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Snyder oilfield worker dies in well blast

CLAIREMONT - A Snyder oilfield worker was killed and two others were hospitalized in very critical condition after a fire they were using to warm themselves ignited a well, authorities said

Three other workers also were injured in the Monday afternoon explosion, officials said.

Sparks from the fire ignited fumes in the producing well about 15 miles northwest of this snow-covered West Texas community, Kent County Sheriff's Deputy

The fire, which broke out about 12:35 p.m., was

under control in about 35 minutes, Standefer said. "The fire pretty well burned itself out," he said Monday afternoon. "They're trying to keep it cool now so they can close it back up.

David Brecheen, 32, of Snyder was pronounced dead at the scene by Kent County Justice of the Peace Louie

Standefer identified the injured as Bob Milton, 29, Jerry Moore, 41, Henry Wood, 25, Lloyd Israel, 25, and William Pohlman, 40, all of Snyder.

Wood, who was burned over 75 percent of his body, and Israel, who was burned over 99 percent of his body, were flown from Cogdell Memorial Hospital in Snyder to Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas, according to Gail Anderson, a spokeswoman at the Snyder hospital. She said the other three men are listed in good condition at Cogdell.

Wood is listed in critical condition in the Dallas hospital's adult burn unit, according to a Parkland spokesman, while Israel is listed as serious in the

The well is one of several located on land leased by Mobil Oil Corp. about 80 miles southeast of Lubbock Brecheen, Milton, Wood and Israel worked for B&F Well Service Co. of Snyder, Standefer said. Pohlman was employed by Mobil and Moore worked for H&L Well Service Co., also of Snyder, he said.

The Spur, Jayton and Post fire departments all helped battle the blaze, the deputy said. Services for Brecheen are pending at Bell-Seale

Funeral Home in Snyder.

LAMESA (SC) - An Andrews County District Judge has ruled that the newly incorporated town of, Los Ybanez and the election of its city officials are "illegal and

James H. Clack, judge of the 109th State Judicial District, ruled Friday that lawsuits filed by **Dawson County residents John Dell** Barron and Milton Earnest claiming errors in the boundaries of the town had a basis in fact.

Referring to a surveyor's map, Clack said a portion of the incorporation application called for an election to be held in an area situated in the southwest corner of Section 12 in Dawson County. The election was actually held in Section 9, he said.


Clack said the apparent mistake by the surveyor rendered the application "erroneous."

Attorneys representing the three defendants in the case, Los Ybanez mayor Israel Ybanez and city commissioners Mary Ibanez and Francisco Rodriguez, said they would file an appeal in the State Court of Appeals in Eastland.

Bill Flynn, commissioner and district supervisor for the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission. said approval of an application to grant Israel Ybanez a license to sell beer at his package store in Los Ybanez has been postponed.

Three injured in gunfire at Houston emergency room

HOUSTON (AP) - A man seeking treatment at one of the nation's busiest hospital emergency rooms was critically wounded in a gun battle after shooting two policemen, officials and

> Billy Ray Clark, 29, was shot in the stomach Monday and listed in poor condition after undergoing surgery at Ben Taub General Hospital, a spokeswoman said.

Witnesses said Clark pulled a .38-caliber pistol

from the holster of Robert McMenomy and shot him in the stomach, and then shot Houston Police Department officer James H. Legg in the head.

McMenomy, 31, an off-duty Texas Medical Center policeman who was working as a security guard at the hospital, was listed in critical condition. Legg, an 18-year veteran with the Houston Police Department, was in fair condition after a bullet grazed his head.

Gramm to become Republican?

Gramm, who was dropped from the House Budget Committee by Democratic leaders, is planning to resign his seat and run as a Republican in a special election, according to a published report. The Dallas Times Herald, in to-

day's editions, quoted several sources close to Gramm as saying that the College Station congressman has been considering the option for several weeks and has laid plans for informing key supporters of his intentions.

The newspaper reported that one source said that Gramm justified the move by saying: "My old mammy said if you're elected as a Democrat, you should serve as a Democrat. I don't want to be a Democrat, so I'll go back and run as a Republican.

Gramm' refused to discuss his plans further, the newspaper reported, saying, "I have looked at many options, but I have not made a final decision.

