## OIL lays off 35 workers; obtains drilling firm

Oilfield Industrial Lines announced it will lay off 35 employees at its city industrial park plant, while at the same time disclosing it has obtained the L.G. Williams Oil Co. of Oklahoma City — a move expected to boost the drilling side of O.I.L. operations by 55 persons.

The layoffs were a "seasonal adjustment," according to

a statement from Chief Executive Officer Chris Christopher. The 35 employees were "mostly contract welders," said Richard Fackler, the company's chief

operating officer. They are not expected to be hired back, Fackler said.

The cutback in staff was necessary because of anticipated levels of production during the October-November-December quarter of the year, he explained.

O.I.L. has experienced "tremendous activity during the past few months," despite a business downturn throughout much of the energy industry, Fackler added. At the same time, the company has in recent months cut its Big Spring workforce from an alltime high of about 770

employees — a high reached during the first quarter of the year. The most recent layoffs bring the total to 652 em-

O.I.L. primarily manufactures oil rigs and oilfield parts, but it also has expanded into oil production ven-tures. With the acquisition of Williams, O.I.L. Energy Inc. (the production division of the company) will assume the operation of 187 Williams wells, according to an O.I.L.

O.I.L. Energy employs 167 persons as well as 55 persons in the newly-acquired Oklahoma City office of Williams.

Earlier this year, O.I.L. boosted its oil-production side by acquiring Sunbelt Oilfield Services of Dallas for \$18

Fackler declined to reveal the sum O.I.L. paid for

He also put to rest a rumor that O.I.L. plans to close in Big Spring. The company is engaged in a major expansion of its facilities at Big Spring Industrial Park and will assume the area now housing the city airport terminal and hangars.

# 6 die after gun spree

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — A screaming Armenian suicide squad exploded bombs and sprayed submachine gunfire into a crowd at Ankara airport Saturday, killing at least six people - including an American woman - and wounding 72,

Panicked people dived through windows and trampled each other trying to reach safety during the three-hour rampage, authorities said.

A terrorist group calling itself the Armenian Secret Army for the Liberation of Armenia claimed responsibility for the attack in a telephone call to The Associated Press office in Beirut, Lebanon,

The terrorists said their first attack within Turkish borders was to avenge the purported massacre of 1.5 million Armenians by the Ottoman Turks in 1915-16. The Turkish government refuses to acknowledge the claim.

A witness, Nihat Erdebil, said one of the terrorists kept firing on the fleeing passengers while screaming, "More

than a million of us died, what does it matter if me fyou die!"

Earlier, the state radio reported seven people were killed. But a communique later by the martial law command said one terrorist, three

passenger died. No reason was given for the change.

The semi-official Anatolia news agency quoted witnesses as saying a West German engineer identified as Herbert Osanowski, 53, also was killed. The report was confirmed by the engineer's Turkish interpreter.

In Washington, the State Department said one American was killed and another was wounded. Identities were not immediately released but the dead woman was reported to be around 60 years old.

"The U.S. government deplores this outrageous incident involving indiscriminate killing and maiming. This is another savage reminder of the need to take firm action against such unlawful and despicable acts,' said State Department spokeswoman Carolyn Johnson.

The government communique said two terrorists shouting they were Armenians entered the international flight terminal passenger lounge at Esemboga airport as passengers waited to pass through costoms for a Dutch flight.

One terrorist hurled a bomb into the crowd of waiting passengers and the other strafed them with submachine

### Boy pleads guilty to 36 crimes

CLEVELAND (AP) - A 17-year-old Cleveland man called a "one-man crime wave" has been sentenced to up to 225 years in prison after pleading guilty to 36 crimes, including attempted murder, rape and robbery.

Michael W. Turner, whom authorities said had injured five police officers while they tried to capture him on different occasions. was sentenced Friday by Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Judge Bernard

"I was floored when this guy came before me," Friedman said. "A 17year-old guy with all those rapes and shootings - I couldn't believe it. This guy was a one-man crime wave.

"In the 20 years I have been on the bench, I have never run into a case of this magnitude," said Friedman, who sentenced Turner to 66 to 225 years in the Mansfield Reformatory.

Turner, who was jailed on March 12, pleaded guilty to seven counts of attempted murder, 18 counts of aggravated robbery, four counts of rape, four counts of felonious assault and one count each of aggravated burglary, robbery and escape.

A grand jury had indicted Turner on 56 counts stemming from crimes in Cleveland and several suburbs.

Turner's lawyer, Thomas M. Keane, said his client was a drug addict and "needs help."

A. It can be done. However, said Jim Robinson, associate director of the Texas Property Tax Board, a provision is available for persons over 65 years old. They may apply for a tax deferral affidavit. Taxes, penalty and interest continue to accrue, but the person is not required to pay them as long as he or she lives in the same homestead. In all other cases of delinquent taxes, a tax lien on a home could be foreclosed by any taxing agency, Robinson said.

### Dallas firm buys Abilene bank

ABILENE (AP) — Abilene National Bank, described as being on the verge of failure, has been acquired by a Dallas holding company that received emergency federal approval for the takeover.

Mercantile Texas Corp. of Dallas took over the bank on Friday in a loan foreclosure against Abilene National's parent company, Consolidated Bancshares.

'The bank's condition had deteriorated significantly because of bad loans and a withdrawal of deposits from the bank," said Gene Bishop, chairman of Mercantile. He said the amount of the loan foreclosed on was "about \$9.5

Mercantile, which owns 23 banks in Texas, immediately put \$20 million into Abilene National to help stabilize the bank. It said Abilene National will not close and will keep its name.

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. is helping the Abilene bank with a five-year, \$50 million deposit. No interest is to be paid the first two years, and in the last three years, interest will be payable semi-annually at the prevailing rate on one-year Treasury bills.

Based on current rates, the deposit will cost the FDIC \$11 million in lost interest payments, the FDIC said. The FDIC board acted following notification by the

comptroller of the currency that Abilene National's financial condition had deteriorated and the bank was in imminent danger of failure," the FDIC said.

A "significant portion" of Abilene National's portfolio

was made up of energy loans and the bank was hurt by a reduction in drilling activities and the recession in the energy industry, Bishop said. The deterioration in the bank has happened within the last year and most of it within the last six months," Bishop

Mercantile has more than \$9 billion in assets. Abilene National, which has two offices in Abilene and is the city's second-largest bank, has assets of about \$449 million.

