Open house

HC dental program spotlighted

Howard College, in its attempt to provide topflight education in the vocational-technical field, unveiled its modernized dental hygiene program yesterday during open house ceremonies at the

The facility is designed to take students through a two-year program encompassing classroom and laboratory work to prepare them for career in dental hygiene. Students will get first-hand experience with x-rays, dental materials, teeth cleaning and other facets of the profession.

Headed by Bette Buchanan, the program got under way in January with an enrollment of five students, but Mrs. Buchanan is confident class rosters will grow with the program.

"The program is set up to enroll 12 students every fall," Mrs. Buchanan said. "And from all indications it appears we will have no trouble finding

students for the program. It isn't easy to be chosen for the program, according to Mrs. Buchanan. The students are picked after completing stringent application rules based

on a point system.

Included in the criteria is the person's high school or college grade average, science background, work experience and ACT score. The student must also have three letters of recommendation, a per-

sonal interview with Mrs. Buchanan and have a cur-

rent cardio-pulmonary resuscitation card.

Once the student is enrolled, he will face an 82-hour program that includes two solid years of schooling including summer sessions. And once accepted, the student may not drop out and re-enter the program, Mrs. Buchanan said.

Tuition and expenses exlusive of room and board will cost an in-state students about \$3,294 for two years, \$4,144 for an out-of-state student.

Mrs. Buchanan said the program was begun by Howard College to meet a growing need for dental hygienists in the West Texas area

'We get lots of phone calls and letters from dentists asking about the program," said Mrs. Buchanan, holding up a letter of praise for the program from a local dentist. 'The administration and board saw there was a

need and the local dentists supported the program strongly because they cannot get dental hygienists to come to this part of the state," she said. She said part of the program may be because

there are no dental hygiene programs in West "We are the only program in a 250-mile radius of Big Spring," Mrs. Buchanan said. "So we feel we can fill the demand of the dentists, while offering

students a good chance for a job. She said dental hygiene is becoming more popular with the public as it begins to see dental prevention as a much less painful and costly way to keep teeth in shape. This demand has also caused more and more dentists to add a hygienist to their staffs, thus opening a new job market.

Vo-Ed facility opened to public

Staff Writer "The best thing that ever happened to Howard College" was open to the public Tuesday as the Occupational-Technical Building held open house

on the junior college campus. Director Joe Rhoades said the building, which opened to the students in January, was a prized possession of the junior college.

"We are just ecstatic," Rhoades said. "People

will be really glad to work here."

Rhoades said he expected enrollment in occupational and technical classes to increase due to the new building and the state of the economy. The in-structor said Howard College currently had about 150 students in the program.

"The instructors do better, the students get more

benefit and they bring in others," Rhoades said. The new building has four large work areas with high ceilings as well as connected classrooms and offices. The old building — called a "dungeon" by one student - was about one-third the size of the new facility, Rhoades said.

Instructor Bill Sprinkle said space was the main problem in the old facility for his automotive classes. Gesturing around the spacious shop, Sprinkle said "We could get 12 cars in here."

Welding Instructor Al Long told a small tour group he had 17 welding units he could run at one time. Long said he currently had 40 students enrolled in his classes. The teacher said the training students received here could be put to use quickly. "I've put lots of people to work," Long said.

Survey will tap opinions on local cops

About 200 Big Spring residents will get a chance next month to anonymously express their opinion of the city police department.

The community relations service of the U.S. Justice Department will conduct a survey here to examine the police department's relationship with the community.

Big Spring is the second of about 20 Texas cities that the justice department will survey. A pilot survey in Mission, Texas, was conducted in January.

Robert F. Greenwald, regional mediator for the community relations service, said he developed the survey after two month's research. He was here last week to organize the project.

The Colorado River Municipal Water District will be looking into the possibility of a second diversion on Beals Creek in an effort to upgrade the quality of water in Lake E.V. Spence.

CRMWD directors have authorized an engineering study on alternative courses for intercepting the normal flow of the creek, which is now heavily laden with

General Manager O.H. Ivie, said there are several potential sites that could be used to divert water a lower the chloride level of the water.

Ivie mentioned a point eight miles east of Big Spring below the Moss Creek Road crossing where the chloride level stabilizes, and diminishes slightly, that might be used for a dam to intercept the flow. The water could then be diverted to side storage and left until needed

Ivie was also given authority by directors to set up a plan of releases from Lake Spence, coordinated with potential inflows. The directors said releasing some of the present content and replacing it with floodwater will held to remove some of the chloride content in the

In other business the directors:

• Approved a maximum of \$125,000 for consultant studies to check into the possibility of replacing old microwave equipment at the Big Spring-Odessa intake and Morgan Creek booster station.

The funds will also be used for studies to increase the efficiency of the Martin County pump equipment.

• Heard a report that negotiations were continuing for the acquisistion of additional ground water rights on the western end of CRMWD system to be used as back-up source during summer peak demands.

munication causes widespread distrust and suspicion.' Greenwald said the justice

system can only work effectively if people understand how it functions. This questionnaire is designed to reveal the public's perceptions of the police, he said. The Big Spring City Council last

month approved spending the \$250 to \$300 needed to conduct the survey. The funds are paid to Southern Methodist University, which was contracted to analyze data gathered from the 8-page questionnaires.

A "nucleus group" of 21 persons representing large employers, school systems, ethnic organizations, churches and business and civic groups answered the questionnaire last week. These representatives will choose representatives from their organizations to participate in the survey next month.

Greenwald said those selected will represent Big Spring's demography: 30 percent Hispanic, 10 percent black and 60 percent Anglo, plus various educational levels, occupations and income levels.

"We realize most people have never set foot in a police station, they have no personal experience with the department," Greenwald likely to be based on reputation or what their family and friends have told them.'

AUSTIN (AP) — The Senate today confirmed the appointment of Houston businessman Robert Lanier to the state highway commission despite a senator's protest that it would mean an all-urban commission for the first time in history

The vote to confirm Lanier was 28-3. Senators also extended "senatorial courtesy" to Sen. Glenn Kothmann, D-San Antonio, in rejecting 0-31 the appointment of Van Henry Archer Jr. to the Texas Ad-

Absentee voting ended yesterday for both elections. The Saturday election will have two polling places: Precinct 1 at the Northside Fire Station and all other precincts at Dorothy Garrett Coliseum at Howard College.