The Steering and Policy Committee voted 26-4 on Monday against giving Gramm another term on the Budget Committee.

Gramm said he would return to his district today and that he expected to announce by Wednesday his decision on whether to switch parties.

Earlier in the day, Gramm, a former professor of economics, sipped coffee behind a desk adorned with the American and Texas flags and acknowledged, "There's no question about the fact that I face a

"If I'm taken off the (Budget) Committee I would have a difficult time commung to serve as a Democrat. On the other hand, I was elected as a Democrat.

Gramm said he grew up in a Democratic family and that when he first ran for the House in 1978. "I never gave any thought to running as a Republican. It just basically didn't seem at that time to make an difference. I knew what I wanted to

What he wanted to do was promote the kind of conservative economic policies eventually embraced by President Reagan. His alliance with Reagan on budget

issues angered a number of Democrats. But some say it was his style, as much as his positions, that led to Monday's vote in the Steering and Policy Committee.

For the committee, said Rep. Charles Wilson, D-Texas, "he's a symbol. In the second place, he's an example. In the third place, he just irritated everybody so much by always being on the tube with the White House people and by participating in the plotting sessions

'In other words, it's one thing to vote the other way (with the Republicans)," said Wilson. "It's another thing to rub the leadership's nose in it, so to speak.

Water import far in future, CRMWD executive believes

Importing water to Texas is 'quite a distance in time away from being resolved," says O.H. Ivie, general manager of the Colorado

River Muncipal Water District. Ivie was responding to a recent Associated Press story in which a state energy committee proposed a governor-appointed group to work on importing water to Texas.

Ivie said the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council was primarily concerned with reviewing former Gov. Bill Clements' water program at its December meeting. State control of ground water was a more important issue of the meeting, Ivie said.

"Water importation had been studied diligently for 20 years," Ivie said. "But before any water is imported into the state, a lot of

answers have to given. Establishing who pays and devising a conveyance system are difficult questions that need to be

resolved, Ivie said. Review for the development of a state water plan was the main pur-

pose of the meeting, Ivie said. "TENRAC is trying to implement various programs where the state can assist with water supplies,"

Ivie said. Ground water - the water below the surface and controlled by the land owner - is closer to coming See Water, page 2-A

Malone Hogan begins school gift program

A program designed to encourage employees, physicians and hospital board members to make contributions to colleges and universities has been introduced at Malone Hogan Hospital in Big Spring.

The plan, called the Educational Gift Matching Program, will match monetary gifts by employees to qualifying institutions of higher learning. Locally, Howard College and the hospital's School of Radiologic Technology are eligible for the funds.

Introduced to employees in July, 1982, the program garnered ever \$10,000 in matching funds from Malone Hogan's parent company, Hospital Corp. of America. Encouraged by the response, the corporation will

open the program to active staff physicians and board members Jan. 1, 1983. With federal assistance decreasing and because of tougher government loan policies, many schools

Cool days forecast

Another cool day shaped up across Texas as a thick blanket of low clouds and fog covered many eastern and southern central portions of the state before dawn.

Forecasters expected the haze to burn off later in the day, leaving fair to partly cloudy skies across most of the state.

As 98th Congress opens, Reagan could find the going tougher

WASHINGTON — House Democrats strengthened by the last election - have already flexed their muscle in the new 98th Congress by winning rule changes as well as by removing an outspoken "Boll Weevil" from a key committee post.

The House opened the new session by adopting Democratic backed rule changes that Republicans claim will muzzle them.

The rule changes and the action against Gramm could signal tough times ahead for President Reagan's policies in the new Congress.

House Democrats added 26 to their ranks in the November elections. The Senate remains in control of Republicans, though the body has become increasingly hostile to administration proposals.

The rules changes include revisions to discourage members of either party from using spending bills to implement legislation like restrictions on abortion, bans against school busing or limitations on military and foreign aid expenditures.

Democrats said the House will now operate more orderly and efficiently. They said the use of so-called legislative riders on appropriations bills usurps the power of other congressional committees.

But critics said the changes were designed to choke off initiatives by conservatives. Rep. Bob Michel of Illinois, the House

Republican leader, called the package an 'exercise in expendiency' so that Democratic leaders can "endure less dissent, less debate, less legislation.

