

earthquake that sparked 50-foot flames and made a "quiet little country town" look like a "bombed out city" injured more than 45 people and damaged virtually all 2,500 homes here, authorities said today.

"The No. 1 thing is to continue searching for people in the buildings downtown, but they haven't found any so far," said city spokesman Bob Semple. "We're recommending people sleep outdoors because of aftershocks.'

The quake, which struck at 4:45 p.m. Monday, registered 6.5 on the Richter scale and was centered five miles north of this rural oil and farming community in the San Joaquin Valley. No deaths were reported.

'There's no part of the city that's untouched," Mayor Keith Scrivner said today. "All of the residences are damaged, half of them extensively. It's terrible, everybody's going to lose a lot."

Firefighters searched all the buildings, said Fresno County Sheriff's Lt. Merrill Wright. "They have found no injured persons and heard no cries for help.

"Parts of it look like a bombed out city. It was a quiet little country town," Wright said.

At least 45 people were hurt and another 10 to 15 may have suffered See Quake, page 2A

Local investors turn to markets

The stock market is becoming an increasingly popular investment now that Wall Street appears healthy again, attracting some first time dabbiers.

While the newcomers are interested in the market, they are also apprehensive about the complicated ins and outs this type of in-

vestment involves. There is money to be made in the stock market; however, not everyone can reap huge profits. Yet for the small investor there is a common sense set of guidelines that will make investing less risky and provide a basis for a solid investment philosophy.

Local brokers Dan and Ann Wilkins of Edward D. Jones and Co. recently offered several suggestions for the first time investor.


"The stock market is a good place to invest if a person has surplus monies," Dan Wilkins said. "It can be rewarding if the person concentrates on investing rather than gambling. You can't go in with the idea that you're going to get rich quick.'

Mrs. Wilkins said most first-time investors are frightened of the market, its risks and jargon. She suggested that newcomers invest small amounts in stocks just to get an understanding of the market before putting in larger amounts of

"Once you see how it works, you'll find its not that difficult to learn.

Mrs. Wilkins said a person should not use money he may need for something else in the forseeable future. The person should be able to invest the money, leaving it to work for an extended time.

"As insurance, the person should probably have six months to a year in savings in the bank, a good job and some surplus money," said Wilkins. "He should buy good growth companies and hold on to those for two or three years. He

should be patient; if not, he'll make bad decisions if he tries to get rich quick."

He said the minimum a person should have to put into the market is \$600 to \$700.

According to Wilkins, growth companies are those firms developing new methods, products and

markets, or products with increasing demand such as the high technology industry. Investors should avoid cyclical stocks that go up and down with the business cycle. Investors should also look for companies with strong manage-

ment and financial positions. See Stocks, page 2A

Picking broker requires care

Buying into the stock market takes much research and careful planning. The same care should go

into selecting a stock broker. When searching for a broker, most persons are looking for someone in a reliable brokerage firm who will provide adequate service. Here are several guidelines for picking a broker.

 A person should select a broker who can give quick and efficient service. This means the broker should be able to confirm a purchase or a sale within minutes. The broker should also provide price quotes quickly.

• The broker should have a good reputation in the community. Generally, investment counselors, bankers or lawyers can provide an investor with a list of reputable brokers and brokerage firms.

 The investor should pick an experienced broker and one who is working for a firm with an established record of good service.

 The broker should not attempt to sway the investor after a well researched decision is reached. In this respect, an investor should choose a broker who is similar in philosophy. In choosing a brokerage firm, an investor should look for adequate research and information facilities. The firm should also be able to offer qualified advice and recommendations on markets trends and particular stocks

• The brokerage firm should be a member of all principal exchanges (New York Stock Exchange, etc.) and the National Association of Securities Dealers.

very minor injuries, said Bob Manning, Fresno County emergency services coordinator. Manning said only seven had to be taken to hospitals and only two of those were in serious condition.

The downtown area is "completely going to be demolished and hauled away — the entire original buildings in the city of Coalinga," Scrivner said. But he was optimistic: "We can build it again, and we will. We'll make it.

"It's things like you see in the movies," said Bob Green, who fled from a Radio Shack store as it collapsed behind him just in time to see his car crushed by the Coalinga Inn across the street.

"I ran hysterical down the road, my husband right behind me," said Agnes Bement.

