'I'm still numb'

Wife of C-130 crash victim lives here

For Donna Sasseen of Big Spring, her worst fears became a reality Wednesday morning. She was informed by U.S. Air Force officials that her husband Staff Sgt. George Thiery Sasseen III had been killed in the crash of

a C-130 near Gevencik, Turkey. Mrs. Sasseen, a resident of Big Spring since July, said she now faces an uncertain future with three small children to raise.

"I'm still numb. We don't really know any of the details yet. The Air Force told me some people were coming from Goodfellow Air Force Base (in San Angelo) to talk with me," Mrs. Sasseen said. "What I do next depends on them.'

Staff Sgt. Sasseen was one of 27 victims in the crash that included nine crew members and 18 passengers. The plane took off from Incirlik NATO air base in Turkey on a routine supply mission and crashed Tuesday after-

ACCORDING TO Air Force officials a team to study the cause of the crash is being assembled. The investigation could possibly take from two to six months.

"He was a precision measuring equipment technician. He was on temporary duty at Incirlik. I came to live in Big Spring when he left for duty last summer," Mrs. Sasseen said. For the time being she said she will continue to live with her sister Ruth Salazar in

'We're just waiting and wanting to such a shock right now there just isn't much you can say about it. It's terrible for this to happen to her when she's so young (29-years-old) with three children to support.'

Mrs. Sasseen has three daughters: Terri age 5, Rachel age 21/2 and baby Sarah age 11 months.

Post office runs out of forms

Tax time torment is traced

Staff Writer It's the day before the deadline and you need a 1040A form to complete your 1981 federal income tax. Quick! Run to the post office!

The post office is out of forms. They recommend you go to the Howard County Library and copy their form on their copying machine. Quick! Run to the library!

The copying machine is broken. What now? Run and hide?

Fortunately the library was able to temporarily fix the machine, but a number of Big Spring's lastminute taxpayers were faced with that situation Wednesday afternoon as they tried to settle their income taxes before tonight's midnight deadline.

COUNTY LIBRARIAN Judith Gray reported that as many as 80 people have been to the library to

copy forms in the last two days.
"The machine broke down when someone tried to change the paper tray themselves," she said Wednesday afternoon. "We were able to jerry-rig it until a repair man comes. People can still copy

Actually, Big Spring was not completely out of the income tax forms, as some believed. Phone calls to several of the city's accountants revealed that there was an ample supply of all the necessary forms. But Postmaster Frank Hardesty did confirm that

the Big Spring post office has been out of forms — both 1040 and 1040A. "We ran out early in the week. There just wasn't

enough time to order new ones," he said. C.G. Osburn, building superintendent at the post office says he was surprised that they had run out. "Usually we end up with an excess. We put our

last shipment in the bins Friday (April 9) and sometime over the weekend we ran out," he said. Osburn explained that the Internal Revenue Service mailed 4,000 of every form at the beginning of the year. Since then the post office has requested two additional shipments of 2,000 each. That means Big Springers have gone through 8.000 of the main forms at the post office alone. It takes 10 days for a

new shipment to arrive, he said. "What happens is people who figure income tax as a side business come in and pick up handfuls of them," Osburn said. "Accountants and people in established businesses order their forms directly from the IRS, but the ones in business for themselves come in and take the forms here. We heard about a lady who came in and took 200 of them at

AS A RESULT. Osburn says, the post office has an excess of instruction books, but no forms. Despite all the form-filling being done, accountants say they are still receiving requests for help on 1981 returns.

"We make it a policy to complete all our work on April 14 so we will have time for emergencies and last-minute corrections before midnight April 15." says Maxwell Green, certified public accountant at

"As a rule, anyone who comes in on April 15 with their taxes needing to be done is encouraged to give an estimate to the IRS and ask for an extension. That's a lot easier than trying to do it at the last minute," he said.

Failure to file a tax return — or an extension request — by midnight will subject a taxpayer to a civil penalty of five percent of taxes owed for each month the return is late. There is a criminal penalty of up to a year in prison and a \$10,000 fine for failure to file at all.

Frank Hardesty recommends that taxpayers be sure and have their returns in the post office by midnight tonight. "They need to have them either in the inside drop

or in the courtesy box outside by midnight. We'll separate them and make sure they get an April 15 stamp," he said. Hardesty said he couldn't tell if there will be a

"I feel like we've had such volume the last few days that there shouldn't be a big crowd," he said. BIG SPRING isn't alone in its last minute tax

DALLAS (AP) — Republican Party leaders have reached a basic agreement on a contract with city officials to hold the GOP National Convention here in 1984, officials say.

