## School recovers after mandated tuition hike

When law mandated that tution fees at the SouthWest Collegiate Institute for the Deaf be raised to \$8,750 per year per out-of-state student things looked gloomy for the fledgling deaf

Since its beginning the school has depended on out-of-state students to

bolster it enrollment and it was feared the tution hike would prevent many non-residents from attending the school. SWCID had optimistically predicted a fall enrollment of 180 before the hike, but when news of the considerably

tuition rise came out predictions fell However, things are looking up at SWCID today as preliminary

Poles demonstrate WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Thousands of demonstrators defied

martial law and marched through Warsaw, Gdansk, Wroclaw and Nowa Huta today to mark the second anniversary of Solidarity. Police fired tear gas, water cannons and what appeared to be concussion grenades at the protesters, witnesses said.

Police called through bullhorns demanding that a crowd marching on

Warsaw University disperse, then fired tear gas when they refused. Witnesses said the marchers, who chanted Solidarity slogans, dispersed and then regrouped at several points and resumed marching through a blue haze of tear gas.

Solidarity leaders who went underground with imposition of martial law Dec. 13 called for the demon-See Poles, page 2-A

Dr. Hays said the school has picked up a number of Texas students. He


said in-state students now compromise approximately 60 percent of SWCID's enrollment, whereas a year ago Texans accounted for only 30 percent on the school's students. This does mean; however, that out-ofstaters attending the school have dropped approximately 30 percent evidently victims of the lofty tuition.

Acting Vice President at SWCID, Sam Hill, regarded the enrollment with mixed emotions.

"Since we have more students than predicted — that's good, but I feel bad for those students who have a year or two years invested that won't be able to come back," Hill said.

He said the mood at SWCID was "very optimistic" and that students and parents had been "very supportive" of the school's attempts to keep enrollment levels up.

Hill said he probably would have final registration figures by the end of the week and he expected "a few more students" by then.

## Egyptian studies U.S. agricultural methods

An Egyptian plant virologist stopped at the USDA Big Spring Wind Erosion and Moisture Conservation Unit yesterday as part of his four-month educational visit to the United States. Ibrahim I.M. Hassan said he was trying to learn as much as possible to take back to help his countrymen.

Hassan met with Bill Fryrear, superintendent of the Big Spring field station, to discuss farming problems in Egypt and in Texas. Hassan, who has a masters in agricultural science, works with the Plant Pathology Institute at the Mallawi Research Station in middle Egypt. Hassan was escorted by J.T. Leach of Texas Tech University.

The Egyptian scientist just finished nine weeks of classes at Northwestern Illinois University where he studied everything from computers to agricultural engineering and marketing. "I am receiving lots of information in different areas," Hassan said in his articulate but accented English. "I can't always apply (techniques) in my country, but I look to the principle and ask: 'How can I modify what I have to work?'

Hassan presently is working in Egypt on a United Nations project with other scientists. The project is engaged in a four-year effort in a small village with poor crop yields and a low standard of living. "We want to achieve a goal of development for the village, "Hassan said. "We want to find where the break in the (food) chain is so we can fix it." Egypt is covered with agricultural research stations, according to

Hassan, working to improve the production of the myriad of crops in the Middle East country. Cotton, sugar cane, fruit, wheat, corn, rice, vegetables and beans are but a few of the crops grown in this "desert"

One interesting aspect of farming in Egypt is the use of manual labor in picking cotton and other crops. The long-staple cotton is picked twice during the long growing season and "costs the government lots of money, Hassan said. Children are held out of school by law until the second pick is

'We have a problem of a shortage of hand labor," Hassan said. "We try to introduce machines." Machinery is used in all phases of the planting process except harvesting, he added

Hassan's work in the village is to teach the farmers how to work as one unit and adapt new, better techiques of farming. "We want them to cooperate and we will leave after four years and leave all the machinery," Hassan said. The plant pathologist stressed the project was

"We're charging them less than it costs to show them it works, then we raise the price," Hassan said with a laugh.

Hassan expressed amazed admiration for Americans and American farmers after being in the states for nine weeks. "One people working hard, these people like their country. It's the best place in the world, Hassan said. "Over 200 or 300 years ago, nothing was here, now it's very good. We've had several centuries; what'd we miss?'