The quake was felt along a 450-mile-long stretch from Sacramento to San Bernardino and into western Nevada, but hit hardest in a four-block section downtown and caused heavy damage elsewhere in Coalinga, especially to brick buildings built in the

Houses were hurled from their foundations, roofs gave way, large buildings collapsed in clouds of dust and ruptured gas lines sent 40- to 50-foot flames raging into the sky before they were controlled.

"Ther are 2,500 homes in town, and I don't know if any of them were not damaged to some extent," said Semple. "There is going to be a loss in every home." He also estimated that 50 percent of the businesses suf-

Gov. George Deukmejian declared a state of emergency for Fresno County, setting the stage for large-scale state and federal assistance.

Bulldozers and cranes worked under floodlights through the night, picking up rubble in the search for any people still trapped by flattened two-story brick buildings. Dog teams were brought in to sniff for people who might be trapped under wreckage.

Some residents spent the night in tents or campers on the lawns of their ravaged homes, barbecueing dinner as the odor of smoke mingled with liquor from shattered bottles in nearby stores

Semple said residents were urged to use water from shelters due to the fear of contamination in city lines.

"Hundreds" of aftershocks - some of them surpassing 4.0 on the Richter scale - followed the main temblor, which occurred about 20 to 30 miles east of the San Andreas fault, and minor shocks continued into the morning, said Waverly Person, seismologist with the U.S. Geological Survey in Golden, Colo.

"It's estimated that it will take days to clean up and get an estimate of injuries, loss of life and property,' said Ted Eichman, a spokesman for the California Highway Patrol in Fresno.

But all residents of the town of about 7,000 apparently escaped death.

"We're 99 percent sure that everybody's safe," Fresno County Coroner David Hadden said late Monday. "It's our great hope that we're not going to be needed."

Wilkins suggested prospective buyers research and study areas and companies that interest them before buying. He said brokers can also assist in getting information about companies, offering advice and guidance in the market.

Wilkins' office, as well as other brokers' offices in Midland, offer literature on established and new companies for buyers to browse through. Wilkins' office also has video cassette recorder for showing presentations by various

Persons can also study Standard & Poor's Stock Guide, the Wall Street Journal and the Value Line Investment Surveys for factual, upto-date information about how stocks are performing and how they have done in the past. These materials are available in most libraries.

"There's a smorgasbord of products on Wall Street to fit the needs of the buyer, but it takes a lot of research to tailor the right stocks for a person. You don't want to buy into a company without checking it out," Wilkins said.

Wilkins said he learns the financial position of the prospective buyer and helps him establish goals and desires for the future. "Some people might think that's a

bit nosy," Wilkins said. "But I can better advise you that way.' The broker then learns of specific areas the customer is interested in

investing money. "Once we have that, we'll look at three or four companies as to how well they done in the past and projections as to growth," he said.

From there the person can buy those stocks which best suit his

situation and plan to hold them. "A person should plan on investing, not speculating; if you're

gambling, the stock market is a good place to lose your money, Wilkins said. "If you're smart about it you can get a better than average return; however, there are risks and if you're afraid of them you shouldn't by common stock."

Wilkins said after a person buys stock he should keep up with its progress. A-watchful eye will help individuals decide when to buy or sell in the market

Wilkins suggests staying with a particular stock as long as it remains profitable and healthy, selling on evidence of decline.

Once you start investing and let yourself become involved, you'll really enjoy it. To some it becomes a hobby," Wilkins said.

Any tips Wilkins has for the stock market?

'Don't buy on tips or rumors. Check everything out thoroughly, investigate what you buy."



Two area men missing after plane crash

PORT ARANSAS (AP) - Authorities have been unable to locate two men who disappeared when the single-engine plane in which they were believed to be traveling crashed into the Gulf of Mexico.