State and federal officials had affirmed in mid-July that Abilene National was solvent, after a flood of withdrawals the bank blamed on a story in The Dallas Morning News

about loan problems at the bank. The bank said \$50 million — more than one-tenth of its total deposits - was withdrawn the day the article was published. The bank borrowed more than \$86 million from the Federal Reserve to make sure it could cover those and

subsequent withdrawals. The next week, bank Chairman Don Earney said the trend had subsided and insisted the bank was in no danger of going under.

On Friday, the FDIC said that Earney, bank President Steve Chapman and the other bank board members submitted their resignations as a condition of the acquisition by Mercantile.



The Lebanese in the 1975-76 civil war displayed a propensity for making do in the worst of times, and many cling stubbornly to their apartments, shops and property despite Israeli leaflets warning noncombatants to flee west Beirut for the sake of their "loved ones."

### Italy's premier has resigned

ROME (AP) - Premier Giovanni Spadolini resigned Saturday, ending Italy's 41st postwar government after a dispute erupted in his five-party coalition over a defeated

Spadolini, a member of the minority Republican party, made the announcement at a Cabinet meeting and later gave President Sandro Pertini his formal resignation. The president told reporters consultations on forming a new

government would begin Monday.

The resignation came one day after seven Socialist ministers resigned from the 28-member Cabinet following Parliament's rejection of a Socialist proposal to speed up tax payments by oil companies as part of the government's economic austerity program. The ministers angrily accused several Christian Democrats, the largest coalition faction, of publicly supporting the proposal but voting against it in the secret balloting.

A Cabinet communique said the Socialists considered the vote "an act of no confidence in the government as a

The 57-year-old Spadolini, a former newspaper editor, refused to comment to reporters on why he quit.

He was the first non-Christian Democrat to head one of Italy's governments since 1945. Twelve of the 41 postwar governments were in power longer than Spadolini's,

which lasted 405 days. Until Pertini names a premier-designate to form a new government or announces a general election, Spadolini will continue to run the country's day-to-day affairs acting as head of a caretaker government.

Political observers said consultations on forming a new government will likely be lengthy. It was 33 days before Spadolini formed a government on June 28, 1981, replacing the government of Christian Democrat Arnaldo Forlani, who quit because three of his ministers were linked to a masonic lodge scandal.

Pertini, an 85-year-old Socialist, told reporters he did not want to call a general election two years ahead of schedule because it would be "a trauma for the country."

But the Italian press has speculated the Socialists want to force an early election because they have gained in local balloting since 1979 and believe they can increase their parliamentary strength from the current 10 percent.

A large gain would put Socialist leader Bettino Craxi in a position to demand more Cabinet seats or even the post of premier, Italian newspapers say.



## Wind shear alerts issued just before Pan Am crash

WASHINGTON (AP) - Air controllers were warning pilots about possible "wind shears" buffeting the New Orleans airport minutes before Pan Am Flight 759 took off last month and crashed into a suburb, tape transcripts show.

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The transcripts, released Friday, confirmed reports that within six minutes of Flight 759's takeoff control tower personnel radioed alerts about sudden shifts of wind in all parts of the

Federal investigators have said previously that the recording of conversations in the cockpit of Flight 759 indicated its crew heard at least two of the wind-shear advisories.

The aviation industry and safety experts long have been concerned

Pilots, while acknowlegding that they take wind shear reports seriously, say the alerts are used in conjunction with other available information, particularly reports from other pilots, to determine whether to take off.

John O'Brien, a safety specialist with the Air Line Pilots Association, says a wind-shear alert does not always mean that a wind-shear threat is present because detection devices are imprecise



## The bishop, the bomb

#### Amarillo bishop assails weapons plant

By MIKE COCHRAN

**Associated Press Writer** AMARILLO - The headline stretched eight columns across the page and said: "Bishops, Bombs, Peace and

In a nutshell, that hits the four corners of a High Plains saga that has polarized a large portion of this windswept city of 150,000.

The fiery drama is perhaps a microcosm of the worldwide debate over the nuclear arms race and the sticky moral and political questions involved therein. But what makes the Amarillo dispute so personal is that the bombs are assembled near here, and by what one Eastern newspaper called "moonlighting farmers

and silent mechanics. The plant is called Pantex and, with 2,500 workers and a \$90 million annual budget, it is the largest industrial employer in the Panhandle, let alone

Amarillo. To portray Pantex as vital to the city's economic wellbeing would be to understate the case

Consider, then, a homegrown boy with the audacity to issue an anti-nuclear manifesto that struck at the heart of the golden goose.

Assailing President Reagan's decision last year to produce and stockpile the neutron bomb, he said: "The matter is of immediate concern to us who live next door to Pantex, the nation's final assembly point for nuclear weapons, including the neutron bomb

'We urge individuals involved in the production and stockpiling of nuclear bombs to consider what they are doing, to resign from such activities and to seek employment in peaceful pursuits.

What angered many in this largely Protestant city was that the homegrown boy was Leroy T. Matthiesen, bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Amarillo.

The bishop had dropped his own bomb. "I'm shocked and surprised," said Amarillo Mayor Rick Klein when he heard of Matthiesen's statement. He fretted that the bishop was neglecting his church

duties to dabble in matters far removed from his spiritual realm. Although some hailed him as courageous, most local critics tended to dismiss the bishop as "naive." Others were less charitable, including one letter writer who

accused him of treason. No small number of Catholics, some of them Pantex employees, grumbled publicly that such matters

should be left to world leaders.

Aside from the controversy, the Matthiesen statement's most immmediate effect was to plunge the bishop into a media whirl that took him around the country and onto national talk shows.

Last February, a Nebraska religious order sent the bishop a \$10,000 grant earmarked to assist Pantex workers who might wish to switch jobs.

Even before Matthiesen gave the money to Catholic Family Services to administer, the nuclear dispute erupted again. Pantex workers seized upon the fact that Catholic Family Services was funded in part by the town's United Way, to which they were big con-

Their United Way contribution fell sharply. One company official observed dryly that he saw little sense in "funding a situation that might tend to

promote employees' leaving the plant.

With the handwriting on the wall, in red ink, United Way withdrew its funding of Catholic Family Services. Lost in the shuffle was some \$61,000 the Catholic social agency used to aid runaway youngsters, unwed sed children.

ON A typically warm and windy July morning, a visitor motored past the wheat fields and grazing cattle and approached the entrance to the Pantex plant, 17 miles northeast of town.