Richard Richards, GOP national chairman, said Wednesday that officials have made "substantial progress" on an agreement submitted to the city attorney's office. He said a "general agreement" had been reached on major points of the proposed contract.

The GOP convention site committee is expected to unanimously endorse the city's selection to the full Republican National Committee at its meeting in Washington June 18-19.

Richards refused to discuss terms of the agreement. City officials have declined to spend tax money to help fund the event, leaving the Republicans searching for \$5.4 million in private contributions.

Financing the event is the only roadblock to the selection of the Dallas Convention Center as the site, officials said.

Richards said the GOP convention site committee will meet "within a few weeks" at an undetermined site. He said the committee members toured area hotels and motels Tuesday.

Murder suspect slain

HOUSTON (AP) — A laborer found tied and shot to death may have been killed at the same time as a man whose body was found here last weekend, police said. Samuel Gonzalez Luna, 38, was found wrapped in blankets and lying in a ditch about 6:30 a.m. Wednesday. Police said he had been shot twice in the head with

a .22 caliber weapon. Luna had been charged with murder in the April 4 stabbing of Raymon Figueroa, 60, in a San Angelo lounge. Justice of the Peace Ruth Nicholson had issued

a warrant for his arrest The body of Tomas H. Ramon, 38, also of San Angelo, was found in a Houston apartment Sunday afternoon. San Angelo investigators said they believed he had been a witness to the Figueroa slaying.

Ramon had also been shot with what appeared to be a .22 caliber weapon, police said.

Officers said the men could have been killed at the same time. Luna had been dead at least 36 hours, they





Prosecutors say statements conflict

DALLAS (AP) - Prosecutors in the Mexia drownings trial have attempted to instill doubt about a defendant's testimony by bringing up statements attributed to him in a newspaper Kenneth Archie and two other Limestone

County officers are on trial for negligently causing three teen-age suspects to drown when a boat transporting all six across Lake Mexia capsized last June 19. The motorboat, which contained no life jackets

or running lights, had a posted passenger weight capacity of 400 pounds. Deputy Kenny Elliott and probation officer David Drummond swam to shore to get help, while Archie tried to hold one of the teen-agers atop the overturned craft. Archie testified the youth slipped off and he clung to the boat until he

was rescued by a civilian. The three suspended officers, charged with criminally negligent homicide, each could be imprisoned up to a year and fined up to \$2,000 if convicted of the misdemeanor.

The teen-agers, suspected of drug possession, had been arrested at an annual Juneteenth celebration attended by several thousand blacks to mark the day in 1865 when Texas slaves learned they were free.

The three teen-agers were black. Archie is black; Elliott and Drummond are white. Despite the state's attempts to find

Prisons to stop using inmates as guards

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas prisons will stop using inmates as guards - known as "building tenders" — and will make other staffing changes in an agreement announced Wednesday, an

attorney for the inmates said. Other lawyers in the long and bitter prison reform case declined to discuss specifics of the out-of-court agreement, pending its formal acceptance by the court, expected in a week.

Donna Brorby, representing the inmates who filed the suit in 1972, said, "The document calls for the dismantling of the (building tender) system. Several other issues in the case remain

But the agreement announced Wednesday was a major breakthrough in the 10-year-old dispute involving convicts' civil rights. One lawyer said it could signal other out-of-court bargaining on court-ordered prison reforms now under appeal.

The negotiated settlement must be approved by U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice, who outlawed building tenders a year ago when he decreed widespread reforms in the Texas prison system

The accord on building tenders ended a hearing begun last month after court-appointed Special Master Vincent Nathan complained Texas was not complying with Justice's ban on

Inmate witnesses who testifed during the hearing said building tenders were given jobs normally assigned to guards, were allowed to keep deadly weapons and were given special privileges within the prison.

After the hearing had been under way for two weeks, lawyers for the state withdrew a day previously filed motion to have Nathan and his staff fired for alleged misconduct and opted to

Nathan said formal negotiations took place over a period of two days, ending Tuesday night, and involved 19 different parties, including representatives from the Justice Department Civil Rights Division

Choosing foreign diplomats

Former U.S. ambassador Malcolm Toon has criticized the way this country selects its foreign diplomats.

Toon is the epitome of diplomatic professionalism. During his career he served as ambassador to Yugoslavia,

Czechoslovakia, Israel and Russia.

HIS COMPLAINT is that sensitive U.S. diplomatic posts go not to career members of the Foreign Service but to men whose qualifications are measured by how much money they donate to the president's campaign fund. That has long been the case and, unfortunately, it is not likely to change soon.

Toon said in a recent interview that nearly half the U.S. ambassadors appointed by President Reagan got their posts for political, not professional, reasons. John Gavin, for example, ambassador to Mexico, is an actor friend of the president's. The former ambassador went on to criticize the ambassador appointments to Great Britain, France, West Germany and Italy.

