

Learning the ropes

World champion ropers share their talents

ELBOW — Tuesday afternoon, the cowboys were standing and throwing ropes at wooden sawhorses and plastic calves heads lashed to hay bales.

By evening they were on real horses roping real cattle in a lighted arena.

At week's end they hope to be on their way to real competition in rodeo team roping events.

These 40 enthusiastic cowboys from Howard County and as far away as Virginia are being taught roping by a world champion roping team from California.

The school is sponsored by Bob Price and Kessie Kothmann of Howard County and is being taught behind Price's home on his 250-acre ranch near Elbow.

"Our company (P.K. Industries) is dedicated to the teaching and staging of roping events," Price said Tuesday. "We hope to make this an annual thing in the county."

The first school began Tuesday and ends today. Students and teachers all agree it is off to a good start.

Price and Kothmann advertised the school in the Professional Rodeo Cowboy Association's program over the last year. Students pay \$250 each and must provide their own horses, transportation and places to stay.

The main draws, Price said, are the two champions

— Doyle Gellerman and Walt Woodard. As a roping
team, they were 1981 PRCA World Champions and
are tied for first place this year.

"This is good refresher for us," Gellerman said as he walked around the arena giving pointers to cowboys tossing their ropes at the sawhorses. "You're dealing with basics, and there's no better way to keep learning and improving."

Gellerman is teaching the "heelers," those who rope the cattle by the heels while their partners try to See ROPING, page 2A

White: No use for special session

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Mark White says there is no use in calling lawmakers back to town for a special session until he has some assurance they will support his

"There's no sense to keep them after class just to be hard-headed about it," White told reporters Wednesday at his regular weekly news conference. "I am certainly not going to call one (a special session) until the Legislature is prepared to take action in some of these areas."

A pay raise for schoolteachers financed by a tax on luxury items — White's pet project — failed during the regular session, and the governor said he needs time to try to build new support for it.

He said when he visited the House

and Senate Monday night just before adjournment of the 140-day regular session, "I had many of them who'd suggested we shouldn't do it at this time tell me that they would be willing to do it as soon as we could, and I think more and more people will be coming to that postion."

In the meantime, White denied that a special session was mandatory this summer to address three other major issues left hanging by the Legislature — the possible end of the Texas Employment Commission, a statewide water plan, and a brucellosis control bill.

The TEC required a bill to keep it operating because of the state's "Sunset" law designed to reduce bureaucracy, but the bill was killed See WHITE, page 2A

Pilot makes emergency landing in Midland

MIDLAND (AP) — A Federal Aviation Administration official says that low oil pressure prompted the pilot of an American Airlines Boeing 727 carrying 116 people to make an emergency landing here.

The FAA spokesman in Fort Worth said that the plane, Flight 350 from El Paso to Dallas-Fort Worth Regional Airport, landed in Midland Wednesday night after losing oil pressure in one of its three engines.

"He had his Number One engine out. It wasn't much of an emergency," said Rex Hudson, FAA controller in charge of the Midland Airport tower. "He was going up to Dallas at about 30,000 feet and he just swung down here as a precaution."

He said the plane landed without incident and was serviced by mechanics for 90 minutes before resuming its route. Officials said the plane landed safely at the

Dallas-Fort Worth Regional Airport Wednesday night. Hudson said the plane's crew reported the engine problem at about 7 p.m. when it was 40 miles west of Midland. He said the plane landed at about 7:25 p.m. American spokesman Art Jackson said 116 people were on board the flight.

"The engine had a loss of oil pressure and they shut it down, and when you do that, you land at the nearest airport, which happened to be Midland," said Jackson. "It is not an uncommon occurrence, but I don't mean that it is an everyday thing either."

The FAA spokesman in Fort Worth, who declined to be identified, said that loss of oil pressure was given as the reason for the Midland landing.

"There was no emergency declared or anything of that type," the spokesman said.

Kidnapping suspect arrested in El Paso

Two Big Spring police detectives arrested Manuel Arteaga, 25, at the El Paso County sheriff's office resterday afternoon in connection with last week's aggravated robbery and kidnapping of local businessman Roy Lee Powell.

Arteaga had been arrested at 8:30 a.m. May 26 by El Paso police on an aggravated assault warrant and held there for Big Spring authorities, police Lt. Alvis Jeffcoat said

Peace Justice Lewis Heflin said today he denied bond for Arteaga because the suspect refused to sign his statement of rights and because an additional kidnapping charge will be filed against the man.