He found an unstructured, unimpressive maze of buildings and fences and only meager evidence that a super secret bomb complex does indeed exist in this isolated nook of northwest Texas.

Once inside, an aide guided the visitor through another checkpoint, down a long hallway and into the office of the DOE's on-site manager.

His name is Paul Wagner. Though cordial, he is hardly enthusiastic at the prospect of still another interview

"Most of the noise is generated by the media," he said of the bishop-bomb hassle. "It's a non-problem to me," he said of the controversy. "My only problem is talking to the media."

He seemed hardly ruffled by the fact that a priest contends what he is doing is morally wrong and a lawyer worries incessently and publicly about the environmental impact of his plant.

'We're here as a result of national policy. So I have nothing to apologize for," he insisted.

Wagner said he found no fault with Bishop Matthiesen's initial statement regarding the propriety of working in a munitions plant. "The bishop took what I thought was a reasonable

position for a clergyman," Wagner said. 'We do have a very, very large share of community

support," he added. They accept Pantex for what it is and does and their philosophy is in tune with the bigger issue.

Which is? 'Should the United States have an adequate national defense?

Said he: "That does not preclude people supporting disarmament, I don't think. I think it is consistent to work toward a reduction of arms and still support a national defense that meets the world as it exist



About the tax appraisal recently completed by the tax appraisal office. do not advocate panic but I sure think the taxpayer had better find out what is going on. I personally feel like this is going to turn into the biggest rip-off the taxpayer of Big Spring has

I have seen a lot of progress in our city in the past 8 years (water mains replaced, remodeled sewer plant, Wasson Road being repaired, etc.) but I feel the tax appraisal office has done more harm to Big Spring with one swipe of the pen so to specification the efforts of many good men and women in he past 8 years.

I understand the appraisal office is seeing approximately 200 people a day to protest this new appraisal. Does this not tell something? How about the people who have to work for a living not that a lot of these people don't) that cannot take off 2 to 4 hours from their job to insure their protest, and I assure you there are hundreds of

I personally feel this whole appraisal should be thrown out and be redone by a qualified head appraiser. I'm sure the other appraisers were only following orders.

I know of several inconsistencies in the appraisal which I will bring to the

one of the major goals of the Reagan The Texas State Pension Review Board already supervises the Texas state public pension plans insuring

their actuarial soundness and prudent investments. Texas law already provides for disclosure by these pension plans to their participants and annuitants and for reports by these plans to the State Pension Review Board

Article XVI, Section 67 of the Constitution of Texas protects the interests of participants and annuitants of public pension plans by requiring that pension investments be made prudently by pension trustees considering both probable income and safety of capital, by requiring that such funds be held in trust for pension participants and annuitants, by prohibiting diversion of the funds for other purposes, and by requiring that the benefits be funded on an actuarially sound basis,

## A look at some new gardening books

"Mary, Mary, quite contrary, how does your garden grow? Well if it's not doing too well, the Howard County Library can help

Michael Kressy has written "How to Grow Your Own Vegetables." In his book, he states that gardening not only supplies you with fruits and vegetables, but you get the extra benefit of getting away from tension and plenty of pleasant exercise in the sunshine and fresh air. Kressy gives tips on preparing a garden plan for small and large gardens, and beginning gardens, on treatment of soil, planting seeds, weeding, watering, bugs and other battles, plus a special section on herbs and how to use them.

Another book to help with your vegetable garden is "The Basic Book of Vegetable Growing" by W.E. Shewell-Cooper. He too stresses the fact that a garden needs good planning before you plant anything. There are chapters on composting, feeding, crop

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rotations, popular vegetables, main salad crops, plus many other topics.

If you go in for tomatoes we have "The Great American Tomato Book" by Robert Hendrickson. He writes that the tomato can be grown almost anywhere, including apartments, pots, window boxes, houseboats and even on the roofs of cars like Volkswagons. He shows you the many varieties of tomatoes, and what each one is best suited for. Hedndrickson gives advice on space-saving ways to grow tomatoes, extending the growing season, harvesting and saving needs. The big bonus in this book is the fact that he also gives many recipes in the section "Making it: A Love Apple Cookbook."

Another book to help with your tomatoes is 'Garden Way's Red and Green Tomato Book" by Janet Ballantyne. She also gives many good recipes for tomatoes and how to grow them. Unfortunately, when I went to get this book from the shelf someone had been there first and checked it out.

Patricia Shannon Kulla has written "Make

Your Garden Last All Year." She says her book is a product of frustrations, such as high food prices, quality of produce, and not being able to have fruits and vegetables all year long. She tells us about drying, storing and having a winter garden. The only equipment needed for sun-drying are the trays and drying equipment, which can be bought or built yourself. Drying can also be done in your own kitchen oven at a very low temperature. Ms. Kulla gives a delicious recipe for fruit leather, which is pureed fruit with sugar added, spread in a thin layer on a tray and dried.

So whether your name is Mary, John, or anything else, the Howard County Library has many other books, including "Neil Sperry's Complete Guide to Texas Gardening," "Down-to-Earth Vegetable Gardening Know-How" by Dick Raymond, "Growing For Cooking," edited by Francis C. Stark and Arthur H. Thompson, and "The Edible Indoor Garden," by Peggy Hardigree, that can help you with your gardening and

In my travels over Texas, it has become clear that Texans rate crime, the economy, and the education of their children among their principal concerns.

This week I would like to discuss education. As the father of six children, this has long been one of my principal concerns also.

We currently spend over half our tax revenue on education, and many people raise the question to me: "Are we getting our money's worth?"
The questions put to me indicate some think we are spending too much; others, not enough.

I too am concerned about the amount of money we spend on education, but I am more concerned about the quality of that education. I believe the quality of education our children receive can be improved by making some funda-mental changes in the way we pay and treat our teachers.

I believe in merit pay for teachers. Frankly, I think good

teachers ought to be paid more than poor teachers. A good, conscientious teacher cannot help but become discouraged and disillusioned when he or she ends the month with the same pay as one whom they know to be indifferent. The result is apt to be that they leave the teaching profession

I also think we ought to enter a system of competency testing not only for new teachers, but for those who are currently teaching. We test our kids, why not also test those who teach them?