Warsaw Pact meets, backs nuclear weapons reduction

Associated Press Writer PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia - The Warsaw Pact opened its first meeting under the leadership of new Kremlin chief Yuri V. Andropov today with the Soviet Communist Party proclaiming the members "unanimously support" his proposal for reducing nuclear weapons in Europe.

The party newspaper Pravda and other East bloc Communist papers issued a barrage of criticism against the United States on the first day of the conference, which is expected to endorse Andropov's

nuclear arms proposal formally "The U.S. armed forces are getting ready to wage an aggressive war," Czechoslovakia's Rude Pravo

The Warsaw Pact meeting had been delayed from its December opening date because of the death of Soviet leader Leonid I. Brezhnev.The conference is Andropov's first trip abroad since he replaced Brezhnev as Soviet Communist Party general secretary on Nov.

"The fraternal countries unanimously support the far-reaching proposals made by the Soviet Union,' Prayda said in a dispatch from Prague.

Echoing Andropov's contention that the United States is trying to gain a nuclear edge over Moscow, Pravda said, "The policy of gaining military superiority over the Soviet Union has no future.

Let NATO commanders not hope that someone will be able to put at risk with impunity the life of the

ocean should not take our peacefulness for lack of vigilance. Let them not try to deceive the masses in the West by fabrications about the alleged 'Soviet

Pravda did not mention President Reagan or his proposals for nuclear arms reduction specifically. But it clearly was referring to his "zero option" plan and U.S. arguments that NATO must go ahead with its planned missile deployment to force the Soviets to bargain at nuclear arms talks in Geneva.

Reagan's proposals calls for NATO to abandon its planned deployment of 572 U.S nuclear missiles in Western Europe in exchange for removal of all Soviet SS-20 missiles targeted on NATO nations.

The Warsaw Pact consultative committee did not publicize its agenda, but Communist sources said it would formally approve Andropov's proposal to reduce Soviet medium-range nuclear missiles in Western Europe to 162, the current level of British and French arsenals

In exchange, Andropov demanded NATO cancel its missile deployment plans.

The Western allies already have rejected the proposal, announced Dec. 21, on ground the Soviet SS-20 missiles have triple warheads, giving them a 3-to-1 firepower advantage over the British and French

The consultative committee, composed of heads of seven national Communist parties, government leaders and other officials, is the coordinating political body for the Warsaw Pact alliance and usually meets every two years.

Besides Andropov and President Gustav Husak of Czechoslovakia, the leaders participating are Gen. Woiciech Jaruzelski of Poland, President Ceausescu of Romania, Janos Kadar of Hungary, Todor Zhivkov of Bulgaria and Erich Honecker of East

'At the present time the international coordination of the foreign policy of the Warsaw Pact countries has reached such a level that essentially there exists a single foreign policy strategy and level of these countries," the Slovak youth newspaper Smena said.

Smena reported the meeting also would focus on deteriorating relations with the West, including American restrictions on trade and technology exports, and the economic problems of the Soviet bloc.

The East bloc, hard hit by the worldwide recession

and huge debts owed the West, is trying to tighten economic cooperation. But shortages of food consumer goods, electrical power and exports persist.

Polish sources in Warsaw said the committee probably would give special attention to Poland's debt to the six other members of the alliance. They con-

tributed funds over the last two years of social and political upheaval, when Western aid dried up

Western diplomats and East European source they expected few new initiatives but could med against discounting the meeting's importance.

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
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

Tried to build a New Jerusalem And ended up with Houston.

Ever since I came to Big Spring more than two years ago I have fallen victim to a bad habit which befalls almost anyone who comes from Houston. I try to deny its existence, at least its existence as a nice place to live, even as a nice place to visit.

No one in the world hates Houston as much as West Texans. West Texans believe, with some justification, that their region is the True Texas; Dallas, San Antonio, Austin and El Paso are on the fringe; Houston is in another state, another country, another galaxy.

Ex-Houstonians usually do not debate this, primarily because they cannot develop a solid enough counterpoint. My new year's resolution is to find a firm argument for Houston's sake. It can't be that

But to accentuate the positive you first must accept the negative. Houston is a hot, humid, cockroachinfested Swamp City. Its violence. often meaningless and gruesome, is, if not accepted, at least lived with by the population.