Howard County Clerk Margaret Ray said 429 persons voted absentee at the county courthouse for the school board race. She described the turnout as good, but said with the election falling on Easter weekend, more persons probably voted absentee than normally. City Secretary Thomas Ferguson said 296 people voted absentee at City Hall for the city council

Saturday's election should see a turnout of less than 2,000 voters if past trends hold true. School district Assistant Business Manager Don Green said the last three years showed the following school board voting totals: 1982 - 1,567; 1981 - 1,642; and 1980 - 2,463. Green said the last 10 years - with the exception of

1980 — had showed a voter turnout under 2,000. The 1982 city elections featured a mayoral race between Mayor Clyde Angel and challenger Jerry Higgins. Approximately 1,700 people voted in that election. Two unopposed candidates received about 200 votes

Reagan offers cut in European nukes

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan today offered to cut back on the planned deployment of new medium-range nuclear missiles in Europe if the Soviet Union agreed to reduce its arsenal of rockets targeted on NATO countries.

Even if the proposal is accepted, the United States would begin installing new Pershing 2 and cruise missiles in Europe late this year as scheduled, while the Soviet Union would be required to dismantle some of its medium-range weapons. The Kremlin's chief arms negotiator, asked about the offer Tuesday, said, 'I'm not optimistic."

Revealing a compromise plan to his "zero-zero" proposal to eliminate all medium-range nuclear missiles in Europe, Reagan said in a nationally broadcast statement from the White House that "it would be better to have none than to have some. But, if there must be some, it is better to have few than to have many.

"If the Soviets will not now agree to the total elimination of these weapons," Reagan said, "I hope they will at least join us in an interim agreement that would substantially reduce these forces to equal levels on both sides.

The Soviets have flatly rejected the zero-zero pro-posal and The United States' NATO allies have urged that the Reagan administration make a scaled-down proposal.

Reagan did not propose a specific limit on the number of weapons. A senior administration official who spoke on condition he not be named said the numbers of missiles allowed under the new U.S. proposal would be the subject of negotiations with the Soviets.

Accusing Moscow of failing to offer any serious alternatives to the zero-zero formula, Reagan said, 'Their failure to make such a proposal is a source of deep disappointment to all of us who have wished that these weapons might be eliminated — or at least significantly reduced

'But I do not intend to let this shadow that has been cast over the Geneva negotiations further darken our search for peace," Reagan said

Reagan's announcement confirmed earlier reports that a new proposal was put on the bargaining table in Geneva on Tuesday.

Accompanying Reagan's announcement was a White House statement saying the NATO allies 'welcome and strongly support the new American intermediate nuclear force negotiating initiative announced by the president today.

"It represents a signficant step designed to move the INF negotiations toward conclusion of an equal, fair and verifiable arms control agreement," the statement said.

Reagan announced his new strategy in a speech to NATO ambassadors, gathered in the East Room.

"NATO will begin deploying a specific deterrent to this threat late this year, unless, as we hope, an agreement to eliminate such weapons would make this deployment unnecessary," Reagan said.

Reagan, noting that the Soviet Union has rejected the zero-zero plan, said Moscow "has failed to come up with any serious alternative. They insist on preserving their present monopoly of these weapons.

The Kremlin has proposed — and Washington has rejected — a plan under which the Soviet Union would scale back its missiles to 162 rockets - matching the number of British and French missiles — if the United States abandoned plans to deploy its new weapons.

A senior administration official said the United States has asked Moscow not to reject the proposal out of hand. "We have asked them not to in any preemptive way come forward and disagree with it until they have had a chance to seriously consider it and before the negotiators have a chance to discuss it.

The talks recessed Tuesday and the United States asked the Soviet Union to agree to resuming them May 17, two week ahead of schedule.

Artificial heart patient buried

FEDERAL WAY, Wash. (AP) — Barney Clark, laid to rest as a cold rain fell on 1,300 mourners, was eulogized as "our hero in this chapter of history" who blazed a medical trail with his artificial heart that thousands of patients will someday follow.

"In time, 50,000 men and women per year will be restored to a wort while existence with the artificial heart in the United States alone," said Dr. Willem Kolff, director of the University of Utah Division of Artificial Organs, as Clark was buried Tuesday near his

About 1,300 people turned out in cold, driving rain for the funeral service at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints Stake Center, south of Seattle, where the retired dentist was eulogized as a selfless hero.

To a world increasingly filled with hopelessness and despair, he stood quietly and resolutely for an entirely different view of life," said Elder Neal A. Maxwell of the Mormon Church's Council of the Twelve Apostles. "His impact was immense — greater than he could possibly know.

He called the 62-year-old Clark "a selfless pioneer, adding a new dimension to the Mormon pioneer tradition in which those who lost their loved ones crossing the plains nevertheless picked up their handcarts and headed west '

Clark, the walls of his diseased heart as thin as tissue paper, on Dec. 2 traded a peaceful, imminent death for a painful future with the experimental, air-driven

Rarely without pain after the operation at the University of Utah Medical Center, an uncomplaining Clark shook off death time and again for 112 days until circulatory collapse and multiple organ failure overtook him a week ago today.

Future recipients of the plastic heart "will experience that their borrowed days, weeks, months or years of survival are a precious gift which they owe to Barney Clark and (his wife) Una Loy," said Kolff. In remarks directed to Mrs. Clark, Kolff spoke of the

operation and its effect on the patient, his family and

"It is not so much life we wanted to prolong, but happiness we wanted to create ... We had hoped we could have given Dr. Barney Clark a higher quality of life," Kolff said. "Dr. Barney Clark is our hero, Una Loy is our heroine in this chapter of history.

The second artificial heart will be implanted within six months, Dr. William DeVries, Clark's surgeon, has said. Doctors hope to expand guidelines for the experiment to allow use on patients not as sick as Clark was

Clark's body, in a closed walnut casket draped with yellow roses and carnations, was wheeled slowly into the chapel, followed by his wife, sons Stephen and Gary, daughter Karen Shaffer, five grandchildren and members of the medical team.

Clark was remembered by his dental partner, Theodore Lund, as a man devoted to golf who "could literally knock the cover off the ball. He never lacked for a foursome." Clark, he recalled, treated patients like family members.

Texas car liability insurance could rise 50 %

AUSTIN (AP) — A bill under study by a House subcommittee would raise the minimum amount of car liability insurance Texas motorists must carry by

more than 50 percent. Insurance rates for liability coverage would go up by a statewide average of 10 percent for motorists now carrying the minimum protection required, said sponsor Rep. Don Lee, D-Harlingen. Lee operates an insurance agency in the Lower Rio Grande Valley city

that sells automobile insurance. His bill was sent to a subcommittee of the House Insurance Committee on Tuesday.

