

14 pound American cheese grated Cook onlons and peppers in bacon fat until soft but not brown. Stir in flour quickly and continue stirring until mixture is well blended and smooth. 





AUSTIN, Nov. 5 .- (SPECIAL)-Piling up a lead of forty thousand votes in the first 270,000 ballots counted, Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, of Temple, seems certain of being the next governor of Texas. Counting up to one o'clock today gave Mrs. Ferguson 160,125 and George C. Butte, Republican, 119,723. A number of the larger cities of the state have returned majorities for Doctor Butte, however, and he refuses to concede his opponent's victory until the last-vote is counted. Cities returning a majority to Butte thus far include El Paro. Amerilla Dal ing a majority to Butte thus far include El Paso, Amarillo, Dallas, Fort Worth and Houston. The rural districts, however, as they are slowly being reported, are giving Mrs. Ferguson an overwhelming majority.




