SOMETIMES WE humans take a lot of things for granted, or fail to be impressed by natural wonders which are located "right in our backyard," so to speak.

I could be talking about Palo Duro Canyon--as many Panhandle residents are no doubt guilty of not taking time to go and enjoy the beauty of this area attraction.

Actually, I'm referring to the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge, located in southern Bailey County. This is somewhat closer to most of our readers than Palo Duro.

I hate to make the following admission--but it emphasizes my opening statement: Ye Editor lived as a young child just a stone's throw from the refuge. In fact, when we drove to and from Muleshoe, the first/last few miles of the refuge adjoined the dirt road, which intersected Highway 214.

For years, I had remarked to Carol that sometime I'd like to drive down to the refuge, and see the sandhill cranes, which come to the refuge area to over-winter. In fact, the cranes have been coming to our area to spend the winter for hundreds (maybe even thousands) of years.

Farmers and others who work outside are familiar with the cranes. You become used to hearing their distinctive shrill calls (garoo-garah, garoo-garah), as they pass overhead--southerly in late fall, northerly in February and March.

The second weekend of February, Carol and I finally had a day on a weekend with no obligations. It was the first one we could recall since last August. She said earlier in the week that we should make the trek to southern Bailey County, and see if the cranes were still around.

So we did--and they were! Paul's Lake, which is on the east side of Highway 214, just beyond the "bluff" south of Needmore (where the roadside park is located), is one of the larger gathering points for the sandhill cranes in the United States--perhaps the world.

This was getting toward the end of the winter season, but we were fortunate to be able to see probably 10,000 birds--on the lake and in the air.

We arrived at the lake around 5 p.m., which was an hour and one-half before sundown. The lake already had thousands of birds on the eastern edge, and you could see "strings" of cranes in the sky, on the horizon--dozens of different flocks--as far as the eye could see.

It was difficult for Ye Editor to decide which was the most impressive: the large number of birds on the lake, or those forming practically a "holding pattern," awaiting their turn to land.

The watch area is still 30-40 yards from the edge of the lake. We had brought binoculars, which were a fair tool for watching. A fellow "birder" offered those in our party to look through his scope, and by doing that we could see the birds' bright red forehead. This was the first time Ye Editor had been able to see this distinctive marking on the cranes.

The Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge hosts the largest concentration of sandhill cranes in the world. The birds, which stand three to four feet high, with wingspreads of six to seven feet, travel 30 to 35 miles during the day in search of left-over grain, plant roots, insects and rodents. In the evening they return to the lake to roost.

Teachers, Friends Lament Tragedy

Jason Slagle, 16, a junior at Friona High School, died at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo on Saturday morning, February 22, as a result of injuries received in a Friday night one-car accident six-miles southeast of Friona.

According to DPS Trooper Dean Fant, the accident occurred at approximately 9:30 p.m. Friday, February 21, near mile marker 138 on FM 3140.

Two other youths in the car, Rusty Peace and Alicia Smith, both of Friona, were also injured in the accident. Peace was taken by ambulance to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo where he was treated and released.

Miss Smith was transported to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona, where she was treated and released on Saturday afternoon.

Sheriff Rex Williams, one of the first on the scene, stated that the car, a 1991 Ford Escort, missed a curve, plunged into a ditch, and rolled end-over-end. At press time, DPS officials were still investigating who was driving the vehicle.

Smith and Peace managed to walk the approximately one-half mile to Friona Feed Yard where night watchman Noel Woods placed the call to emergency personnel.

Friends and fellow students struggled with the loss. School Principal Frank Belcher dismissed school at 1 p.m. last Monday to allow students and teachers to attend the 2 p.m. funeral. Belcher typified Slagle as a student who would do anything you asked him to do.

He and classmate Justin Grimsley were scheduled to compete in state competition as a cross-examination debate team in Austin on March 10.

Grimsley decided not to seek another debate partner. But he will assume Slagle's lead role in "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum", scenes from which Friona drama students will perform at a one-act play contest March 17.

Grimsley said, "It was a very hard decision to make but someone had to do it. Jason would have wanted us to go on."

