the boat in case one paddle is broken or lost.

Wear clothing which will protect you from sunburn, concludes the specialist. Sunlight is intensified by reflection off the water.

**Corporal Phelps Ends California Desert Test**

Marion Cpt. Marion D. Phelps, son of Mrs. Opal Phelps of Brownfield, recently participated in "Operation Ironhorse," a desert combat exercise to test men and machines under adverse desert conditions.

The 22-day exercise was conducted Aug. 5-27 at Marine Corps Base, 29 Palms, Calif.

Under simulated combat conditions, 15 troop-carrying 1st Marine Division vehicles and crews conducted a 160-mile drive over the barren desert terrain during the three-week test.

Yes, attending court was informative and entertaining, and I wonder how many in the courtroom this week actually realized how privileged they were to live in a country where justice can be expected regardless of whether we are guilty or innocent? Indeed, it is a privilege just to be heard. Let us all remember it!

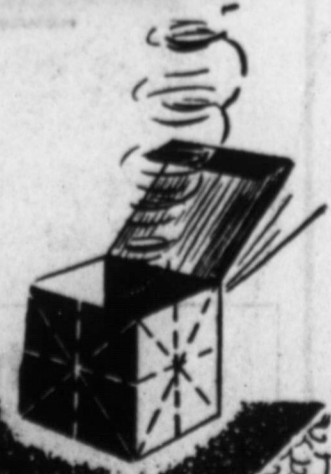

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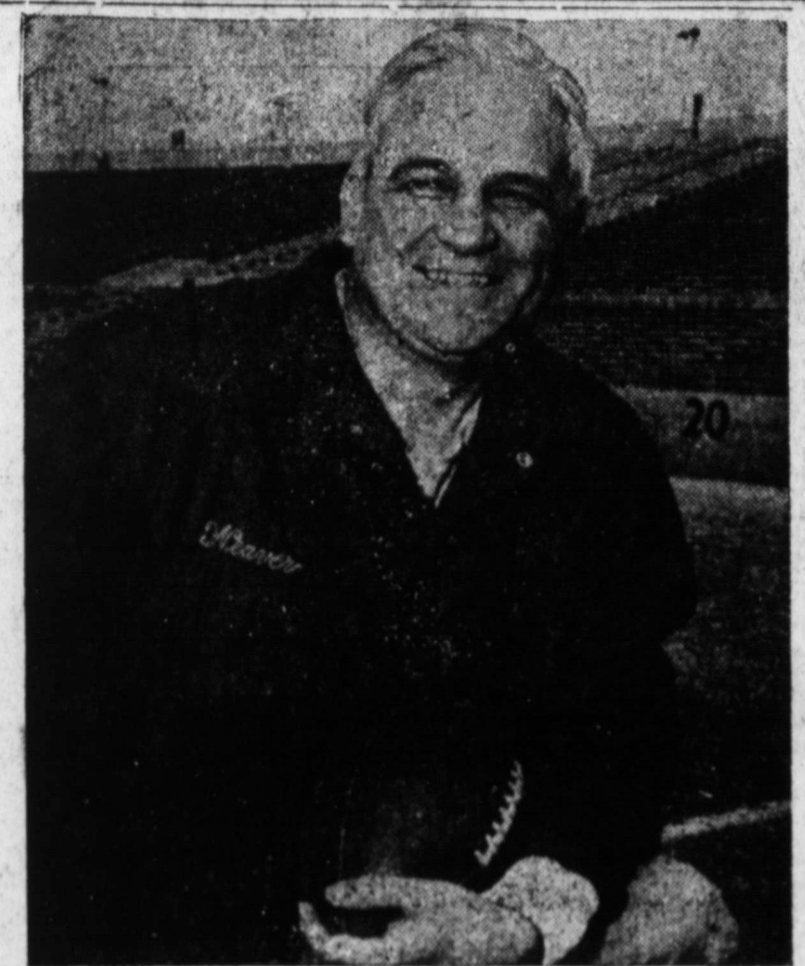

