Welders remember deceased buddy

They described it as the "last respects we could give" to an "almost perfect man.

Eighty-five welding rigs carrying close to 200 O.I.L. welders rumbled down Highway 87 to Trinity Memorial Park yesterday to honor Sam Kerby, a man described by both relatives and fellow workers as a man "loved by everybody" and one who never spoke ill of his fellow man.

Kerby died Saturday at the age of 38, only three days after being told a cancer had spread to his brain. Friends, family and more than 200 O.I.L. employees gathered at Trinity Memorial Funeral Home Chapel of Memories at 3 p.m. yesterday in remembrance of him.

Phyllis Kerby said her husband's life "was a light and his death was a light, too ... bringing people close together.'

The welders and other O.I.L. employees paid for Kerby's funeral expenses and will "keeping taking up money to help" Mrs. Kerby and her five children, welder supervisor J.R. (Jack) Howard said. A fund also has been established at Coahoma State Bank.

"I've known him all my life and he's one of the finest fellows I've ever known ... Sam was a person everyone loved. Those who would say about," Howard said.

Kerby, a contract welder for O.I.L., was unaware of his illness until two weeks ago when he began having severe headaches, Mrs. Kerby

Kerby belonged to several softball and bowling leagues and a gospel singing group. He "play anything .. there wasn't nothing he couldn't do, Mrs. Kerby said.

Donations from O.I.L. began to come in for medical costs about a week ago, and when Kerby told his wife of the donations from O.I.L. employees, "I told him I hated to take this money from them but he said we're a family out there, we take care of our own. They'd do it for us and we'd do it for them." she said.

Talk centers on crop loss assistance

A grim U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm of the 17th District faced a roomful of angry and frustrated farmers and others during a stop in Big Spring

The gathering in the Howard County Courthouse was part of Stenholm's "Chat with Charlie" sessions that he is conducting in his district to gauge his constituents' feelings on subjects ranging from farming to social security issues.

The mood of both Stenholm and the crowd could best be described as disappointed and tinged with a feeling of helplessness. Several times Stenholm said he was at the point of asking "where do we go from here?"

Several farmers were concerned about relief they might receive from federal crop insurance to cover recent losses cause by wind and hail. One farmer said it had been 10 days since he filed a claim with the ASCS office and he was worried no action was going to be taken on his claim.

Stenholm assured the man that crop damage survey crews were out assessing losses; however, he told the farmer he had a right to be mad if claims were not adjusted quickly and

'All I can say to you at this moment is that I was talking to an ASCS administrator this morning, and told him whatever we do let's do it quickly, whether it's going to be good or bad," Stenholm said

Stenholm called the federal insurance program "a disaster," saying the program is a failure from both the taxpayer's and farmer's standpoint. He said the farmer does not benefit from the insurance because of increased costs and decreased advantages of the program.

Stenholm also addressed the problem of high interest rates, saying, 'There's no way we're going to survive with interest rates at the level they are.

He said the U.S. must "bite the bullet" and make some changes so that government can move forward.

"The Federal Reserve has its foot on the brake and the federal government has its foot on the accelator. We need to press the brake on the fiscal side and make a few more cuts across the board and open up the monetary side and see if that would help interest rates come down without inflation

taking off," Stenholm said. He said if government fails to control its spending habits then inflation "will go through the roof."

Stenholm hopes the new tax cut starting Thursday will get the economy back on its feet. "For the first time in a long time when we need a tax cut it's there and I pray it works," he said.

Stenholm encouraged his constituents, especially farmers, to fight for what they believe in. He urged farmers to attend various agricultural organization meetings and try to establish ideas and guidelines that can be made into legislative proposals.

'You can't solve the problems of the world by gathering at a cafe and talking about it. It's not a fair criticism of farm organizations to say they are not representing you unless you have made the best effort to see they are representing what you stand for - and let's face it, you and I haven't done that," Stenholm said.


Wright, who came to Big Spring and Howard College in 1976, will assume his new job in mid-July, college officials said.

Denies he 'beat the rap'

Hinckley shocked by verdict

WASHINGTON (AP) - John W. Hinckley Jr. denies that he "beat the rap" last week when a jury found him innocent by reason of insanity in the shooting of President Reagan, according to a published report

In a copyright story in The Washington Post today. Hinckley said he believes he was insane when he shot Reagan and three others and emphatically denied that he 'beat the rap,' as one newspaper headline had said.

"I'm not walking out on the street. I'm in a hospital with bars on it They act like I'm out free It's not that way at all," Hinckley said. Hinckley said he was shocked by the jury's

verdict - that he was so sure he would be convicted that he had prepared a four-page speech to read in court the day he thought he would be sentenced, the Post reported. "I respect them (the jurors) now a lot for just

saying, 'To hell with what the public said, we think

he's not guilty,' " Hinckley said during three

telephone interviews Saturday and Sunday from St. Elizabeths Hospital for the mentally ill, where he is confined.

Post reporter Laura A. Kaernan obtained the interview because Hinckley called her at the newspaper from the hospital. Hinckley's chief defense lawyer, Vincent J. Fuller, said Monday that the calls were made without the knowledge of Hinckley's attorneys.

In what were his first comments to the news media since his arrest immediately after the shooting March 30, 1981, Hinckley also said he likes the hospital.

"I like it here so far. Nobody bothers me They call me Mr. Hinckley," he said. He said that when he arrived at the hospital last Tuesday people began asking for his autograph.

Hinckley was found innocent of the shootings by reason of insanity June 21. Doctors at St. Elizabeths must submit a report on his mental condition to the court by Aug. 2 and U.S. District Judge Barrington D. Parker has scheduled a hearing Aug. 9 to determine whether Hinckley is entitled to release from the hospital because he is no longer a danger to himself or others

Asked if he thought he was ready to be released from the hospital, Hinckley, hesitated, then said: "I certainly would not "That's a hard question ... be a danger to myself and I don't honestly think I've been a danger to society I certainly would not be a danger to the president, I'll say that for sure." He said he thought there might be a problem with

'I don't know if you've ever heard of her," he said, naming actress Jodie Foster. "I don't think there would be a problem. I don't think I would go stalking after her If we were in the same room, there might be some problem," he said.

He said that he has in his hospital room a picture of her taken from a magazine.

Lenders, realtors respond to high court action

Mortgage ruling shouldn't pose problems

Staff Writer The U.S. Supreme Court's ruling yesterday that home owners with mortgages at federally chartered savings and loan associations can be forced to pay off their loans should have little adverse effect locally, according to a check with area lenders and

The ruling was in response to a case in California that challenged a "due on sale" clause established in 1976 by the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, which requires homeowners to repay mortgages

when they sell their homes. First Federal Savings President Charles Beil said his institution already had been implementing the 'due on sale'' clause, which allows lenders to adjust

rates to a current level when a house is sold. Beil said the ruling simply "enforces the legality"

of the 1976 bank board ruling.