Loil W. "Bubba" Ballentine, a San Angelo private

detective, and Phil Schroeder, a corrections officer from Hobbs, N.M., were attempting to land in fog here Sunday night, said Acting Port Aransas Police Chief

But the pair apparently headed out over the Gulf and tried to turn back toward Corpus Christi because the private air strip here did not have lights, he said. Titus said officials have not found any trace of the

bodies, but did find pieces of the plane and personal articles Monday believed to have belonged to the two missing men. Port Aransas police patrolled along the shore through the night looking for pieces of the plane, but

winds and rough waters have prevented an air and sea search, officials said. Titus said the single runway at the private airport had lights until Hurricane Allen destroyed them in

"I had gone to the airport to meet them but it became dark and I assumed they had decided to land

at Corpus Christi," Titus said. He said two fishermen reported that an airplane with its landing lights on made two passes over the airstrip and headed over the Gulf of Mexico. The airplane then turned as if it was heading toward Corpus Christi.

"The weather was pretty heavy at the time," Titus

Mist and fog had been reported on the island when the plane vanished shortly before 10 p.m. The plane disappeared from radar contact at Corpus Christi International Airport, Titus said, when it was

about one-quarter of a mile off Mustang Island. Titus, who has been acting police chief since the resignation of Don Perkins several months ago, said he had invited Schroeder, 45, to apply for the police

chief's job. Ballentine had accompanied Schroeder, Titus said,

to visit old friends Ballentine, about 46, had lived in San Angelo and worked for the Tom Green County sheriff's department before coming to Port Aransas as a detective with the police department. He returned to San Angelo from Port Aransas about a year ago, said Titus, who said he was a friend of both men.

A search was started Sunday night but was called off Monday after pieces of the airplane and "several personal toilet articles" washed ashore. The pieces of the airplane came from the same type of aircraft believed to have been owned by Ballentine.

"You get to know them. Especially if you know their family. I've gotten very close to understanding what a mother feels when she comes here because her son is in jail. When she comes, she's usually emotional. It tears your soul apart. It's hard because my job is to keep them here.

But he admits the work does pay off

"I was talking to a mother whose son had been in jail not long ago," she said. "She had been reading his diary and in there he said that being in jail and talking with the people here at the department was a turning point in his life

"Hearing that was a great feeling," he said.

"You just try to help people by trial and error. It makes you more compassionate. Saunders has lived in Stanton all of his life, and

because of his long residence, he is often asked about town's famous "few old soreheads" sign on Interstate 'Robert Whitaker, who used to be mayor of Stanton,

thought that up 30 years ago. He was just joking about it, I think, but it stuck. The slogan has gotten us a lot of publicity," he said. Because of land development, Martin County will

White loses nuke waste battle

Dump could be located in Panhandle

WASHINGTON (AP) — Texas Gov. Mark White, a Democrat elected to office last November, has had his first Texas-style shootout with the Reagan administration — and lost.

Despite White's objections, administration energy officials have scheduled hearings in Texas this month on the possiblity of locating the nation's first high-level

nuclear waste repository in the Texas Panhandle. "The governor is naturally disturbed about it," said Steven A. Frishman, manager of the state's high-level

nuclear waste office. "I'm disturbed about it. The Department of Energy decided to proceed with the hearings despite a strongly worded letter received last month from White, who objected that hearings should not be held until guidelines for selecting a site are finalized.

Those guidelines are not likely to be in final form until August or September.

After receiving White's letter, the department at first delayed scheduling hearings in Texas. Then, on April 22, Energy Secretary Donald Hodel notified White that the Texas hearings would be held after all, in Hereford on May 16, Tulia on May 17 and Austin on

Frishman said in a telephone interview that the hearings were scheduled "over the objections of the governor.'

Two Texas sites, one in Swisher County and the other in Deaf Smith County, are among nine in six states being considered as possible locations for the nation's first permanent repository for high-level nuclear waste. The other states are Washington, Utah, Nevada, Mississippi and Louisiana.

Under a 1982 law, the department must by Jan. 1, 1985 recommend to the president three of the possible sites for further detailed studies.

However, the department says it wants to make the recommendations by the end of this year, an acceleration that has brought protests from some environmentalists and officials of the states involved.

From among the recommended sites, the president must by March 1987 to choose one as the location for the repository, a deep shaft that would begin accepting waste late in the century.

Frishman said the state would continue to try to reach an agreement with the department similar to one he said federal officials have reached with Mississippi.

In that state, the department said it would hold an initial set of hearings as planned, then, after the site selection guidelines are finalized, subject draft environmental assessments to further public review, of-

Len Arzt, a department spokesman, said that the additional review would include another hearing in

Arzt said that Texas could probably get additional hearings later if it wants them.