The scientist listed the advantages Egypt had over American farmers in addition to centuries of development: land, water, labor force, 11-month growing season. "What is missing is the desire for our country," Hassan said. "Why haven't we reclaimed the desert? Why haven't our family farmers responded to new trends?

Egypt needs more of its 48 million inhabitants for Egypt, Hassan said. The farmers unfortunately lack education, he added. The educational projects like the village program and his studies abroad are attempts to educate those farmers. Hassan said. Putting scientists in the villages, working from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., is to help farmers become better at their

## Only three Hatitians will be moved here

At first there were 10 and now there are three.

A few weeks ago the Big Spring Ministerial Alliance had hoped to sponsor 10 Haitians until the refugees' deportation cases could be heard by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization service. But now it appears that only three of the requested 10 will be making their homes in Big Spring in the next few

According to Rev. Guy White, the other seven Haitians probably will be sponsored by their own family members who have already settled in the United States, Evidently, family members who were aware of their relatives' presence in the holding camps asked for sponsorship at the same time as the ministerial alliance. The INS, believing the Haitians would be better off with family, ruled in

favor of family sponsorship. Two Haitians, Augistin Jean and Moise Lubin, have been in Big Spring since Aug. 22 and a third Haitian is expected to arrive this Friday. Jean and Lubin have been staying at the

Once they are settled here the Haitians will have to attend periodic hearings in Midland to determine their citizenship status. Chris McCormick, a Midland attorney, and a battery of five other lawyers have agreed to act as coordinating counsel for the Haitians, Rev. White said.

Persons turning their television sets on Labor Day may be a little confused since KMID and KTPX are switching affiliates then. KMID will begin broadcasting the American Broad-casting Company while KTPX will go to the National Broadcasting Com-

KTPX, channel 4 in Big Spring (13 on cable) and channel 9 in Odessa, will be the first to make the switch as it begins with NBC's "Today Show" Sept. 6. KMID, channel 2, will follow the Jerry Lewis telethon at 8 p.m. with an ABC NCAA football game.

According to KMID station manager John Foster, the move to ABC was keeping with the station's desire to provide viewers with the best possible programming and to in-corporate the newest broadcast technology."The ABC television network is number one nationwide, which certainly signifies that telecasting ABC programming is a worthwhile venture, "Foster said. Foster said ABC's goal was to ex-

plore new technological advances

while maintaining an entertainment stance. "That aim exactly parallels KMID's goal," Foster said.

KMID will be only one of six television stations in the nation using 100 percent satellite programming after Labor Day, Foster said. "Viewers will see a clear, stable picture on their television set," Foster

KMID General Manager Ray Herndon said the afternoon shows would not change and the news team would continue to broadcast its local news program.

For KTPX, the move to NBC was to bring to the area the kind of programming it desired, KTPX station manager Bob Good said. "NBC, in West Texas, is traditionally stronger than ABC. We feel that NBC's type of programming is more attuned to people in this area," Good

Good said KTPX planned to offer the full range of NBC programming including programs currently not carried on local NBC broadcasts. 'The David Letterman Show,

#### Wheeler reunion set

Of course, John and Nettie are no longer living, but the family has decided it will gather once again to honor the Wheeler heritage.

John Wheeler was the pioneer farmer in the Coahoma area. When he settled on his farm north of Coahoma near Signal Mountain many years ago there was not a fence between his place and Big Spring. Wheeler lived in the Coahoma area for 37 years and watched the country turn from prairie occupied by longhorn cattle to an area encompassing farms and families

After 32 years of being on the shelf the Wheeler family dusted off the family reunion ritual to honor John and Nettie's wedding date. After more than a year of preparation the celebration will get under way on Labor Day. For many of the Wheeler descendants it will be the first time many of them have seen one another.

Festivities will begin Friday, Sept. 3 with a "meet and greet" session from 6-9 p.m. at Garrett Hall at First United Methodist Church. ## Mexican store boycott looms as protest of cost of living

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Thousands of unsigned leaflets distributed in the metropolitan area here urged housewives to boycott stores today and Wednesday to protest the high cost of living brought on by two devaluations within six months.

Some leaflets accused merchants of taking advantage of Mexico's economic crisis by marking up prices indiscriminately while others blamed

the government for alleged inability to cope with inflation soaring about 60 percent. It was not known how effective the

strike could be. Government officials did not comment on the movement and Mexico's Televisa news network, which usually follows a government line, urged people not to listen to unfounded rumors.

