## City Awards Pact For Library Work

At the regular meeting of the Friona City Council on Monday, February 10, city officials awarded the bid for the City Library's renovation and expansion to Clint Cox Construction Co. of Farwell.

Cox, formerly associated with A&M Building systems of Clovis, now independently operates in the Farwell-Clovis area. Clint is the son of David and Imogene Smith of Friona. The bid accepted was in the amount of \$61,643.

U. V. Construction of Friona, operated by Uriel Vega, was the other contractor submitting a bid. "The city appreciates the bidders for their time and effort they expended," said a spokesman.

This cooperative project between the City of Friona and Friends of the Friona Public Library began in 1992 when they jointly purchased the former post office building (1955-75) from Sol Taylor Enterprises of Fort Worth with plans of future expansion in mind.

The building is located on the corner of Seventh and Euclid Streets, and is adjacent to the library. The present library building was funded by the Friends of the Library in 1982, and was constructed by Lewellen Construction Co. Of its \$75,000 cost, \$35,000 was from local public donations, \$30,000 was from grant monies received, \$10,000 was from City Revenue-Sharing Funds, and the building was built on land donated by Friona State Bank.

Funds for the current project will come from the City of Friona's Library Building Escrow account, which the city started in 1993 and to which they have

made yearly contributions.

Money also comes from the Friends of the Library special account, which includes memorial donations, fund raisers (cookbook sales, doll raffles, book sales, Carol Ellis original oil raffle, "donation jar" receipts, etc), as well as donations from the general public.

"Current funds available will pay for the renovation and connection of the two buildings, but more funds are needed for the planned outside renovations, in order to make the blending of the buildings as attractive and smooth as possible, plus parking improvements," stated librarian Darla Bracken.

Donations to this fund are welcome, and are being solicited by the Friends of the Library, Mrs. Bracken added. Donations of \$500 or more will be permanently recorded and displayed on the "Building Appreciation Plaque" at the Library.

"We would like to acknowledge that it has been through the continued support and generosity of the citizens of Friona, not only as taxpayers, but also as concerned citizens desiring to work together to provide better public services for the people of our community that we have the level of library service we have today," Mrs. Bracken added.

"We want to express our sincere gratitude and appreciation to all who have contributed to this process in any way. We want you all to be able to share in the pride we will have in our new library facility," the City Librarian concluded.

## Police Arrest Suspect In Allsup's Robbery

Acting on a lead, Friona Police have arrested Vivian Cisneros, Jr., 24, for the January 11 robbery of the west Allsup's store.

Allsup's clerk Tory Snyder was seriously beaten during the early morning robbery, resulting in an undisclosed amount of money taken.

According to Police Chief Randy Gerles, Cisneros was raised and lived in Friona, and was visiting Friona at the time of the robbery.

When case investigation identified Cisneros as a suspect, an arrest warrant was issued. Friona Police Captain Tim Roberts and Sergeant Steve Jones traveled to the Houston area last weekend and arrested Cisneros at a residence in Humble, Texas. They were assisted in the arrest by the

Texas Rangers.

Cisneros, whose bond was set at \$75,000, was returned to Friona by the two officers, booked into Friona jail, and subsequently transferred to the county jail in Farwell, where he awaits a grand jury hearing on aggravated assault charges.

Snyder picked Cisneros' picture from a police lineup and identified him as being in the store prior to the robbery. Police officials say that Cisneros has admitted to the robbery.

At press time, Tory Snyder continues to improve and has been released from the hospital, however he is still under regular doctor's care for the serious head wounds suffered during the incident.

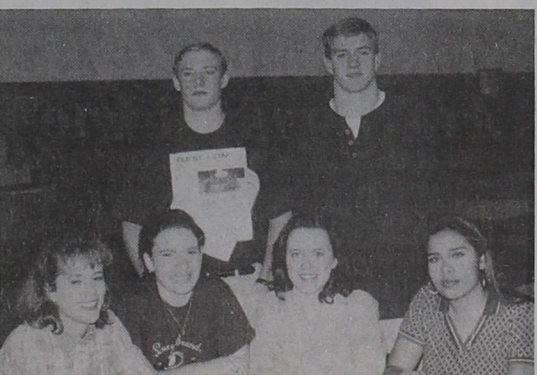

## Friona City Council Acts On Several Matters

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Monday, February 10, at Friona City Hall.