Toon, of course, is not without prejudice in this matter. As a career diplomat he obviously believes that foreign affairs should be left to career diplomats. But there is another important consideration here. The president must have people in sensitive diplomatic posts with whom he feels comfortable and in whom he has confidence. As long as the diplomatic appointments are not baldly irresponsible — and, over the years, some have been — the president's wishes should be followed.

STILL, GREATER care ought to be exercised in this country's diplomatic appointments. Foreign nations study the U.S. ambassador as a sign of the importance America places on that country. Toon is probably over-rating the qualifications of career diplomat, but there is little doubt that our relations with a foreign country can be seriously harmed by appointing an unknowledgeable oaf ambassador.



Atlantic alliance on slippery ground

WASHINGTON - The nuclear disarmament movement in the U.S. now finds striking reinforcement in an article bound to command attention around the world. Four distinguished Americans, renowned for professional concern with national security, are calling on this country to consider renunciation of the first use of nuclear

That means a break with the strategy of deterrence which has been central to the Atlantic alliance through the postwar era. The Reagan administration has to comment, and, because the article is vulnerable to demagogic attack, the response poses a test of maturity.

The four authors came to prominence as promoters of the doctrine they would now discard. They are Goerge Kennan, the intellectual architect of resistance to Soviet expansion in the Truman administration; Robert McNamara and McGeorge Bundy, who, as secretary of defense and White House adviser respectively, led the nuclear buildup in the Kennedy administration; and Gerard Smith, who in the Nixon administration negotiated the SALT I Treaty that made nuclear deterrence the centerpiece of arms control

The article, published in the spring issue of the quarterly Foreign Affairs. goes back to the beginnings of nuclear deterrrence in 1949. The Russians, having gobbled up Eastern Europe in the wake of World War II, maintained massive armies that posed a threat to Western Europe. The West Europeans turned for security to Washington, with its monopoly of nuclear weapons. The Truman administration accepted the challenge. It committed the U.S. to defend Western Europe — with nuclear weapons if necessary.

THAT COMMITMENT, enshrined

in the Atlantic alliance, passed from Truman through six other presidents down to Ronald Reagan. It survived in large part through inertia. The doctrine of first use of nuclear arms, the four authors write, was maintained "by general neglect ... not sedulous public discussion.

Three major developments have now inspired "sedulous discussion," and a public change of mind by the authors. One is the huge buildup of nuclear weapons by both America and Russia along a spectrum that runs from artillery to intercontinental missiles. The interlocking nature of these weapons makes it extremely doubtful that a limited nuclear war could ever be fought. "Any use of nuclear weapons in Europe," the article says, "carries with it a high and inescapable risk of escalation into bring ruin to all and victory to none.'

Allied sensitivity to that danger is the second development. Not only demonstrators, but opposition parties and many government officials in Western Europe have come to regard the American nuclear arsenal more with terror than confidence.

Soviet awareness of that division is the third development. With the alliance pulling apart on basic strategy, the Russians are irresistibly tempted to avoid genuine arms control in favor of maneuvers to split Europe from the U.S.

Even accepting the three points as I do — a declaration of non-first-use does not automatically follow. Unless there is a prior buildup of conventional forces by the alliance, Europe would become highly vulnerable to Soviet military pressure. But the article, while

touching on the point, does not make major strengthening of conventional forces in Europe an explicit prerequisite for the change in strategy.

POLITICALLY, moreover, the article is certain to embarrass the administration and leading allied statesmen, especially Chancellor Helmut Schmidt of West Germany, for it lends weight to the nuclear disarmament movement. The demonstrators undoubtedly aim at discrediting the Reagan administration in this country and dislodging Chancellor Schmidt in West Germany.

So the administration comes under strong temptation to attack the article and its authors. The President and those around him could easily put the as a case of betrayal by an establishment that lost its nerve in Vietnam. But what does it serve the administration to provoke confrontation on national security issues?

A far better response is a move to co-opt and top the anti-nuclear argument. That means much more than a show of polite interest in he article. It means moving forward in a serious way with proposals for genuine reductions in the intercontinental missiles that are supposed to be covered in the Strategic Arms Reduction Talks (or START) with Russia. It means subordinating to START the negotiations on intermediate-range weapons which are highly sensitive to European jitters.

For the fact is that the Atlantic alliance now stands on slippery ground. Cohesion can be restored only by genuine negotiations that center. first of all, on the most dangerous weapons of the two superpowers.

WASHINGTON - A growing number of Americans are turning to religion today, not for redemption of their souls but for reduction in their income taxes.