I was in downtown Houston awhile back. Some shots were heard. People, started running around and getting under cars and three policemen ran by with their guns drawn. A second later. everybody got up and returned to their conversations. No mention of the incident was made on television or in the newspapers.

Speaking of the newspapers, for big city papers they stink. There are no big investigative pieces. A LOT of wire service is used and rarely do you see color photos or

charts. Moving right along, Houston's traffic is diabolical, the police force is famous for its abuses and the town seems incapable of sustaining a winning professional sports team.

SO WHAT'S there to like about Houston? The trivial things first:

It's close to an ocean, there's never a lack of exciting things to do, be it museums, concerts, or sports, and it has more foreign restaurants for "great international cuisine" than any other place in the South.

Houston's size is its main problem and its main salvation. It has grown so huge so fast that it is unmanaged and unmanagable. But it has been able to keep its identity and sense of history where many other southern cities have not.

Only-New Orleans tops Houston in this, I think. Dallas, Los Angeles and so on are totally prefab where Houston is only partially prefab the best we can hope for these days. These cities try to conceal their problems. Houston is too emotional for

Yes, it does seem unTexan in ways, despite the fact it is from under Houston that Urban Cowboy chic crawled. The reason? Houston is filled with non-Texans. It makes for an unusual tug-of-war - a city still trying to act like a small town, with an old-Texas frontier justice mentality, is filled with Yankees trying to give their new home some

of their Yankee culture That fact alone is what destroys Houston in the mind of Texans. There is no other place in the state like it (Thank God, you say?), but that difference makes it alive and interesting - not dead and self-

conscious like Big D. In this world you don't build New Jerusalems. If you try you get weird misfits like New York and Houston, where you have to be half crazy to stay sane. Houston has picked this up from New York.

NORMAL PEOPLE, the ones who aren't trigger-happy, love and hate the place with equal passion. Houstonians who have settled in develop a sense of humor about the big mess - it draws a big. divergent city together somehow.

Those who can't settle in move on to other, more normal, less challenging places

A lot of people do that, me included. I guess. But I'm finding that if you say you don't like Houston, you're saying you don't like big, growing, exciting cities.

House phone operators happy

WASHINGTON — Older readers may remember a song from a few years back called "Three Coins in the Fountain." Hardworking telephone operators on the congressional switchboard are more likely to remember a two-year struggle that could be called "Three Coynes and a Cohen.

Here was the problem: For two years, there was a Congressman named Bill Coyne, a Democrat from Pittsburgh. There was also a Cogressman named Jim Coyne, a Republican from Philadelphia.

Both were elected in 1980. Both had offices in the antique Cannon House Office Building - Bill on the fifth floor, Jim on the first. Both were on the Banking, Finance and Urban Affiars Committee, as well as its subcommittees on economic stabilization and housing and com-munity development. Both were on the House Administration Committee on its policy group on information and computers. Both were also members of the Joint Committee on the Library.

Mixups were understandably endless. Visitors looking for Jim ended up in Bill's fifth floor office and had to be sent downstairs; Jim estimates that his constituents logged 100 miles in misdirected footwork during the 97th Congress.

The office staffs of both Coynes got used to switching phone calls from innocents who had called asking for Congressman Coyne of Pennsylvania. In the waning days of the lame-duck Congress, for example,

Democrat Bill got a call from the **Association of Building Contractors** expressing confidence that he would vote to rescind the Davis-Bacon wage law, which guarantees union-scale wages on federal contracts. Wrong Coyne: Democrats generally support Davis-Bacon: Republicans generally don't. The contractors wanted Republican

Then there's Cohen - Sen. Bill Cohen, R-Me. Both Senate and House have the same telephone number. You can see the problem if someone just calls and asks for 'Bill Coyne" or "Bill Cohen."

IN FACT, sources told my reporter Andrea Siegel, that's precisely what happened last summer to a former radio announcer and movie star now known as the Great Communicator. Democrat Bill Coyne of Pennsylvania got an unexpected call from the White House. President Reagan was his usually chatty and friendly self. This was puzzling enough.