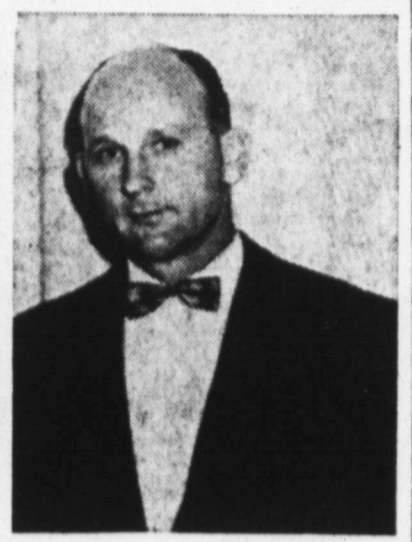
## Wellman Wildcats Prepare for Rugged District Schedule

### Tech To Open Season With Only 11 Lettermen

Probably the smallest group of returning lettermen among the nation's major colleges will report to Texas Tech Coach DeWitt Weaver today.

Only nine lettermen from last fall plus one from 1955 and another from 1954 are scheduled to report. More than half the squad will be sophomores, 27 of 55 candidates.

Five of Tech's positions have no returning lettermen from last season — left end, right guard, right tackle, and both halfbacks.

Weaver, in his seventh season as the Red Raiders' head coach and athletic director, must guide the young team through a rugged schedule involving teams from five conferences.

Tech doesn't compete for the Southwest Conference title until 1960, but the Raiders face three teams most prominently mentioned for championship honors in the SWC this fall — Texas A&M, Baylor and Arkansas.

Other games are with West Texas, Texas Western, Arizona and Hardin-Simmons of the Border Conference, Tulsa of the Missouri Valley, and Louisiana State of the Southeastern, and Oklahoma State University of the Big Eight.

Tech's three returning starters are left guard Charlie Moore of Lubbock, center Jack Henry of Floydada, and right end Pat Hartsfield of Lubbock.

Other lettermen from '56 are left tackles Jim Henderson and Phil Williams of Lubbock, left guard Tim Stone of Kilgore, quarterback John Riddle of Artesia, N.M., and fullbacks Charlie Dixon of McCamey and Gene Bentley of Panhandle.

Halfbacks Bobby Kyzar of Melvin, a '55 letterman, and

Mack Pogue of Sulphur Springs, who lettered in '54 before joining the army, also are expected.

Five junior college transfers, headed by quarterback Floyd Dellinger of La Vega, from Victoria College, figure prominently in Weaver's plans.

Tech again will use the split-T.

### Colorado Game Is Dropped By Tech

Even though Texas Tech's football trip to Boulder has been put off a few years, Coach DeWitt Weaver was happy to release the University of Colorado from a Nov. 19, 1960 football date.

The release will permit CU to meet Oklahoma State University and thus enable the OSU Aggies to participate in Big Eight title competition in 1960.

Scheduled to play in the Southwest Conference title race the same year, Texas Tech has been the beneficiary of such actions by other schools since its election to SWC membership in 1956.

In fact, Colorado released Tech from a 1959 engagement to allow the Red Raiders to begin play with Southern Methodist that season.

Colorado and Tech are still slated to meet in Lubbock Nov. 17, 1962.

Polk Robison, Texas Tech's assistant athletic director and basketball coach, played at Ranger and Lubbock high schools before coming to Texas Tech.