Two weeks ago, hundreds of

Mexican merchants along the U.S. border staged a one-day strike to protest hardship brought on by the devaluations totaling 65 percent and exchange controls introduced by the government to keep scarce dollars from being taken out of the country. Americans also were reported to be buying up basic foodstuffs because of the favorable dollar rate.

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U.N. Command said. "I once again make it clear that Pfc. (Joseph T.) White requested political asylum from our side," the senior North Korean representative to the Military Armistice

Commission was quoted as saying. Unsatisfied with the North Korean answer, U.S. military officials repeated their request for an interview

"The other side's unwillingness to address the question is unacceptable," said U.S. Rear Adm. James G. Storms III, the senior U.N. Command delegate to the Military Armistice Commission, "We have asked for an interview because we are interested in having Pfc. White speak for

The U.N. command had initially reported that White, 20, from St. Louis, Mo., was "apprehended" by the North Koreans in the demilitarized zone. Monday's announcement said the meeting was sought "to determine whether he is in North Korea of his own free will."

"This is a patriotic boy," Kathleen White said. The Whites showed reporters a letter their son wrote 10 days ago to a long-time friend, Paul Plummer. It described his experiences around the demilitarized zone and gave no

indication that he was unhappy or disillusioned.

The Army said White joined the service in October, 1981, was stationed in Korea in March, 1982, and had no record of medical or disciplinary problems.

White reportedly was on civil police duty in the demilitarized zone Saturday, a task routinely performed by South Korean and American soldiers. White belongs to the U.S. 2nd Infantry Division, the only major American ground combat unit still stationed in South Korea.

Military officials here said there have been four defections by Americans to North Korea since the 1950-53 Korean War ended with an uneasy armistice agreement. No peace treaty has ever been signed. ## PLO exodus ends 3 days early

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - The last remnants of the PLO prepared to leave west Beirut today, ending the guerrilla evacuation three days ahead of schedule. Israeli jets, meanwhile, shot down a Syrian MiG 25 near

About 600 guerrillas assembled for departure by ship for North Yemen after another 600 sailed from Beirut for the Syrian port of Tartus aboard the Greek ferry Paros. PLO chief Yasser Arafat sailed for Greece Monday.

Arafat's top security chief, Salah Khalaf, and chief of staff, Brig. Gen. Saad Sayel, were among those leaving by

Syrian troops also completed a two-day overland evacuation from west Beirut. This put the Syrian-PLO pullout three days ahead of the two-week schedule drawn up by the United States.

Associated Press correspondent Daniel Grebler reporting from the town of Rabieh, seven miles northeast of Beirut, said the falling MiG tore off the roof of a fourstory apartment building and shattered a bedroom wall on the fourth floor. None of the tenants was hurt, he said.

Police told Grebler one of the two pilots bailed out and was captured near the Israeli-held mountain resort town of Aley, nine miles east of Beirut, and the other's body was trapped in the wreckage.

The Israeli military command, in a communique issued in Tel Aviv, identified the plane as a Syrian MiG-25 "Foxbat" on a photographic mission in Lebanese air-

But the pro-Israeli Voice of Lebanon Radio said the downed plane was a MiG-23.

The radio station, run by the rightist Christian Phalange Party, said warships lying off the Beirut coast fired surface-to-air missiles at intruding Syrian planes over the capital before Israeli jets scrambled for the dogfight. It did not identify the warships.

Besides Israeli gunboats, the Beirut port is guarded by seven to nine warships of the American 6th Fleet and two French navy frigates that are part of the international peacekeeping force supervising the PLO evacuation.

It was the first Israeli-Syrian dogfight since June 9, when Israel claimed 83 Syrian jets were shot down over east Lebanon in assaults that wiped out Syrian SAM-6 anti-aircraft missile batteries stationed in the Bekka

## Lawmakers tackle jobless fund crisis

Next week, the Legislature will go into emergency special session to avoid a \$150 million tax increase set to take effect

The unemployment trust fund, which guarantees Texans who lose their jobs through no fault of their own up to 26 weekly payments of between \$24 and \$147, has become seriously depleted due to the economic conditions brought on by the

Something needs to be done, and built into the fund is a provision that would raise the employers' tax which supports it unless the Legislature acts.