He said the ruling allows savings and loans to 'upgrade loans as quickly as possible to current rates to continue as leading mortgage lenders.'

Several area real estate brokers were in agreement that the ruling would create few pro-Janelle Davis of Sun Country Relaty said, "The

savings and loans need to get a better rate of con-

ventional loans. They are our lifeblood and we can't

afford to kill them off. I don't know that the ruling will be any problem.'

Jeff Brown of Home Realtors said the ruling was "what I expected. Savings and loans had to have that right to have money working at current rates or else they would have to go the short terms loans at higher rates. It's not going to affect us.'

Laverne Gary of Area One Realty dissented by saying, "I think it will have a bad effect. The only homes selling now are mostly on (assumed mortgages). It's going to hurt and we'll be struggling. I know it was done in the favor of savings and loans, but I don't see how it'll help the housing industry."

Unlikely breed of dog protects sheep, ranchers say

WINDTHORST, Texas (AP) — They're big, clumsy and could never catch a coyote in a foot race, but a pair of Great Pyrenees guard dogs has changed the Berend Brothers sheep operation in Archer County

Predators, mainly coyotes, had become so great a problem for the Berends' sheep operation that the flock had to be penned each night and lambs still were being lost to

The new practice of using guard dogs has changed this. The dogs run year round with the sheep. They live with the sheep day and night These guard dogs should not be confused with the

'sheep dog' such as a Border Collie. The sheep dogs are used to move or handle sheep; the guard dogs are used to Lawrence Berend said the Pyrenees are typical of the

guard dogs that have been developed in Asia and Europe such as the Komondors of Hungary "They all looking strikingly alike in spite of their

geographic separation," he said. The dogs are large, placid and generally unresponsive,

with domed heads and drooped ears. The beautiful part is they do not chase sheep but relate

Berend said the dogs were out out with the sheep last June and have never been separated. The only handling they get is annual shots and when James Zotz, a employee, feeds them once a day in the pasture.

The dogs lie in the shade with the sheep and walk to water with them. The Pyrenees have the same color, shape and about te same weight of a grown ewe. The resemblance is so close the dogs are difficulty to locate in a flock, whether it is moving or grazing.

The dogs even interact with sheep, sniffing noses or tails and sharing a patch of shade. Berend stressed that the dogs aren't treated as pets.

"They don't even have names, and their only contact with humans is when James comes out once a day to feed

Berend tried to coax the dogs away from the sheep for a better photograph, but they moved off in the same direc-

He said in all the years they have run sheep they always had to pen the flock at night or lose lambs by the dozen to predators. Now the sheep are penned only to work the

"We've lost almost no lambs, and when we did it was our fault," explained the Windthorst hog, chicken, cattle and lamb producer. "There are many traps and small fenced field in this farm that a coyote can catch a few lambs in a trap and kill them before the hogs can find a way to get around the fences.

H said the dogs can't catch a coyote and are slow and clumsy, but if a predator attacks the sheep, they attack the predator.

Berend said a neighbor told him he saw the pair of guard dogs chase four coyotes out of the pasture, but once the varmints got to the barbed wire fence the dogs turned back to the flock. Berend, who said his lambs and wool are always

marketed in San Angelo, said he began hearing of the guard dogs about two years ago. Last June he decided to try a pair and began pricing them. "I finally got with Vernon Hogg, a breeder of the guard

dogs down at Brownwood. Texas, and he had six of them out in an 800-acre pasture with some sheep. I picked out these two. They were 15 months and 18 months at the time. "He told me he just put the dogs as pups out with the

sheep and let them grow up with the sheep," said Berend. Berend said the advantage of not penning at night is more than the time and trouble saved.

"It spreads all that manure over the fields instead of letting it stack up in the pens, and James said the sheep are having a lot less mastitis and other diseases," he said.







Denies he 'beat the rap'

Hinckley shocked by verdict

WASHINGTON (AP) - John W. Hinckley Jr. denies that he "beat the rap" last week when a jury found him innocent by reason of insanity in the shooting of President Reagan, according to a published report.

Dr. Charles Hays, president of the

Howard County Junior College

District, was unavailable this mor-

ning to comment on the resignation or

any time frame for replacing Dr.

In a copyright story in The Washington Post today, Hinckley said he believes he was insane when he shot Reagan and three others and emphatically denied that he 'beat the rap,' as one newspaper headline had said.

"I'm not walking out on the street. I'm in a hospital with bars on it They act like I'm out free It's not that way at all," Hinckley said.

Hinckley said he was shocked by the jury's verdict — that he was so sure he would be convicted that he had prepared a four-page speech to read in court the day he thought he would be sentenced, the Post reported.

"I respect them (the jurors) now a lot for just saying, 'To hell with what the public said, we think he's not guilty,' " Hinckley said during three telephone interviews Saturday and Sunday from St. Elizabeths Hospital for the mentally ill, where he is confined.

Post reporter Laura A. Kiernan obtained the interview because Hinckley called her at the newspaper from the hospital. Hinckley's chief defense lawyer, Vincent J. Fuller, said Monday that the calls were made without the knowledge of Hinckley's attorneys.

In what were his first comments to the news media since his arrest immediately after the shooting March 30, 1981, Hinckley also said he likes the hospital.

"I like it here so far. Nobody bothers me They call me Mr. Hinckley," he said. He said that when he arrived at the hospital last Tuesday people began asking for his autograph.

Hinckley was found innocent of the shootings by reason of insanity June 21. Doctors at St. Elizabeths must submit a report on his mental condition to the court by Aug. 2 and U.S. District Judge Barrington

D. Parker has scheduled a hearing Aug. 9 to determine whether Hinckley is entitled to release from the hospital because he is no longer a danger to himself or others.

Asked if he thought he was ready to be released from the hospital, Hinckley, hesitated, then said: 'That's a hard question "I certainly would not be a danger to myself and I don't honestly think I've been a danger to society I certainly would not be a danger to the president, I'll say that for sure." He said he thought there might be a problem with

'I don't know if you've ever heard of her." he said, naming actress Jodie Foster. "I don't think there would be a problem. I don't think I would go stalking after her If we were in the same room, there might be some problem," he said.

Lenders, realtors respond to high court action

Mortgage ruling shouldn't pose problems

The U.S. Supreme Court's ruling yesterday that home owners with mortgages at federally chartered savings and loan associations can be forced to pay off their loans should have little adverse effect locally, according to a check with area lenders and

The ruling was in response to a case in California that challenged a "due on sale" clause established in 1976 by the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, which requires homeowners to repay mortgages

when they sell their homes. First Federal Savings President Charles Beil said his institution already had been implementing the "due on sale" clause, which allows lenders to adjust rates to a current level when a house is sold. Beil said the ruling simply "enforces the legality"

of the 1976 bank board ruling. He said the ruling allows savings and loans to "upgrade loans as quickly as possible to current

rates to continue as leading mortgage lenders.' Several area real estate brokers were in agreement that the ruling would create few pro-

Janelle Davis of Sun Country Relaty said, "The savings and loans need to get a better rate of conventional loans. They are our lifeblood and we can't afford to kill them off. I don't know that the ruling will be any problem."