Associated Press Writer Dozens of tornadoes knifed through the Great Lakes region in the biggest outbreak this season, with high winds flipping small buildings into the sky, killing seven people, injuring at least 45 and causing millions of dollars in damage.

Meanwhile, thousands of displaced Missouri residents - including those from dioxin-tainted Times Beach - were waiting today for rain-swollen streams to

An estimated 60 twisters caused dozens of injuries Monday in Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York and the Canadian province of Ontario, officials said. Tornadoes or high winds killed four people in Ohio and three in New York.

An estimated \$3 million in damage was caused in southeastern Michigan by tornadoes, heavy rain and hail, officials said. Estimates of the injured included 25 in Ohio, one in Michigan, seven in New York and 13 in Ontario.

In Michigan, as many as 30 homes were damaged and another 10 were destroyed on Harsens Island, about 35 miles northeast of Detroit, said state police Lt. Russell Beamish, who estimated local damage at \$2.5 million. "It's a mess ... There are trees

it's one house or two," Beamish said. Elsewhere, thunderstorms accompanied by winds gusting to 60 mph saturated Arkansas, washing out bridges and closing roads. More than 31/2 inches of

Farther north, more than 1,000 families were evacuated in Missouri's St. Louis, Franklin, and Jefferson Counties as the rain-swollen Meramac River inundated areas including Times Beach, where a flood in December spread dioxincontaminated soil throughout the town. The river wasn't expected to crest until later today, officials said.


Dioxin, a byproduct of herbicide manufacturing, is a toxic substance known to cause liver problems and cancer in laboratory animals.

In Plymouth, Vt., civil defense officials went door-to-door early today urging about two dozen people living below the Woodward Reservoir to evacuate and move to higher ground as water threatened to spill over an earthen dam and flood

Monday's tornadoes were spawned by a lingering cold front centered today over Lake Huron, said Nolan Duke, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service's Severe Storms Forecast Center in Kansas City, Mo. The violent weather resulted when the front collided with warm air along line from Ontario to

'This was a major outbreak of tornadoes - the largest of the season," Duke said early today. "We counted 40 by noon and got reports of another 20 sightings by midnight. Ordinarily, we'd see something rain had fallen in some areas by 7 p.m. like this about the first week of April."

Roman Catholic bishops call for nuclear freeze

bishops today neared the end of their struggle to erect a rampart against nuclear war after deciding to toughen language in a pastoral letter that condemns any use of such weapons — even in case of nuclear

They also called, in effect, for a nuclear freeze, rejecting overtures for a softer line by the White House. After two years of work on the proposed letter, which was expected to be formally approved today, the bishops on Monday showed overwhelming support for it and brushed aside pressure to mute criticism of U.S.

nuclear policies. So far, acting on a tide of amendments at a special two-day meeting, the bishops have consistently strengthened injunctions against nuclear weaponry.

Two changes on Monday termed "morally unjustified" any "deliberate initiation of nuclear warfare" or "a nuclear response to either conventional or nuclear attack.

These possibilities are regarded as options in the "flexible response" policy of U.S. nuclear planning, and the Reagan administration has repeatedly appealed to the bishops to temper their criticism.

But the approved amendments said such nuclear response "can cause destruction which goes far beyond 'legitimate defense.' Such use of nuclear weapons would not be justified."

Asked whether there were any conceivable circumstances in which nuclear weapons morally could be used under the document's principles, Archbishop R. Quinn of San Francisco, former president of the U.S. bishops, said, "My answer is that I cannot conceive of any circumstance when it would be morally justified to use nuclear weapons. The bishops' stance was seen as signaling a historic

shift in the social role of American Catholicism, which in the past has supported national military policies.

The church is "undergoing a deep sea-change," said Auxiliary Bishop John J. Dougherty of Newark, N.J.,

The 44,000-word pastoral letter, to be used as a basis for Roman Catholic teaching and preaching throughout the United States once it is formally adopted, calls for negotiations to end the arms race

and to ban nuclear weapons. The bishops worked swiftly through 85 proposed amendments Monday, most of the 97 prime ones offered, but had nearly 400, mostly secondary, yet to handle.