According to figures released by the Texas Employment Commission, the unemployment fund is paying out some \$60 million a week. They expect the balance to be so low that the cost per worker of supporting the fund will skyrocket (Texas at this time has the lowest average cost per worker for the fund in

State officials have been looking at a number of possible solutions to the problem. Ideas that have been suggested and ruled out include a lowering of the benefits, the injection of surplus state funds into the unemployment fund and, finally, a change in the tax formula.

Most likely it seems the state will look for help from the federal government and try to retrieve some of the state money to bolster the fund. The federal jobless fund is, like those of the states, paid by employers and, alas, being depleted.

But some action is needed, and we hope the Legislature will act quickly to solve the problem.

#### Seems like old times

Every so often the people in Hollywood go into their vaults to find a dusty, old-fashioned movie script, They sign bright new stars, spice up the language, free up the sex a little and TADA

'The Way We Were' was one, 'Rocky" another.

This year's model is "An Officer and a Gentleman," the story of an unhappy college graduate who tries to add dignity to his life by entering officer training school.

He is neither officer material nor much of a gentleman at the beginning, but thanks to a tough drill sergeant and an upright girl who works at a nearby factory, he is well on his way to becoming both by the end

It doesn't come off as corny as it sounds thanks to the screenwriter and director (Taylor Hackford and Douglas Day Stewart respectively). They seem to have known they had a hokey plot but decided to film it at peak capacity. The performances are all energetic and interesting and the characters have more depth than you

Richard Gere stars as the officer candidate with the unhappy childhood. In some of his performances ("Yanks," "American Gigilo") Gere has been pretty dull. but here he lets himself go. His character is not a complete jerk at the beginning or a Prince Charming at the end. They have tried to make him as realistic as possible. (By the way, as in 'The Way We Were' most of the actors are years too old for their

Debra Winger gives a low-key

performance as a local girl who softens Gere's heart. The role is a bit ambiguous (she's obviously out to snag an officer but talks like she's disgusted by the unwholesomeness of it all), but Ms. Winger is a beautiful actress who makes her poor-girl-withbig-dreams character plausible and

And then there's Louis Gossett Jr. To prepare for his role as the drill instructor with a repertoire of the filthiest cadence calls in military history, he reportedly went through actual Marine training. He's tough and degrading, but he obviously cares about his candidates - just like a good DI should

An Officer and a Gentleman' is really a dressed-up soap opera, but there is pleasure to be had from seeing it all done so expertly. The movie tries as hard to satisfy as any movie can. It generally succeeds.

You could call it a movie for the Reagan Era. It is patriotic and moralistic — you cheer the characters for being decent to each other. Whether your not you swallow it all is

The ending is a pull-out-the-stops happy one, complete with soaring music by composer Jack Nitzsche (who did a very similar score for "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest"). It will have you suppressing either a sob or a giggle.

It's hard not to admire the movie's craftsmanship and heart, even though you may come out thinking you'd seen it before. Audiences are given every opportunity to love it. Most are taking that opportunity.





#### What if Russia declares a peace?

Now that I have dealt with the threat of accidental war and what it could mean to all of us, I would like to deal with a subject that is even more frightening than accidental war. It is accidental peace.

Suppose someone got his signals mixed and by accident started a peace. You may say it's impossible, that it could never happen. But as men keep fooling around with things they don't know about, as our communications systems become more complex, as the pressures on the leaders who hold the key to our future become greater, there is always the chance that someone might set off a peace that no one could control

In a new book that I'm, writing called "Fail Peace," Thave presented just such a situation. I tell how, with all the safeguards both sides have at their command, someone triggers off the greatest peace that man has ever

My story opens in Geneva during one of the many disarmament conferences. A lowly clerk in the American delegation pushes the wrong button on his decoding machine, and discovers that the Russians have launched what could possibly be a peace offer. He reports it to his superiors, who immediately call

'We can't be sure,'' the ambassador tells the President, "but we think the Russians are about to declare peace.

"It could be a false alarm," the President says. "We've had these alerts before. "Yes, sir, but I think we should be

prepared in case it's the real thing. "All right, I'll put Operation Good-Will to Men into effect.