According to police reports, Powell was robbed at knife point and kidnapped from Al's Trading Post at 2607 W. Highway 80 at 16

a.m. Monday, May 23.

His kidnapper stole \$250 cash and five each of watches, rings and knives from the store. Then he tied Powell's hands with a shoelace rom a pair of sneakers at the store, drove him about 180 miles to the junction of Interstate Highways 20 and 10 and left him.

Powell hitchhiked to Pecos and filed a report at the sheriff's office. An all points bulletin for the kidnapper's arrest was issued that night, and Arteaga was arrested three days later.

Powell hitched a ride to Odessa where his wife and a friend picked him up and brought him back to Big Spring, about 14 hours after his abduction.

Jeffcoat said some of the stolen property was recovered after Arteaga's arrest.

Two cases slated for trial

Two cases are slated for trial in 118th District Court next week, including a murder case involving the shooting death of a 10-year-old girl.

Jury selection is expected to begin Wednesday in the murder trial of Nelta V. Thompson, 54, of 1609 Avion in Big Spring. Mrs. Thompson is charged with shooting Michaela Marlene Reeves, 10, on May 17, 1980 in Big

According to the grand jury indictment returned in June 1980 against Mrs. Thompson, she was attempting to shoot a Patty Howell but shot the child instead. The young girl was identified as Kay Thomas at the time of the shooting, according to the district attorney's office.

The murder case has been set for trial on previous occasions, according to court records. Roy Ford is representing Mrs. Thompson.

A civil case will be tried Monday, with jury selection beginning that morning. Landon Burchell of Howard County is seeking damages from Cap Rock Electric Co-op, Inc. Burchell's suit states electric lines were installed on his property in March 1979, reducing its value.

CANYON (AP) — Americans who make their living harvesting the nation's crops want to stop the influx of Canadian competitors whom they say get unfair advantages because of U.S. government regulations.

AT STAKE IS a harvest diminished by a government program that pays farmers to leave fields unplanted. The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates this year's harvest will be off by as much as 25 percent because of the Payment-In-Kind program, leaving fewer acres for the competing American and Canadian custom harvesters.

'We have nothing against the Canadian people, but we've got enough machines and less acres, and we don't need them," Swisher County custom harvester J.L. Pettiet told the Dallas Morning News. "We just don't need their equipment.

Pettiet is president of the 180-member U.S. Custom Harvesters Inc., a Canyon-based group seeking to stop the Canadians at the border.

THE GROUP SAYS Canadians can contract harvesting for less than Americans because the government gives Canadians a number of tax and immigration advantages that are not extended to U.S. harvesters working in Canada.

And the group, which was formed in April, has succeeded in getting the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service to close loopholes in a 40-yearold policy that exempted Canadian workers from U.S. labor restrictions that normally apply to foreigners.

But the move prompted a sharp response from the Canadian government, and a U.S. State Department official said Canada has asked for talks with U.S. officials on the issue in this month. ONE CANADIAN WARNED his country was con-

cerned about what it interpreted as a unilateral change in a harvesting agreement between the two nations. Although the issue has international implications, Pettiet said he and 2,500 other U.S. custom harvesters see it as a pocketbook issue.

"We really don't care if it tees them off or not because they've been fleecing the U.S.," said Pettiet. 'We're looking out for our own harvesters. What they (the Canadians) have had is strictly a gravy train." The harvesters follow the harvest season as it moves

from Texas in the late spring to the Dakotas in early fall. They contract with farmers to bring in their grain and work as long as 18 hours a day, seven days a week. George Weiss, 63, of Canyon said the Canadians can charge from \$2 to \$4 less an acre because of their advantages and the U.S. Farmer exannot be blamed for

hiring the Canadians. THE 1942 HARVEST agreement between the United States and Canada was drafted during World War II when farm equipment and farm workers were scarce in both countries.



"I'd seen Woodard rope at the national finals that year (1976) and he was fast. I was accurate, but I needed the speed," he said. In 1977, they placed fourth with winnings of \$5,000.

They steadily improved until their first place finish with \$48,818 each in 1981.

"Every dollar is a point," said the 30-year-old

A meeting of the Texas Brahman Breeders Association is scheduled for June 7 in Austin. Officials say producers may unite to urge Gov. Mark White to put the matter before the Legislature this summer.



Texas Methodists favor nuke freeze in convention vote

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Delegates to the annual United Methodist Church's Southwest Texas conference supported a nuclear weapons freeze and called on Congress to allocate 10 percent of the military budget "to feed the hungry (and) clothe the naked."