According to drama teacher Joy Morton, "All the kids don't understand why this had to happen, but they know going on with the play and doing well with it would be what Jason would want."

Slagle had earned many honors in school, including being selected to attend the Hugh O'Brian Youth Foundation Leadership Seminar in Amarillo as a sophomore last year. A selection committee chose HOBY students based upon their potential for leadership.

Snowfall Melts Down To .29 Inch

An Arctic front brought snowfall to the Friona area the past week, with 2.5 inches of snowfall measured in the city.

The snow melted down to .29 inches of moisture in the city's official gauge. This brought February's moisture total to .66 inch, and the snowfall to four inches. For the calendar year, the moisture now totals 1.6, and the total snowfall is 16 inches.

CC Banquet Ticket Sales Begin Mon.



March 6--primary campus, 6:30-7:30 p.m.; elementary campus, 7-8 p.m.

On the junior high campus, parents will be able to visit with teachers and observe class work and projects. Sixth grade students will display circle designs that were completed in math. The science students will have lab projects available and social studies classes will display their projects in the classroom.

CRP Signup Is Somewhat Cloudy

Area farmers/ranchers are scheduled to begin signup for the new Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) on Monday at the FSA office in Farwell.

The new Farm Bill is changing the CRP program somewhat, and the changes have most farm officials scurrying, to say the least.

Parmer County F. S. A. director Curt Miller was unavailable to comment on the new program, as he was attending informational meetings in regard to the new regulations.

The CRP program was instigated in 1985, designed to encourage producers to plant long-term resource-conserving vegetation on eligible cropland to improve the soil, water and wildlife resources.

Congressman Larry Combest held a hearing Wednesday, February 26 in his House of Representatives Subcommittee at Washington, D.C.

Rep. Combest reported on the main points of the hearing Thursday morning during a conference call involving several newspaper publishers in his district. Bovina Blade/Friona Star publisher Bill Ellis took part in the discussion.

"The first and foremost problem with the release of the guidelines for the renewal of the CRP program is timeliness," Rep. Combest told the publishers. "When the new Farm Bill was passed,

the Department of Agriculture was instructed to issue the regulations for CRP within 90 days, which would have been last July."

However, Combest pointed out that the USDA missed the July deadline "by a few months," finally releasing the guidelines at the end of September. "Now it is March, 1997, and we are still waiting for some final rulings, with signup scheduled to begin March 3."

Signup runs only through March 28, and Combest doubts that all farmers who have been or will be involved with the CRP can decide within this time frame, how they will approach CRP, and know all of the details.

Combest sponsored the original CRP legislation in 1985, and has hailed the program as "One of the best examples of a successful government program that produces tremendous public benefit through a public/private partnership."

Combest pointed out that the new guidelines establish a complicated setup whereby land to be in CRP is "scored," using a point scale.

"We ran some numbers in Lubbock, at a meeting with CRP advisors, and came up with 78 points for an average farm. There is also an air quality statement. In areas such as those east of the Mississippi, the farms' rating might top the 200-mark." (Continued on Page 4)

High School To Give AP Tests

In May of 1997, Friona High School will administer Advanced Placement tests in seven subject areas to approximately sixty students. This will be the thirteenth year that these tests have been administered in the district and at no cost to the students.

Nationwide the Advanced Placement Program began in 1955 and to date more than six million students have taken nine million examinations. More than fifty per cent of U.S. secondary schools currently participate in the program. The AP Program was begun in Friona High School during the 1984-85 school year. From that time until May of 1996, the district has administered 474 tests to 311 students in seven different subject areas.

At present, FHS students are being prepared to take tests in calculus, chemistry, computer science, English language and composition, English literature and composition, Spanish language and U.S. government and politics.

Since 1985, more Friona High School students have taken A.P. exams than any AAA high school in the state.

The Advanced Placement Program is administered by the College Board. It is a cooperative educational endeavor between secondary schools and colleges and universities to expose high school students to college-level material in an AP course.

In May of each year, students are given an opportunity to show they have mastered the material by taking an exam. Colleges and universities can then grant credit, placement or both to students who achieve required scores.