But what really baffled the congressman was a remark from the president that he hoped Coyne would support the White House on an anti-abortion bill being considered that day. Coyne said he didn't think the abortion matter was

on the House agenda that day. It turned out, of course, that Reagan had intended his persuasive charm for Bill Cohen in the Senate, which indeed was considering the abortion legislation that day.

At least part of the name problem was solved by Pennsylvania voters last November. Bill Coyne was reelected, Jim Coyne wasn't. That still leaves AuCoin and Cohen, of course. And Jim Coyne may be back in Washington anyway. He's being pushed for chairmanship of the Federal Home Loan, Bank

The attorney general doesn't want just any hash slinger off the street though. In the job description published by the Justice Department, the successful applicant will have to assist Smith's chef "in food preparation, setting tables for official function and meals; serving food both buffet-style and family style; checking trays and setups for completeness and attractiveness, and washing dishes, pots and pans."

The attorney general's sous-chef will need "the ability to keep things neat, clean and in order: .: (and) the ability to use sanitary food handling procedures." The wage scale is \$6 to \$7 an hour.

PLAYING GAMES: Samuel, Pierce, head of the Housing and Urban Development Department,

tried some sleight-of-hand to stop the investigation of a proposed action by HUD. Here's what happened:

Late last summer, Congress questioned the wisdom of a HUD plan to consolidate its offices dealing with multifamily housing. So the legislators told HUD it couldn't spend any money on the plan.

Meanwhile, Sen. James Sasser D-Tenn., asked the General Account ting Office, Congress' investigative arm, to check the cost-effectiveness of moving a HUD multifamily housing office from Nashville of Knoxville. When the GAO investigators showed up at Nashville, they learned that HUD employees had been told not to cooperate with them.

The reason, according to a HUD pokesman: Congress' refusal to let HUD reorganize the housing offices may also have forbidden HUD from allowing any investigation of a reorganization.

Congressional staffers didn't buy this disingenuous reasoning at forced HUD to open its books to the GAO auditors.

WATCH ON WASTE: Members of the House not only passed themselves a health pay increase during the lame-duck session, they also received a generous 10 percent increase in office expenses and 15 percent in travel expenses. Each member will now have at least \$52,000 a year for such incidental expenditures, instead of \$47,300. Airfares home have gone up, a con-gressional source explained.

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
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


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
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
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


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
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


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
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


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




Waitresses claim tips are earned

DEAR ABBY: Please tolerate one more letter on tipping

Beginning Jan. 1, 1983, federal law requires tipped employees to pay taxes on 8 percent of the company's gross sales whether they actually received the tip or not!

Herpes: sores disappear with virus

Dear Dr. Donohue: I would like to know if there is a way for a doctor to tell for sure if you have herpes if the sores have healed up before you can get an appointment? Can he tell from a Pap smear, or possibly a blood test? —

Once the sores have healed the diagnosis of herpes is very difficult. That means the virus has gone into hiding again, so the cells that previously indicated infection are no longer present. The best time to make the diagnosis, then, is when the sores are fresh. Then you can tell with a Pap smear if herpes

Fast-motion feast: BSHS hosts Eagles

Fond of slow-motion replays? Grab the video recorder you got for Christmas and take it to the Big Spring-Abilene High game tonight. It might the only way you'll be able to see the action.

This game headlines the opening night of play around District 4-AAAAA tonight and promises its share of blurs, whirls and sneaker-squeaks. With both teams reving the engines on their full-court man presses, this contest should be labeled a track meet rather than a basketball game.

In other games, San Angelo tangles with Cooper, Midland battles Permian and Lee tries its luck against Odessa High.

The game will pit two of the league's premier point-scorers. Big Spring's Jerald Wrightsil, an all-league first team choice as a junior, will toss his 21.8 average against AHS veteran Mike Simmons who is scoring at the very same clip.

Wrightsil has been the steadiest of performers in Big Spring's first 15 games. He's been over 20 points nine times with a high of 32 in a home win against Lubbock Coronado. Among his credits are all-tournament picks at the Tall City Classic and Reese AFB Christmas tournament

But if teams think the Steers are solely a one man team, it could cost them. Senior Tony Randle has

played beyond pre-season hopes, scoring 12.6 points a game and making double figures in all but three games. The fact includes a no-point showing in a season-opening loss to Levelland.