IN A SHOW-OF-HANDS vote, delegates on Wednesday also called on President Reagan to take the initiative in seeking a nuclear freeze to end the nucleear

"We realize this is an idealistic thing," said George Ricker, chairman of the Board of Church and Society, which offered the resolution. "But this is a move in the right direction. Something positive like that is

The conference here ends today.

THE RESOLUTION TO end the testing, production and deployment of new nuclear weapons systems also urges that 10 percent of the defense budgets of the two superpowers be turned over to some recognized international relief agency "to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, educate the illiterate, care for the sick."

For the United States, that would amount to about

The resolution also commended the National Conference of Catholic Bishops for its recent controversial pastoral letter on the nuclear arms race and called on United Methodists to join the Catholic bishops in the effort to ultimately eliminate the atomic arsenals of both

the United States and the Soviet Union. ATTEMPTS TO AMEND the nuclear freeze statement were all voted down despite heated debate,

Ricker said. "There was a question about whether we can trust the Soviets." Ricker said. He referred to a pledge from Russian leaders that the Soviet Union will not be the

first to use atomic weapons. On Tuesday, a bitter debate over an emergency resolution banning homosexuals from being ordained in the Southwest Texas region delayed discussion of the nuclear arms issue.

Also Wednesday, delegates approved a resolution calling on the United States to grant "extended voluntary departure status and honorable treatment and respect" to Central American refugees.

THE RESOLUTION URGES that Central American citizens be treated in the same manner as refugees

from Poland, Russia, Cuba and Vietnam. The McAllen District delegation began the debate on the role of homosexuals in the church on Tuesday by offering a petition calling for "fidelity in marriage and celibacy in singleness" by ordained ministers.

An amendment by Seguin lay delegate Jimmy Walker that he said would make the same requirement of the Methodist laity won overwhelming approval. AFTER MEMBERS QUESTIONED the meaning of "celibacy," saying complete dedication to abstinence

of sex would disallow marriage, an amended petition barely passed, 324 to 316. McAllen District superintendent, the Rev. John W. Platt, said the result of the petition was to prevent

homosexuals from holding official posts. 'That will be the end result, but the main purpose was to clarify what we understand the Christian lifestyle to be. There has been confusion and unrest in the church arising out of the election of an avoyed homosexual last year to the Church and Society

Platt was referring to Troy Stokes of Austin, who was not renominated to the board this year. Platt said the petition would be sent to the v general conference to let "them know what the people

from the grass roots have to say." On Tuesday, Gene Leggett, who was removed from the ministry in 1971 after announcing his homosexuality, said that since the conference opened Sunday night, everything has revolved around sexual lifestyle.

Road work continues on Forsan stretches

The Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation is in the middle of a \$664,300 project to improve four miles of road near Forsan

Construction began March 1 and will be completed sometime this summer, department Resident Engineer Joe Smoot said Wednesday. Three miles of county road 461 from U.S. Highway 87

to Forsan and a mile of road south of Forsan are being paved and widened. Howard County furnished the right of way, and state

highway funds are being used to pay for the project. Part of the road south of Forsan is complete and is being used as a detour for traffic rerouted from the closed three-mile section.

When complete, the entire four mile section will become FM 461. In addition to the paving, a protected left turn lane? will be built at Highway 87 and the new road.

Smoot said FM 461 will be of similar quality to U.S. West Texas Roads Inc. of Big Spring was awarded the contract for the work, Smoot said.



Volunteers 'salvation' of flood-ravaged Utah

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Thousands of volunteer workers have been the salvation of flood-ravaged Utah, filling sandbags, donating equipment and running through neighborhoods to shout warnings of flash floods, authorities say.

"Other people around the country can't believe we can get out 40,000 wolunteers to help," Gov. Scott Matheson said Wednesday. "The sense of community and self-sufficiency is part of the Utah heritage, and in this case the volunteer effort has been

unprecedented."
"You ask for 10 or 20 people, and they bring you 30, 40 or 50. I can't believe it,' said Rick Olsen, volunteer coordinator for Salt Lake County. "They seem to be happy to do it. They have been the

mainstay of the whole system." "It's hard, backbreaking stuff," said Michelle Lang, 17, of Sandy, after five hours of sandbagging with a group of friends. "But we're coming back at mid-

night because we're having fun." The flooding, caused by warm weather melting a record snowpack, has forced hundreds of residents from their homes throughout northern Utah and caused damage estimated in the

millions. Olsen estimated that in Salt Lake County alone during the past four days, as many as 15,000 citizens have responded to officials' pleas for help in fighting mud and water spilling from the

Wasatch Mountains. By Tuesday, county officials estimated volunteers had laid nearly a million sandbags along rampaging creeks, city curbs, around homes and businesses and down streets turned into makeshift rivers.