Like a lone battler against the tide, Archbishop Philip M. Hannan of New Orleans repeatedly stressed the need for military might against aggressors and to uphold human rights, even involving massive civilian

"The experience of World War II, with the devastation of the Rhineland and many other regions, shows the lack of morality in imposing on aggrieved nations

unwarranted shackles," he contended. But his attempts to tone down the letter were rejected.

In one key action, the bishops voted to replace the word "curb," with the more absolute "halt" in calling for "immediate, bilateral agreements to halt the testing, production and deployment of new nuclear weapons systems."

While the bishops, in a footnote, said they were not identifying any "specific political measures," Archbishop John R. Roach, president of the bishops, told reporters the meaning equaled a nuclear freeze. The objective parallels that of the widespread move-

ment for a freeze, including that in Congress, except

that the term generally used is a "freeze" to nuclear expansion, rather than the bishops' "halt" to it. The policy of possessing nuclear weapons as a "deterrent" to using them is accepted by the pastoral

letter only on condition that arms-reduction negotiations are being vigorously pursued.



Monkey business: the last laugh

We've heard of cases where paintings created by turning a chimpanzee loose with a brush and palette have been entered in art shows and won blue ribbons from unsuspecting critics. Now we know what such works of art are worth.

A value of \$25,000 has been placed on a set of 200 drawings in crayon and felt-tipped pen executed by Nim Chimpsky, a chimp used in a Columbia University experiment comparing his artistic abilities with those of children. That works out to \$125 per drawing, which is more than many a human artist can command for the kind of squiggly abstractions that were Nim's

The valuation was set during a long-running court battle over possession of the drawings. William J. Tynan, who worked with Nim as a graduate student when the research was conducted between 1974 and 1976, thinks the drawings belong to him. Columbia University thinks otherwise, and sued Tynan for \$25,000 to cover the value of the drawings plus \$250,000 in punitive damages. Tynan in turn sued Columbia for \$250,000.

A JUDGE HAS DENIED the damage claims of both parties and hopes to settle the matter by ruling that Tynan can keep the drawings if he makes them available to Columbia to be reproduced. The cost of four years of litigation is not known, but our guess is that Tynan or Columbia would have to hock quite a few of Nim's drawings to pay it.

Nim has not been represented by an agent or an attorney in this episode in the history of modern art. He is in a research laboratory in Oklahoma making further contributions to science. Like other chimpanzees, Nim from time to time makes chuckling sounds. Scientists say this is not laughter, because apes are not intelligent enough to appreciate what is ludicrous. But are they really sure?

On cool summer evenings at a Christian study camp in the north woods of Michigan, we stood and sang before a huge picture window that looked out at the trees and the birds and cold Lake Huron.

That was four years ago, during college, where you sit around and talk about Life before you have to

go out and earn your keep. remember one song that was so beautiful in this setting. It was an Irish hymn with a gorgeous melody called "Be Thou My Vision." It sounded great and it was easily one of the favorites.

But look at the lyrics - sing them and you break the false witness commandment.

> Riches I seek not Nor Man's empty praise. Thou mine inheritance Now and always. Thou and thou only First in my heart.

Peter Sellers once said that if he had life to do over again, he'd do everything exactly the same except he wouldn't read Beowolf.

I wouldn't sing "Be Thou My Vision." Deciding to be a Christian is tough enough without lying to God in front of 75 people to the accompaniment of plunky acoustic guitar. But that summer marked the time I was most sure of what was

true about God and Man. I would never be so sure again. Something happened. I became a journalist. Something.

I'm told it's a problem faced by a lot of people who think they "figured things out" in college.

In college you are surrounded by people in more or less the same position as yourself. You are confronted with serious opposition, but

it's controlled. It's no big deal if you lose an argument. Then college dumps you - like

salt out of a salt shaker You hardly ever talk about those things in the real world. I don't know why, because I'm certain that in one form or another it's on everyone's mind.

So you have to fight from accepting everybody else's view of a Christian as compulsive, argumentative Fundamentalist who should be avoided at all costs. Because you don't generally hear anything about them unless they write passionate letters to the editor or walk up and down the street carrying a sign.

I know that is not an accurate picture. But I'm having trouble finding a way of becoming "sure again" except by going to Michigan to study intellectual books about world view and evangelism and sing songs I can't believe like "Be Thou My Vision.'

Here's the catch: I know there is another, better way.