Students benefit from taking AP courses by learning a subject in greater depth, developing skills that will be important to successful study in college, and demonstrating to colleges that they are willing to undertake challenges.

Colleges view AP students as better prepared academically for college courses and less likely to drop out of college. They see these students as ones who will specialize in majors with tougher grading standards and go into advanced studies such as Ph.D. programs, medicine and law.

The local students benefit from AP as a result of specialized training received by the AP teachers. Friona teachers are afforded the opportunity to attend week-long training seminars for preparation to teach these courses. In addition, pre-AP courses have been developed to begin earlier preparation for the AP offerings.

For example, there are pre-AP classes in ninth and tenth grade English in preparation for the AP courses in eleventh and twelfth grade. AP Spanish tests are administered to students who are taking their third year of Spanish. The calculus students will have had at least four years of math prior to beginning their AP calculus course.

The Advanced Placement Program can have a systematic impact on a school's curriculum and instruction. This affects all students, not just those enrolled in AP. Because it develops high standards for student achievement and provides a source for professional development, its benefit is far-reaching. Advanced Placement is not just a test or a course. It is a program.

Revision in the structure of basic rates governing fire insurance written in Friona has resulted in a considerable improvement that will save policy-holders money. The


Fire Dept. Holds Class

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



Combest Talks About CRP... Football Issue Here

Combest said. "Will the USDA have a 'cutoff' line below which farms will not qualify? We don't know," the congressman said.

Where farms will be placed depends on how many acres are involved, and if there are offsetting points. At the present time, there isn't nearly as many acres in CRP in the Mississippi area (as there are here). But how farmers in that area may respond to the new guidelines poses a threat to area farmers.

Combest personally would like for the USDA to postpone implementing the new guidelines for a year. "With the lateness of the details, I think it should be extended," Combest said. He indicated that he would sponsor a bill in this regard, but wondered

aloud of such a bill would pass both the house and senate, and not be vetoed by the president.

"President Clinton has said he might veto anything that would change the program drastically," Combest said.

"The farmers are in a real bind. This is a ten-year program they're looking at, and the USDA is expecting them to make decisions regarding the CRP when at present they don't even know the details," the congressman said.

One of the threats posed by the new CRP programs is that certain regions might opt to eliminate the program, in favor of planting more cotton, for example.

"If this happens, this could prove devastating to certain markets," Combest said.

Another factor in taking

land out of the CRP, farmers have indicated, is that land which has been in grass for the past 10 years cannot be worked and ready to plant in a short time, and a short time would be all they'd have, if they have to make certain decisions hurriedly.

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Parmer Co. Resident Writes From Bosnia

Guy Warren, III, of Friona was activated with his Civil Affairs Battalion out of Lubbock's Army Reserve Unit, for service in Bosnia.

He left Friona last November and after a brief stop in Ft. Bragg, N.C., the unit shipped out to Bosnia in late December.

While serving in Bosnia, Warren left behind his job at Wilbur-Ellis, wife Heidi, and children Guy IV, and Hannah.

We have sent him and his buddies some books, magazines, and newspapers, as well as a bag or two of hard candy.

Others in Parmer County have sent chocolate chip cookies, books and other useful items.

According to Heidi Warren, Guy may be able to come home by July, but nothing is certain yet.

Heidi said that on Fridays Guy has a meeting in Banja Luka and can call home via Cannon Air Force Base.

She and the kids talk to him often. Also he has a computer E-Mail address which is included in his letter below. We received the following two letters, written several weeks apart, last week.

We will keep you posted as time goes on if we hear news from Bosnia. In the meantime, Guy and his buddies would sure like to hear from anyone here at home. His address is included in the letters below.

Ron,
Hello from Bosnia! Well, actually from the Republika Srpska. I am in the town of Prijedor.

Things are going well here and I'm keeping busy. There are six of us living in a house in the middle of Prijedor. We enjoy living in town but sometimes things get a little hectic without much security.

All the other Americans are living on Fire Bases with plenty of military security around and we are the only ones that are living in a town. And to make matters

worse, we are the first Americans in this town.

When NATO was making air strikes on the Serbs, they were bombing targets just north of Prijedor. And remember Capt. O'Grady who was shot down? Well, that was just south of here. So there are a lot of people who don't like us here but so far we haven't had a lot of problems.