Dallas lawyer Richard Geiger, a lobbyist representing Fire and Casualty Companies in Texas, testified that 55 percent of Texas motorists already carry more

than the required minimum liability insurance. He said, therefore, the impact of increasing the minimum amount of insurance required would affect only 45 percent of the motorists in Texas. Besides that, he said, the amount of increase would vary greatly, since rates vary according to 15 classifications of motorists and 40 geographic regions.

At present, the law requires liability protection of \$10,000 per person injured in an accident. \$20,000 for total medical expenses, and \$5,000 for property

Lee said most cars today cost more than \$5,000. He proposed raising the limits to \$15,000 per person for medical expenses, \$30,000 per accident for injuries and \$15,000 for property damage. Lee said the minimum rates have not been changed

in the past 20 years, although it was not until 1981 that motorists were required by law to have liability insurance or post a bond.

The bill was referred to a subcommittee. Another proposal sent Tuesday to an insurance subcommittee would allow motorists cited for not having proof of insurance to get the ticket dismissed by later showing up in court with the proof that they were insured when they got the ticket.

Gene Green, D-Houston, said an attorney general's opinion issued earlier this year said the same thing his bill says — you violate the law only when you drive without insurance, not when you drive without proof of

What IS news?

John Chancellor, the former NBC anchorman, was on a talk show this weekend discussing "hard news." The TV newsman said most newscasts shied away from real news to spend their programs doing consumer information, weather, sports and other "soft news" items.

Chancellor said soft news dominated so much that newscasts were often interrupted for real "hard news."

His observations bring to mind exactly what is news anyway — whether on television or in print.

The definition is fairly nebulous, even for veteran journalists like Chancellor. News is loosely defined as fresh information on something that has taken place recently. News is further identified as anything new or strange.

All this definition really means is that anything can fit under the news umbrella from the world's largest radish to a street riot in Yemen to the President's sock size.

HOWEVER, an examination of most news can lead to a stricter definition — news is composed of the bad things that happen to other people and the good things that happen to the most area.

pen to us.

Let's examine that statement in the context of some top news stories: the EPA hearings, Watt, Beirut, El Salvador, the Russians. All of these woeful tidings are happening to other people somewhere

The shootings, the assaults, the arrests, the thefts — they all victimize someone else. We are drawn to it all.

Of course, if you are a victim or a perpetrator, you wouldn't consider it news.

For some perverse reason, "the

other guy's" disasters and misfortunes are newsworthy — even when the other guy is a country.

Psychologically, I suppose, the knowledge of others' suffering makes our own less painful.

BUT NEWS IS more than dire tidings from afar — news is the positive that happens to us all. No one dislikes seeing his name in print or hearing it spoken aloud or seeing his picture in connection with something good.

People enjoy reading about themselves. They like learning their teams won big or their business is expanding or their state is the best. News is news when it's good and "you are there."

Oftentimes, this is the only "real" news to many people. "Don't tell me about buffalo riots in Yoganda — we're sponsoring a ball team this summer." People don't care about Russia's threat to the U.S. — they want to know why their name is misspelled.

Of course, this definition of news omits items like the Queen's recent visit. But no one — as so aptly detailed by writer Richard Horn

last week — really cared anyway.

News is those little things, too. My favorite "little news" is from the Santa Anna weekly newspaper in Coleman County. A column on Trickham society had this gem (more or less).

"The Quilting Club met this last week. Ten persons were present and everybody seemed to have a good time. We are trying to get two quilts out before the Cemetery Meeting April 10. Sarah Hastings and Jane Rogers already have two

Minimum wage proposal eclipsed

Among the economists, the minimum wage has about as many adherents as the Flat Earth Society has among astronomers. Everyone from Lester Thurow on the left to Milton Friedman on the right regards it as a phony program which does the poor more harm than good. But in Washington, the minimum wage is treated as the political equivalent of the third rail: Touch it, and you're dead.

That's why the Reagan administration deserves credit for proposing to allow a lower minimum wage for teen-agers during summers. Though the measure probably won't pass, it may help to educate the electorate in the fraudulence of the minimum wage.

The bill would permit employers to pay workers under the age of 21 only \$2.50 an hour between May 1 and Sept. 1 of each year, instead of the current \$3.35 minimum. That would make it cheaper for employers to keep teen-agers off of street corners and, while they're at it, to train them in some useful skills.

The problem with the minimum wage is that it forces employers to pay unskilled workers more than they're worth. If a worker can produce only \$3 worth of output each hour, a firm loses money by paying him the \$3.35 minimum. Thus, the minimum wage induces firms to find ways to do without unskilled workers. It discourages restaurants from hiring human dishwashers and encourages them to buy the kind you plug in.

kind you plug in.

The greatest impact is on teenagers, few of who have marketable skills. The minimum wage is the

main reason teen-agers typically hve an unemployment rate five times higher than that for workers over the age of 25.

Economists Robert Meyer and David Wise, writing in the inaugural issue of the Univeristy of Chicago's Journal of Labor Economics, calculate that if the minimum wage had not existed between 1973 and 1978, employment among young men would have been 4 percent higher than it was — in effect, cutting their unemployment rate by nearly a third. And the effect would have been more dramatic still among black teenagers.

One retort is that though some workers lose their jobs because of the minimum wage, others get paid more because of it. No doubt this it true. But Meyer and Wise found that the total earnings of teen-agers are no higher than they would be without the minimum wage — they are merely divided up among fewer workers.

Even the advocates of the

Even the advocates of the minimum wage have trouble denying its malign effects. Former Labor Secretary Ray Marshall, who is to the AFL-CIO as the dummy is to the ventriloquist, once defended an increase on the ground that unemployed young people would be more likely to go back to school

But the damage goes beyond the unemployment caused among teenagers. Many young people, particularly those from poor families, have no way to acquire work skills except through low-paying jobs. Those skills, once acquired, can provide entree to better-paying jobs.

Why do college students waste their time in class when they could be out making money? Because that investment in "human capital" today ensures higher pay tomorrow. Likewise, unskilled workers can increase their future earnings by working for low wages now. But teen-agers who never get the chance to learn often have nothing to look forward to but lifelong unemployment.

It's easy to see why organized labor opposes any cut in the minimum wage, even though most union members make considerably more. The only way unskilled workers can compete with skilled ones is by accepting lower pay. Make it illegal for them to accept a lower wage, and you take away the competition. At the heart of union support for the minimum wage is not sympathy for low paid workers but pure self-interest.

