"If proposition 1 is disapproved and either of both of three are disapproved," said Douglas.

The superintendent said SB. 116 (Article 2784e-1) allows trustees to adjust the tax rate to meet bond payments without re-evaluating city property. "Under this bill we are sure we can sell the bonds at .25 per cent lower interest rate than under the old law," he

Poll Tax Recepits

Douglas reported more than 280 elections have been held under SB 116 since its passage in the 55th Legislature. Some of the South Plains school districts which have used the provision are Lubbock, Plainview, Hale Center, Big Spring, Lamesa, Idalou, Ralls and Crosbyton, he revealed.

J. D. (Jot) Akers, county tax assessor-collector, advised voters to present their 1958 poll tax receipt or exemption when they vote. "We will attempt to compile our poll tax roster by Tuesday," he said. "However, voters should present their receipt in the event the roster is not ready by then."