Jeff Brown of Home Realtors said the ruling was "what I expected. Savings and loans had to have that right to have money working at current rates or else they would have to go the short terms loans at higher rates. It's not going to affect us.

Laverne Gary of Area One Realty dissented by saying, "I think it will have a bad effect. The only homes selling now are mostly on (assumed mortgages). It's going to hurt and we'll be struggling. I know it was done in the favor of savings and loans, but I don't see how it'll help the housing industry.'

Librarian: 900 books are missing

Howard County commissioners learned yesterday more than 900 books were stolen or missing from the county library. County Librarian Judith Gray told the commissioners that book theft since the last inventory three years ago totaled more than \$18,000 in losses.

Ms. Gray said records — more than 150 — as well as cassettes and art works also had been taken. Auto repair reference books and medical reference texts were the most common texts taken, in addition to being the most expensive to replace, she said.

The librarian presented two anti-theft concepts to the commissioners for consideration. Both systems involve inserting sensitive material into the books that would sound alarms if passed through detectors mounted at library exits. Both systems cost in excess of \$6,000, Ms.

Commissioner Paul Allen suggested either closing off one of the two library exits or re-routing traffic in the library in order to make a device more effective and reduce its cost.

Commissioners then decided to consider an anti-theft device during their budget work sessions.

Commissioners also considered a candidate for the position of county extension agent in home economics. Roberta Johnson from the Texas A & M University Extension Service presented Naomi Hunt, an ag agent from Stephens County, Texas, as a candidate to the commissioners

County Treasurer Bonnie Franklin requested the commissioners sign a Texas County and District Retirement System protest of recent federal legislation concerning pension plans. Mrs. Franklin told the commissioners the legislation does not guarantee pension plans as expected by requires more cost to counties to prepare reports following federal guidelines. The commissioners signed the protest after brief consideration.

Meeting in the afternoon for their 1982-1983 budget work session, the commissioners recessed until 9:30 a.m. July 7 to allow for individual consideration of the proposed budget. County Auditor Jackie Olson said complete figures on the budget would not become available until later this week

The 27-year-old presidential assailant said he feels sorry for Brady, whose wound to the brain has left him permanently disabled.

'He's suffered and his life is not what it should be I just want to say I'm very sorry about what I did. He was just at the wrong place at the wrong time ... and I just wish, I just honestly wish I could go back before that shooting and let him move s out of the way," Hinckley said

The other men have recovered from their wounds Hinckley told the Post he did not feel sorry for them and that he thought the shooting helped Reagan's popularity.

Hinckley read the Post reporter the first two paragraphs of the speech he said he was prepared to give upon his sentencing

'From the start all I wanted was for someone to love me. I desperately wanted to be loved but I never could give appropriate love in return. I seem to have a need to hurt those people I love the most. This is true in relation to my family and Jodie Foster. I love them so much that I have this compulsion to destroy them.

'On March 30, 1981, I was asking to be loved. I was asking my family to take me back and I was asking Jodie Foster to hold me in her heart. My assassination attempt was an act of love. I'm sorry love has to be so painful

Weary astronauts check for contamination

By HOWARD BENEDICT **AP Aerospace Writer**

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - Columbia's workweary astronauts unlimbered the space shuttle's 50-foot mechanical arm for its stiffest workout today, lifting an instrument package the size of a desk "to sniff for contamination" inside the cargo bay.

The test, more of a weight-lifting demonstration than anything else, is intended to certify the robot limb for future satellite-hoisting assignments.

Arm maneuvers were the main item of business as Ken Mattingly and Henry Hartsfield began a third demanding day in space after imploring Mission Control not to bother troubleshooting "all the little problems."

The first little problem of the new day was with the hand-snare of the arm. Within minutes, Mission Control directed Hartsfield to a backup control and he began the

The astronauts went to bed tired and Hartsfield suffered slight motion sickness on Monday. Today, Hartsfield's voice was booming at wakeup and strong as he began to move the arm, hinged in the cargo bay, through a series of precise exercises.

Standing at a remote station in the cockpit, Hartsfield unlatched the arm from its cradling de ◀ and maneuvered it into position to lift an 800-pound monitoring package in the rear of the cargo bay.

The initial difficulty was with the wire "fingers" that were to latch onto the package. At one point, Hartsfield said the "snares do not move; they seem to be fully clos-The arm, too frail to support its own weight in Earth's



District attorney says he won't enforce it

San Francisco passes ban on handguns

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — San Francisco has become the largest city in the nation to pass a ban on possession of handguns, but the district attorney says he won't enforce the law until it passes a court test

Mayor Dianne Feinstein signed legislation Monday making it a misdemeanor to have a handgun in this city of 650,000 people, saying it would "help us make our streets and homes ... safe for everyone."

But District Attorney Arlo Smith said he wouldn't file charges in connection with the law until there has been a "constitutional determination" of its validity by the

Smith said he believed "the ordinance is pre-empted by state law and it is invalid.

The Board of Supervisors voted 6-4 on Monday in favor of the ban, which has a 90-day grace period before becoming law in order to give people time to dispose of their

Ms. Feinstein, who proposed the legislation in February, predicted Smith would enforce the law because "that's what he's elected to do. Or the district attorney will go out and tell the citizens of San Francisco next year when he runs that he's not prepared to enforce the law." "If you're packing around a gun or you have one, you're

going to be arrested for it," she said. City officials, nevertheless, "obviously expect the egislation to be challenged in court," said Bill Strawn, the

mayor's assistant press secretary. The National Rifle Association, the major foe of the measure, plans to file suit seeking to overturn it, said Paul Stone, the group's national spokesman. He said the ban

Reagan to sign Voting Rights Act renewal

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House has invited some of the nation's best-known civil rights leaders to a ceremony today at which President Reagan is going to sign into law a bill renewing the 1965 Voting Rights Act.

The bill, designed to guarantee free access to the polls for millions of minority voters, most directly affects nine states and portions of 13 others which are required to obtain federal approval when changing election laws. Besides civil rights leaders, key members of Congress

have also been asked to the signing ceremony. Among those expected to attend is Benjamin L. Hooks, executive director of the NAACP, who said as recently as Sunday that he hopes to return Reagan to "the purple hills

of California. A White House spokeswoman said National Urban League President John Jacob, the Rev. Jesse Jackson and several other prominent civil rights activists — many of whom have been critical of Reagan's policies — also had

indicated they would accept their invitations. Reagan's record on the voting rights extension was unclear for much of the year-long battle that culminated in passage of a compromise extending key provisions of the law, viewed at the most successful civil rights measure of the 1960s.