Ordained on a cash-and-carry basis by obscure "religions," these bornagain tax dodgers hope to evade the burden the rest of us share every April 15. By declaring themselves "churches," these quickie clergymen claim exemption from all or part of the taxes they should be paying on their

Unfortunately for them, the Internal Revenue Service views this burgeoning evangelism with deep suspicion, attributing it to greed, not piety. The agency is cracking down on the dilettante dominies with heavy fines and wage garnishments. In some cases, the tax dodgers could wind up practicing their ministries behind prison bars.

According to internal IRS documents, returns showing illegal tax ductions based on church-related schemes grew from 486 in 1978 to 2,784 in 1980. The heavenward trend reportedly is steepening.

CONSIDER THE CASE of "Archbishop" William E. Drexler Sr. of the Life-Science Church of California, as disclosed in court records. Since 1976, he has set up about 3,000 "churches" across the country by selling handydandy packets of documents for anywhere from \$1,000 to \$4,000 a shot. The conversion kits contained or-

dination certificates, clerical identity

cards and vows of poverty for the new

"church." Drexler made no secret of his hostility to the IRS. In issues of the Life-Science newsletter, The Patriot

"minister" to sign as he turned over

all assets and income to his instant

News, the church offered monetary rewards for the names, addresses and telephone numbers of IRS agents and their families. Those it was able to identify were listed under such titles as "Enemy of the Month" and "Know Your Enemy List." Life-Science members were encouraged to harass the IRS employees by dumping manure on their lawns, placing earlymorning collect calls to their home phones or sending them unwanted magazine subscriptions.

Drexler even obliged his new converts by backdating the ordination documents to permit tax deductions for earlier years. The archbiship assured his new ministers that the IRS had given the church tax-exempt status - which it had not - and promised that the church would provide full legal services if the tax collectors hauled them into court. This also proved to be untrue, as many Life-Science ministers in New York City discovered, to their dismay. In fact, some complained to authorities that they were threatened with "excommunication" if they insisted on legal help.

Drexler was convicted last year of evading more than \$185,000 in income taxes and of failing to file returns in years when he and his son earned a total of \$365,000. In New York City, the IRS slapped levies on the wages of 319 members of Life-Science and other churches for payment of \$484,000 in

Born-again tax dodgers

ANOTHER TARGET of the irreverent IRS is Jerome Daly, archbishop, president and pope of the Basic Bible Church of America. In February, a 40-count tax-fraud indictment against Daly and nine others was withdrawn on a technicality, but the feds haven't given up.

Daly's operation was virtually identical to Drexler's - pay your money and become a "church." Two boilermakers in Pennsylvania would up in tax court last year when they tried the Daly system on the IRS.

"Those guys didn't follow through with the program and follow instructions on the organizational aspect," Daly explained to my associate Tony Capaccio.

Though declining to go into details about his organization, which claims 3,000 members, Daily did disclose part of his teachings by saying, "Our mind is our church." He added: "If the pope in Rome and Cardinal Cody are exempt from taxes ... what's the difference between them and a guy carrying a lunchbucket?"

PENTAGON PIPELINE: Flushed with enthusiasm over President Reagan's \$258 billion military budget proposal, the brass hats sometimes can't understand how Congress can even question the absolute necessity of every item on their wish list. When asked to justify spending \$1.5 million on a new visitor center at the Air Force Academy, an official earnestly explained to a congressional staff aide that the bathroom facilities in the present visitor center are simply inadequate. "It's a shame that the No. 1 tourist attraction in Colorado doesn't have enough toilets," lamented the Air Force poohbah.

Temple can't escape 'rich candidate' label

TRINITY, Texas (AP) - The robust older man with the cigar rolling around in his mouth was the only person in the Trinity Community Center who was not thrilled that Railroad Commissioner Buddy Temple is running for governor.

"I don't know why he wants it, but if he does. I think he can do a great job for the state," said the man in the yellow sport coat and cap.

Moments later, Temple said the man in yellow, "as a general principle, doesn't have a high regard for politicians.'

Buddy Temple is Arthur Temple III. The man in yellow is Arthur Temple Jr., the candidate's father. Candidate Temple did not know his father, the timber and Time Inc. millionaire, was going to show up here at "event nine" on an East Texas campaign swing this

"It's the only way I get to see him," said father Temple.

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Said his son, "He would much prefer I not be in politics. He's pretty thin-skinned. He does not like to see people jumping on his son.

Despite his father's wishes, Buddy Temple is deep in politics. After one unsuccessful year at the University of Texas (his father also went to UT for just one year), Temple joined the Army and then returned to East Texas for a stint on the Diboll school board

In 1972 he started eight years in the Texas House of Representatives. In 1980, he surprised some by unseating incumbent Railroad Commissioner John Poerner.