It comes from reading the Bible and looking at forming a religious view as something pleasurable, not as drudgery to be studied with massive textbooks.

I got this view from a book, by the way. God Has Spoken, by J.I. Packer.

"Pleasure, unalloyed and unending, is God's purpose for His people in every aspect and activity of their fellowship with him," writes. "Leave the studying and the yelling to the preachers and

scholars. They get paid for that." That doesn't mean religious conviction should be all easy. It means you shouldn't make it hard on

That's easy enough to know. Hard

enough to practice.

For Lufkinite Wilton Teal, staying out of trouble is not an easy thing to do.

Teal knows the great majority of the members of the Lufkin police force quite well, and he knows the inside of the city jail even better.

The 54-year-old has the well-lined face of a man with a history. His drinking has landed him in jail so many times that the police department has just about lost count.

Tuition hike bill passage chances slim

AUSTIN (AP) - An attempt to raise Texas public college tuition for the first time in 12 years has only a "slim" chance of winning approval by legislators, says the measure's sponsor.

Rep. Gary Thompson, D-Abilene, told the House Higher Education Committee on Monday that tuition should be tied to the state's cost of educating college students.

Currently, he said, the \$4 per semester-hour charged at Texas colleges currently is only 3 percent of the \$105 per student, per hour cost. Thompson's bill would raise tuition approximately \$2 per year until it reaches 15 percent of the cost per student.

"To the degree that we virtually give away education, for many it is a trifling thing," argued Thompson, who is a college professor. Students testified that the measure

is a "necessity tax" and "anti-

education.' Tuition at Texas-operated colleges has not been raised since 1971.

"It's going to be rough going," admitted Thompson after his bill was referred to a subcommittee with only four weeks left in the legislative session. He called its chances "slim." Tuition for out-of-state students

would be almost doubled in the next seven years, with an approximately \$5 increase each year until then. Thompson said approval of his bill.

which is cosponsored by Rep. Rollin Khoury, R-Waco, would give the state about \$16 million in additional revenues in the first two years, and

approximately \$114 million by 1988-1989

Mitch Kreindler, president of the University of Texas Students Association, called the bill "antieducation." He said a tuition hike, in combination with a bill approved by the committee Monday to raise from \$60 to \$100 the ceiling of college fees, would impose a hardship on students barely able to meet current costs. Khoury called current tuition

"unreal." "Not everyone who strolls down the

streets ... is entitled to a college education," Khoury argued.

The committee also sent to a subcommittee a bill to define fees colleges may charge foreign students.

The purpose, said sponsor Bill Presnal, D-Bryan, is to cover costs of counseling and processing paperwork on foreign students.

Several students testified against the bill, complaining that it would strap foreign students who already pay thousands of dollars just in

Nuggets pound Spurs

DENVER (AP) — The Denver Nuggets got their fast break in high gear, crashed the boards and shot effectively from the outside, thus avoiding extinction in their National Basketball Association playoff series with the San Antonio Spurs.

Kiki Vandeweghe scored 37 points and Mike Evans came off the bench for a career-high 23 as the Nuggets beat the Spurs 124-114 Monday night. The victory reduced San Antonio's lead to 3-1 in the best-of-seven Western Conference semifinal series. Game 5 is scheduled Wednesday night in San Antonio.

"I guess we're still buried alive, but we're coming back to life," said Denver Coach Doug Moe. "We've actually had three pretty good performances in a row, and our players are getting healthier.'

NBA Playoffs

The Nuggets still face long odds, however. No NBA team has ever won a best-of-seven series after being down 3-0. But, as Moe pointed out, "You can't get the

Moe had been criticized for his strategy of having his defense collapse inside, thus leaving point guard Johnny Moore open to shoot from the outside. Moore scored 24, 26 and 39 points in the first three games. He led the Spurs again Monday night, getting 27, but he had only four points on 2-of-7 shooting in the first half when the Spurs fell behind by 22 points.

"As for the strategy, you can say what you want, but we've got to shut off their inside game," said Moe. "If they beat us from the outside, more power to them.'

The Spurs had little success from the outside in the first half, allowing Denver to take control. Midway through the opening period, Evans hit three baskets as Denver scored 10 straight points to move to a 12-point lead. Evans wound up with 13 points in the quarter.

