Mullican to serve their terms in the state penitentjary at Huntsville, The negroes and their terms in jail are Kansas City Jones, two years; Gold Tooth Hamilton, three years; and Jazz Baby Samuels, three years.

The negroes were charged with enering the Hodges Brothers Mercantile company, on the southeast cornerof the square, late one night in the spring, and escaping with several hundred dollars worth of clothing, practically all of which was recovered by the officers when the negroes were arrested. The killing occured in the Ware cotton yard in the neighboring city about eight o'clock Wednesday morning. According to testimony in the hurriedly called coroner's inquest, held before Justice W. B. Shelton immediately after the trouble, Hightower drove into the cotton yard in a wagon and as soon as Harvey, who was helping cut open a bale of cotton, saw him he opened fire with a ,380 automatic. Hightower leaped from the wagon and ducked behind a cotton bale but two bullets from Harvey's gun crashed into his brain at a point just over the left temple, caus-

BERTON OWEN MCWHORTER

Thirty-two years in Lubbock county and taking an active part in the advancement of the city and the surrounding territory is the record of Berton Owen McWhorter, pioneer cattleman and resident of this city.

Mc-Whorter, member of the haber-dashery firm of McWhorter-Roberds. Both of the McWhorter boys were educated in Lubbock and in the state university at Austin.

B. O. McWhorter has elways been and still is an ardent booster for Lubbock and West Texas. He has always been identified with the cattle business, is a member of the Methodist Church and of the Chamber of Commerce. He is a former member of the board of aldermen of the city and has done a number of outstanding acts to aid in the progress of the city. A number of years ago, before Lubbock had railroad facilities, he made two trips to Chicago and did a great deal of the work which engineered the building of the Gulf and New Mexico branches of the Santa Fe railway through this city. When it was thought that Lubbock needed an ice plant and cold-storage company he was one of the first men to invest a large sum of

money in backing the new project. A block of land, which he owned near the city, was one of the first blocks of ranch land broken up infarms and sold to newcomers, thus aiding in the populating of this county. On his ranch, west of the city, Mr. McWhorter was one of the first men to demonstrate the great quantities of pure water underlying Lubbock county, when he erected a pumping plant and furnished water at the rate of 1,000 allons per minute to use in irri-



The old saying, "hard work never killed anyone" is disproved by Dr. Raymond Pearl of John Hopkins Uni-

It stands to reason. A machine is capable of just so much work before it becomes worn out. A machine lasts longer, if it is used only occassionally, than if it runs day

And the body is a machine. Up to the age of 40, it appears very difficult to kill a man by physicial hard work, occupational and industrial hazards being excluded from consideration, Dr. Pearl reports. But after 40, hard work begins to short-

That's why a man should make hay while the sun shines. The bulk of his hard effort should come, before he leaves his thirties behind.

At 40, it is not time to take a back seat. But it is

time to play the game less strenuously, and to rest more. Whether or not a man is able to do so, depends to considerable extent on whether he wasted his twenties and frittered away his thirties. Henry Ford isn't the only wise old owl who believes

that most people can not expect to accomplish much until they are 40 or older. Possibly this is true of the actual accomplishments. But the efforts that flower into accomplishments can take place in early manhood.

The seed planted in the twenties and thirties sprouts in the forties and bears its best fruit in the fifties and later. Hard work does not wear out a man as quickly when he works outdoors, Dr. Pearl finds. This applies to men who do hard physicial work indoors, quite as well as the men who work sitting in a chair or standing behind a bun-

The natural life is outdoors in the fresh air and sunshine. An indoor worker can get considerable of these in his spare moments, and they form the real fountain of

WASHINGTON. - The cotton crop was forecast today by the Department of Agriculture as 191,00 bales smaller than indicated two weeks ago with a total production of 12,596,000 equivalent 500 pound bales indicated. The condition on Sept. 16 and the forecast of production therefrom (in

thousands of bales, by States follow: Virginia condition 60, forecast, 3%; North Caroline, 52, and 782. South Carolina, 47 and 728. Georgia 59 and 1,198. Florida 71 and 29. Alabama 59 and 956. Mississippi 57 and 1,055. Louisiana, 48 and 398. Texas 52 and 4,327.