We are working with the Serbs only. And helping to rebuild local schools and hospitals. I am working with the Minister of Agriculture in five different municipalities. I coordinate with NGO's (non-governmental organizations) who donate seeds, fertilizers, and livestock to the area. So far things are slow but with spring around the corner I will be busy.

Here in the house, the bottom floor is our office so sometimes we are working late at night. There are six of us, four from my unit in Lubbock, one from the Czech Republic, and one from the United Kingdom. So we have a lot of fun learning from the other officers about their country.

There are so many different countries involved over here that sometimes I need an interpreter just to understand their English. We get a lot of laughs out of it.

Here in the office we have four interpreters who go with us when we meet the local officials. It's very odd walking through town and not be able to understand what is being said. Although I am picking up some Serb, it's still strange.

We are for the most part cut off from the States as far as news goes. Every so often we get a newspaper and we read the letters off the paper! We even managed to watch the Super Bowl! But it wasn't over until 4 a.m., so the next day we were worn out.

If you can, send a paper from Friona. I would really appreciate it. Also if anyone has an E-mail address, they can E-Mail me at ggwaren@rastko.hobbiton.co.yu. All letters must be lower case.

Two days after I sent your letter, I received the newspapers. I have received several packages from Friona already. The library sent a package of books and the Berends sent a box of cookies. Home-made cookies go over real well here, we really enjoyed them. And you always can find time to read a good book.

The weather here has improved a little, we finally are seeing the sun after 3 weeks of cloudy skies. It's still cold but just seeing the sun helps. We still have a long way to go before the weather really warms up, so there is a lot more snow on the way.

Ben Osborn left for boot camp in January and I would like to send him some letters, if you could find out his address, I would appreciate

it. Plus, it would help Ben make it through. As you know, bootcamp can be depressing.

The pictures I'm taking are being sent to Heidi to be developed. I told her to call you when the one with me reading the paper shows up.

I have worked out a deal with the Czech Republik to let me go on patrol with them and ride in one of their personnel carriers (their version of our Bradley) so there will be some good pictures of that as well.

The interesting thing is that all their equipment is Russian! But I've talked my way into riding with them on patrol.

I'm glad to hear that the cotton harvest was good this year. Hopefully it will help get a lot of them back on their feet.

After working with these farmers over here, I'm ready to get back to some real farming. After seeing how Communism forces people to live and work, I understand why it failed and how grateful I am to live where we do.

You never realize how good we have it until you see these living conditions.

Well, that's about all for now, I'll write back soon.

staff was over 250,000 in February of 1981. From now through late March the big birds start their migration back north to their breeding grounds.

The cranes' summer homes are anywhere from northern Canada to Alaska to southeastern Siberia (Russia). Most birds with long necks pull their necks in while in flight. The cranes fly with their necks fully extended.

Jim Steiert of Hereford, the area's "resident expert" on waterfowl, spends his spare time hunting, researching, and guiding hunters.


Steiert, who has published a beautiful book on playa lakes, says that you often see the "Sandhills" up in our area. "They are beginning to notice that we grow corn up here, and they are scouting this out," Steiert says.

According to at least one source, the cranes will go into cotton fields and dig out cotton seed, even from green bolls. This may have been an isolated incident.

"Sandhill cranes prefer real shallow water. They were thick around the Hub/Paco area two or three years ago when there was water in the lakes," Steiert said.

Unlike their cousins the whooping cranes, the sandhill cranes are not endangered. However, the Fish & Game Adm. issues permits to hunt the cranes. A week after seeing the cranes south of Muleshoe, we were enroute to Lubbock when Carol spotted a lake just off Highway 84 very near Littlefield. We pulled over, found an access road, and saw probably 2,000 birds in this small lake. No doubt we'd get more of them stopping off in our area, if our playa lakes contained more water.

The cranes are interesting birds. And-like all migratory fowl, you are prone to wonder: "How do they decide

when to start north or south," or "Who decides which lake they'll stop at in the evening," or "How do they decide which bird is their leader (in the front of their "V" formation) and "How do they keep from running into each other while flying in such close formations, at speeds up to 35 mph?"