THE PRESIDENT pushes a button that sounds an alarm in bases all over the country. "Now hear this, now hear this," commanders announce to their men, "a Russian peace proposal has been spotted over Geneva. This may be a test or it could mean the real thing. If it's the real thing, be prepared to cancel all defense contracts and destroy all stockniles in

In the meantime, the Russians have received word that the Americans have put their armed forces on a peace alert, and they get ready to meet the attack. Five Russian divisions are demobilized, an atomic testing station in the Urals is destroyed, and 40 new Soviet sub marines are flooded and sunk

The Americans pick up this information, and they immediately sink 14 of their own missile cruisers, slash the tires on every SAC bomber and order all Polaris warheads to be destroyed at sea.

The Russians immediately react

and start breaking up their ICBM missile sites, demobilize another 200 divisions, and kick all army officers out of the Presidium.

The President closes down the Pentagon, furloughs the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and fires the United States Marine Corps Band.

Both sides are eyeball to eyeball, headed hell-bent toward a peaceful showdown, and nobody blinks.

At the last minute the error is

discovered. The Russian peace proposal in Geneva, it turns out, is not the real thing. The President is aghast. Is it too late to stop the destruction of the

United States military machine? How will the Russian Premier act when he realizes the disarmament he has been forced into was all a mistake? The President decides there is only

one thing to do. He telephones Moscow and tells the Soviet leader there has been an accident and chances of peace are imminent. He asks the Russian if there is anything he can do to avert an all-out detente.

The Soviet leader is sympathetic. "It's nobody's fault," he says. "We'll start from scratch again. Neither one of us can afford an all-out peace at this

Relieved, everyone goes back to doing things the way they were doing before. New safeguards are put on the decoding machines to prevent such an accident from happening again.

#### Hashish crop at stake

WASHINGTON - The military focus in the Middle East has shifted from Beirut to the Bekaa Valley in eastern Lebanon, where Syria and

Israel are building up their forces. At stake is one of the most fertile areas in the whole Middle East. But the most important crop isn't melons

or wheat; it's hashish. Intelligence sources in Israel, Lebanon and Washington agree that hashish production has increased since 1976, when the Syrians occupied the Bekaa Valley as a United Nations peacekeeping force. Some sources suggest that hashish is one reason

Syria wants to stay in the valley. A classified "narcotics intelligence estimate,".prepared with the help of the CIA and shown to my associate Dale Van Atta, estimates that the valley's annual production of hashish was 230 to 260 tons - almost double what it was before the Syrian occupation. Nearly 75 percent of the crop has been going to Egypt each year, the report notes.

"Generally, only one crop is grown per year," the narcotics report explains. "It is ... harvested from mid-August to mid-September, before the advent of the rainy season.

In other words, the Lebanese farmers are harvesting their crop right now; at least, they're trying to. The intelligence experts say this year's hashish crop isn't nearly as big as usual because of the Israeli invasion. But no one can even guess at the exact size of the crop because, as one report notes, "the flow of narcotics intelligence from Lebanon has been seriously curtailed because of the turmoil there.

Anywhere from 9,000 to 13,000 acres of the Bekaa Valley are devoted to cultivation of cannabis, the plant that produces marijuana and hashish. Because of the valley's lushness, an

acre yields a 3,080-pound crop. This can be transformed into more than a ton of marijuana, or 35 to 60 pounds of

WHEN THE SYRIANS moved in, some of the land abandoned by Christian villagers (was) confiscated by Moslem farmers and put into cannabis cultivation," the narcotics estimate reports. It adds that "the livelihood of two-thirds of the valley's population" depended directly on hashish cultivation under the Syrians.

Before the Israeli invasion, the Bekaa Valley was controlled "by approximately 20 family organizations," each of which had its own "well-armed, para-military force whose arsenals reportedly contain automatic weapons and, in some cases, tanks," the report states.

From the Bekaa Valley, the hashish is taken to the Lebanese ports of Beirut, Tripoli and Jounieh, where small craft like rafts or lifeboats deliver the stuff to ships waiting beyond the 12-mile limit.

Lebanese authorities have generally winked at the lucrative, illicit traffic. In fact, it is one of the ironies of Lebanon that the hashish trade has been one of the principal areas of close cooperation between Moslems and Christians.

"Traditionally, Christians have controlled most of the business and financial arrangements of the hashish trade, (including control of) two of the major hashish export cities in the north," says a classified government report. "Moslems, on the other hand, have been the hashish cultivators."