Early on, the president said he would sign whatever bill the Congress sent to him. But as conservatives inside and outside the administration expressed their opposition, Reagan threw his support to an alternative proposal without the enforcement clause that gave the old law its

Later, after the House had passed one version and it became clear a big majority in the Senate favored for a similar bill, Reagan endorsed the Senate compromise. Final passage, which came on an 85-8 vote in the Republican-controlled Senate, was delayed by a weeklong filibuster staged by Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C.

The new law extends with some modification the enforcement provisions of the 1965 act, which would have expired in August had Congress not reached agreement.

It continues to require 22 states to get "preclearance" of election law changes, the most common of which involve redrawing district lines for local, state and congressional races. The purpose of requiring Justice Department to review proposed changes is to prevent state or local officials from limiting the number of minority officeholders by gerrymandering districts or making it difficult for blacks and other minorities to cast ballots.

Those states required to obtain advance clearance of electoral changes include:

Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, South Carolina, Texas and Virginia, as well as portions of California, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Hawaii, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Hampshire, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, South Dakota and Wyoming

The coverage, based on previous findings of discrimination, varies widely among the partially affected states, ranging from a single county in Wyoming to 39 of the 50 counties in North Carolina.

Texas unaffected by mortgage ruling

By The Associated Press Lenders and real estate brokers say a U.S. Supreme Court ruling that federal savings and loans can refuse to let home buyers assume existing mortgages will have little effect in

"It's still business as we've been doing it." said Tom Heaton, president of the Austin Board of Realtors.

The Supreme Court ruled in a California case Monday that federally chartered savings and loans associations can enforce "due on sale" clauses that require homeowners to repay mortgages when selling their homes. That prevents buyers from taking advantage

of the below-market interest rates they otherwise could assume. The high court ruling would not affect state-

chartered institutions, but a Texas law already allows the clauses. Hub Bechtol, president of the Texas Board of

Realtors, estimated that 90 percent to 95 percent

of mortgages in Texas have "due-on-sale" clauses.

State chartered institutions have been using them for ten years, said Alvis Vandygriff, commissioner of the savings and loan department of the Texas Finance Commission. "It just wasn't practiced too much until in-

terest rates rose above the historic 10 percent usury rate." he said. "The law in Texas establishes that mortgage lenders could enforce the 'due-on-sale' clause

and all this (the ruling) would really do would be to add another arrow to the quiver of a federally chartered savings and loan operating in Texas, said William Livingstone, general counsel for Dallas Federal Savings and Loan. "This should not hurt sales at all," said John

Jenkins Jr., president of the Amarillo Board of "This is something that has been enforced for

years and the market has been accepting it,"

Dallas real estate broker Ebby Halliday said she was disappointed with the ruling, but understood the lenders' position

"We're not excited about the ruling," she said. 'We realize that if the savings and loans loaded down with 5 and 6 percent loans go out of business there won't be any mortgage money,

Durward Curlee, executive vice president of the Texas Savings and Loan League, said the ruling will have more effect in California, where a state law conflicts with the federal regulation, than in Texas "I don't think it'll have a significant impact on

Texas lending and borrowing," he said. Bob Haynsworth of Surety Federal Savings and Loan in El Paso praised the ruling.

Public broadcasting will receive funding

Action by a House-Senate conference committee assures that the Corporation for Public Broadcasting will get its authorized funding total of \$130 million from the government in fiscal 1984. That is very substantially below the \$172 million appropriations for public broadcasting in 1982 and 1983, but at least the 1984 funding is better than it might have been.

In its continuing resolution Congress had earlier approved only \$105.6 million for public broadcasting. The conference committee, happily, has restored \$24.4 million to the budget.

What is at stake in this controversy is the quality of programming. Both in radio and television, public broadcasting has provided many admirable offerings. Budget reductions threaten some of these programs, and make less likely the development of others of comparable quality.

As matters stand, public broadcasting is still on short rations. Its prospects are markedly improved, though, in the wake of the conference committee's action.

Goodbye, Al

I am really going to miss Alexander Haig.

That may seem like a strange sentiment, since few people, particularly in my age group, are lamenting his resignation Friday as secretary of state.

But to me, Alexander Haig was always the most interesting of Ronald Peagan's administration. He was like a one-man show, always giving us something to talk and argue about.

HAIG WILL forever be remembered for the way his mutilated English came rollig off his tongue. Did our allies or adversaries ever really ever know what he was talking about? Despite his inability to com-

municate a simple concept in anything but West Point manual language, Haig seemed to be the only one in the Reagan administration who belonged there. He was one of the few who wasn't a California businessman. He has been replaced by a California businessman.

According to one newspaper report, a senator referred to Haig as the "1eyed man in the land of the blind.'' He was the only one who had any great amount of experience in White House politics (it came in the Nixon years some may not consider it much of a credential). And he was the only one who did not have a lot of business interests in the countries he was working with as a diplomat. I'm not crazy about having a secretary of state with major business dealings in Arab countries

Was Alexander Haig a good secretary of state? Who knows? America hasn't been nuked, so I guess you couldn't call him a disaster. It's impossible for me to make an intelligent comment on that since I couldn't ever tell what he was talking

Reagan first nominated him for the

job. He was always talking about our needing to be tough and openly challenge the Soviet Union. He didn't want to talk about human rights or disarmament or any of those other things that concerned us. I was among those that thought he's lead us into a

new war. Of course he's still got time, but I think that first impression was wrong. In fact, Haig has sometimes seemed like the most modearte and thoughtful in the administration, even more than Reagan himself. I still don't agree with him on a lot of things, but he turned out better than most of us expected.

HE'S GONE now, at least for the time being, and with him go all the jokes. I can't imagine George Shultz telling the country at a time of crisis, "I am in control now," like Haig did. What a spectacularly stupid thing to say on national television. But it sure gave us something to laugh about.

Gone too, I imagine, will be all the arguments with Reagan's closest aides. I will really miss Haig for that, because I don't care for Reagan's aides. They are always trying to keep him away from newsmen and making sure he gets to bed on time. I was really embarrassed when he visited Europe. His nagging assistants got everybody from royalty to secret police mad at the United States. They even set up a command post in England and called it the "Windsor White House." That may be the real reason Haig quit

The news from Washington will be a bit more boring now I'm afraid. But I shouldn't count Haig out entirely. He has thought about running for president before and we may see him again when the 1984 elections get closer. It will be good to have them back. I shall vigorously vote against him, but it will be good to have him

A renegade agent's view

WASHINGTON - A unique view into the subterranean operations of the Central Intelligence Agency has been provided by a renegade agent, Edwin Wilson, who was lured out of Libya by a ruse into the Justice Department's waiting arms.

He now faces charges of smuggling weapons and running a terrorist school for Libyan dictator Muammar Qaddafi. But before he left his sanctuary, he talked freely about his life in the CIA. The exclusive taped interview was arranged by my associates Dale Van Atta and Indy Badhwar

Wilson told how he worked for the Seafarers International Union while h was on the CIA's payfoll. But he said there was "no double-dipping." The agency took into account his union salary and deducted it from his CIA pay. He had to file two separate income tax returns.