### Tower wants quick disaster aid

WASHINGTON - U.S. Sen. John Tower has asked the Small Business Administration to make loans available immediately to West Texas businesses affected by this year's farm

The federal government already has declared much of the region a disaster area, and the Department of Agriculture has given farmers more than \$300 million to help recover from crop damages. But Tower has asked SBA administrator James Sanders to

provide loans to small businesses right away. rather than going through the usual administrative steps

Under federal law, loans to small businesses in a particular county are made available automatically if the Farmers Home Administration makes emergency loans to farms located in the same county. Farms qualify for emergency loans if crop damages exceed 30 percent of the total crop, but making such an assessment usually means waiting until after the harvest.

The Farmers Home Administration is considering loans to 79 counties in West Texas that have been hit hardest by this year's freak weather.

According to Elvin Carraway, arf aide to Tower, two million acres of High Plains cotton have been damaged this year.

Grain, fed and sorghum crops have also been lost because of hail storms and hurricane-force rains that ripped across the Panhandle, forcing some farmers to re-plant

### New Jersey institutes death penalty

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) - Gov. Thomas Kean says lethal drug injections should be the method of execution in New Jersey, which has become the 37th state to institute the death penalty since the U.S. Supreme Court struck down all state death penalty laws in 1972.

Kean said he took "a terrible, serious step" when he signed the death penalty measure into law Friday. But "people will know that from this date that if they go out and take a life, their life can be forfeit in exchange

The death penalty would be a "logical deterrent" to violent criminals "but not to all people who commit crime or to all people who commit murder," Kean said.

Those convicted of first-degree murder and those who hire killers are subject to the death penalty under the new law. The method of execution must be determined in

separate legislation.

The only bill now pending in the Legislature would reinstate electrocution. But Kean said he favors execution by injection "because it seems to me that is the most

New Jersey used electrocution from 1907 to 1972, when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled all state death penalty laws were unconstitutional because haphazard administration violated protections against cruel and unusual punish-

In Boston, meanwhile, the Massachusetts Supreme Court cleared the way Friday for a November ratification vote on a constitutional amendment to restore the death penalty in that state.

The Massachusetts amendment is aimed at nullifying a 1980 ruling by the court that said capital punishment violates the constitution's prohibition against "cruel or

If approved by the voters in November, the amendment would allow the legislature to enact a death-penalty law.

Florida became the first state to restore the death penalty in 1972 and 188 inmates now are on death row

#### Hazardous mosquito infestation

By the Associated Press Swarms of mosquitoes hatched in rains that broke a long drought are spreading an outbreak of encephalitis that has killed at least two people, dozens of horses and thousands of birds in the Southeast

While New England and the Midwest have been spared the heavy mosquito infestations predicted earlier - partly because it rained so hard in places many areas along the Eastern Seaboard from New York to Florida are suffering the worst attacks in years.

In Georgia, where outbreaks of equine encephalitis have been reported in 14 counties, Dr. David Bedell, a veterinarian with the state Cooperative Extension Service, said the mosquito infestation was at its highest level since 1965.

On Fire Island near New York City, Dr. Samir Guirgis of the Suffolk County Health Department went out to check an insect trap one morning last week, expecting to find the usual 10 to 20 mosquitoes, the normal catch for a summer's night.

He counted 85,000. Guirgis said his telephone lines have been jammed all week with citizens seeking relief and officials can't keep up with the bugs. New Jersey officials already have sprayed three times as much territory as they did all of last year and they are worried that the money for aerial spraying is running

out. been so dry, it's hard to compare this year in a larger perspective," said Mike Loving, an entomologist who works for the state of South Carolina. "People may be perceiving it as terrible don't they

Alexander, supervisor of mosquito control in Orange County in Central Florida, said especially heavy rains on the heels of three dry summers made this season about three times worse than last year in a state where mosquitoes are always a problem.

The disease, an inflammation of the brain which is rare in humans, originates in several species of birds known as reservoir birds. Mosquitoes spread the disease by biting infected birds and then biting other birds, or horses, or humans.

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# Guadalupe Mountains

### Exploring that mysterious range on the border

GUADALUPE MOUNTAINS
NATIONAL PARK, Texas — It took six
men in wheelchairs six days to bring the
public eye to Guadalupe Mountains
National Park, a natural monument of
limestone 280 million years in the making.

Last month, representatives of a Dallasbased group called Paraplegics on Independent Nature Trips, or POINT, attempted to climb the 8,751-foot-high Guadalupe Peak, the highest point in Texas. Three of them succeeded and were helicoptered down off the mountain to public acclaim and national attention.

The feat, while noteworthy, is a speck in the sea of history that surrounds the mysterious mountains on the Texas-New Mexico border.

That history, in fact, began in the sea. In the Permian age of prehistoric times, much of Texas and southern New Mexico was covered by a warm, shallow ocean. Near the northwest shore, a giant reef was created by lime-secreting algae and other organisms.

Eventually, a series of earth movements pushed the reef skyward, creating the barren cliffs and forested canyons of the Guadalupes.

uadalupes.
"This is the best exposed Permian reef

in the world," said park Area Manager Ralph Harris. "In the higher parts of the reef, there are fossils you can see with

While the history of the mountains goes back to the squirming critters that became those fossils, the park itself is relatively new

IN OCTOBER, park rangers and residents of nearby Dell City plan to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the formal opening of the park, which encompasses more than 76,000 acres in and around the mountains.

"We'll have our fall colors, a full moon and our 10th birthday, all that month," Harris said.

The park's youth and tighter federal budgets have meant slower development than others of the nation's showpieces.

The trail used by the wheelchair climbers is one of several that have been developed since the opening of the park. Now, there is a network of trails that climb through canyons and up into the mountains

On top of the mountain range is a maze of trails left from the days when ranchers raised cattle in the green solitude of the High Country.

"The real development of this park has

been the trails," said Park Superintendent Bill Dunmire, who also supervises the nearby Carlsbad Caverns National Park. "About all that was here were old ranch trails. We started a system of upgrading trails and replacing them. Later this year, we're hoping to set up a matrix of connecting trails in the High Country."

Other development has been limited to the construction of one campground near U.S. Highway 62 and erection of a temporary rangers' station and visitor's center.

Dunmire said plans call for construction of a permanent visitors' center complex in the next few years, but otherwise the park will remain in the natural state.

DOMINATING THE scene is El Capitan, a 8,078-foot-high monolith of stone, eroded by the elements through the years and standing alone at the southern tip of the

mountains.
"The conquistadors used El Capitan as a landmark," Harris said. "There were already Indians here when they arrived."

The mountains long had been a hideaway for the Mescalero Apaches and other tribes drawn to the green foliage and spring water.