Clearly, this unholy alliance is still operational, waiting only for the Syrians and Israelis to settle their differences and let the hashish traffic



## Doctors ask high court to rule against abortion

WASHINGTON (AP) - Four major medical groups are asking the Supreme Court to declare wide-ranging abortion regulations unconstitutional when it

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reviews them in its upcoming term. The request was made in a "friend of the court" brief filed Monday by the American Medical Association, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, American Academy of Pediatrics and the Nurses Association of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists.

The brief was submitted in a case the Supreme Court is scheduled to hear this fall or winter regarding state laws in Virginia and Missouri and an ordinance in Akron, Ohio, which make abortions more difficult to get.

The medical groups said the regulations interfere with the right of the doctor and

his patient to decide the best course of treatment, including questions of when it is necessary to get an abortion.

"We hope we can curtail" these, Dr. James Breen, president-elect of the obstetricians and gynecologists' group, said at a news conference. He said the Akron ordinance "is the one

we chose to oppose" because it is par-ticularly "intolerable" and would force doctors to practice "bad medicine." The laws require that abortions for

women more than three months pregnant be done in a hospital rather than a clinic, where it would be cheaper. The Akron law also would require that

doctors tell prospective patients a list of "facts" about fetusus and abortions, many of which Breen said are incorrect, misleading or irrelevant.







#### 'Memory' drug: evidence not in yet

.Dear Dr. Donohue: I have read an article on nasal spray called vasopressin. I would like a definition of this and other details about it. The article said it sharpens memory. Would this be a safe product to help people who

have bad memories?—Ms. W.B.

Vasopressin is a brain hormone. It's other name is "anti—diuretic hormone" because it helps keep fluid in the body — the opposite action of the so—called water pills, which help remove fluid.

If the body does not produce vasopressin (in the pituitary gland) a condition called diabetes insipidus results. Enormous quantities of urine are passed. The treatment for diabetes insipidus is to supply the vasopressin in medicine form. And nasl spray is one of the ways it can be given. Diabetes insipidus, I should add, is an entirely different problem from diabetes (sugar) mellitus. Vasopressin is NOT used for that.

As to the effects of memory: This is being investigated. So far researchers have not proved beyond a shadow of a doubt that it really does do this. The drug is not licensed

for use as a memory enhancer in this country.

So what can I tell you? Although a few initial studies have had some positive things to say on this subject of memory potential for the elderly, it is far too early to make judgments or to endorse its use for that. Time will tell if it really does work, for whom it works best, and just how safe its use would be for that purpose. When and if that time comes, you will most likely read of it in your paper's news pages, if not here.

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am so frustrated. Depsite the fact that I take 10 glasses of water a day, I am troubled with constipation and end up having to take laxatives. I am a

female in my 70s. Any suggestions?-R. Lose your frustration by eating fiber. (Regular readers can move on to the next item.) Just drinking water is not going to do a whole lot for relief of your constipation. The digestive tract is quite long, from the stomach to the colon (large bowel). Much of the water drunk is abosrbed out of the tract before it gets to the colon, and it is in the colon where the food residue becomes hardened. What you have to do is find a way to trap some of that

moisture for the long residue voyage. You do that by eating fiber foods. That kind of food holds moisture. By fiber, I mean the undigestible part of vegetables, cereals, fruits. Bran and kidney or lima beans are good examples. There are even high—fiber tablets available. You might want to try those.

I'm not telling you to stop drinking water. I'm just telling you that without fiber, the water is not going to do much for your constipation. You may want to review the booklet "The Way To Stop Constipation." Other readers can order a copy by writing me care of the Big Spring Herald enclosing a stamped self—addressed envelope and

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

## Freed lifer wants 'peace and quiet'

BOSTON (AP) — George A. Reissfelder, exonerated by a dying man's statement and released after nearly 16 years in prison for murder, says he now wants some hardearned peace and quiet.

"I want to go somewhere and be by myself," he said, joking with reporters who crowded around him Monday as he headed for a beer and a celebratory lunch. Judge Paul K. Connolly had just dismissed the case against him in Suffolk Superior Court.

Reissfelder, 42, was convicted in 1967 of killing a Railway Express Agency clerk in a \$20,000 robbery, despite his claims that he was not at the scene and the testimony of a woman who said he was asleep at her home at the time of the robbery.