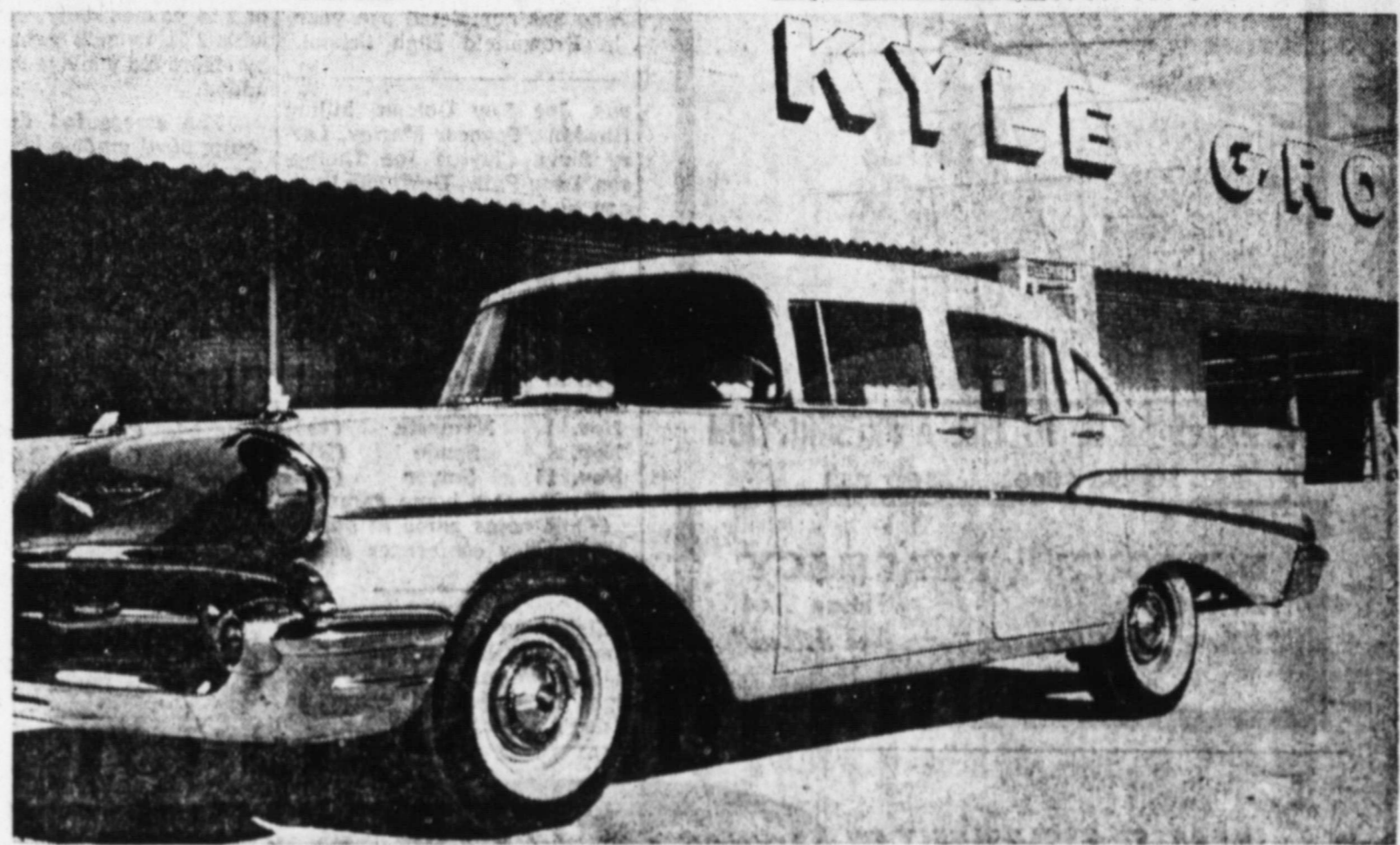

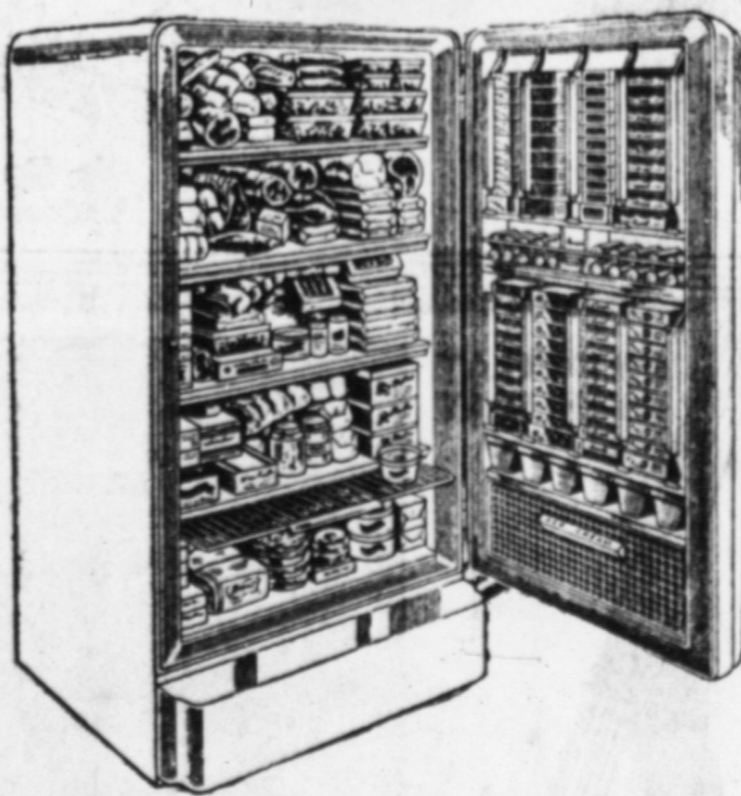

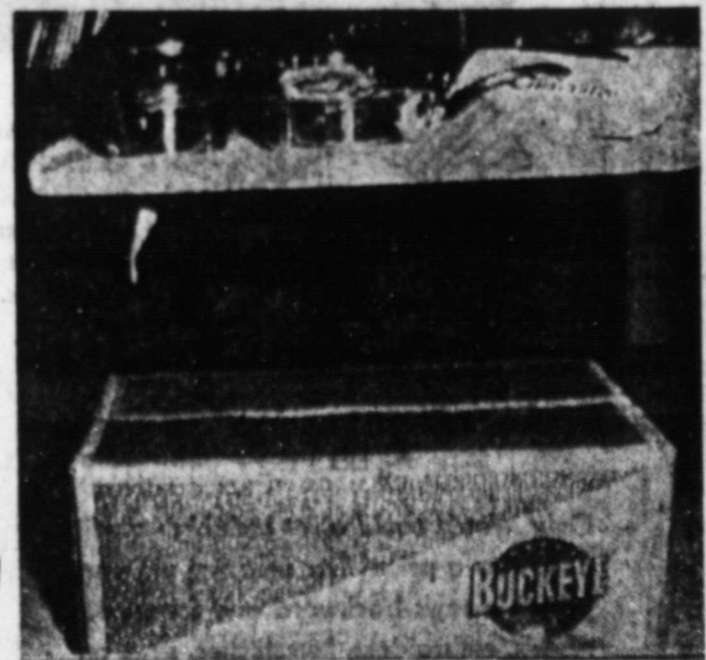

Yearling steers fed a ration containing 7.2 pounds of ground mesquite wood gained 2.2 pounds per head daily in feeding tests at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Spur, said P. T. Marion, station superintendent. Similar steers fed cottonseed hulls instead of mesquite meal gained 2.29 pounds daily. The feeding period was 140 days.

In a more recent test lasting 112 days yearling steers fed a ration containing 12.23 pounds of ground mesquite wood per head daily gained an average of 2.54 pounds daily, compared with 2.71 pounds gained daily by steers fed a silage ration, he added.

The steers fed the mesquite meal made a higher net profit on the basis of \$10 per ton for ground mesquite and hulls than those fed the cottonseed hull ration.