Harris said there are archeological sites on the mountains that bear the remains of

tribes' summer and winter camps. Rangers are careful to warn visitors not to disturb the finds.

The Indians were moved out of the mountains as cattlemen moved in, Harris

"At that time, this whole area was covered in lush grass," he said. "The ranchers grazed unbelievable numbers of cattle on that grass. Then, they had a couple of drought years and there was quite a bit of overgrazing. Then they grazed sheep and then goats. Now, there's hardly any grass over there."

The rolling plains around the mountains now belong to the Chihuahuan desert. Mesquite and creosote bush have replaced the waist-deep grasses.

The ranchers, trying to cling to cattleraising in the area, developed a system of pipes to carry water to the top of the mountains, where herds grazed in the shade of the cooling pines, Dunmire said.

shade of the cooling pines, Dunmire said.
"They finally went broke," he said.
"The water supply was not enough to keep

it going."

Water still is unavailable on top the mountains, posing a problem for those camping and hiking in the High Country, Dunmire said. The rangers recommend that hikers carry a gallon of water per person per day.

## PUC chief warns of power blackouts through decade

AUSTIN (AP) — The chairman of the Texas Public Utility Commission says consumers will have to pay more for electricity or face "rolling blackouts" in this

Moak Rollins warned Texas Senate committee members that Texas' growth could mean a shortfall in power supplies by the mid-1980s if growth is not cur-

If Texas lowers its demand during the 1980s to a 3.5 percent growth rate from the 5.7 percent electricity demand rose in 1970s, the state can meet its needs—but only if all the power plants currently under construction are completed on schedule, Rollins said.

Rising construction costs are passed on to consumers, but if those costs are not met, Rollins said, the state will see "rolling blackouts" leading to reduced development and higher unemployment.

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# Floyd increases PGA lead

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — Ray Floyd pulled away to a commanding five-stroke third-round lead Saturday while golf's two greatest names shot themselves out of the title chase in the 64th PGA national championship.

The veteran Floyd, who set first- and second-round scoring records, shot a third-round 2-under-par 68 on a cooler Southern Hills Country Club course to establish still another PGA tournament mark: a 200 total for 54 holes. That broke his own record of 202, set when he won the 1969 PGA title in Dayton, Ohio.

While Floyd, less than a month short of his 40th birthday, was taking his liberties with the fierce reputation of the course that stretches 6,862 yards over rolling hills, Jack Nicklaus and Tom Watson found it more than they could handle.

Nicklaus, who counts five PGA championships among his record collection of 17 major professional titles, struggled to a 2-over-par 72 that left him at 216. The 6over-par total for the three rounds left him out of the title chase in the last of the year's Big Four events, around which the 42-year-old Golden Bear has built his awesome

The hopes of Watson, currently the dominant player in the game, also came to an end. Watson, who beat Nicklaus in the dramatic climax to the U.S. Open and then went on to acquire his fourth British Open title, needed this title to become only the fifth man in history to score a career sweep of all the Big Four tournaments.

But Watson could do no better than a 71 that left him at 212—12 strokes back with only 18 holes to go.
Floyd, who counts a Masters and PGA title among his 17

career victories, has earned a reputation as one of the game's great front-runners.

He did that with an opening 63 on Thursday and hasn't been headed since. That 63 matched the best round in tournament history, broke Ray's own course record and represented the best first round in tournament history.

### **PGA** Championship

He added to the record collection Friday, shooting a 69 that set the tournament record for 36 holes at 132. And now he's added one more, the best 54-hole total and tied still another, matching the largest three-round lead five strokes, which he also set in 1969.

With his scoring heroics continuing in 90 degree temperatures - a considerable relief from the 100-plus marks that were recorded in the first two days — only Jay Haas and the Australian Greg Norman could keep Floyd in sight. They shared second at 205.

"I've seen this before," said Haas, a three-time winner in six years on the PGA tour, after he had posted his 68. 'He's the kind of guy who gets it going and keeps it going. He'll be hard to catch. Norman, who has won some 20 world-wide tournaments

but has yet to take a title in the United States, had a 70. Norman took heart from Floyd's last-hole bogey that was recorded under threatening skies while distant thunder rolled in the background.

'Ray's miss of that last putt helped. Five back is better than six," he said.

"I have a realistic chance if Ray stumbles on the first few holes. And I have to get away to a fast start, at least three under after six holes. But only that combination, his own fast start and a

Floyd lapse, Norman said, could set up a battle.

Bob Gilder, in second through the first two rounds, dropped back with a 72 and was at 206. He seemed to be the only other man with any hopes at all of overtaking Floyd.

Cal Peete, winner of two recent tournaments, closed up with a 68 that left him at 207, seven strokes back. Peete, however, suffered a twisted knee while playing the 16th hole, declined an invitation to the press room for a mass intereview and hurried back to his hotel for rest and treatment of his knee.

'I hope to be able to play tomorrow,' he said

## Rickey racing at record pace

OAKLAND (AP) — Now you see him, now you don't. Rickey Henderson's basepath magic — transforming walks and singles into doubles and triples in the twinkling of an eye - is dazzling American League pitchers and catchers this summer and threatening not just to better but to belittle one of baseball's biggest

In the process, he may be leading the way to a significant change in the nature of the game.

Lou Brock, Maury Wills and Ty Cobb were slowpokes by comparison. Henderson is leaving the game's greatest base-stealers far behind in his breathtaking pursuit of his place in the record books. Henderson tied his own American League record

with his 100th steal of the season Monday night and then broke the record with three stolen bases in a doubleheader with Seattle Wednesday night.

If possible, he would like to break Brock's major league single-season record when the Oakland A's play at home Sunday, Aug. 22, against the Boston Red Sox.

That base, No. 119, would be Henderson's birthday present to his mother, Bobbi, who chose baseball over football for her son's career and now cheers him loudly at every home game.

After that date, Henderson would have 34 games to stretch the record as far as he pleases. He may try to put it out of reach for years to come or he may ease up As the baseball season grinds on, Henderson is

beginning to show a few signs of weariness. He hasn't slowed down, but it shows in his eyes and in

his voice. It's the first evidence of the strain he's feeling from the daily pounding his body has taken and the losses the fifth-place Oakland A's have endured. He's proud of the record he'll hold. But for a man who

hates to lose even a game of Pac-Man, that's not quite 'The joy is not the same if you're not winning,'

Henderson observes.

At 23, an age when Brock and Wills were still in the minors. Henderson will have over 300 steals, 300 runs and a 300 career batting average. Cobb broke in at 18 in 1905 and had more runs and a higher average, but fewer steals.