Reagan's proposal can be faulted only for not going far enough. Better to repeal the minimum wage entirely. But by lowering the wage floor for teen-agers during the months when they are most in need of work, it attacks the biggest problem.

Given the political climate in Washington, the bill may have only the dimmest prospect of enactment. But the administration should make the public understand that congressional intransigence comes at the expense of the poor, the young and the unskilled. It is up to Ronald Reagan to make the unassailable case: The minimum wage is the greatest enemy of the people it is supposed to help.

EPA forgets what it is

WASHINGTON — The function of the Environmental Protection Agency, of course, is to protect the environment. But the people who run the EPA seem more interested in protecting the environment's industrial polluters.

Take the matter of "particulate pollution." This is the visible soot and dust that people suck into their lungs. EPA officials decided the existing standards were too strict, so they decided to run a "cost-benefit" analysis of its proposed relaxation of the standards. This means determining whether the cost of enforcing a regulation is worth it in benefit to the public.

The idea of equating human health and dollars-and-cents is pretty crass. In fact, Congress made an explicit exemption from the costbenefit yardstick in the Clean Air Act

But the determined particulatepushers at EPA went ahead with their cost-benefit study anyway. They justified this nose-thumb at Congress by citing a White House executive order that instructed federal agencies generally to run cost-benefit studies whenever a

rules change was being considered.
But guess what: The EPA's proposed looser standard flunked its cost-benefit test. EPA staff studies and a \$200,000 report by an outside consultant agreed that letting the air get dirtier would be far more expensive, in terms of additional health-care costs and workdays lost

due to illness, than the amount saved by having a looser standard to enforce.

One EPA study found that the existing tough air-pollution standards had prevented as many as 40 million lost workdays. Another showed that hundreds of lives would be lost from lung disease and thousands of illnesses caused if the standards were relaxed.

E m b a r r a s s e d b y t h i s bureaucratic boomerang, EPA officials simply kept the studies away from the agency's science advisers, whose job is to provide relevant data for new regulations. Sheldon Meyers director of plan-

Sheldon Meyers, director of planning and standards for EPA's office of air quality, said the studies were not allowed to be used because they hadn't been "peer reviewed" by other scientists. My EPA sources suggest it was because the results weren't what the agency brass wanted to hear.

At any rate, EPA next contracted with Mathtech, a respected consulting firm in Princeton, N.J., to do the required cost-benefit study. But the Mathtech report, a draft of which was seen by my associate John Dillon, was even less palatable to the EPA poohbahs.

Mathtech estimated that relaxing the air-pollution standards would save about \$20 billion over a nine-year period. But it estimated that keeping the current standards would save \$75 billion over the same period.

Slapped down by their own costbenefit studies, EPA officials abruptly reversed themselves. They cited a provision of the Clean Air Act that says the EPA should not use the cost-benefit ratio as a basis for setting pollution standards.

The reason EPA was established in the first place was that Congress considered health more important than money. So clean-air standards should be enforced even if they are expensive. EPA officials chose to ignore this in hopes that the costbenefit studies would help them justify a relaxation of the standards; then, when things didn't work out the way they had hoped, they changed signals.

Footnote: The White House has

told EPA it wants to see the study,

but it's unlikely the results will be used. Nobody thinks the study "produced good results," an administration spokesman said.

MIDEAST PARADOX: Both sides in the Israeli-Lebanon dispute are citing the late Egyptian President Anwar Sadat as an arguing point. His name was invoked by President Reagan, for example, when Israeli Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir called last week at the White House.

Reagan pointed out that the Egyptian leader was first ostracized by other Arab leaders for signing the Camp David accords, and eventually was assassinated by Moslem extremists. Reagan suggested that Lebanese President Amin Gemayel faces the same fate if he signs a separate peace with Israel,

Jury convicts whites in death of black man

BOSTON (AP) — A jury convicted two young white men of manslaughter Tuesday in the death of a black man who ran into the path of a subway train trying to flee a gang of whites who were stoning and jeering him.

The jury of eight whites and four blacks deliberated all day Monday before finding Francis X. Devin, 20, and William M. Joyce, 19, guilty of three counts each of assault with a dangerous weapon. The jury met for half an hour Tuesday morning before finding the two Boston youths guilty of manslaughter.

Defense attorneys said they will appeal the verdicts.

The prosecution charged that on the night of March 13, 1982, William Atkinson, a 30-year-old maintenance worker, ran into the Savin Hill rapid transit station in the city's Dorchester section to escape the jeering youths who threw rocks and bottles and shouted racial slurs at him.

Joyce shook his head as the verdict was read; Devin stood impassively.

sentencing April 8. Devin and Joyce face up to 20 years in prison for manslaughter and five years for each assault

Donohue told the jury that to convict Joyce and Devin of manslaughter, the panel had to believe that the attack set in motion "a natural and continuous sequence that produces death."

Defense attorney Geoffrey Packard said he would base his appeal on his belief that the prosecution failed to prove its

"The question is whether or not there was sufficient evidence to link the defendant's acts to the death of the victim," he

Joyce's attorney, George Donovan, said he will also appeal on the question of cause but added: "There was evidence that Joyce abandoned a joint enterprise if one existed...There is no doubt in my mind that this can began tandmark

"I believe that if it were a gang of young black men who had attacked a white man and killed him that they would be tried for murder, not manslaughter.' said the minister.

"We are talking about a tragedy, about a black man whose life has been taken from him. We're talking about people who are racist, who acted out that racism against him and now they are victims of their own white racism," Alberts said.

New execution date for condemned killer

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — A new execution date has been scheduled for a condemned killer who was so impatient for a date with death that he unsuccessfully tried to force a deputy U.S. marshal to kill

Charles F. Rumbaugh was ordered Tuesday by State District Judge George E. Dowlen to die by lethal injection before sunrise May 2. But the execution could be stayed again if the U.S. Supreme Court does not rule quickly in another case.

Charlie Brooks Jr. was executed by the state last December, making him the first inmate executed by injection and the first in Texas to be put to death since the high court allowed the reinstitution of the

death penalty. But in January, the Supreme Court eafectively delayed further executions by deciding to use the case of condemned Texas prisoner Thomas Barefoot to review procedures for emergency appeal of death sentences.



Rare potassium problem inherited

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Please write about hyperkalemic periodic paralysis. At least six living members of my family have been bothered with this, but it was not defined until recently. I am presently taking a diuretic for it, but still get the paralysis episodes. If I ride a bike one day, I have the attacks the next. Do attacks subside as one gets older? — Mrs.

Yours is the first letter I have ever received on this quite rare disease. There has not been much written about it, and little is really known about it.