Other scoring helpers are senior forward Jinx Valenzuela who drops in nine points from underneath and senior play-making guard Kevin Watson who contributes eight points from out front.

Simmons has been over 20 points 11 times for the Eagles with a high game of 33. He's had to take a huge chunk of the scoring burden since fellow senior Shannon Daniel was not with the team through the 1982 portion of the schedule.

Daniel is back and in good form, too, having scored 44 points in three recent tournament games.

Leading the Eagles downcourt in small but quick guard Tony Roberts. Other players to watch are postman Tim Robertson and junior Rufus Brooks who can score big

Big Spring brings a 10-5 mark into the game while the Eagles have split their first 20 games.

While both teams are flashy scoring machines, each will try to defense the other into mistakes and easy hoops in return.

"To me defense is what wins the game," BSHS coach Archie Myers drilled his players Monday. "If you can throw the ball up more than the other team, you have a good chance of winning the game."

And so the Steers shuffle their feet and wave the hands in playing as a tight a man-to-man defense as possible. And Myers thinks that if his squad can create the turnovers, they won't have to worry about breaking the Eagle press. But just in case, his team has been working on that phase of the game, too.

"I feel like that's their style. It's going to take some people in shape to play this game," Myers says.

The first-year coach wants his players to go full speed. When they're tired, he's got John Howie, Jimmy Brown and Jerry Wrightsil on the bench ready to join the flow. What happens if the Eagles stop

his No. 1 scorer?

"Jerald will pass it off," Myers says confidently. "He's not a selfish player. If they double-team him, he'll pass to a man that's open."

"We're playing for keeps, now," Wrightsil says. "We've got to play with intensity and go the things coach has shown us how to do. We're working together now, we're blending. We just got to do the little things right."

Abilene, the defending league champion, is picked No. 2 this year behind San Angelo Central. Big Spring was chosen to battle it out with Odessa High, for third place. The district season will not be divided into halves but played straight through. The two top teams will enter post-season play.

fought to stay here and they deserved it," Landry said after Minnesota's nationally televised Monday night victory. "We just wanted to play hard. We really had no incentive except the prestige of winning."

The Vikings earned the home-field advantage against Atlanta in the first round of the playoffs Sunday.

In a game that featured big plays, the biggest was a 99-yard scoring dash by Dallas' Tony Dorsett, the longest in NFL history.

It came just after Minnesota cornerback John Turner ran back an intercepted pass 33 yards for a touchdown to give the Vikings a 24-13 lead. On the ensuing kickoff, Timmy Newsome fumbled the ball out of bounds on the Cowboy one.

On the next play, Dorsett went off right tackle for his history-making run.

"There wasn't a thing wrong about the (defensive) play," Minnesota Coach Bud Grant said of Dorsett's run, which broke the record of 97 yards set by Andy Uram of the Chicago Cardinals in 1939 and tied by Bob Gage of Pittsburgh in 1949. "He saw a crack and exploited it. I was in awe of the play myself."

"I just saw a lot of green," said Dorsett, who finished the game with 153 yards and wound up second to Freeman McNeil of the New York Jets for the NFL rushing title. "I'll hold on to this one a long time."

"Nothing happened," nose tackle Charlie Johnson said of the effect of Dorsett's touchdown. "There was no emotion change. A lot of teams would have folded after that, but not us. That's what made the difference."

Later, Ron Springs' two-yard dash gave Dallas a 27-24 lead, but the Vikings came right back and drove 80 yards.

The Vikings went to running back Ted Brown for one of the big plays of the series. Brown, who scored twice and rushed for 100 yards and caught passes for 50 more, caught a 29-yarder in the drive to get into Cowboy territory. A little later, quarterback Tommy Kramer, who completed 18 of 34 passes for 242 yards and two touchdowns, hit Rickey Young with a 14-yard touchdown pass.

Young caught the ball as he slid to the ground, regained his feet and ran it the remaining 10 yards. Young said his first thought was to hang onto the ball and not get up.