#### Germans rule swimming

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador (AP) - Cornelia Sirch of East Germay smashed the world record in the women's 200-meter backstroke Saturday night at the World Swimming Championships and teammate Ines Geissler handed American Mary T. Meagher her first butterfly defeat in a 50-meter pool since 1978.

Sirch was timed in 2 minutes, 9.91 seconds to break the world mark of 2:11.77 by Rica Reinisch of East Germany at the 1980 Olympics

Silver medalist Georgina Parkes of Australia and bronze medalist Carmen Bunaciu of Romania were far back at 2-14-98 and 2:15:40, respectively

Geissler set a meet record of 2:08.86 in the 200 butterfly, while Meagher was timed in 2:09.76, nearly four seconds slower than her world-record time of 2:05.96 The previous meet record in the event was 2:09.87 by Tracy Caulkins of Nashville, Tenn., in 1978, when Caulkins won five gold medals and one silver. In this year's championships, Caulkins won two bronze medals and finished sixth in the 200 backstroke

The only swimming gold for the United States Satur day night, the conclusion of the meet, was a world record in the men's 400 medley relay, giving the Americans a total of eight swimming golds in 29. events, compared to 12 by East Germany

At the 1978 championships at West Berlin, the United States won 20 swimming golds, while the East Germans had only one

Meanwhile, Greg Louganis of El Cajon, Calif., won the platform event Saturday for his second diving gold medal here, helping the United States to a sweep of four golds in the men's and women's diving competi-

In the four different sports contested in this equatorial seaport near the Pacific coast of South America, the United States finished with gold-silverbronze totals of 13-11-10, while East Germany finished second with 12-9-5. The Soviet Union's totals were 5-9-4. Competition was held in water polo and synchronized wimming as well as swimming and diving

In swimming alone, East Germany had 12-8-5 for a total of 25 medals, the United States 8-8-9 also for a total of 25 and the Soviet Union 4-6-3 for 13.

In the Americans' world-record relay, Rick Carey, Steve Lundquist, Matt Gribble and Rowdy Gaines were timed in 3 40.84, surpassing the U.S. world mark of 3 42 22 set in the 1976 Olympics. The Soviet Union was second in 3-42.86 and West Germany third in 3:44.78.

It was the third gold medal of the championships for Gaines, but all were in relays.

The Soviet Union saved its best day for last, with a 1.2 sweep in the men's 1,500 freestyle behind the meet record of Vladimir Salnikov, a meet-record victory by Alexander Sidorenko in the men's 200 individual medley and a gold medal in water polo

Salnikov was timed in 15:01.77 in the 1500, breaking his meet mark by 2.22 seconds. Sviatoslav Semenov was second in 15:05.54, while Darjan Petric won Yugoslavia's only medal of the championships by taking the bronze in 15:10.02.

Sidorenko edged top qualifier Bill Barrett of Mission Viejo, Calif., to win the gold in the 200 individual medley. The Soviet was clocked in meet-record time of 2 03 30. Barrett in 2:03.49 and Giovanni Franceschi in 2 04 65 for Italy's only championship medal

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body headlong into the bases. He roams the outfield like a young Willie Mays, making routine plays out of what would be spectacular catches for someone else. He is a player of many gifts, capable of coaxing walks or blasting 400-foot home runs, but on the basepaths he is in a class of his own.

No major single-season baseball mark has been broken at such an early point in the season since Babe Ruth began swatting home runs at a revolutionary

"Rickey is probably the most feared offensive force in the game," said California's Reggie Jackson, who tipped his cap to Henderson after the two put on a tremendous duel recently. Jackson, pure power, belted a homer and a double. Henderson singled, doubled, homered and stole two bases, including home, in a wild 11-8 A's victory.

"I'm leading the league in home runs, but I'd fear him more than me," Jackson said. "With him, if he gets on base, it's a triple. Lou Brock, Bill North and Campy Campaneris were doubles, but this guy's a triple. I'd like to be around Rickey every day. I'd keep him pumped up."

Henderson needs no one to pump him up. "He plays hard every inning he's out there," said A's Manager Billy Martin, who still tells Henderson when to run. "He plays like he loves it and that's the attitude I'd want in all my players. That's the attitude that all the great players had."

'I do love it," Henderson said. "I don't want to be just a base-stealer. I want to be one of the all-time best all-around. Right now I think I'm one of the top five playing today. But the best I've ever seen was Willie Mays. I'd like to be in his class someday."

Like an actor afraid of being type-cast, Henderson is quick to rebuke suggestions that he is a one-dimensional ballplayer, blessed only with fast legs and

a durable, muscular body.

"Most of the guys stealing a lot of bases are faster than I am," he said. "I have more than just running. When you can read pitchers well, you don't need as much speed.

"I know a lot about the art of base-stealing that people don't want to give me credit for," he said. "You can't say that it's just natural ability. You got to learn. I'm reading a lot of keys (in the pitchers' motions). That's why I'm making more bases this year. I'm getting a better jump. It's not just flat out running." Henderson said he goes from first base to second in about 3.1 seconds, a few tenths of a second faster than

it takes most catchers to get the ball to the bag. He's been timed, he said, as fast as 2.9 seconds. "Most people think it's a foot race between Rickey and the ball," Brock said recently. "But to Rickey, it's messages from the body that begin long before he gets into the batter's box. In fact, it takes place in the on-

deck circle. 'The challenge or duel begins with his attempt to disarm the pitcher and catcher with his body. He dictates with his body complete control over the game. Once he's on base, he positions his body in such a way that it looks like he can't go in motion. It's body language and Rickey does that with the best of them.

Henderson had a long, amiable chat over dinner with Brock in St. Louis last winter. They discussed the 'idiosynchrasies of base running, the basic techniques and the psychological flavor of it,' Brock said.

"We must've talked for three hours," Henderson recalled. "He gave me some ideas on how to intimidate the catchers a little more."

If the catchers are worried about his running, Henderson said, "they get tense. They squeeze the ball too tight and throw the ball wild. But I don't talk to them too much. I don't think I need to. But a lot of Henderson bedevils pitchers and catchers alike. His 100th steal was his 70th in 91 attempts at second

base. At that point he had stolen third 28 times in 36 tries and home two out of five times - a total success rate of 100 for 132.