The birds which overwinter in this area are known to stop over at the Platte River in Nebraska to rest and feed. While there, they are joined by cranes from other

wintering areas in the "central flyway." Other overwintering points are located in the Southeastern U.S., and even Cuba.

The Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge was created during the early part of this century. Its lakes were improved with dams, roads, etc. by the Works Progress Administration (WPA). Ye editor is glad he finally re-discovered it, and recommends it to his readers--although the "big show" may be over 'till next October.

The meeting, scheduled for Friday, March 7, will begin at 10 a.m. at the Plainview Country Club, 2902 West 4th Street in Plainview, and should conclude by 3 p.m.

This meeting is open to the public and all interested persons are invited to attend. A dutch treat lunch will be served at a cost of \$9.80. Reservations must be made by contacting Kathryn CdeBaca at the High Plains Water District at (806) 762-0181 no later than 5 p.m. on Tuesday, March 4.

C.E. Williams, manager of the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District in White Deer, will discuss groundwater legislation during the morning session.

Following a lunch break, representatives of the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service will present information about new Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) rules.

John Ashworth with the Texas Water Development Board in Austin (TWDB) will discuss a recent study pertaining to groundwater quantity and quality in the Dockum/Santa Rosa Aquifer, which underlies the Ogallala Aquifer in portions of the area. Use of groundwater from the Dockum/Santa Rosa Aquifer is being considered as an alternative to pumping Ogallala Aquifer water for some applications.

Butch Bloodworth, also with the TWDB, will discuss water demand forecasts and the possible effects that these demands will have on the High Plains region during the next 50 years.

Immediately following the meeting's adjournment, the management team will meet to review various study components for the Ogallala Regional Water Management Plan.

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



Moisture Is Needed In Parmer County

Parmer County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area need 4"-10" of water from precipitation and/or irrigation to bring the five foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before Spring 1997 planting, according to data released by the Water District and the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS).

"We found that 10% of the Water District service area will need from 2"-4" of moisture to bring the soils to field capacity. About 40% of the area will need 4"-6" of moisture, and 45% will need 6"-8" of moisture. About 5% of the area needs 8"-10" of moisture to refill the soil profile," says Gerald Crenwelge, USDA-NRCS soil scientist.

Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube at each of the 299 monitoring sites within the 15-county Water District service area. Each site is chosen based upon the soil type, the variations in the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates potential well yields, and typical farming operations in the area.

Plant available soil moisture varies according to the previous crop produced at the site. For example, there is between 1.2"-1.6" of soil moisture below the plow layer to five feet for the four main crops grown within the Water

District service area (corn, cotton, grain sorghum and wheat).

Historical data shows that above-average crop yields are more likely when the five foot root zone soil profile is at or near field capacity at planting.

"We hope the area will receive significant precipitation to help reduce these soil moisture deficits prior to planting," says Crenwelge. Rain gauge readings taken at soil moisture sites in Parmer County indicated an average of 13.01" of rainfall during 1996.

Use of furrow dikes help keep moisture that falls between now and spring planting on the field so that it can soak into the soil.

The annual pre-plant soil moisture survey data informs producers about general plant available soil moisture conditions across the Water District. Irrigators can use this information to estimate the amount of water needed to bring their soil closer to field capacity without wasting water by over-irrigating. This information reflects general soil moisture trends and should not be used in place of individual soil moisture testing on farms," says Crenwelge.

The Better Living for Texans Program is part of the state education plan of the Department of Human Services which has designated funds to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to implement this comprehensive educational effort, says Debbie Pollard, County Extension Agent-FCS.

Parmer County will be one of 51 Texas counties participating in the program this first year. Nutrition, food safety, wellness, parenting and financial management will be the content focus to assist limited resource families acquire needed knowledge, skills and behaviors. The topics will be taught in an integrated, holistic manner so that families are empowered to take greater responsibility for their own health and well-being and move toward self-sufficiency.

Funding for the Better Living for Texans Program is provided

through the Southwest Regional Food and Consumer Service Office, and agency of the United States Department of Agriculture.