Then, in the second period, the Spurs went cold from the floor, failing to score over a four-minute span while Denver was exploding for 14 straight points and taking

Broncos get Elway

Denver signs hard-to-get quarterback

DENVER (AP) - Stanford quarterback John Elway, who threatened to play professional baseball rather than join the Baltimore Colts, has signed with the Denver Broncos, saying "I'm glad

to be playing in the NFL."

The Broncos acquired Elway from the Colts Monday for offensive lineman Chris Hinton of Northwestern — the fourth pick overall in the National Football League draft - the Broncos' 1984 firstround draft pick and quarterback Mark Herrmann.

But there appeared to be several hitches at the Baltimore end.

Sources reported that Colt owner Robert Irsay swung the deal on his own without consulting with team officials, including Coach Frank Kush. And Hinton's lawyer, Dick Lynn, said in Chicago that his client was "crushed" and would entertain an offer from the Chicago Blitz of the United States Football League, whom he had spurned last March.

"We're terribly disappointed," said Lynn, who added that the first he heard of the deal was when reporters started calling him.



Hinting that the Braves, who jumped off with a 13-game winning streak last season, were an accident, the ebullient Papa Dodger boldly predicted: "You can bet the Braves won't win the division this year - no way. I guarantee it."

Going into the second month of the campaign, the Braves are matching their 1982 pace in a nose-tonose struggle with the Dodgers for first place.

Clean the chwads from your chair

NEW YORK (AP) — For the romantic, it's OK that words can't express certain experiences. But for the realist, there are holes in the dictionary, words that Noah Webster left out — like the junk that accumulates on the neck of old ketchup bottles, or the wrinkles caused by extended stays in the bathtub.

Some of those holes now can be filled, thanks to comedian Rich Hall and his "Not Ready for Network Players" who appear on Home Box Office's monthly spoof, "Not Necessarily the News." Henceforth and forevermore, there will be "sniglets" for once-

wordless situations. "Whenever you can say, 'Oh, that thing,' you've got a sniglet," says Hall. "It's something that should have a name but doesn't.

According to Hall's unabridged dictionary, "flen" is the black crusty residue found on the necks of old ketchup bottles. "Grackles" are the strange wrinkles that appear on your body when you've stayed in the tub too

Sniglets are all over the place. During the conversation with Hall, he spied a Bic pen and decided that the innocuous hole on the side of the pen deserved a name. It was dubbed "blint." "You try for a name that fits the image," he says. "But we find a lot of these words have some of the same sounds."

"Lub" is any particle of food that becomes lodged in one's teeth, prompting the fear of same, "lubophobia." "Lebbetts" are the mangled pieces of bread in a bag that are passed over for fresher pieces. "Chwads" are those hard pieces of gum that seem to be part of the furniture, at least they're frequently found under chairs and tables.

Hall says "flen" is the most popular sniglet. 'Research says HBO's primary audience is males from 18-25, and that describes the kind of guy who's

bound to have an old ketchup bottle around," he says. The idea for sniglets came when Hall was mailing a letter, then checking and rechecking to make sure it went down the mailbox. He calls that "premblememblemation." Many viewers must have experienced it when they mailed their sniglets to HBO.

Hall says about 10,000 suggestions have been received. "Many of them are crude and dwell on bodily functions," says Hall. "One we keep getting is the goo that's in the corner of your eyes when you wake up. Some suggestions are written in crayon. We got one

None of Hall's sniglets have achieved official sanction. "When I called, both Funk & Wagnall were both out, and Daniel (he means Noah) Webster is dead,"

says Hall, a stand-up comedian by profession. Hall is a writer and on-camera company member of HBO's "Not Necessarily the News," a fast-paced collection of send-ups, news spoofs and splice jobs on politicians. Some segments were part of the underground tapes that recently were making the rounds in Washington, including the White House's close-circuit TV system.

When an announcer intones, "Ladies and Gentlemen, the president of the United States," Reagan, from an old movie clip, saunters into a Western saloon. He's wearing a white hat and is confronted by a vermin who isn't: "I'm poor and I'm hungry. What am I going to do?"

Reagan says 'shut up' and decks him. In the spirit of bipartisanship, House Speaker Tip O'Neill is also on the tapes. With a little audio hocuspocus, his roll-call vote turns out to be orders for pizza "How many for anchovies?"