Some Texas Democrats are glad that Temple and his family money are in the race to try to wrest the governor's job away from millionaire oilman Gov. Bill Clements, a Republican.

If Clements and the Temples put their money in stacks, the Clements' stack would be higher, according to Temple.

"I'm no Bill Clements. I'm not even in the same league. I imagine he is worth \$100 million to \$150 million." said the candidate

"We are a very fortunate family," said Temple. "I don't have to be reminded of that.'

As his leased plane knifed through a night wind and headed for Lufkin from Austin, the 40-year-old candidate talked about being a rich candidate. "Every race I have ever been in

Temple is the rich candidate again this time. Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, a Temple opponent, has based his campaign on a theme of elections not being for sale, a not-sosubtle dig at Temple and his family wealth.

Temple wheeled through East Texas this past week to solidify his home-area support. The first day included hours of small towns which he seemed to enjoy - and small 'alk - which he hates.

In Wells, the first stop on the road, about 30 people — out of a town of 926 turned out for the first of the morning's four "coffees." Temple endured 30 minutes of coffee, cookies and small talk among friends before retreating to the van carrying him through the region.

"I am not really good at small talk.

Those two-hour deals kill me. The small talk tires me out," Temple said. In Alto, the crowd inside the Lions Club never exceeded a dozen, including and an old woman who

complained about a speeding ticket. The small talk was interrupted by a reporter from the local weekly. "You have any pertinent quotes about what you're going to do for Alto when

vou're elected?

Somehow, Temple had an answer. Throughout the day Temple said Texans are tired of Clements' gruff style. It's a campaign theme that Temple, Armstrong and Attorney General Mark White, the three major Democratic contenders, have repeated.

In Rusk, insuranceman and former Clements supporter Frank Bowden said Democrats are right about Clements. As Temple chatted with others in a bank meeting room, Bowden said he voted for Clements in

1978 because, "I was kind of tired of having nice guys that didn't seem to do much. I wouldn't mind them being my children's grandfather, but I didn't want them as governor.

But tough guy Clements has

"embarrassed" Bowden. "I don't think he's grown up enough to be governor," he said. "From a personal standpoint, I think he lacks the type of class we need in a state as progressive as Texas. Buddy probably has that class.

Temple, live on local radio thanks to station owner and former state Rep. Emmett Whitehead, told Rusk supporters his top priorities are money for teachers and law enforcement.



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

Scopolamine is not a new drug. It is quite old. What is new is the way of getting it into the body. It is done through a tiny disc that adheres to the skin behind the ear. The anti-motion sickness medicine is slowly absorbed into

the blood through the skin. This has been effective in preventing motion sickness.

You mention the concentration of the drug as being 1.5 milligrams (another part of your letter). That is a low concentration and is safe, although your sister would have to talk it over with her doctor before using it. Some people are particularly sensitive to even small amounts of some drugs. Scopolamine might cause dryness of the nose and of the breathing tubes, or even mental agitation in some people. For most, it is a safe preparation and a very novel idea for the prevention of motion sickness. I suspect you may be right, and that this is in one way or another a spinoff from space-medicine research.





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SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - Dr. Christopher Columbus Kraft Jr., a key member of the management team that put America on the moon and developed the space shuttle, announced plans to retire late this year.

Kraft, 58, director of the Johnson Space Center, said Wednesday he would retire following the first operational flight of the space shuttle Columbia, scheduled for November.

Columbia has made three flights and has proven its worth, said Kraft Wednesday, and I'm proud of our accomplishment there. This is a good time to leave."

This will be a transition period for activity at the Johnson Space Center and a reasonable time to depart," Kraft was quoted in an official

statement He said in an interview that he will continue as a member of a board of a hospital management firm here and has received employment offers from several aerospace companies.

Retirement of Kraft from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration marks the end of an era for the nation's space program. His announcement follows by less than two

last of the original seven Murcury astronauts to leave the space program.

Kraft's was a powerful civilian voice in a space program that is becoming increasingly a military effort. Some observers believe Kraft's departure will contribute to the ascendency of the Air Force in management of the space shuttle.

He is the last member still working at NASA from an original team of 35 aerospace engineers called the Space Task Group. They were selected to develop America's man-in-space program in 1958, during the frantic days following the Soviet launch of Sputnik. The United States was just entering the space race and was then far behind

A key element in that effort was establishing a sophisticated ground command post for directing the space missions. Members of the space task group, including Kraft, organized the Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston and built the famed Mission Control Center, a concentration of computers, communications and engineering expertise. Starting with Gemini 4 all of the U.S. manned flights have been guided

Dr. Robert Gilruth, a retired leader of the Space Task Group and first director of the Houston space center, credits Kraft with developing many of the spaceflight control techniques used in the Gemini, Apollo, Skylab and Space Shuttle missions.