It is an inherited problem characterized by attacks of muscle weakness or paralysis, with attacks lasting for minutes and in some cases hours. It gets its name from the fact that during attacks blood potassium levels rise (kalemic is a reference to that mineral). That potassium is most likely coming from the paralyzed muscles. In your form of this muscle disease (hyperkalemic), attacks are often less severe after adolescence. And the diuretics are used to keep the blood potassium level on the low side. That sometimes prevents attacks from occurring. Attacks often happen after exercise, so you will have to seek guidance in that

Incidentally, there is another kind of periodic paralysis related to the blood potassium level. It is called hypokalemic periodic paralysis, and is characterized by low blood potassium levels, an even more puzzling circumstance. However, the symptoms of the two illnesses are similar


May I make a suggestion? It is that you carry with you some form of identification, a tag that will let doctors know about your rare condition in the event of an emergency. Then if you are taken to a hospital where no one is familiar with your case you can get proper treament as quickly as possible.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Why is it that some doctors give out penicillin for virus infections? I am told that antibiotics do not get a virus. Is there some difference of opinion among doctors about antibiotics vis-a-vis viruses? Or do some doctors just hand it out to make parents feel better when they bring in sick children? -

There's no disagreement. Doctors are aware of the fact that antibiotics are ineffective against viruses. They are effective only against bacteria. So they should be used only for bacterial infections. And patients should not pressure their doctors for a "shot of penicillin" when they have a simple cold — a virus infection.

Those are general principles, but as with all principles (outside of mathematics) there are exceptions. Nothing in medicine is this clear cut. Do I hear someone out there muttering, "here comes Donohue dashing to the defense of the establishment"? Not so.

Example: It is not always possible to tell the difference between a viral and a bacterial infection. A sore throat is a case in point. Many sore throats are bacteria — like the strep germ. You tell the difference by examining a throat culture.







But some doctors will treat a sore throat with penicillin without taking a throat culture. If the germ is there, the penicillin will kill it, and the extra expense of the culture is eliminated. And if the sore throat is viral-caused, that will wear itself out in short order, the way most viruses do. And the earlier you get the strep germ under control, the better. If you can do that with a harmless medicine, like penicillin, you can be that much further ahead.


Other doctors argue that a culture should be taken so that the antibiotic won't be used needlessly. You see, there are valid disagreements in how medicine should be practiced. However, most doctors I know are hesitant to use antibiotics without a good reason. Certainly, they should not be used for those infections clearly due to viruses, like the common cold.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Which foods contain nucleic acid? Are supplements important for nervous system disorders? — Mrs. J.F.

Cells of all living matter, plant or animal, contain nucleic acid. There's no recommended dietary requirement for nucleic cid. You may be referring to one theory about aging, which suggests that a diminished ability of our bodies to produce its own nucleic acid (hence its own protein) is a fault. Yet, I am not familiar with the practice of taking nucleic acid supplements for the treatment of aging or for any nervous system illness.

ATT asks to hike rates for long-distance competitors

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American Telephone & Telegraph Co. asked permission on Monday to boost the rates paid by its long-distance competitors for connections to local switches by roughly 18.6 percent.

The company told the Federal Communications Commission on behalf of its Bell System companies it wanted to put the higher rates into effect April 16.

The change would boost the basic rate for so-called ENFIA access connections from \$183.46 per line per month to \$217.64 per line per month, or an increase of

If allowed to take effect, the increase would be the third in less than a year for AT&T competitors like the MCI Communications Corp.; Southern Pacific Communications; the International Telephone & Telegraph Co.; Western Union, and Satellite Business Systems.

The previous increases totaled roughly 50 percent. AT&T's major long-distance competitors construct their own long-distance networks, but need connections to the switches of local phone companies to complete a long-distance call. The competing carriers pay for those connections based on a complicated formula contained in a negotiated agreement known as Exchange Network Facilities for Interstate Access, or

AT&T said Monday its latest request to boost ENFIA rates did not involve any proposal to change the for-mula, but rather reflected the fact that its competitors have reported they are using their ENFIA connections more each month as their traffic grows.

AT&T spokesman Pic Wagner said the current charge of \$183.46 is based on an average weighted use of 4,474 minutes per line per month, when it appears the competing carriers are now using the lines for 5,236 minutes per month on a weighted basis.

"We estimate the new rates will produce additional

1983 revenues of about \$30 million to \$35 million for the Bell companies," Wagner added.

The ENFIA charges are normally among the largest expenses incurred by competing long-distance


Gary Tobin, a spokesman for MCI, the largest of AT&T's competitors, immediately disputed AT&T's calculations and said his company would challenge the request at the FCC.

"Our usage numbers would not support any request for this kind of increase," Tobin said. "We're convinced the FCC will agree to suspend this. We would also note that AT&T is filing this right when we're preparing to argue our case in the U.S. Court of Appeals here."

Tandy unveils micro-computer with phone capability

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A battery-powered portable computer that fits in a briefcase and can retrieve outside data via a telephone hookup was introduced Tuesday by Tandy Corp.

Tandy said its TRS-80 Model 100, with a suggested list price of \$799, is designed as a "micro executive workstation" and will be marketed through its 8,700 Radio Shack stores.

The computer weighs four pounds, measures 12 by 81/2 by 2 inches, and can be operated comfortably on the lap where it takes up no more room than an opened book, said Tandy spokesman Sid Bates.

The Model 100 includes a display screen showing eight rows of 40 characters each, and it can show text, numbers or graphics. Its keyboard is full-sized with a layout similar to a standard typewriter.

Tandy's new computer comes with five built-in programs for word processing, storing address and telephone directories, and other chores. It comes with internal storage capacity of about 8,200 characters, and can be expanded to store up to about 32,800

In addition, the Model 100 is seen as an important step in combining personal computers with telecommunications.

The machine can plug directly into a standard telephone jack, and by using its "TELCOM" program, the user can then automatically dial up a connection

into a data base provided by information networks for retrieving stock quotes or electronic mail, Tandy said.

"With the Model 100, it may become a common experience to see the person next to you reading the latest Dow Jones reports, not from the traditional printed matter, but from a small computer which receives details over the telephone from an information network such as CompuServe (a unit of H&R Block Inc.)," Bates said.

There are other portable computers now on the market, some smaller than the Model 100, but many have to be programmed from scratch by the user. Tandy is taking an opposite approach by preprogramming its computer to handle several basic functions, and raising the machine's ease of use.