California's Bob Boone, Minnesota's Butch Wynegar, Boston's Rich Gedman and Chicago's Carlton Fisk are the only catchers who can claim any Boone cut down him three times at second base in an

inspired series late last month. Wynegar threw out Henderson twice at second, Gedman threw him out once at second and once at third and Fisk cut him down twice at third. Six other catchers have thrown him out

"I thought the toughest catcher was Gedman, but I hadn't seen Boone until the second time in Anaheim," Henderson said. "Boone showed me a lot of smarts. People said he couldn't throw anymore, but he knew how to call a pitch so that he could set up and get a good shot at me. He places the ball right where he wants. Henderson has been picked off base by pitchers a dozen times this year.

"I'm not afraid to get picked off," he said. "It's part of the game. You might be looking down at your shoe or the ground and 'Bam!' the pitcher's thrown the ball back to first and you're picked off."

By that time, Henderson added, he's already thinking about revenge.
"That's all right. I know and he knows I'll be back and I might get four or five steals in a row before they

get me again," he said. "The pitchers I give the most respect to are (Mike) Flanagan and (Scott) McGregor of Baltimore," Henderson said. "But some pitchers now are getting

away with illegal moves. 'The umpires nowadays aren't paying close at-tention to what (the pitchers) are doing. When I'm on the basepaths, the pitchers are changing their motion. You cannot change the motion and go to the plate with it. There ain't no way. It's a balk. You got to go through your motion. Base-stealing's gonna be tougher because the umpires aren't paying attention."

The pitchers are certainly paying attention to Henderson. The A's play the longest games in the







CANTON, Ohio (AP) -Steve Dils, Minnesta's second-string quarterback, shattered three Pro Football Hall of Fame exhibition passing records Saturday, leading the Vikings to a 30-14 victory over the Baltimore Colts in the season's first preseason game.

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THE "MARRIAGE PENALTY"

When a wife decides to return to work, she may find that the tax system has her paying as much as half her pay in taxes even though she earns a "lower bracket" income. Her income will be added to her husband's income and taxed at the higher bracket rather than being taxed at lower levels. By the time she has paid for transportation, work clothes, housekeeping help or child care, she may decide the family is gaining very little financially by her return to the work force.

The 1981 Tax Act seeks to alleviate this problem by reducing this so-called "marriage penalty" the stacking of the second earner's income on top of the first earner's. It gives a deduction of 5% of the lower earning spouse's income up to a maximum deduction of \$1,500 in 1982. In 1983 the deduction increases to 10% up to a \$3,000 maximum. This provision, along with the across the board tax cuts and the increase in the child care credit, may make the tax burden lighter for working couples. Just how much relief an individual couple will get depends on how much they earn and how the income is split between them.

Spouses earning equal incomes are hit hardest by the "marriage penalty." If in 19892 each spouse earns \$25,000, they'll pay bout \$11,800 in taxes as a oled. If they were single and each earned \$25,000, they'd pay a combined tax of \$10,000 or \$1,800 less. This additional tax paid by the married couple on the samed total earnings is the "marriage penalty." With the same facts, the additional taxes in 1981 would have been \$2,600 - the new law has reduced the "marriage penalty" by \$800. In 1983 and following years, the penalty on the same income will be reduced an additional \$600.

While the new ruls do not totally eliminate the "marriage penalty," it may now make more economic sense for a wife to take a job if she wishes

### 'Young Doctors' ailing; Cheech, Chong still funny

Michael McKean, rated R, at the College Park Cinema. "Things Are Tough All Over," starring Cheech and Chong, rated R. at the Ritz Twin.

Two new comedies arrived in town Friday with the laughs heading in different directions. While the creators of the smash movie "Airplane" crash and burn with their second try "Young Doctors in Love," Cheech and Chong roll another winner with their fourth spoof, "Things Are Tough All Over."

An initial comparison provides the reason why one movie succeeds where the other fails. Unlike "Airplane," "Young Doctors" boasts hardly any recognizable names and the rookies in this show struggle in their bid to bring out non-stop

"Things Are Tough" relies on drug scenes for laughs far less than the three previous Cheech and Chong movie efforts but the simple fact is these two guys are funny doing just about anything. Experience is the key difference in the two movies and that's why audiences are laughing at "Things Are Tough" and merely giggles at "Young Doctors.

WHEREAS "AIRPLANE" featured seasoned veterans Robert Havs and Lloyd Bridges, "Young Doctors" seems to rely solely on slapstick to get its laughs. What this movie needed was one or two established stars to build the movie around and do to the hospital business what Bill Murray and Goldie Hawn did to the Army.

Most of the humor brings out groans Especially when Stephanie, the movie's heroine, is on the operating table and the heart monitor plays Pac Man, "Jaws" and 'Close Encounter' theme songs. When someone accidentally kicks the plug out and the monitor's read-out says the patient has died, the machine does a Pac Man "Game Over" sequence.

One minute it operation seems to be taken in all sincerity and then next it's back to slapstick. No wonder the audience was confused

The movie had a few good moments. One hearty laugh came when a PA announcement went, "Attention: At 3 p.m., all electricity will be turned off for five minutes At 2:59 p.m., all oxygen patients are asked to take a deep breath.

It was the same female voice over the intercom that announced, "Attention: Starting Monday, all nurses must wear underwear" and "Attention: E.T., phone home." Those where some of the best one liners and the audiences doesn't even see who says them.

A notable scene comes along along when group of interns meets with Dr. Oliver Wendell Ludwig to discuss fluids. These young doctors would much rather take the Pepsi Challenge" after Dr. Ludwig tries to get them to finger-dip-sip various bodily

fluids. Actually, between all the joke attempts. there is a major plot and several subplots. Serious Beverly Hills doctor-to-be Simon August (Michael McKean) and doctor Stephanie Brody try to operate a romance

(I guess they are the young doctors in love). That's the main story while a substory features a hit man trying to knock off a mafia-type godfather (while his son has a relationship with a doctor while disguised as a female), another young doctor trying to rip off drugs while romancing a hard-nose nurse and Dr. Pang, head of surgery, trying to retain his senses and

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But all in all, the makers of "Airplane" don't get off the ground with this one. Even the musical score by Maurice Jarre seems wasted. The film boasts "Warning: This movie may be dangerous to your health. You may never stop laughing.

Actually, it should be "Warning: This movie may be dangerous to your senses. You may wonder why you went to see it.'