"Mission Control lent an ease and elegance to running those missions," said Gilruth. "He was a key person in making all that happen."

Kraft began his government service with the National Advisory Council on Aeronautics, a group headquartered in Langley, Va. A cadre of engineers from NACA, sometimes called the "Langley group", was selected to organize what later became NASA.

During the Mercury missions, Kraft was the only flight director. Others were added as the missions grew longer. Kraft developed the training procedures that helped produce a whole generation of flight directors, preparing for missions that would last weeks and months.

HOUSTON (AP) - Lawyers for five paternal heirs to the vast fortune of Howard Hughes said a \$5.25 million damage suit filed against four Californians and a Nevada corporation is a warning to others who may claim to have found a will written by the wealthy recluse.

Attorneys for the five cousins declared heirs to half of Hughes' estate asked Harris County Probate Judge Pat Gregory to brand an alleged will found by Acme International Corp. President Martha Jo Graves a fraud.

The suit, which also seeks \$250,000 in actual damages and \$1 million in punitive damages from each of five defendants, was filed Wednesday against Acme, Ms. Graves, Acme stockholder Glenn David Bourland, both of Los Angeles, Stanley Dubrin of Anaheim, Calif., and Harold Mallett of Canoga Park, Calif.

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Local oilman still unhappy with ordinance

Once again, oilman and area resident Čecil Gilstrap has gone before the Big Spring City Council and pleaded with councilmen to throw out the city's peddling ordinance.

And once again, councilmen have listened to Gilstrap's plea, explained why they can't agree to it — and kept the ordinance firmly planted in the city code.

Gilstrap, who has gained attention by filing suits against bilingual education and the windfall profits tax, was at the city council meeting last night urging rejection of a recently revised ordinance covering peddlers, solicitors and itinerant merchants.

It was the third time the matter has been on the council's agenda in recent months. The first time it cropped up, Feb. 23, it was there because Gilstrap requested space on the council agenda to explain why he thought the ordinance was unconstitutional and violated the principles of free en-

The council took the matter under advisement, directed legal advisor Elliott Mitchell to draft a new ordinance, then took a look at the revised ordinance at the March 23

Again Gilstrap strolled up to the microphone and blasted the ordinance as an infringement of rights

guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution. "Throw it out," he urged the council, its members shaking their heads and indicating they couldn't.

LAST NIGHT, a streamlined version of the ordinance went before the council for a vote. One of the highlights of the new version was a change in fees charged for getting a license. Peddlers and solicitors would be charged \$25 for a three-month license instead of \$50; itinerant merchants would be charged \$25 for a three-month license instead of one dollar per day as proposed under the previous revision of the ordinance.

Gilstrap still didn't like it. "I've told you repeatedly that the law is wrong. I've researched it and it's unconstitutional," he said.

That prompted Mayor Clyde Angel to say: "You've been before us three times on this subject, but you've never offered us a remedy.

"Why not make it twenty-five dollars (as a one-time fee) and forget about it?" Gilstrap responded. "Let's say I've got some chickens and I want to sell some eggs, Clyde." he said to the mayor. "Why can't I get one per-

mit and get it over with?" City Manager Don Davis told the council that a one-year permit could cause administrative problems as well as problems if a permit was to be canceled. The council unanimously approved the new ordinance on preliminary vote and Gilstrap walked away from the podium shaking his

"You're all trying to keep traffic out," he said.

"No," Councilman Russ McEwen said emphatically. Basically what the council is trying to do, McEwen said, is set up a system whereby if people are harmed by a product sold by an out-of-town merchant, they have a way of tracing that merchant so they can remedy the problem.

The matter will go before the council one more time for a final vote.

IN OTHER BUSINESS last night, the council approved a 30-lot subdivision to be built in Coronado Hills. The project is being developed by Cunningham Oil Co. and had been okayed by the city's Planning and Zoning Board. Concern about the size of the project's homes was registered by a woman in the audience, who was told by City Manager Don Davis that the city can control things like lot

sizes and easements but not house specifications, which are left up to the developer

Also last night, the council approved a change in the city's zoning law to allow for the sale of building materials in areas zoned for light commercial business, with the provision that if a company wants to sell such materials in a light commercial zone, it must first get a specific use permit from the council.

The action capped several weeks of head-scratching by city planners on how to allow lumber sales in certain areas of the city without at the same time paving the way for a big lumber yard to set up shop some place where it wouldn't be harmonious with its surroundings.

Don Davis explained to the council that by having the companies come to the council for a specific use permit, the city can then control access, parking and other matters normally left to the developer's wishes.