The audit report, which had been tabled at the last meeting, was brought for discussion. Randy Fields gave the audit report and answered council questions. Taylor moved to accept the audit report for Fiscal Year 1995-96, McCoy seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Jo Blackwell gave a Prairie Acres report and answered questions from the council. Her report was received with thanks.

The council considered bids received in Library renovations. (See details in separate article). The council then heard from members of the Friona Youth

Commission and PRPC representative Vince Hernandez concerning the application of a Criminal Justice Grant to hire a Human Resources Director for the city.

Funds from the grant would pay the first year's salary of the individual and it would be his responsibility to solicit funds from other sources to fund some sort of building for youth activities.

After questioning Mr. Hernandez concerning certain aspects of the grant, Gurley moved to pass a resolution allowing for the application for a Criminal Justice Grant. McCoy seconded, motion passed unanimously.

The council considered proposals received for engineering services for the Parks and Wildlife grant.

After score sheets were reviewed, McCoy made a motion to select McKay Engineering for the park grant project subject to contract review and approval.

After a discussion, Taylor made a motion to call for a joint election with the Friona ISD for the election of city officers in the May election. Gurley seconded and motion passed unanimously.

Council then considered a variance request from Roy Don Smith to place a small crafts shop in his home at 404 Ash.

During the city manager's report, items discussed included a speaker for the April TML meeting; the water and sewer fund; this year's TDCA grant; a report from Chief Gerles; financial statements.

# Friona Flashbacks

## 70 Yrs Ago-Feb. 18, 1927

At least one local farmer and stock raiser, Mr. Floyd T. Schlenker, whose farm is 14 miles west of Friona, has met with success in his efforts to grow sweet clover on the Plains. Mr. Schlenker wished to grow some pasture for his registered spotted hogs, so he sowed his clover broadcast, and then planted it to oats with a disc drill. The oats came up first, then offered

some protection for the clover, which followed. The hogs grazed the oats, and by the time they were all gone, the clover was large enough to furnish grazing for the rest of the season. \*\*\*\*\*

## 65 Yrs Ago-Feb. 12, 1932

The streets of Friona are being gradually improved in more ways than just simply dragging them at intervals. One of the best improvements that is being made is the concrete crossings that are being put in places where they are most needed. One of these permanent crossings was placed across Sixth Street, at its intersection with main, from the City Drug Store to the T.J. Crawford Store. Last week there was a crossing and concrete dip placed across Fifth Street from the Friona State Bank to the Maurer store. \*\*\*\*\*

## 55 Yrs Ago-Feb. 13, 1942

Basketball and bonds form a smooth mixture, according to members of the Friona Lions Club, who announced a sale of \$2,350 in bonds at the basketball game at the high school gym Monday night. Facilities of Emergency Crop Loan office were made more convenient for farmers of the Friona area this week, when officials of the government agency announced they would set up an office in Friona at the First State Bank. \*\*\*\*\*

## 45 Yrs Ago-Feb. 14, 1952

Parmer County citizens plan to get the vote in 1952, if poll tax payments can be termed indicative. The tax collector's office has reported 2112 poll taxes paid, plus 46 exemptions. This is a dedicated increase from the 1916 paid in 1951 and 2019 paid for the 1948 election. Construction workers moved to Friona Monday to begin immediate construction of the new high school building. \*\*\*\*\*

## 40 Yrs Ago-Feb. 14, 1957

Fifty persons attended a meeting of Hub community residents at the Methodist annex Friday evening. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the possibility of building a community center. Bill Wooley acted as presiding officer, and the Hub Community Assn. was organized. Wooley was elected president of the association; James Mabry is first vice president, Dean Bingham second vice president and Melba Burleson, secretary-treasurer. \*\*\*\*\*

## 35 Yrs Ago-Feb. 15, 1962

Political fever hit the area. Announcements were carried for B.M. Nelson, Dimmitt, for state representative. Previously announced were Bill Clayton, Springlake, and W.T. (Bill) Millen, Muleshoe; J. Frank Ford, Hereford, for state representative (Republican ticket). For the first time in recent history, there is a large number of Republican entries and a Republican primary will be held in Parmer County this year. \*\*\*\*\*

## 30 Yrs Ago-Feb. 16, 1967

Rev. W.G. (Bill) Burton, pastor of Friona's First Baptist Church for the past six and one-half years, tendered his resignation during the morning service at the church last Sunday. Honored by the Friona Chamber of Commerce last Thursday were W.L. Edelman, man of the year; Mrs. Frank Spring, woman of the year; Iola Nelson, most courteous employee and Mal Manchee, teacher of the year. \*\*\*\*\*

Sincerely, Kenneth Neill p.s. I always wondered why some folks shopped out of town. Now we know-it's boredom.