In the mid-1960s. Wilson was assigned to set up a CIA proprietary a legitimate business that could be used as a cover for intelligence gathering. He left the Seafarers and formed Maritime Consulting in Washington, D.C. Its purpose was to provide a means for Wilson to gather information on Soviet shipping and other matters of interest to the CIA.

But the consulting firm was also a bona fide business, with three or four employees. Did they know it was a CIA operation? "After a while, they would know," Wilson said. "They would be cleared and briefed, but not

told too much Wilson put his CIA budget of \$75,000 to \$100,000 a year to good use, and soon the business was thriving. Meanwhile, he was dabbling successfully in the Washington area's booming realestate market. He bought a 16-acre farm in Virginia and fixed it up. He also bought up mortgages from servicemen who were reassigned out of Washington

.Tempted to get off on his own, Wilson resigned from the CIA in 1971. The agency gave him a \$25,000 bonus, evidently in the expectation that he would keep "The Company" in mind as he wheeled and dealed in the international business world.

Using the bonus and profits from the sale of properties, Wilson put \$60,000 down on a 500-acre farm in Upperville in the posh Virginia hunt country. Over the years, the estate has grown to more than 3,000 acres, with an estimated value of \$5 million or more.

Wilson was also allowed to keep another company he organized, Consultants International. He said he initially put up his own money, with the idea that the CIA would reimburse him later. Instead, "I got written permission to keep it" when he left the agency, Wilson said.

Several months later, the Navy asked him to run one of its own secret proprietaries for Task Force 1577 gathering worldwide information. He thinks the name of the company was World Maritime, "or something like

Of one thing he was certain: "I never made a fortune in Task Force 157. In fact, the job cost me money. I took time out as a patriotic duty to help them out, because they were really floundering.

Wilson left the Navy in 1975. He was making money in real estate and ship charters. Then he threw in with "a guy I'd met at a party by the name of Frank Terpil' - another ex-CIA agent. That's when Wilson's troubles started. The deal involved shipment of explosives to Qaddafi. The Horatio Alger hero had gone from riches to

frags Footnote: Wilson is now worth more than \$10 million — in real estate here and abroad, in corporations and in Swiss bank accounts. His big problem is when he'll be able to enjoy his millions.

DELUSIONS OF GRANDEUR: When James Sanderson, a top Environmental Protection Agency consultant, was being investigated by the agency's inspector general, one charge was that he had used a government limousine to visit his private business clients.

Why did Jesus pray?

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: I have noticed in reading the Gospels that Jesus prayed frequently. Why did he do this, if he was truly God? - M.O.

DEAR M.O.: One of the most striking features of Jesus' life was the central place which prayer had in his life. I believe there are at least two main reasons for this.

First, Jesus prayed because he knew it was absolutely necessary for him to have complete communion with his Father. Yes, Jesus was completely divine (as well as completely human, although without sin). But during his earthly stay he needed to have close fellowship with God the Father through prayer. We may not understand completely why this was necessary; the Bible hints, however, that in some measure Jesus voluntarily took upon himself some limitations when he became man. Christ, the Bible tells us, "being in very nature God, ... made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness" (Philippians 2:6-7).

Second, Jesus prayed constantly as an example to us. If Jesus needed to pray, how much more do we need to pray! The Bible says, "pray continually" (1 Thessalonians 5:17). This is what Jesus did, and we are to follow his example in this.



"The name Prince William will not be foreshortened in any way," Buckingham Palace advised Monday when it announced the names chosen for the blue-eyed son born to Prince Charles and Princess Diana on June 21

The full name of their heir apparent is William Arthur Philip Louis. Second in line to the throne behind his father the Prince of Wales, he will be known as Prince William of Wales.

But the British tabloid The Sun succumbed to temptation today, running a

story on the week-old prince under the headline "Billy the Kid." "It's bound to get shortened, isn't it?"

said Earl Spencer, Diana's father. "I don't know what I'll call him yet."

Other reaction to the choice of names varied widely.

"I think it's a very lovely name, very royal and aristocratic," said William "Willie" Hamilton, the Labor member of Parliament who has long campaigned to abolish the monarchy.

"I'm sure they had me in mind when they

Genealogist Patrick Montague-Smith. former editor of Debrett's, the blue-bloods, Who's Who, said William was "one of the greatest traditional names." The present editor, Charles Kidd, said the name had "a fine ring to it.'

But Leslie Dunkling, author of the books "First Names First" and "Our Secret Names." said William came nowhere in a survey among London women on which men's names they considered sexiest.

The women Dunkling surveyed fancied David, Stephen, Paul, Mark, Adam, Robert, Richard, Michael, Christopher and Philip in that order

"But William is not seen as sexy at all," he said.

Nevertheless, birth announcements appearing in the London Times show William comes second only to James in popularity.

William also sat well with Protestants in strife-torn Northern Ireland. "King Billy" King William III — on his white horse is a powerful tribal totem, recalling the Dutchborn monarch who routed Catholic King James II in th Battle of the Boyne in 1690.

"Nothing would please the Northern Irish more than to see a King William on the throne because of the past great Williamite traditions," said the fiery Protestant leader the Rev. Ian Paisley.

World Digest

British rail strike off LONDON (AP) - Leaders of Britain's National

Union of Railwaymen called off a day-old national rail strike Monday after their stoppage brought transport chaos to London, already gripped by a week-old subway shutdown.

Delegates at the NUR's annual conference in Plymouth, a coastal resort in southwest England, voted 47-30 to suspend the strike after thousands of their 117,500 members defied the strike call and kept some trains running.

The rail workers are to return to the job at midnight Tuesday, and trains should be running again Wednesday. The union's conference referred the pay and productivity dispute that led to the stoppage to a national railways tribunal for arbitration.

However, the conference made no immediate decision on its members' strike against the London Underground subway system, brought on by a separate pay and productivity dispute between the NUR and the British capital's government-subsidized transit authority, London Transport.

The surprise vote against the rail strike, which paralyzed many sections of the 11,500-mile state-run network Monday, appeared to undercut a threatened campaign of disruption by labor union militants in state-owned industries against Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's Conservative government.

Polish youths riot

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Helmeted riot police swinging long batons clashed briefly with youths shouting "Long Live Solidarity" during a tense standoff Monday at a memorial march commemorating bloody riots 26 years ago in Poznan,

About 300 youths fled from a crowd of about 4,000 workers who gathered at a huge memorial cross in central Poznan, erected by the now-suspended Solidarity union last year to commemorate scores of deaths and injuries during the 1956 rioting there.

The clashes ended quickly, however, as heavy trucks and water cannon surrounded the marchers, who had walked quietly about 11/2 miles to the cross from the Cegielski heavy equipment factory where the 1956 riots

Delegates from the factory placed wreathes at the foot of the cross and distributed small leaflets saying "Free Lech Walesa," the witnesses said.