He was granted a new trial in June after new evidence was brought by his attorneys, Roanne Sragow and John F.

The new evidence included a priest's testimony that he heard Reissfelder's co-defendant, dying of leukemia in 1972, proclaim Reissfelder's innocence. The judge dismissed the case after Assistant Suffolk

County District Attorney John Kiernan said it was impractical in 1982 to try a case for a crime that occurred on 'I'm overjoyed to be out, and I just want to try and put it

all behind me and put my life back together again," Once a lifer with no chance of parole, Reissfelder said

his inmate friends at Walpole State Prison shared his happiness. About 15 relatives and friends had to wait eagerly for 45 minutes after the court proceeding for Reissfelder to be released.

"I'm really, really nervous," said Donna Reissfelder. 33, his sister-in-law. "But imagine how he must feel.



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## Man wounds self after spree in which 1 died

RESEARCH TRIANGLE PARK, N.C. (AP) — A former assembly worker for IBM Corp. was charged with murder and assault after a rampage with a rifle and firebombs at an IBM complex left one worker dead and four others injured, authorities said.

The suspect, Leonard D. Avery, 39, of Raleigh, shot himself in the head just before being arrested at a roadblock after a 10-mile freeway chase, police said. He was in stable condition early today at Durham County General Hospital after brain surgery, said hospital spokeswoman Ruth Harris

The incident was the second shooting spree in three months involving a former IBM employee.

Police said Avery, carrying a high-powered rifle and four firebombs, walked into the IBM complex and began firing Monday afternoon.

He was charged with murder, five counts of assault with intent to kill and two counts of assault with a firearm upon law enforcement officers, said a Durham County Sheriff's Department spokesman.

Michael F. Pandich, spokesman for local IBM operations, initally said Avery had worked as senior keyboard assembler for the firm and was "terminated" Aug. 19. Pressed later for details, Pandich said he would

neither confirm nor deny that Avery had been fired.

The dead man, Ralph A. Glenn Jr., 53, was a part-time minister and had tried to calm the gunman but was shot anyway, said another IBM employee, O.T. Weaver.

Another worker, Richard D. Martin, 51, was shot in the

chest and listed in critical but stable condition at Duke University Medical Center. Three other employees who received minor injuries were treated and released.

Pandich said as far as he knew, neither Martin nor Glenn had any professional relationship with Avery. But some IBM employees told reporters that Martin had been Avery's supervisor.

Avery, married and with two young children, had been deeply worried that his exposure to the chemical defoliant Agent Orange during the Vietnam war might endanger him and his children, said a neighbor who asked not to be

Another neighbor and co-worker, Ryland E. Grissom, said he saw Avery Friday and "he didn't look off the wall

The gunman, wearing military fatigues, entered one of the IBM buildings at about 1:30 p.m., "fired some shots" and detonated two incendiary devices, said Durham police investigator David Frey.

The man fired several shots in one building, shooting out several windows but hitting no one. He then entered an adjacent building, ignited two more firebombs, and shot two workers while others barricaded themselves in their offices, Frey said

#### Moderate California quake

SALINAS, Calif. (AP) — A moderte earthquake rumbled through the Monterey County region, the sixth temblor to jolt northern California in less than two weeks. No injuries or damage were reported from the Monday night quake.

The temblor registered a magnitude of 4 on the Richter Scale, indicating it was capable of moderate damage, according to the California Office of Emergency Services in Sacramento.

The epicenter of the quake was about 10 miles east of Salinas, according to R.B. Black, the emergency services warning officer.

The latest in a series of five recent quakes had been one with a 3.8 Richter reading on Saturday with an epicenter at Mount Diablo, more than 80 miles north of Salinas.

Frey said more than 12 shots were fired from the .45caliber semi-automatic rifle, which held a 32-round clip of ammunition. The bombs scorched walls and carpets but caused little damage otherwise, officials said.

After exchanging shots with sheriff's deputies in the parking lot, the gunman drove along Interstate 40 toward Raleigh with officers in pursuit.

Upon reaching the barricade, the man stopped his car. Police used loudspeakers to order him to surrender and took him into custody after he hung his hands from the car. Blood covered his face.

On May 28, another shooting spree at an IBM office in Bethesda, Md., left three people dead and six wounded after a man rammed his car through the doors and fired 150 shots using automatic weapons.