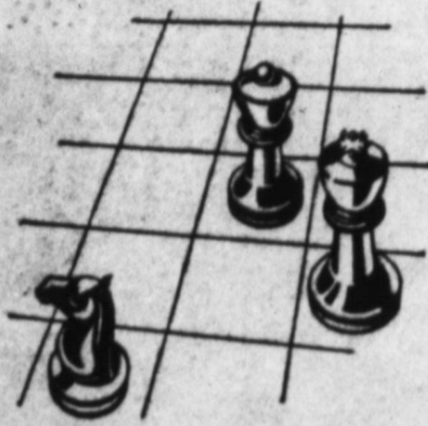

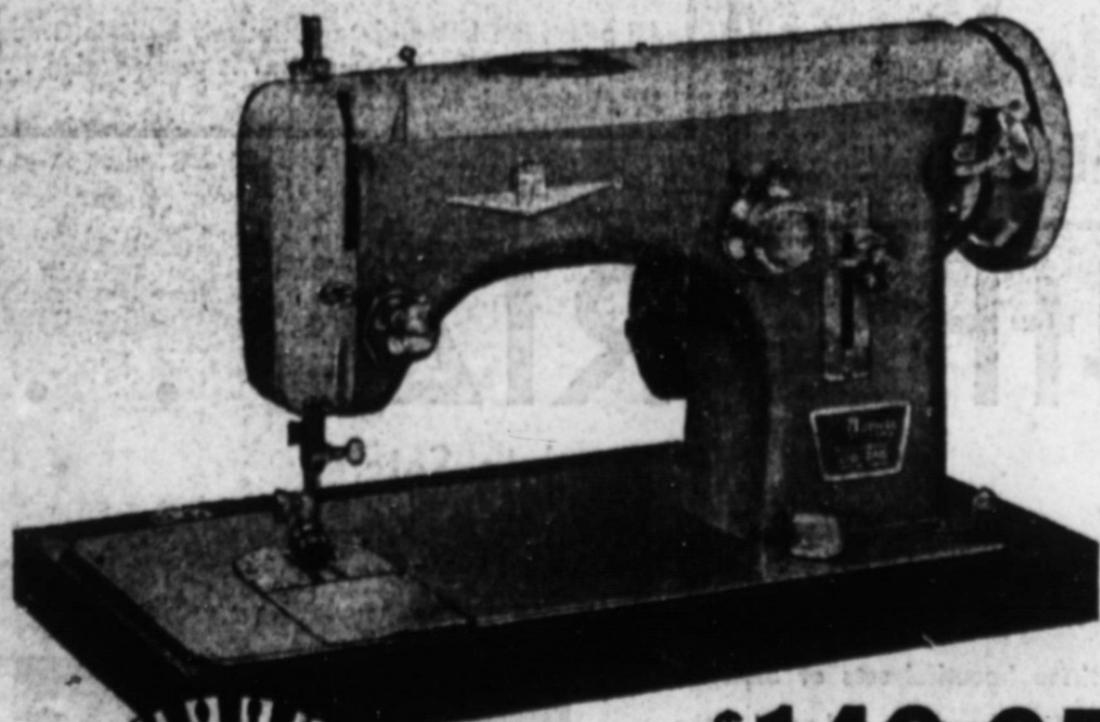

**Jehovah's Witnesses Are Deported By Dominican Republic Under A New Law**

Ten American missionaries were reported recently from the Dominican Republic to Puerto Rico.

The action was described last week by Alfred Ferguson, presiding minister of the Lavaland congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses.

Fare was paid by the Dominican government and the missionaries were escorted under arrest to the plane which flew them to Puerto Rico.

Said Ferguson: "The action came on the heels of a wave of persecution equaled only in Communist countries, and was climaxed by a total ban practice as first-aid instructor. Brown now is qualified to instruct company employees in first-aid procedures.

An ultimatum to the missionaries to renounce all association with the organization and to cease communication with their Brooklyn, N.Y., office or leave the country was made last month by Maj. Gen. Arturo Espallat, minister of security in the Republic.

The general is the same person whom the U. S. government has sought to question in the disappearance earlier this year of Dr. Jesus de Galindez. Some of the missionaries had been living there for 12 years.

According to official news sources of the Dominican Republic, prescription of the

Christian activities of Jehovah's Witnesses was legalized July 24, and the law carries penalties of from one to three months imprisonment and fines of from \$30 to \$100.

It has been announced that the government has appropriated more than \$1 million to enforce the ban. Ferguson explained that a full-scale campaign to restrict the religious freedom of the Witnesses has been under way since July 1.

Kingdom Hall meeting places of the Witnesses had been ordered closed and some 250 Witnesses taken in for questioning.

Said Ferguson: "They have been subjected to beatings and violence by police and prison guards in an effort to make them renounce all association with the movement. About 50 now are in prison, some with sentences of two or more years."