The march came at the end of a two-day series of events marking the 1956 riots that left some 75 people, including soldiers and police, dead and at least 300 wounded in the worst violence since the communists came to power in Poland after World War II.

Nixon praises Shultz

PARIS (AP) — Former President Richard Nixon, whose advisers included both Alexander M. Haig Jr. and George Shultz, predicted today that Shultz's views on the Middle East would have "perhaps a shade of difference" from Haig's "but not as great as some have indicated.

He also said he had tried to talk Haig out of resigning and that he did not believe "we've heard the last" of Haig, who resigned as secretary of state on Friday and is being replaced by Shultz.

"I happen to be one of the few who knew both Haig and Shultz, perhaps better than anyone else," Nixon said. "I just wish both could be in the administration. But Secretary Shultz will carry on. He will have his differences from the Haig policies, perhaps a shade of difference in the Mideast, although not as great as some have indicated."

Shultz had strong business ties to Saudi Arabia through his work with the Bechtel Corp. As a result, there has been speculation that he will be more sympathetic to the Arab view than Haig, who is a strong supporter of Israel.







DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Are you familiar with a certain kind of blood testing to determine the kinds of foods you are allergic to? If you know of any special testing like this. please let me know because I have severe chronic skin allergy with lots of rashes - T.T.

My allergist friends tell me that one of the very best ways to determine food allergies is simply to see if eliminating that food from your diet does away with

Now, there are many blood tests to prove food allergies. The usefullness of these test is a little controversial, and they are expensive. In one test, the suspect food is added to a sample of your blood. Then a count is made of the number of white blood cells killed after the food was added. The theory is that the offending food triggers a reaction that leads to the cell death. This is called the

Another test measures the amount of histamine released by certain blood cells after the food has been added to the sample. We know that histamine is involved in the body's reaction to substances that are toxic to it. Still another test is available. In this one,a paper disc is coated with the suspect food. Then it is flooded with the patient's blood. Allergic antibiodies attach to the disc and can be measured. If the number is high, then the person may be thought of as allergic to that food

So there are many tests. They may be of some help in a particular case. I am not putting them down, certainly, even though I cannot personally vouch for their reliability. I would certainly advise you to begin your search, at least, through the simple elimination method

described at the outset of this response. DEAR DR. DONOHUE: For years I have been plague with headaches. Sometimes, I have to go in for shots. The doctors have never been able to determine what causes them. My doctor has now put me on Inderal, and this has completely stopped the headaches. 

Suspended Tyler police chief may be fired

TYLER, Texas (AP) — Police Chief Willie Hardy says he will appeal his suspension with pay, but the man who pulled Hardy off the job said he will try to have the chief fired.

City Manager Ed Wagoner said he would present to the City Council his case against the man who directed the department through a series of controversies dating back to a bungled 1979 drug investigation.

'While I continue to have faith in Hardy's personal integrity and character, it is apparent to me he cannot effectively provide leadership and administrative ability that is necessary to continue as head of the police department at this time," Wagoner said.

'Within the next several days I will prepare and deliver to city council the reasons for my action as required by the city charter," said Wagoner, who declined to say if a specific

indident prompted the suspension. Hardy declined to comment on his suspension, but said he would be represented by his attorney, Rex Houston, before the City Council.

"I have regretfully taken this action after Hardy declined to accept another position within city government and declined to resign," Wagoner said during a Monday afternoon news conference.

He said it was not related to Hardy's suspension of two officers after an investigation into allegations they used excessive force when arresting a burglary suspect.

The city manager also denied the suspension was related to a petition calling for the city council to fire Wagoner because of his handling of the police department.

Ed Holley, a Tyler security officer and critic of Hardy, has said he hopes to get 2,000 signatures on the petition to fire Wagoner.

Mayor Norman Shtofman said Hardy had been asked to resign before Holley began circulating the petition, and Shtofman and Councilman Glenn Taylor both said they supported Wagoner's decision.

'I think it's something that's been brewing for 60 to 90 days ... we've had some trying times with the police department," said Taylor. The councilman said the suspension was caused by "discord and discontent" within the department.

"Basically we've got a lot of good men on that force. Maybe Mr. Hardy's effectiveness ran out and it was time for a change," he said. Shtofman said he expected the council to discuss the suspension at a meeting Friday.

"To the best of my knowledge, Wagoner has the full support of the city council as city manager and overwhelming support of the council in the action he's taken today." Shtofman said.

"It Hardy's suspension was a matter of a lack of total community support, a lack of support of his officers, and also a lack of support from the people with whom he works other than the officers. That's no reflection in him individually," said Shtofman.

Wagoner said that assistant Chief Leo Britton had been named acting chief. Britton served as acting chief last December after Hardy was indicted on federal perjury and conspiracy charges stemming from a drug roundup in 1978 and 1979. Hardy was acquitted on all charges.

More than 100 drug charges were thrown

In the police department's most recent controversy, Hardy suspended officers Oren Hale and Dan Ross on Jlune 16.

Grand jurors looking into the allegations of excessive force by arresting officers took no action against Hale, president of the Tyler Patrolmen's Association, and Ross, a member of the group's executive board.

Hale called for Hardy's suspension while he was under indictment for civil rights, violations in the drug bust case.

Allegations of retaliation — which Hardy denied — surfaced this month against Hardy when he announced the indefinite suspen-

Judge selection called 'Russian Roulette'

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - With up to 80 candidates to choose from on some ballots, Texas voters are doing nothing more than playing "Russian roulette" when they choose judges, a special committee on the subject has been told.

But the Select Committee on Judicial Selection was also told Monday at its first public hearing that eliminating elections would closet judges away from their public.

Forrest Smith, a Dallas attorney and a member of the Committee for a Qualified Judiciary, said "embedded political leaders" are the only ones who favor keeping judges beholden to party politics.

"We are playing 'Russian roulette' with our judicial system," he said. "Qualifications are becoming secondary to how a candidate spells his name.

Smith did not advocate any particular system, but said virtually any change "would be better than the status quo," which was defneded, with some qualifications, by Dallas attorney Otto

"We must insist that judges play their constitutional role to the full and account to us, not to a governor or a selection commission," Mullinax said. "We demand as a right that our judges account to us, the voters, by seeking our ap-

proval to office.'

Rep. Bob Bush, D-Sherman, chairs the 13member panel which was appointed by House Speaker Bill Clayton. He said the committee will consider changes in the process ranging from simple "fine-tuning," like adding the notation "incumbent" by appropriate names on the ballot, to wholesale dissolution of judicial elections in favor of a merit system

Currently, only 10 states, including Texas. choose judges through partisan elections. A dozen hold non-partisan elections to fill judicial slots, three give the choice to their governors and three more leave the choosing of judges to the state legislature

Nigerian indicted on gun charge

David Benton, agent with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms in Wichita, said Chima is being investigated in a scheme involving more than 100 smallcaliber handguns purchased in the Kansas town within the last year.