Gibbs named Coach of Year

NEW YORK (AP) -Joe Gibbs, who guided the Washington Redskins to the best record in the National Con-



ference in 1982 and into the National Football League playoffs for the first time since 1976. was named Coach of the Year today by The Associated Press.

Gibbs was a runaway winner, garnering 49 of the 84 votes cast by a nationwide panel of sports writers and broad-casters. Tom Flores, coach of the Los Angeles Raiders, was second with 14 votes, followed by Tom Landry of the Dallas Cowboys with six. Others receiving more than one vote were Don Shula of Miami with five and Jim Hanifan of St. Louis and Leeman Bennett of Atlanta, two apiece.

"Becoming a head coach and winning this award is truly a dream come true," Gibbs said. I consider myself one of the luckiest men alive because I'm doing what I've always wanted to

In 1981, Gibbs replaced Jack Pardee - who had been Coach of the Year in 1979 but whose star descended as the Redskins fell from 10-6 that year to 6-10 in 1980.

In his first season as Washington's coach, Gibbs suffered through losses in the team's first five games before his system began to take root. The Redskins won eight of the last. 11 games in 1981 to finish at 8-8, remaining in playoff contention until the final Sunday of the season.

"I think we learned something from every game," Gibbs said. "We take away something from each of our experiences, even losses. I learned a lot about myself when the team started off so poorly. I learned a lot about my coaching staff, too.'

This year, the Redskins started off with victoriesin Philadelphia and Tampa Bay. After the strike they ran their record to 4-0 before absorbing their only defeat of the nine-game season, falling to the Dallas Cowboys.

Percentage-wise, the Redskins's final record of 8-1 (.889) in the strikeshortened season was the best since their 10-1 (.909) mark in 1942 the year they last won an NFL title.

"Realistically, I don't think anyone really believed we would go into the playoffs with a record like we have," he said. "Coming back as a winner after the strike was the result of the players, not the coaches. They all worked extremely hard during the strike.

The 42-year-old Gibbs played linebacer, tight end and guard at San Diego State in 1961-62 when Don Coryell, now with the San Diego Chargers, was the Aztecs' head coach. Gibbs then went on to coaching at the college

Both coaches ended months of speculation by fans who had been hearing rumors they would leave after poor seasons last fall.

Overton announced he would leave Cooper in the wake of the school's 2-8 season last fall. The season was the worst in over a decade.

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
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Newspaper folds to pay off lawsuit

CLIFTON, N.J. (AP) — A controversial publisher has folded his weekly tabloid three days after the sheriff put liens on advertising revenues to pay off a libel judgment.

On the front page of Friday's edition of The Independent Prospector — under the headline "1933-1983" — publisher Alex Bidnik Jr. said he would no longer produce the publication he bought in 1960.

Generally working alone to fill editions of more than 20 pages, Bidnik wrote a column, "Behind the Scenes, in which he alleged promiscuity, drug suse and homosexuality among local officials and private

In 1981, Bidnik was convicted of five counts of extortion after complaints filed by a citizens' group charged that he threatened to damage the reputations of people who did not advertise in his publication or provide

The group, Citizens Opposed to The Independent Prospector, once collected nearly 6,000 signatures seeking to keep municipal advertising out of the publication

Edward Looney, the owner of a liquor store who was among the organizers of the citizens' group, said he sought the liens because Bidnik never paid the \$55,000 judgement issued in October 1980. Looney claims he is now owed \$66,000, including interest.

During the extortion trial, Looney testified that when he decided to withdraw advertising and to stop selling the 25-cent tabloid in his store, Bidnik told him, "You mess with the bull and you're going to get the horns.

After the verdict, Bidnik was ordered to undergo psychiatric counseling, pay a \$5,000 fine and serve three years' probation. But he continued to publish the weekly, despite the verdict and nearly a dozen libel suits brought against him

Mortgages may increase '83 inflation

WASHINGTON (AP) Consumers likely will see a higher inflation rate this year simply because of adjustments the government is making in how it computes the cost of owning a home, economists say.

The homeownership costs, which include house prices and mortgage rates, have long been criticized for distorting the real rate of inflation, analysts say.

As a result, the Labor Department is charging the way it records those costs in its widely used Consumer Price Index.