Hague's Shorofsky is a mirror image

CULVER CITY, Calif. (AP) — If you think Albert Hague looks the part of the music professor on NBC's "Fame," chalk it up to typecasting.

Hague is a teacher, lecturer, coach and a Tony award-winning composer who didn't turn to acting until he was 59.

He stars as the acerbic, eccentric teacher, Benjamin Shorofsky, the man who rains on the parade of the students at New York's School for the Performing Arts. He's there to remind the aspiring artists that there's more to a career than the "hey-gang-let's-put-on-ashow" attitude many of them have.

"Shorofsky is two things," said Hague, who grew his professorial white beard when he was cast in the hit movie that inspired the TV series. "He's a dedicated artist in the true sense of the word. He's serious about his work. He's maniacally serious, as I am.

"But he has a passion not to be pompous because pomposity defeats sincerity," Hague

Hague admits there are "enormous similarities" between himself and Shorofsky. Producer-writer Bill Blinn frequently stands near him and picks up his conversation and drops it into the scripts.

"He found out I play table tennis and so Shorofsky plays table tennis," Hague said. "And he found out I don't drive a car, so there was an episode in which they tried to teach Shorofsky how to drive.

'So, in effect, it's really me. It's very flattering that they have gone out of their way to imitate the real Albert Hague.

Hague said that in real life he doesn't teach music but gives instruction in the theater, particularly on how to get a play onto Broadway. Some of the biggest names in the business are his students, but he said reports that Robert Pedford took one of his classes is false.

when he completes filming "Fame" for the season, he and his wife, Renee Orin, will put on a one-night performance of their "Hague and Hague" at the Westwood Playhouse. He described it as humorous autobiographical sketches and songs that describe how he escaped from Hitler's Germany before World War II and came to the United States.

Hague believes it was a performance of "Hague and Hague" in New York that landed him a part in the "Fame" movie.

His wife, who writes under the name, Renee Orin Hague, wrote a script for "Fame" and had hoped to play the guest role. But the part was expanded and she did not want to do such a long role. Betty White took the part and she later played a role in another show.

"She played a villainess," Hague said. "She wasn't really bad, just on the other side. She was representative of a drive to replace an administrator with a computer.

Hague, who is Jewish, was born in Germany but fled the country with his parents after Hitler came to power. "I played a role in an NBC movie coming up called 'Nightmares.' Somebody asked me if I had any nightmares of my own. I said I had gotten out of Germany before the Nazis got me. That was nightmare

He attended high school in the United States. He also attended the Cincinnati College of Music and at one time was known in Ohio as "the King of Boogie-Woogie."

"Someone told me that I'd never understand American music because I wasn't born here," he said. "That was a challenge to me. I say I'm as American as Brahms was Hungarian. He wrote the greatest Hungarian rhapsodies and he was as Hungarian as apple

Hague has a new musical, "Flim Flam," that is Broadway bound. It's based on four O. Henry short stories about "two dedicated

His first Broadway show was "Plain and Fancy" in 1955 and he won a Tony award for his music for "Redhead."

Hague said in his own classes one of the things he teaches is the necessity for hard

"I say you need a talent for pain," he said. "I never tell my students to do anything that I haven't done. If I tell them to sit at the piano working for 14 hours a day, it's because I've done it. It only took me a short while to compose the music for my Broadway shows. But that was the culmination of many years of



A rising tide of marriages, increasing 2-3 percent each year, with half of them being remarriages. Half of all marriages will end up in divorce. Blue law battle begins with emotional

legalized Sunday shopping.
Harold Marshall, a Dallas salesman, said the forces working for repeal of the Blue Law are "raping our school system" by making students work late and weekend hours

'These monkeys are working kids unconscionable hours," he told the House Committee on State Affairs. on Monday.

The committee is looking at several bills aimed at repealing the law banning the sale of 42 items on both days of a weekend. As in past years, witnesses for repeal said the 1961 law is an unfair restriction on free trade, and witnesses who like the law said it provides a needed day of rest.

Despite testimony that no employees would be forced to work Sundays if the stores opened, Marshall said workers - particularly students - would have no choice.

He said his 16-year-old daughter died in a car wreck after being forced to work late hours in a Dallas supermarket.

'These yahoos would run over their own grandmothers for a dollar," he said of the anti-Blue Law "There's ample hours to shop now. Who is having

trouble finding enough time to spend money?," he Rep. Bill Ceverha, R-Richardson, said he got his repeal bill to the House floor in 1981, where it was narrowly defeated. This year, armed with an impressive

fiscal note, he's trying a local option repeal bill. Comptroller Bob Bullock's fiscal note on the Ceverha bill says legalized Sunday shopping would raise \$28 million in sales tax in the next two years, even if shopping was legalized only in urban and border counties.

Despite the impressive prediction, Ceverha said, "Right now, we don't have the votes" to get his bill out of committee. All the Blue Law repeal bills were referred to a subcommittee Monday.

Committee member Gene Green, D-Houston, said Blue Law opponents should concentrate on revision rather than repeal, because, "Repeal is probably not going to happen this session and maybe not next

Anti-Blue Law witnesses - including a judge who ruled it unconstitutional — said the law is archaic. State District Judge Dee Brown Walker of Dallas, who struck down the law, called it a "continual irritant to the people" of a "a 24-hour, seven-day society." Walker's ruling is on appeal, a process that could drag

Robert Goodfriend, a Dallas lawyer who fought the Blue Law in court, said his clients are baffled by the

"What you have done is make legitimate business men in this state operate in continuous legal peril," he

Goodfriend also argued that the intent of the law has become a reason to repeal it. The statute says the intent is "to promote the health, recreation and welfare" of Texans.

"The shopping center has become a recreation center," he said. "It's like the park used to be. It is a place to be with the family.

Trial date set in tape murder case

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) — A 21-year-old La Feria man will be tried on murder charges April 11 in a case involving a tape recording allegedly made by one of the victims.

Paul Wolf is charged with murder in last summer's slayings of schoolteacher Leticia Castro and her fiance, construction foreman Billy Staton, both 26, of San

State District Judge Darrell Hester ruled Monday that Wolf's trial for the slaying of Miss Castro will be held in Brownsville.

The case has generated much media attention because of the tape recording, found on Staton's body the day he was dragged from a Rio Grande Valley drainage canal.

Cameron County District **Attorney Rey Cantu claims** the tape contains "23 minutes of murder" and demonstrates in "grisly detail" the events that transpired the night Staton and Miss Castro were

But Assistant District Attorney Ted Campagnolo acknowledged Monday prosecutors must prove certain elements about the tape - including identification of the speaker in it - in order to have it presented as evidence during the trial.