Shuttle science tests hit and miss targets

There was a big hit and a big miss in major material was processed smoothly science experiments during the space shuttle s second day in orbit.

A machine that experts believe may revolutionize production of some types of medical compounds worked exactly as planned during a high-flow experiment. The device, called the Continuous Flow Electrophoresis Sytem, produced several batches of compounds without an apparent flaw, officials said.

Astronauts Ken Mattingly and Henry Hartsfield again were unable to turn on an experiment package that is housed in a 2foot-high canister in the cargo bay. The experiments are activated through a single control module, which has failed to work for two days, threatening disappointment for nine Utah college students who designed the

Hartsfield operated the electrophoresis system for more than six hours Monday and disease

reported that a stream of raw biological

The experiment uses electrical current to separate compounds, such as hormones or enzymes, from naturally occurring biological sources, such as urine. The process is used on Earth, but experts believe it will be several hundred times more efficient in the weightlessness of space.

James Rose, project manager for McDonnell Douglas, which cosponsors the test project, said he was "very, very pleased" with the test run.

"It ran for six hours and 51 minutes with high concentrations which can't be used on Earth. They were run and flowing nicely.' said Rose.

McDonnell Douglas and its partner in the project, Ortho Pharmaceuticals, hope prove that electrophoresis can be used in space to create superpure hormones or enzymes that are valuable in treating

Energy Conservation Practices

Electricity is costing more this summer mainly because the fuel to make it is costing more. The following low- or no-cost home conservation practices can help you save energy and money.

Do not use air conditioner unless absolutely necessary.

Keep your thermostat set no lower than 80° in the summer. Use ceiling or oscillat-

ing fans to circulate the air. Check your air conditioner filters each month to see if they need cleaning or changing. And make sure that the outside unit is free of grass, leaves and trash.

When leaving home, turn off air conditioning. If away for two days or more, turn off water heater.

If you have a dishwasher, set water heater to 140°; otherwise, set temperature to 120° or lower. Use scrap insulation to plug air leaks

in attic, around fireplace dampers and window air conditioners. Repair water leaks in pipes and faucets, and seal air duct leaks.

Use drapes, blinds, shades, awnings or plants to block sunlight.

Try to minimize traffic through outside

Economize in the kitchen. Plan meals so several dishes can be cooked in the oven at the same time.

Save when you do laundry. Wash and dry only full loads of clothes.

Energy Conservation Measures

These home installations and modifications require an investment, but may return their cost to you in the form of savings on utility bills.

Caulk and weatherstrip around doors and windows to reduce air leaks.

Add insulation to ceilings, walls and floors.

Insulate ducts, especially in the attic. Insulate hot water pipes in attic. Install insulation blankets on water heat-

ers, especially in garage or basement. Investigate cost-effectiveness of storm doors and windows.

Add solar-reflecting materials to doors and windows on east/west exposures. Install a clock thermostat to automati-



Preacher stumps for Clements

AUSTIN - Radio evangelist Lester Roloff of Corpus Christi is considered a persuasive preacher, especially among his many listeners around the state.

These days he's putting his persuasiveness to use for one of his favorite politicians - Republican Gov. Bill

"I helped put him in office," Roloff said. "I believe that it'll be my responsibility to help keep him there.' The 67-year-old evangelist said his role in the 1978

governor's race netted 250,000 votes for Clements. 'We were facing tremendous odds, but we still did our best and he became our governor," Roloff added.

His interest in politics peaking again, Roloff is targeting Democrat Attorney General Mark White, Clements threat to re-election in November.

Though his dabbling in politics isn't something brand new, Roloff seems to feel he owes his people some ex-

At a recent revival in San Angelo, reporters quoted him as telling the crowd, "You may say, 'Man, you're off in politics,' No. I'm off on righteousness.'

In one rally after another, part of Roloff's political message is positive:

"If you want the largest homes in the world to remain open, you better do something about it when it comes time

to vote for governor," he told the San Angelo crowd. "Now, Gov. Clements - he's my friend. I call him Brother Bill," Roloff added.

The other part is negative: "Anybody who votes for Mark White is not a friend in our homes ... and not a true friend of mine," he said.

"I'm against Mark White because he filed an appeal to close our homes," Roloff said. "That means he would

close our homes tomorrow if he could."

Roloff operates homes for delinquent youths, which White and the Department of Human Resources argue must be licensed by the state.

Though the evangelist won a district court battle last year over the licensing issue, White is appealing the case.

The attorney general, who denies any knowledge of Roloff's political stumping for Clements, said, "Well, all I've done is try to enforce the law and I'd hope that that would be honored in his community.'

In the last few months, Roloff has visited with Clements in Austin and "at the close, we had a few words about it (the election)," the evangelist acknowledged.

"He's not asked me to do anything," Roloff said of Clements. "He knows where I stand and I know where he stands. We have a gentleman's agreement that we are for

In other words, the evangelist said, his campaigning is

"He and I have never had a cross word, I respect him ... but I think he's wrong and violating the constitution" by insisting that Roloff's homes be licensed.

As for the present governor, Roloff added, "I'm for Bill Clements because he's done a good job for Texas.

Residents of Iowa town remember end of communal living

Associated Press Writer AMANA, Iowa — Marie Leichsenring Trumpold brings out homemade cheese and fragrant honey cookies as she recalls her last days as a worker in one of Amana's 14

community kitchens. "It was an abrupt stop," she says of the day the "The Great Change" from communism to captialism came to the Amana Colonies

On May 31, 1932, Marie Leichsenring and two other girls helped the older women serve supper as usual to 40 people assigned to their kitchen. When the diners left, they knew they would not return the next morning for coffee, fried potatoes and bread.

"We celebrated," says Mrs. Trumpold, who was 20 years old that summer. "Us three girls, I remember — Dad gave us a little piestengl rhubarb wine, and we had a good time saying goodbye after we got our dishes done. Yes, it was a great change.

It was a half-century ago that one of the longest American experiments in communal living came to an

After 78 years, the German settlers of the seven villages in Iowa County began to cook meals in their own kitchens, work for wages and own their own homes.

The Amana Colonies - Amana, West Amana, East Amana, South Amana, Middle Amana, High Amana and Homestead — are taking quiet note of the 50-year anniversary of "the change." Although no major celebrations are planned, the Amana Heritage Society is gathering an oral history of life in the communal colonies. By interviewing Mrs. Trumpold and others who remember those days, the descendants of Amana's founders hope to capture the essence of Old Amana for

future generations. "We're trying to go for the personal life experience the daily life experiences," says Lanny Haldy, director of

"We're not going for places and dates and facts and such. We're going for impressions and feelings and motivations and things like that."