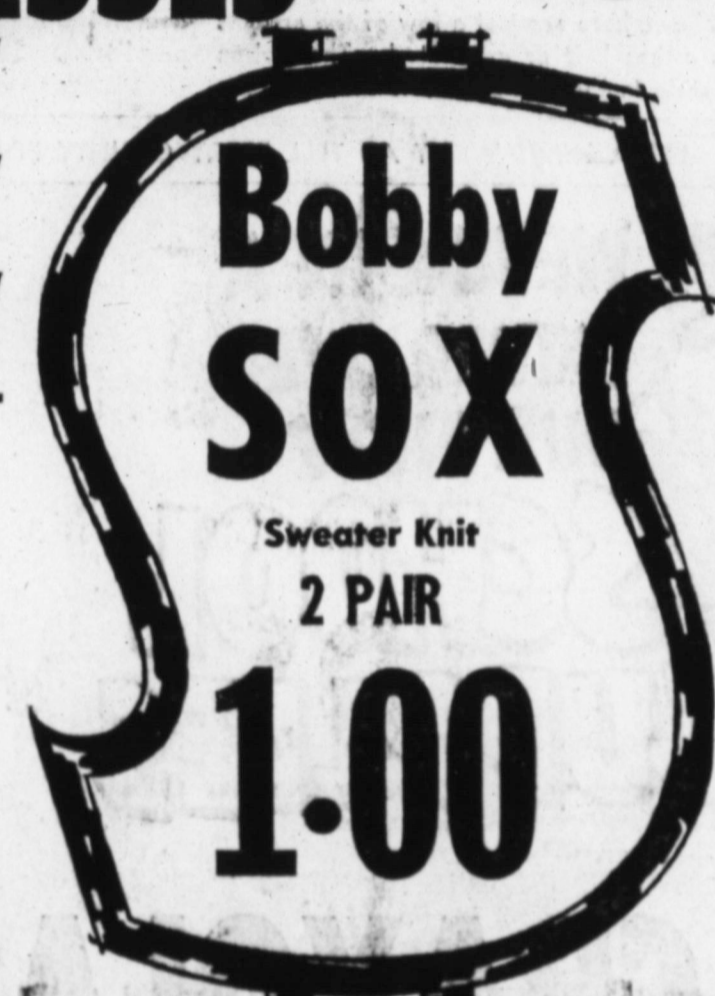

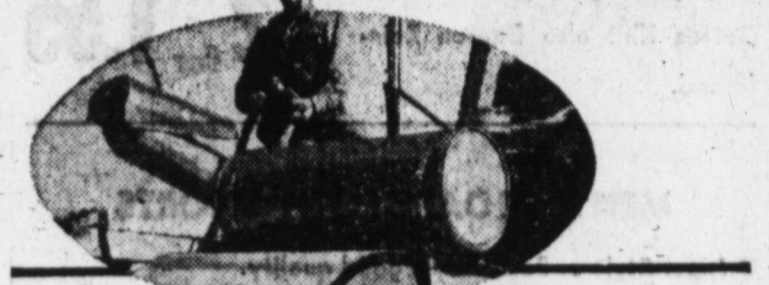

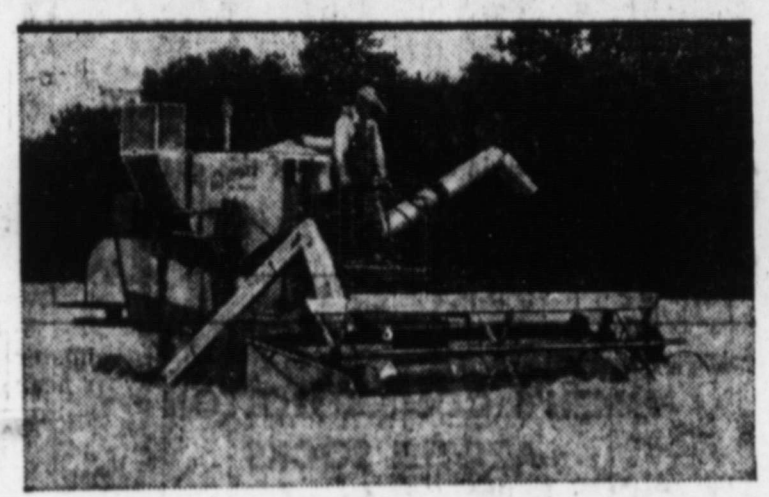