A former IBM employee, Edward Thomas Mann, 38, has been charged with multiple counts of murder, assault and handgun violations. The case has not yet gone to trial.

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
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

# Austin is hurting

so often plagued by injuries in her otherwise brilliant professional tennis career, entered the 1982 U.S. Open with yet another physical ailment.

The defending women's singles champion was scheduled to begin her run today for a third title in four years at the National Tennis Center in Flushing Meadow. But Austin's opening match with Catherine Tanvier was moved to Wednesday because the third-seeded Austin is suffering from tendinitis in her shoulder

"At the moment, it doesn't seem too serious," said Dr. Irving Glick, the tournament physician. "She has a little tendinitis in her shoulder. It started two or three days ago. If she didn't have to play this week or next. everything would be fine. But trying to play with something that bothers you can be unsettling.

In the last 18 months, Austin has suffered from various ailments, including a severe sciatic nerve condition which sidelined her for the entire 1981 winter tour.

Austin was not the choice to win the 101st edition of the Open by Rod Laver, who predicted that Wimbledon titlists Jimmy Connors and Martinva Navratilova will capture the singles titles here.

Laver, the only two-time winner of the Grand Slam — Wimbledon and the French, U.S. and Australian Opens believes Austin could provide the stiffest competition for Navratilova. A Navratilova-Austin matchup, if there is one, would occur in the semifinals.

Connors, who captured his second Wimbledon title earlier this year, is seeded second. But Laver, who won his first Grand Slam in 1962 as an

It marks the second straight year that Richard, once the most feared fastball pitcher in the major leagues, had been called up. But he has yet to pitch again in the major leagues.


Richard pitched earlier this season with the Class A Daytona Beach team, where he posted a 3-0 record and had 19 strikeouts in



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

One More Try' could use one

NEW YORK (AP) — Lucy Arnaz and Laurence Luckin bill are married in real life, so you ought to expect some electricity when they get together for a TV show

Instead, "One More Try" is an ordinary half-hour of gentle comedy, interrupted in the middle by an excruciatingly long lover's quarrel which ends with Didi throwing dishes and Adam busting his favorite pipe.

The plot is a familiar one, and there's nothing really new about the way the story unravels.

Didi. Miss Arnaz's character, and Adam, Luckinbill's, have been married before, to other people, and they're about to tie the knot themselves. The problem is, Adam's kids. Paul and Daniel, don't like that plan. If Adam is going to re-marry, they reason, it ought to be with Mom.

The New York City backdrop is at least appealing, and the atmosphere in this instance transcends the urban

"Are you Mrs. Margolin," Mr. Liebowitz, the elevator operator, asks Didi as she enters Adam's apartment. "Not yet," she replies. "Who am I to judge," Liebowitz says in characteristic big-city style.

The program's producers have at least tried to flavor One More Try" with entertaining characters, and in some instances their efforts are rewarded. Maurice Shrog is amusing as Liebowitz, and Antonia Rey is good for a laugh or two as a female cabbie.

Adam and Didi meet in a diner the morning after their spat and take separate tables. That leaves the cab driver in the middle.

"Idi Amin and Margaret Thatcher could get married," Adam reasons with the hack as intermediary. "All they'd have to do is change a little." "Crazy! "They don't even know each other.

The climactic scene — Adam and Didi are married in his apartment — makes the half-hour worthwhile. First, little Daniel, played by Benjamin Bernoy, leads Didi down the aisle clad in dark suit and sneakers. He's tossing petals at her feet, one at a time, until she boots him in the behind. He dumps the lot a handful at a time.

Judge Olivetti is double-parked and in a hurry "I understand you both have been married before," he says. "We all make mistakes. ... I join with your guests in wishing you all the best, and hope you don't mess up this

Olivetti hustles through the ceremony — there's no time  $\,$ for Adam and Didi to recite what they've prepared — and concludes, "I now pronounce you man and wife. Jeez," he adds, without a pause, "I hope I didn't get towed away."
"One More Try" undoubtedly was produced as a pilot

for a series, and CBS apparently still is in the market for promising programs for the fall. The network introduced a short-run series called "Filthy Rich" early in August, and the show did so well in the ratings that CBS bumped something called "Mama

"Filthy Rich" is about a family squabble for inheritance, literally over a dead man's body. That alone ought to improve the chances of "One More Try.