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

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# Out Here

It's about water. It's about perseverance. It's about love, family, and remembering.

Regardless of your race color, creed, or religion, regardless of your actual or perceived status in life, there is a message in this simple story for you.

Sometimes as a writer, you find a piece of writing

that you like and you say, "I wish I had written that". This is one of those. Thanks for the time off. See you next week.

**MORENO VALLEY, Calif.**—Valentine's Day is a time to say "I Love You".

Some people purchase candy or a card, and others buy gold trinkets to adorn the body. The modes of expressing love are infinite.

In time for this Valentine's Day, Maria, a Mexican immigrant who lives alone in the United States, has completed an act of love for her parents that is expressed in a different way.

Maria's family lives near a small town in southern Mexico called San Cristobal. They are very poor. Once, when food was scarce, her eight brothers and sisters shared one egg among them.

Their home had no running water, and twice each day family members walked a mile to a river to bring water for cooking, bathing, and drinking.

Toting 20 pounds of liquid in pails for long distances makes the body ache, especially the arms, Maria remembers. Yet that is how her family has obtained water for generations.

Sometimes when the rains come, the river overflows and makes fetching water dangerous. Debris, and sometimes cows and burros

are swept away by the strong current and make the water unfit to drink.

Retrieving water can be a traumatic experience. Maria tells how bulls often roamed along the riverbank. There is no leash law for bulls in San Cristobal.

If a hostile bull charged her, there would be no water for washing dishes or drinking that day.

Two years ago, beckoned north by an aunt, Maria left home. After winning a game of cat and mouse with the *migra* at the U. S. border, she reached her destination: a Town in Southern California where many of her relatives have formed a San Cristobal annex. A few days after arriving, Maria found a job caring for an infant.

Her *tia's* house was saturated with other relatives. When she heard about a room for rent with another family, Maria moved.

It was 10X10, with its own bathroom and running water. She didn't have to make a treacherous journey just for a glass of water.

In bed at night, Maria's thoughts centered on San Cristobal. One night, recalling the onerous treks to fetch water, she decided to purchase a well for her family back home.

Most of her younger siblings had moved away, too, and her elderly parents had assumed the burden of hauling water from the river. A well would be the perfect gift.

Sending regular installments of money to her parents put restraints on Maria's life here in El Norte. She didn't go to the movies or buy clothing that people in the novelas--Mexican soap operas--wear.

Other than for necessary expenses, all of her earnings from child care went home. She has yet to treat herself to a meal in a restaurant.

Recently, after a year, there was enough money to begin construction. A well-digger, the only one in town, was engaged.

A large drill poked a hole through the earth to reach a fresh spring. When the electric pump was installed, water gushed from the ground.

On that day, her family ceased depending on the temperamental river for water.

Now, each morning, Maria's parents walk a short distance to the well and extract water with ease. They no longer have to combat an angry river that claims the lives of burros, or flee from the menacing bulls.

Thanks to their distant daughter with the huge Valentine heart, life in San Cristobal is a little more comfortable.

## YOUR EYES



### Seeing In 3-D

Stereopticon pictures were the wonder of the 19th century. Two almost-identical pictures, viewed through a contraption with aimed lenses, presented a three-dimensional effect. Fact is, that's pretty much the way our eyes work.

Six external muscles that control each eye direct them both to a target, whatever it is we want to look at. If the muscles are not coordinated as they should be, depth perception is reduced and many of our activities become extra difficult.

The optometrist's complete examination will determine the cause of the problem. Sometimes vision training may be prescribed to help the eyes learn to work as a team. Corrective lenses may be used, too, to help align the two eyes. Occasionally, in older people, a cataract may be closing off the vision in one eye. After the cataract is dealt with, a contact lens or implant usually will be inserted to replace the opaque lens that was removed.

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