"It's long overdue," said Edward Yardeni, chief economist for Prudential-

Hester's Bache Securities Inc. Added Allen Sinai, senior economist at the consulting firm of Data Resources **OFFICE SUPPLIES** Inc. in Lexington, Mass.: 'It's a good step toward a more accurate measure of

inflation. The change goes into effect with the January report for the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, due, out on Feb. 25

With that report, many economists expect to see inflation running a bit ahead of what it would have under the current formula.

That's because the homeowner costs overstate the effect of increases or decreases in home prices and mortgage rates since those factors are so heavily weighted.

When mortgage rates and home prices were going up, the inflation measure tended to be boosted even higher.

With the recent fall in mortgage rates and softening of home prices, the index may be understating inflation, which has been running at an annual rate of 4.5 percent in the first 11 months of the year.

In comparison, an experimental measure similar to what the department will use in January shows prices rising more, at an annual rate of 5.2 percent through November.

The millions of Americans whose income gains are linked to cost-ofliving changes won't be affected by the adjustment

for two more years. Not until then will the department change the homeownership calculation for the companion index - the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers - widely used in collective bargaining agreements and in adjusting Social Security and other government payments.

Under the new formula, the department will calculate what homeowners would charge if they rented their homes to someone else.

It now figures out homeownership costs by checking house prices, mortgage interest rates, property taxes and insurance, and maintenance and repair costs.



The IRA tax trimmer

There's still time to open account for '82

Associated Press Writer Nineteen eighty-two is over, but there's still a way to trim your 1982 tax bill. It's called an Individual Retirement Account

Contributions to a qualified IRA — and the interest earned by those contributions - are exempt from federal income tax until you start withdrawals. And you can establish an account any time until the

due date for your 1982 return, counting extensions, and still claim a deduction against last year's income. Here's an example of what an IRA can mean:

Suppose you're married, filing a joint return and have a taxable income of \$30,000. Your 1982 federal income tax bill is \$5,607; your marginal tax bracket the maximum rate you pay — is 33 percent. Assume you put \$1,000 into an IRA. Your taxable in-

come is \$29,000. Your 1982 federal tax bill is \$5,313; your marginal bracket drops to 29 percent. You have saved \$294. (State and local taxes on IRA contributions and earnings also are deferred as a general rule; check authorities in your area for details.) The due date for your 1982 return is April 15, 1983. If

you get an extension of the deadline for filing your return, however, you also get an extension of the deadline for opening an IRA. You do not have to itemize deductions in order to claim credit for an IRA contribution

Anyone who has earned income and is under 701/2 can open an IRA. It doesn't matter if you are already covered by a pension plan. You can contribute up to \$2,000 or 100 percent of your income each year, whichever is less. If both husband and wife work, each spouse can contribute up to \$2,000 to his or her own account. A married individual with a non-working spouse can set up a separate IRA for that spouse; contributions to the worker's IRA and the spouse's IRA

together cannot exceed \$2,250.
It is important to remember that you will have to pay taxes on your money eventually; the tax is NOT eliminated, only deferred until withdrawals begin.

An IRA also ties up your money. You are not allowed to start withdrawals until you reach 5912. If you make a withdrawal before that, you pay not only the tax due on the amount withdrawn, but also a penalty of 10 percent. You cannot borrow from an IRA or use it as collateral for a loan.

The money you put in an IRA can be invested in dozens of ways. Banks, thrift institutions, brokerage houses and insurance companies all offer IRAs, and you have to compare terms to find the one that meets

The size of an IRA can mount quickly. The accounting firm of Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Co. calculated, for example, that someone who contributes \$2,000 a year every year from age 35 to age 65 and earns 8 percent interest will have nearly \$245,000 in exchange for a total investment of only \$60,000.

But the accounting firm also offers some words of caution: "If inflation continues, amounts accumulated will not have the same purchasing power as today's

You must begin withdrawals by the end of the year you become 701/2, and you must make a minimum withdrawal every year after that. If you don't, you must pay a 50 percent federal tax on the difference between the required minimum and the actual withdrawal

You do not have to contribute to an IRA according to any fixed schedule. You can, for example, skip a year if you want to or have to. If you contribute more than the maximum allowed for any year, you will be subject to an excise tax of 6 percent of the excess amount