In the midst of the anniversary preparation, the colonies were hit with another big change. On Jan. 20, the Iowa Supreme Court ruled that the Amana Society, a private corporation which has controlled business development in the colonies for 50 years, no longer can do

There are fears that without some type of land-use control, the unique, Old-World flavor of the villages will be lost to commercialization. There is concern about protecting the colonies, but there is no panic - just

recognition that change is necessary, once again. "This change was bound to happen," " says Haldy. "Ever since the change in 1932 there's been this contradiction of the Amana Society, a private corporation,

carrying on government functions. The Society was incorporated 50 years ago when the business and church functions of the original Amana Society were separated and the communal way of life ended. At that time, stock in the corporation was issued to the commune members, who, along with their descendants, retain control.

The society owns about 26,000 acres, including farmland, the villages and some businesses in the villages which produce such things as furniture, woolens and

Before the court ruling, the society had the power to issue or deny permits to those who wanted to operate businesses in the colonies.

So Amana residents in 1982 have another reason to think about their heritage and how to preserve it.

But it is the ability to adapt, says Henry Schiff, 78, of Amana, that has long characterized the Amana people, who immigrated to the United States to avoid religious persecution in Europe.

The Community of True Inspiration was formed in Germany in 1714 and became a communal society when its members settled near Buffalo, N.Y., in 1842. They chose communism as a way of life that allowed them to focus their greatest attention on spiritual matters.

The "Inspirationists" moved west in 1854 and settled in east-central Iowa. They farmed the fertile prairie, hewed furniture from the hardwood timber, harnessed the Iowa River for flour and woolen mills and quarried limestone and made bricks for buildings

The 1,500 people who lived in the seven villages were largely self-sufficient and isolated. Each village had its own kitchens and gardens, mills, factories and small shops to produce needed goods and services.

But as modes of communication and transportation improved, the outside world got closer and closer

The changes - cars, "modern" clothes rather than traditional black garb, radios - came gradually, but the need for restructuring was clear.





J. R. makes first comeback

Former Astros star throws four innings in Daytona

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) - J.R. Richard wasn't the pitcher he was two years ago before a near-fatal stroke felled him at the peak of his major league career.

The velocity that made his fastball one of the most awesome in baseball was not there. And, as doctors had feared, he was slow in responding to situations requiring him to field

But still, Richard's long-awaited return to the mound — a trip many felt he would never be able to make — drew rave reviews Monday night from Houston Astros General Manager Al Rosen and opposing players who said they admired the 32-year-old pitcher's courage.

Richard, hoping to regain the form that helped him fashion a 107-71 career record with Houston, hurled four innings for the Daytona Beach Astros of the Florida State League in his first start since suffering the stroke July 30, 1980.

He threw 64 pitches, four more than team officials had determined he should, and said he felt strong enough to go another two innings. He left the game trailing the St. Petersburg Cardinals 3-1 and took the loss in an 8-4 decision

The towering right-hander, nicked for three runs in the first inning, although he didn't yield a solid hit, gave up five hits, struck out one and walked two before a sellout crowd of 4,500 at City Island Park.

"I felt fine," Richard said, adding that he was not concerned that he hadn't overpowered the Class A opposition. "I'm not here to get strikeouts. I'm here to learn how to

"He's got to have fire in his heart to come

back like he has," said St. Petersburg's Frank Garcia, who faced Richard twice and drew one of the two base on balls the righthander issued.

"That really wasn't him out there. He struggled a little bit but threw me some good pitches," Garcia added. "I think he had a real good idea of what he wanted to do. But to get it done is going to take time.'

Throughout his rehabilitation, doctors monitoring Richard's progress have expressed concern about how he would respond to batted balls in a game. Their concern proved well founded, although both Rosen and Richard played down the right-hander's handling of three plays which required him to utilize fielding skills.

Richard was slow covering first base on two grounders to the right side of the infield and was slow responding to a weak line drive hit back to the mound in the third inning. He did, however, manage to knock down the soft liner and throw the runner out at first.

Richard told a news conference after the outing that he feels his fielding will improve with time and that he was more concerned with the positive aspects of the appearance.

Rosen, meanwhile, said it was unfair to expect Richard's fielding to be up to par at this early stage in his recovery

"His ability to field the position, I thought, took a giant step tonight," said Rosen. "The ball was hit through the middle. He knocked it down, pounced on it and threw it to first base. "He kept the runners close after the first

inning. The two balls that were hit — swinging bunts — I've seen major league pitchers mess those up. I didn't find any fault with that.'

Rosen said he felt Richard's velocity had increased since spring training and the movement on his fastball was good.

"Overall, I was very delighted about the way he threw the ball," said Rosen.

St. Petersburg's Bob Meachum, who opened the game by beating out an infield single, said Richard's 6-foot-8 frame was as imposing as he had anticipated, but that he was not as nervous about facing the fireballer as he thought he would be.

"I thought about his reputation as being a little wild before the game. But once we started I didn't think about it anymore, 'said

"His fastball didn't have the overpowering velocity, but I didn't expect it to.

"I wasn't in awe of him because I know he's still in rehabilitation," said Steve Turco, Richard's only strikeout victim. "But he threw the ball well. I was really happy for

Richard, who has a lifetime 3.15 earned run average with 1,493 strikeouts, and Rosen said no target date has been established for the pitcher's possible return to the major

"It took a lot of hard work to get here," said Richard, who spent the past month in a special extended spring training program at Sarasota. "And it will take a lot of hard work to get back (to the major leagues)

Rosen said Richard will move up to the Astros' Tuscon Class AAA team "when the time is right," but stressed the right-hander

K-15 Europeans

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — The leaders of the European Common Market strongly criticized the United States today, saying its trade policies seriously endanger free world trade.

The 10 government chiefs, concluding a two-day meeting, also condemned the Israeli invasion of Lebanon and called for immediate, simultaneous withdrawal of Israeli and Palestinian armed forces from west Beirut. They also called for a 'complete and prompt' Isreali pullout from Lebanon.

The issues of the Mideast and U.S. trade policies dominated the summit, bringing tough bargaining and repeated redrafting.

A harsh preliminary draft on U.S. policies was considerably softened after British intervention.

One section eliminated from the draft was a warning that U.S. trade policies could seriously deteriorate political and economic relations with Western Europe.

The Europeans are angered by recent decisions of the Reagan administration to try to prohibit European companies from using American technology for the Soviet-West Europe gas pipeline, to curb imports of European steel, and to contest Europe's joint agricultural

policy. Free trade would be endangered by "unilateral and retroactive decisions on international trade, attempts to exercise extraterritorial legal powers, and measures which prevent the fulfillment of existing trade contacts," the final

communique said. British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher left the meeting early, but her foreign secretary, Francis Pym. had the original language considerably softened.

The final declaration called for respect for policies agreed to at the Western economic summit at Versailles earlier this month. At Versailles, the Europeans understood that Americans would not disrupt the pipeline deal.