Prosecutors allege Staton and Miss Castro were killed by Wolf and his wife, Sherry Wolf, July 16, and then dumped in separate Valley drainage canals, where their bodies were discovered three weeks later.

Staton, who is Mrs. Wolf's former husband, concealed a mini-cassette recorder on his body when he and Miss Castro went to the Wolf house to pick up his 21/2-year-old daughter.

Soviet writer surprised by U.S. lack of curiosity

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Soviet free-lance writer Maria Werner says she finds life "complex, wonderful and glorious," and cannot understand why American students do not have characteristically youthful

"Students in America are not very interested in what's going on outside this country. In the papers you can always find 'Andropov, Andropov' said Miss Werner, who free-lances for Pravda and for German-language weeklies in Moscow and Yugoslavia. "But there are 280 million other Soviet people, and no one writes about them.

Miss Werner, in Tucson to visit relatives, said in a recent interview, "When I return to Moscow, I will have guests and guests and guests of the university youth. They will want to know what are the interests of students in America. How you feel about war, the arms freeze, and what you think about Soviet youth.'

A Croatian Yugoslav who became a Soviet citizen in 1948, Miss Werner says she hasn't found the Soviet system oppressive.

'People in America make the mistake of comparing the two countries' political systems," she added. "Each people have their history, desires and ideas on how to build up the society. Your idea of freedom in this country is viewed as anarchy by the Soviet people. 'But you mustn't think everything is imposed from

above," she said. The Communist Party Congress, she said, has the task of carrying out policies and is elected by the people. She added that Pravda published ordinary citizens' letters — even those with complaints.

She says it is a mistake to compare economic, social and technological development of the United States and the Soviet Union. "The Americans made their revolution 200 years ago," she said. "The Soviet Union

made its revolution some 60 years ago.'

Miss Werner, who declined to reveal her age, said she had been interested in writing about people since she graduated from the University of Vienna with a philosophy degree.

"I could not think of another profession than journalism. I was born a journalist," she said.

As one, she said, she appreciates American frankness. "There is such a lack of formality, it allows the natural aspects of people to come out," she said. On the other hand, she says she dislikes the lack of interest Americans show in spiritual things, in particular saying that "they are too much involved with business and how to earn money.

Ex-teacher builds instruments

GARRISON, Minn. (AP) While he was working as a string instruments teacher for Mankato public schools, Arnold Anderson bought a book entitled, 'How to Build a Stradivari Violin.

Studying the methods of Italian master craftsman Antonio Stradivari, who built violins in Cremona, Italy, in the early 1700s, was to change Anderson's

Anderson took a year's leave from his job to bicycle through Europe, and stopped to visit a Stradivari museum in Cremona

"I discovered that there was a violin-making school there," Anderson said. "I took a tour and they asked if I would like to enroll."

Anderson attended the International School of Violin Making for three years, then stayed in Europe another year and a half to collect 61/2 tons of spruce from Italy and Yugoslavian maple, which he says are unequaled in the world for their evenness of grain.

Upon his return to Minnesota, Anderson opened his own violin-making shop in the Twin Cities. Two years ago, he moved the business to Garrison.

"I liked teaching, but I like this better," he said. Anderson, who has been in business eight years, has sold about 100 instruments His violins sell for about \$2,500, violas for \$3,000 and cellos for \$4,500.

Anderson, 38, produces 10 to 12 instruments a year in his home workshop, counts among his customers members of the British Broadcasting Corp. and the Covent Garden Orchestra in London, the New York Philharmonic and the University of Minnesota Orchestra.

"Students going into music professionally will 'sell their souls' for a good instrument," Anderson said. "You can't even touch an Italian violin for what I charge.

Anderson uses wood that has been seasoned at least seven years. Tops of the instruments are always made of spruce, with the rest maple

He uses a planing tool to contour the top and bottom pieces with great care, emphasizing that this step is 'critical' to the instrument's sound.

He then heats an iron to bend six thin maple strips around the sides. The instrument is put together with weak wood glue along side edges, to allow for humidity-related expansion and contraction of the wood, and strong white glue on the fingerboard, bridge and other points of stress.

Anderson lets the instrument dry in the sun to improve the sound quality. then applies from 10 to 15 coats of home-made varnish. The instrument is then ready to be strung and

From start to finish, it takes Anderson about five weeks to build a violin and six weeks to build a viola.



Charles Fry, a 1965 graduate who heads the magazine's board of trustees, told the student newspaper: "In the long life of The Princeton Tiger, there have been occasions when publishing responsibilities have been abused. Unfortunately, this is such

Brooke Shields satire gets student editors fired

Booth Tarkington. Fired by the board of trustees last week were Richard Herschlag, who helped write the article, and magazine President Wendell Long.

The 16-page magazine distributed free at dor-mitories on the Ivy League campus early this month became the topic of letters to the student newspaper, The Daily Princetonian.

"I found it extremely vulgar and sexist," said Hector Delgado, assistant dean of student affairs. "Not just an attack on Brooke Shields, but something just very degrading to women."

Herschlag, a junior from New York, defended his publication: "A lot of people at Princeton can't take a joke. We were surprised at the magnitude of the

Herschlag said Monday the publication was a toneddown version of a special issue that had been planned for December and dubbed "The Brooke Book.

"We decided it was too densely volatile," Herschlag said, adding the magazine's trustees and lawyers advised that he could run one or two articles on Miss Shields if her name was altered.

Scrapping the edition cost the Tiger \$1,500 in advertising revenue and \$500 in production costs, the former editor said.

The publication received \$500 from a fund of student activities fees collected by the university last year. Herschlag said the intention of the controversial

issue was to "poke fun at the male libido." "Now if you're like most of us, you're probably worried about your chances of ... sleeping with Brook, or even getting a date with Brook," the article begins. Delgado said the university plans no further action

A burglar alarm was disabled and dry-chemical fire extinguishers were sprayed on the main vault door, two safes and the floor, apparently to obliterate any fingerprints or shoe marks, he said.

Police, notified of the break-in at 6 a.m. Sunday by a custodian, said they found a rear door forced open and the heavy steel door to the vault room cut open, as were the two 4-by-4 foot safes.

'They apparently first tried to punch a hole through the vault wall,' O'Leary said. "We found a hole in the cement-block veneer, but they stopped and must have decided to cut through the door when they reached the inner wall, which is steelreinforced concrete.

Mystery professor will plead case before judge

LANCASTER, Pa. (AP) — A judge will hear arguments Wednesday on reducing the bail for a jailed college professor accused of using false identities to teach for at least six colleges.

