Copleys Give Details Of Storm Development

Terry and Vickie Copley and Shannon Cochran watched as the funnel cloud formed over Friona on Friday, June 2.

When the cloud started building southwest of Friona, Shannon came to the Copley home and told them that a bad cloud was sure forming. He put his pickup in the Copleys' garage and went to his home on a four-wheeler.

The Copleys went outside to look at the cloud. The wind was blowing very hard out of the northeast at that time. They discussed the fact that it was sure strange for such a bad looking cloud to be coming from the southwest with the wind so strong from the northeast.

They went back inside their home and shortly afterward, Channel 10 put Parmer County in a tornado warning, so they decided they needed to go pick Shannon up since he did not have a vehicle at his house.

Just as they got to Shannon's house, the wind changed from northeast to southwest and got very cold. As they were backing out of his driveway, it started to hail—not many hail stones, but they decided to head back home.

When they turned into their driveway, they looked to the west at the cloud. Terry said, "Look Shannon, that is a tornado trying to come down." The bottom of the wall cloud was spinning, but nothing was on the ground at this time.

They parked their vehicle and went around to watch the cloud. In a very short time, they were able to see the dark cloud with trees and other debris spinning in the dirt.

When the funnels did finally form, there were as many as five small funnels darting out of the cloud in several different directions, at the same time, then the big funnel that resembled a large cloud

just traveling on the ground came through the cloud. Even as the large funnel approached, the smaller ones kept darting out from the edges.

Right after the large funnel turned and traveled north, the Copleys remarked about the roar of

the cloud—something you have always heard about. While they were listening to the roar and thought the worst was over, they looked to the north and another funnel was on the ground, traveling northeast, approximately two minutes behind the large funnel.

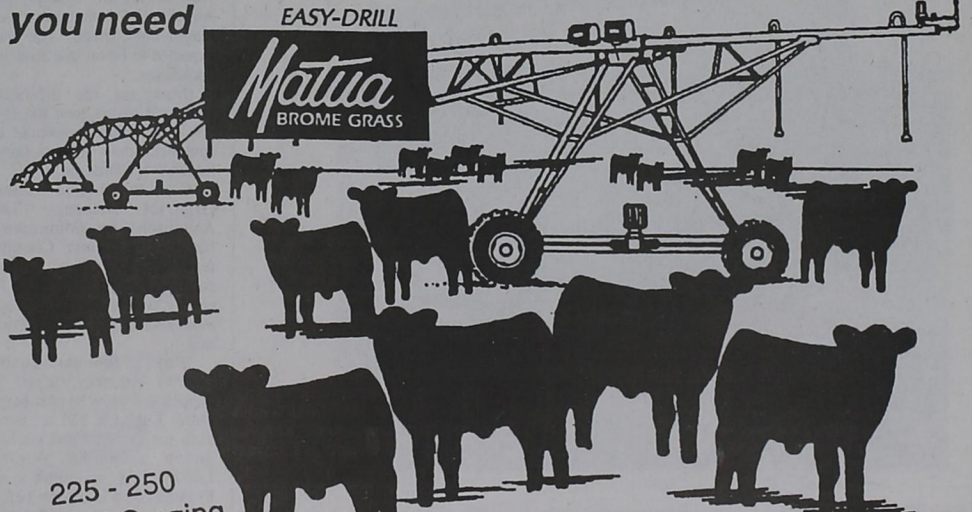

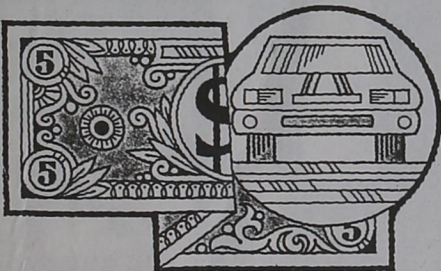

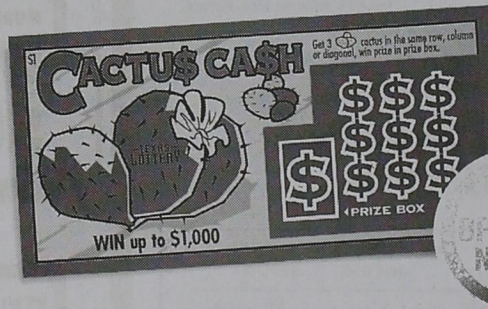

Diversification By Any Other Name Is Still Diversification

Ask for advice from any investment professional or successful investor, and you'll hear one word again and again: diversification. Some prefer to call it asset allocation. Veteran investors still refer to it as "not putting all your eggs in one basket."

Investors who put all their money in certificates of deposit in the 1980s can tell you about the pitfalls of owning just one investment. When rates dropped from 16 per cent to 6 per cent, and CDs came up for renewal, the loss of income was devastating for investors whose portfolios were not properly diversified.

So how can you diversify your investments? There was a time when you could be sufficiently diversified by owning just one solid mutual fund. Today, however, diversification requires more planning. Even owning 10 or 15 different funds doesn't necessarily mean you're properly diversified. If those funds all have the same objectives and invest in the same types of securities, your assets may not be varied enough to protect you from a downturn in one industry or area. A well-allocated mutual fund portfolio consists of funds with different objectives, managers and market sectors.

To illustrate, consider the following example compiled by MFS Investors Services, Inc., an international money manager. The example looks at how a \$10,000 investment, allocated equally among four hypothetical stock funds, would have performed from Jan. 1, 1984, to Dec. 31, 1993.

Fund A earned the **average**

return of the top 25 growth funds for this period (17.98 per cent) as reported by Lipper Analytical Service, Inc.

Fund B earned the same return as the Standard & Poor's 500 (S&P) for the period (14.94 per cent).

Fund C earned **half** the return of the S&P (7.47 per cent).

Fund D earned nothing, and all of the principal was lost. This, of course, has never happened to any fund over a 10-year period.

Even with 25 per cent of the investment lost, the portfolio still grew to \$28,262. A decline in one area affected only one-fourth of the portfolio, and earnings on the other funds buffered the investor from this loss. This is the value of diversification. (Keep in mind, however, that this example is based on historical performance and is no guarantee of future results.)

Try this simple diversification test on funds you already own or plan to purchase. Pick four different types of funds--for example, a conservative income fund, a balanced fund, a blue-chip equity fund and an aggressive sector fund. Ask your financial professional to show you the performance of your selected funds over the past ten years or more. Finally, compare the diversified portfolio to a portfolio concentrated solely in CDs, savings accounts, U.S. Treasury securities or any other conservative investment. The results may astound you.

Careful selection of four or more mutual funds with different investment objectives and parameters can provide the diversification you need. Diversification allows you to take advantage of the various benefits offered by different investments.