THE REVISED ORDINANCE got applied swiftly, since the next item on the agenda was a request by developer Frank Kimmel for a permit to build an outlet for Cashway Home Improvement Center on a three-acre tract on F.M. 700 across from Big

Spring Mall.

The council approved Kimmel's plan and granted him the permit to build the project, but not without Councilman Russ McEwen raising the question of whether the council was 'putting an extra law on the books that may never be used again.'

"The chances are that it will never be used again," answered Don Davis, "but the probability is that it will be.

In other business, the council: Passed on final vote a resolution to hire a private firm to help the city find an alternative to participation in Social Security. The move is being made, according to Davis, in order to improve benefits for retiring city employees. Councilman Larry Miller

voted against the resolution without

explaining why; at an earlier meeting

he had questioned the withdrawl by

The council then decided to give bidders the option of putting in a bid to sell the city vehicles with twostroke or four-stroke engines.

Donations to Montford tops

Lubbock's Criminal District Attorney John T. Montford has outdistanced both his Democratic and Republican opponents in campaign fund raising in the District 28 state Senate race.

Montford reported almost six times more campaign donations than incumbent Democrat Sen. E.L. Short of Tahoka. Montford collected \$62,200 in contributions Jan. 1 through March 22, compared to Short's \$10,905.

From Jan. 1 through March 22, Montford reported expenses of \$33,400, mostly on political consulting fees and advertising.

Short reported expenses of \$12,687. A total of \$6,050 went for public relations work and \$3,765 for advertising. He also spent \$1,367 for an Odessa Chamber of Commerce

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Local rate declines Commissioners discuss

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Staff Writer The unemployment rate in Big Spring inched slightly downward in February, according to Gerald Damm of the Texas Employment Commission. The February figure weighed in at 5.3 percent which is .4 percent lower than January figures

Big Spring's 5.3 percent rate is average in Texas with the state's overall jobless rate reported at 5.8 percent. The city continues to rank far below the national average of 9

DAMM SAID the jobless rate possibly could climb in the coming months.

'We're seeing a lot of drilling rigs stacked and oilfield workers laid off. There seems to be an overall slump in suppliers and manufacturings areas," Damm said. "This makes for shut downs and slowdowns which shrinks the job market.

Damm also said the continued migration of workers into the area from other states has added to the work force and consequently driven up unemployment statistics.

TEC FIGURES showed Big Spring to have a civilian work force of 15,810 for February, 1982 contrasted with 15,415 for February, 1981 and 14,940 for February 1980. Jobless rates for February '80 and '81 were 3.3 and 3 percent, respectively.

The unemployment rate in selected cities included Abilene, 4.8 percent; Amarillo, 6.2 percent; Lubbock, 5 percent; Midland 6.7 percent; Odessa 5.6 percent and San Angelo, 5 percent.

flood disaster payments

Howard County commissioners approved a resolution Monday that would make county residents eligible for flood disaster payments and insurance. The federal and state program approved by the commissioners will also require home builders outside of the city limits to

build within certain specifications. R. Wayne Boggs of the Engineering and Technical Services Station with the Texas Department of Water

Resources presented the program to the commissioners yesterday afternoon. "This program does two things: it preserves an individual's investment and enables a person to purchase flood insurance," Boggs

Boggs told the commissioners the county would establish and run its own program of regulating construction to comply with federal flood specifications. He noted the program aided homeowners but, since some people fought the idea of seeking a building permit, enforcement might require a penalty for non-compliance as many counties have already done.

The permit requiring certain building standards would only apply to persons building within the flood plain, Boggs said. All persons building in the county outside of the city limits would have to apply for permits depending on how the county set the system up - but only those constructing houses in the flood plain would have to follow the flood specifications, he said.

Insulin doesn't cure the disease, it just allows people to survive at a cost of \$1,000 a year, while in some cases, the damage continues.

"The American Diabetes Association intends to change the problem with the help and understanding of the community."



Protein in urine calls for tests

Dear Dr. Donohue: I have albumin of the kidneys, and have had it for a long time now. I would like to know what is causing this? I take tests about twice a year for it. My doctor never gives me any medicine for it. I just took another test a few weeks ago and got a call from the doctor's office telling me it is getting worse. Now, I have to take a 24-hour test of my urine. I would appreciate your explaining all of this for me. - O.J.G.

Practically speaking, albumin is another word for protein. What your doctor found was protein in your urine, something everyone has to some degree. Normally, the amount is small -100 to 150 milligrams daily. When tests suggest the amount is larger than that, there is reason to suspect something wrong with the kidney. It is just letting too much protein leak into the urine.