Lancaster County Judge Ronald L. Buckwalter agreed to the bail reduction hearing Monday, after the lawyer for Paul Arthur Crafton, 60, filed a motion saying Crafton was needed at home in Potomac, Md., to

care for his daughter. Crafton, a George Washington University engineering professor who allegedly used false names to teach at two Pennsylvania colleges and at least four other universities or colleges, is being held in lieu of \$150,000 bail in Lancaster County Prison.

Crafton says he needed money to care for his cripple

tion, forgery, tampering with public records and false swearing.

A petition seeking a reduction in Crafton's bail in Cumberland County was filed in Carlisle today with Judge Harold Sheely of the Court of Common Pleas by attorney Dale Shughart Jr., a secretary in Shughart's office said.

No date for the hearing was set, she said. Crafton faces a total of 27 counts in connection with

his simultaneous employment at Millersville and Shippensburg state colleges, 75 miles apart. He also continued teaching part-time at George Washington University in Washington, D.C.

Crafton's lawyer, John F. Pyfer Jr., and Deputy Attorney General Kim Daniel, met privately with the judge at the Lancaster County Prison.

Afterwards, Pyfer said he was encouraged to get a hearing quickly.

The attorney general opposes any reduction in bail because Crafton has "demonstrated he's adept at creating identities for himself," said spokesman

Pyfer said Crafton created the multiple identities to finance operations for his 17-year-old daughter, Laura Melanie, who suffers cerebral palsey and paralytic scoliosis, a curvature of the spine.

The U.S. Navy, meantime, confirmed Monday that Crafton had once worked at one of its laboratories as an engineer

Navy spokesman Lt. Aaron Long said "an individual by the name of Paul Arthur Crafton was employed by the Naval Research Laboratory in Washington, D.C. from May 1944 through January 1969.

Crafton was hired as a mechanical engineer for the Navy and later was promoted to research physical scientist, Long said.

Race track

CHINA GROVE, Texas (AP) - A dusty quartermile strip of land in this South Texas hamlet has kicked up a ruckus and made folks here pretty mad.

stirs up ruckus

You see, Olly Otten wants to bring horse racing here and the city of 434 people has lost its court fight to stop him

About half of this town's adult population — or 135 people - signed a petition against the race track.

'I have retired and bought two acres of land that I can live on and enjoy the rest of my life." City Councilman Burlen Horton said. "Now I got me a race track within 600 feet of my

property. Otten is building the track behind his restaurant in China Grove, a community on a mile-long strip of rural highway about 15

miles east of San Antonio. He and a makeshift crew spend every day working to finish the glass-enclosed clubhouse, grandstand and dirt track before a targeted

Sunday opening. Otten, 46, came to this country from Germany about 20 years ago. He says folks here don't like him because he's foreign.

"No matter how little a town is - China Grove or Aransas Pass - if you haven't been born there, you're a foreigner," he said, with a heavy accent. "That goes back to the

Indians: Horton disputed that, but later said: "He's an immigrant. He wants all the fringe benefits of the democratic process, but doesn't want to contribute

anything. State District Judge Fred Biery denied city of ficials' request for a temporary injunction against Otten, saying they couldn't prove the track was a public nuisance until it started operating.

"We're just going to have to watch and figure out a way to stop it," Horton

The councilman's property adjoins the 101/2 acres housing Otten's Swiss Chalet restaurant, which stands out from the town's homes and feed stores with its twin windmills and oversized Swiss emblems.

"You don't see much beauty in China Grove, Otten said. "I'm trying to bring progess to this town and they don't want that.'

Jerry Lee, who retired and moved here four years ago, said the townspeople haven't been buzzing like this since the Doobie Brothers recorded a rock song about "the sleepy little town down around San Antone.

"We'd rather keep China Grove nice and peaceful and quiet," said Lee, who circulated the petition. "That's why we all moved here in the first place.

"I'm not against horse racing, but I'm against that track.

The race track, dubbed Swiss Chalet Downs, will operate on Sundays for nine months of the year, Otten said.

Texas has no legalized betting, but Otten said he'll make a profit by charging admission and drawing overflow crowds to his restaurant.

He expects people from across the state.

Peopleand quarterhorses are the problem, Horton said.

"Crowds, trash, noise, dirt, manure and urine," he said. "You try to tell me that isn't a public nuisance.

Rainbow Project looks to citizens

She said they have made arrangements with a local store to receive furniture at cost.

Operator recalls work emergencies

"For \$150, we can buy a good quality bed and frame," she said. "We need groups or individuals to buy a bed. This way we will be able to make everything standard and of good quality.

She said they could receive a good chest of drawers for \$75.

The home at 2906 W. 13th also needs a washer and dryer, large cooking vessels, a cutting board, 20 sets of twin sheets and pillow cases and two sets of full-size sheets, Ms. Holt said.

"We'd be glad to accept donated furniture and other items, but we want to make sure everthing is sturdy and long-lasting," she said.

Victor Sedinger, minister of Big Spring First Christian Church and co-chairman of the ministerial alliance, said he hopes to have construction finished by April 9 and to start moving furniture in on April 14.

April 15 is the time-line for applying for a license from the Texas Department of Human Resources," he said. "They will send someone down to inspect and will respond within 30 days."

He said the project's supervisors would then have a limited amount of time to comply with the department.

'The whole process (of licensing) could take as little as 30 days or as many as 90. We're hoping for 30,' Sedinger said.

Pacific railroad man. Upon being named employee-of-the-month, Mrs. Smith said "I'm pleased, but a little embarrassed. I do like people. But I'm afraid that I'm not always the positive person

they say I am. Many of the calls coming into a hospital switchboard come from people justifiably upset. She says her heart goes out to them. Sometimes things become

hectic at her post, though. She remembers one night in particular. The emergency room was filled with people involved in a shooting. The lobby was quiet, but the switchboard shined solid red with incoming calls. She was trying to reach family members to notify them of

the accident. She heard people at the locked front door of the lobby, kicking against the door. She knew they hadn't seen the telephone outside the door, which would have allowed them to identify themselves

'I couldn't afford to let them in without identification, and I was answering 'stat' calls from emergency room by that time. I heard glass break, and angry voices coming toward me. When I looked up. I saw that one of them was badly hurt, a stabbing victim, it turned out.'

They walked straight into the arms of the police, who were all around that night, she said.

Although not all nights and days are like that, Mrs. Smith likes the urgency of her job. She says 'Sometimes I'm able to help people at a time they need it very much."