REMEMBER "UP in Smoke" and how the whole project centered around two guys trying to get some good stuff to smoke? Well, Cheech and Chong perhaps wisely thinking you can overplay a good thing - stray away from drugs to put out a slightly different comedy this time around

What makes this odd couple so funny is they are so identifiable. Cheech plays his Hispanic role perfectly while Chong is still holding on to counter-culture days of Woodstock. Sometimes they seem worlds apart but still they remain best of friends As usual, the plot in a Cheech and Chong

movie is simple. Things are tough all over and all this pair wants is a job. Two Arabs ask them to deliver a limousine from Chicago to Las Vegas. When Chong spends all the money to pay off the duo's bar tab. they have to trade different parts of the car in exchange for gas. One of their last trades is the front

passenger's seat, under which is a stash of money. Not knowing they've left a fortune at a crumbling desert gas station, Cheech and Chong get in hot water when their Arab employers think they've been ripped off. The rest of the movie races to a wacky ending as our heroes try to find something to eat and the Arabs try to find them.

Cheech and Chong work double-time in this one, playing themselves and their Arab adversaries. Not any of those four is as good-looking as the two French 'girlfriends' of the Arabs.

Cheech pokes fun at his race throughout Emphasizing how cold it was in Chicago one winter, he says, "Like it was something like 80 below...even colder if you were a Mexican." Later, while stranded in the desert, he tells Chong he doesn't want to die there. "Yeah, but it's beautiful out here, man," Chong says. "Yeah, but I don't want to be no buzzard taco!" Cheech answers.

As usual, the two try to make it as singers and one of their new numbers is 'Me and My Old Lady,'' containing the immortal lyrics "so we make like a bread truck and get our buns out of here. If you like Cheech and Chong (even when

Cheech gets stuck inside a dryer or both go through a car wash in a convertible), you'll get plenty of laughs from "Things Are Tough All Over.

### Dress yourself up with with thrifty accessories

Accessories add sparkle to one's appearance and are an important part of one's wardrobe. They add versatility, change an outfit, provide opportunities for creativity, and are outlets for expressing one's personality and individuality.

Accessories emphasize good features thus drawing attention away from less attractive ones. Emphasis in fashion today is placed on the total look of the complete ensemble and accessories enhance the total ap-

Texture is important too. The way accessories feel and look makes a difference in the appearance, feeling of width and size, and attractiveness. Bulky and stiff accessories create the illusion of width; shiny accessories create illusions of largeness; dullness creates an illusion of smallness; and polished accessories attracts more attention than dull or matte finished accessories.

Along with texture, color is important in the use of accessories. Bright colored accessories are pleasing if they are located near the face or high on the figure and away from an days of the 18th-century

More than 12,000 buyers attending the Women's and Children's Fall Apparel Market, held in Dallas in May, were exposed to the new controlled, classic shapes for fall fashion.

The tuxedo look was the newest and most exciting fashion to emerge during the market. The use of installment credit requires that you sign Even after the item has been a contract. Under the terms of the contract, you usually make a down payment and agree to pay the balance with a specified number of equal payments. These equal payments are called installments. Finance charges are included in these

Advantages of Installment Buying - There are many advantages of using installment credit. It is usually easy to get. If you make payments when they are due, installment credit can help you build a good credit

Disadvantages of Installment Buying — There are also some disadvantages to installment buying. The Annual Percentage Rate (APR) may be higher than with other kinds of credit. Some stores or businesses may allow you a long time to pay. This way the dollar cost of credit, the finance charge, may be more than the

What to look for in an installment contract: Any contract providing for installment payments and having a finance charge is a retail installment contract. This means you are buying on the installment plan and that you agree to pay the installments as the contract

Look for these items when you read the contract: Amount Financed, Finance Charge, Deferred Payment Price. The Annkual Percentage Rate (APR) is the

By Texas law, any retail installment contract should list these items on it. If you do not see these items or do not fully understand the contract, do not sign it. The items are Repayment Schedule, Late Payment Insurance Penalty, Agreements and Security.

Before you sign a contract, these always follow guidelines. Deal only with an honest, fair business. Do not believe what someone promises, unless it is written in the contract. Do not sign a contract until all blank spaces are filled in. Be suspicious if the salesperson says you must sign now. Keep your copy in a safe place. If you cannot make your payment for any reason, talk it over with the seller

A credit contact can be enforced in courts of law. You are responsible for whatever you sign - do not let a fast-talking salesperson tell you otherwise. Your signature is your most valuable possession - use it

### Good shoes can prevent pronation

Dear Dr. Donohue: I have been running for a couple of months now, and I have developed pains along the fronts of my legs. A neighbor, who also jogs, tells me I am pronating when I run. Can you explain this, and how to correct for it? - J.L.

You can tell by looking at a jogger's shoes if he is pronating and, if so, how badly. Look at your shoe soles. If you find excessive wear on the outside edges of the heels, you are pronating

As you run, your heels are striking the surface at an angle. When that occurs, the heel tends to roll inward. You are not alone. Most runners overpronate. It is especially common if the runner has even slightly flat feet, which really means weak arches.

Much of the foot and leg pain runners report is from overpronation. The inrolling of the heels places extra stress on the muscles and bones of the legs. That, in turn, causes the shin splints, a tiny tearing away of muscle from the bone. It is a most disabling injury.

Besides its potentially-damaging effects on the legs, pronation, even if it causes no physical problems, should be corrected. It can cause premature leg muscle fatigue,

and one can lose valuable seconds in short-distance running, especially. In longer runs it can pare full minutes from one's time.

Severe pronators need shoes with wedges that stabilize the heel to correct for the in-rolling effect. The wedge stops the heel from rolling from the outside of the foot toward the inside as the foot flattens out on impact. It is called a varus wedge. Commercially-made varus wedges may not be available everywhere. You may have to have a specially-made insert, an orthotic, fashioned for you.







The head teller at First National Bank is Oleta Payne, who has worked at the bank since 1967. She supervises other tellers and is an assistant cashier. Oleta is responsible for seeing that the teller windows are open and running every morning. She must make sure that all tellers are in balance before they leave for the day. A teller must count everything in his or her window plus rolling coins and strapping bills into groups of fifty or one hundred. Oleta says she will have to work until 7 or 8 p.m,. if one of the tellers is "out

of balance." Sometimes it takes several hours to find the problem. Mondays are the busiest days at the windows. Oleta says, "Customers

come get their money on Friday and bring it in on Monday. Hylton, Texas is no longer on the map, but that is where Oleta was born and where her father farmed until she was twelve years old. She was the baby



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
