Local rainfall up
in last 12 years
Although 1982 was far below the average in cloud
seeding opportunities, the ear's weather modification effort by the Colorado River Municipal Water District
continued a 12 -year pattern of increased rainfall and increased cotton yields.
The rainfall measurements for the 12 -year period $1971-82)$ within the cloud-seeded target area is 42 per-
cent greater than in the preceding 35 years. In stations outside the target area, the increase is only 15 percen over the pre-seeding period.
The difference in cotton The difference in cotton yield was even more
dramatic - up 54 percent in seeded counties as compared to 9 percent of counties outside of the targe
area. The CRMWD's target area is a 14 -county portion of West Texas, according to district officials. Counties in the control and target areas are Lynn,
Garza, Kent. Dawson, Borden, Scurry. Fisher, Martin,
Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Glasscock. Sterling and Coke.

Muscles don't do that. They shrink (atrophy) when they aren't used. It's extra calories eaten that turn into and exercising to little. Keeping in shape is not a seasonai.arrair. You do it all year. It takes about as
much time to get back into shape as it took to get out. You're also dealing with a Stone-Age nutritionist. Don't listen to him. You don't need to emphasize milk and eggs, although both supply calories and protein.
They contain too much fat though. Yes, running and exercising seem to help maintain higher levels of the good kinds of cholesterol. But don't workout schedule by increasing the number of total calories from a well-balanced diet - meat, dairy prodcts, vegetables, fruits and cereals