Your doctor's first step is to find out just how much protein you are losing this way over a 24-hour period, and that is the reason for the 24-hour test. A single, small specimen test, taken in the doctor's office, can give a false idea of that. For example, some people pass protein in the urine just from being in the standing position. That is called orthostatic proteinuria, and it is not a serious condition. The doctor wants to find out if the extra protein reflects an actual kidney problem.

If he determines that the kidney is at fault, blood tests can be done for confirmation. The blood is checked for levels of certain substances. This can tell how well the kidney is doing its filtering work generally.

Finally, when all these pieces of evidence are put together, and some problem is indicated, a small sample of kidney tissue can be obtained using a needle. This helps determine the exact nature of the problem so treatment

In summary, then, protein in the urine can be innocent or indicate a problem that needs attention. Please go ahead with all the tests your doctor wants. They are part of his detective work. Kidney disease can be silent in its early phases. It can progress, unsuspected, to the point where treatment will not be as effective as it could have been if detected early.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Will you pleace explain what causes Eaton Lambert syndrome? I have been told by a neurosurgeon that I have this. As you can tell from my writing, if affects my right hand a little. It also affects my foot, hip and shoulders. What causes this? I am 49 years old. — Mrs. B.P.

Eaton Lambert syndrome is an illness that is similar to one that may be more familiar to you - myasthenia gravis. Mind you, I said "similar." As with myasthenia, muscle weakness is the chief symptom in Eaton Lambert syndrome. The muscles are often achey and stiff.

That's where the similarity ends. For unlike myasthenia, the cause of Eaton Lambert is a mystery. It is seen in conjunction with certain lung tumors and with the illness sarcoidosis. But let me point out that you do not have to have either a lung tumor or sarcoidosis to have Eaton Lambert

The drug used in treatment of Eaton Lambert is quanidine. I have never treated a patient with it, and am really not familiar with it.

warm bath is a little better than the warm shower you speak of. If you soak 15 or 20 minutes in the tub that helps relax all your muscles, including those of the neck. If you do use a shower, you should not make the mistake of getting the water as hot as you can stand it. If you get it too hot, the heat will stimulate pain fibers of nerves and that will cause more neck muscle contractions. So just make it warm.

If neck pain is becoming the constant problem it seems to be, then you have to have a closer examination by your doctor. You may have arthritis of the spine, and that can be producing the pain. But for the run-of-the-mill crick, if that is what you have, warm water will frequently bring

Cotton picture clouded by large stocks, weak demand

COLLEGE STATION — Cotton farmers face a tough year ahead as huge cotton supplies will likely keep the lid

The large supplies of cotton stem from last year's bumper crop in the U.S. and abroad coupled with a sharp drop in American consumption, says Dr. Carl Anderson. economist in cotton marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University

"GLOBAL COTTON production last year is estimated at a record 71 million bales, about 5 million more than the 1980 season," he points out. "The U.S. crop totaled 15.7

million bales, up from 11.1 million the previous year.

"It will take a big drop in '82 production and an economic recovery in the second half of this year for the cotton market to turn around," believes Anderson. "Foreign demand and the state of the economy will be important factors in determining domestic mill use in 1982."

World carryover stocks re expected to increase about 4 million bales when the 1981 marketing season ends on July 31, notes the economist. Total offtake of about 12.5 million bales in the U.S. will fall some 3 million bales short of the estimated 15.7 million bale crop in 1982, resulting in a doubling of domestic carryover stocks at some 6 million

Low prices will probably encourage less production in the U.S. this year, with cotton acreage expected to fall substantially below last year's 14.3 million mark, estimates Anderson. The recently announced 15 percent acreage reduction program should result in a significant cutback in the 1982 cotton crop.

ANDERSON SEES few opportunities for producers to contract their '82 crop at prices above production costs during the first half of the year. Any type of price recovery in the second half will depend on the weather.

economic activity and size of the new crop

"The overall long-run demand for fiber appears strong," says Anderson, "But for cotton to maintain its fair share of total fiber consumption, the cotton industry will need strong market development programs.'

He says the industry also needs to continue to improve cotton quality, provide textile manufacturers with more precise information about spinning properties of each cotton bale, and somehow develop a pricing system that reduces extreme price fluctuations.

Additional homestead exemption rejected

Also the purchase of a band bus to transport instruments, uniforms and in some cases commodities: a new vehicle for the athletic department which also would be used by other school personnel for out of town trips; new heaters in Wolf gym; aluminum bleacher and replacements in Wolf Stadium; bleachers at the high school tennis courts and a computer program system at the high

school No action was taken on any of the suggestions, but at the request of Mac Morris, board president. Uselton was instructed to obtain costs on the projects so that priorities might be established



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
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