Olsen said volunteers also went through endangered neighborhoods on foot and by car to announce flash flood warnings.

In dozens of smaller cities and towns elsewhere in the state, officials marveled at the hundreds of people who gave up their Memorial Day weekend to lug sand in 90-degree heat.

The weather turned cooler this week, but the water turned vicious as mudslides and flash floods partimeled

the towns of Farmington and Bountiful.
The party atmosphere of the earlier sandbagging efforts was gone, but the volunteer crews remained, slogging through cold, knee-deep muck to shore up levees or help neighbors clean up nomes

At churches and public buildings, helpers formed assembly lines to pack sandwiches, or assisted flood victims in finding clothing and shelter for the

Red Cross officials said more than 90 volunteers joined a dozen staff members to set up six disaster shelters. By Wednesday, said spokesman Don Cobb, the agency had prepared and served 41,000 meals to victims and volunteers.

Volunteers are showing up around the clock at Salt Lake City and county garages, where the sandbagging effort has centered, said Ezra Borman, a foreman at the city's public works

Borman said the volunteers come and go as they please, some putting in 16-hour shifts filling and stacking 50-pound bags of sand.

Israeli war 'not plotted'

Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin, trying to allay fears of war, says his country is not plotting to attack Syria, and Israeli reinforcements have started pulling back from the cease-fire line in Lebanon.

"It doesn't even occur to us to attack Syrian forces," Begin said in a speech to the Israeli Parliament Wednesday in Jerusalem, after Syria repeatedly charged Israel was preparing to make war.

Begin also conferred with U.S. special envoy Philip C. Habib, who was heading back to Washington today after briefing Israeli leaders on Syria's refusal to accept the Israeli-Lebanese troop-withdrawal pact signed last month. Details of the discussions were not released.

In eastern Lebanon's Bekaa Valley, a growing revolt against Yasser Arafat jeopardized the unity of his Palestine Liberation Organization, which has deployed thousands of guerrillas behind Syrian lines. A senior Arafat aide announced Wednesday

that he and more than 24 other commanders were joining the mutineers, who claim Arafat is not committed to total war with Israel to achieve the PLO's goal of a Palestinian state.

The Syrians conducted military maneuvers near the Israeli-occupied Golan Heights last-

week, shot missiles at Israeli reconnaisance jets over Lebanon and increased their forces in the Bekaa. But reporters there said Tuesday the Syrians were thinning out their forces. "We hope that now that their exercise is

over, they will not attack us," Begin told the Israeli Parliament.

Israel poured reinforcements into Lebanon last week to respond to the Syrian buildup. But combat units headed back to Israel on

Mideast

Wednesday, clogging the narrow roads in southern Lebanon.

"The army adapts to realities in the field." said one Israeli military source. "If there is tension, then it acts accordingly, and if there is no tension, then it also acts accordingly.'

Diplomatic sources in Beirut estimated Israel moved 10,000 men into eastern and central Lebanon last week, increasing its total force there to 35,000 men. The Syrians are believed to have 40,000 troops in Lebanon, backed by 8,000 to 12,000 PLO guerrillas.

Though the threat of war eased, guerrillas persisted in harassing Israeli soldiers, ambushing a convoy with machine guns south of Beirut. The Israelis suffered no casualties and seized one of the attackers, identified by Lebanese radio as a southern Lebanese Moslem.


Syrian President Hafez Assad returned to Damascus on Wednesday after a 24-hour visit to Col. Moammar Khadafy, the Libyan leader, in Tripoli, where Assad renewed his pledge to wreck the Israeli-Lebanese withdrawal accord.

Israel invaded Lebanon last June, routed PLO guerrillas from their Beirut stronghold by late summer and signed the U.S.-mediated troop-withdrawal accord with Lebanon in

Under the pact, Israel will withdraw its forces when the Syrians and Palestinian guerrillas pull out. Syria contends the agreement threatens Syrian security and violates Lebanese sovereignty because it would allow Israeli patrols in southern Lebanon to help prevent guerrilla attacks on northern Israel.

The Syrians have been in Lebanon since 1976 under an Arab League mandate to enforce the armistice that halted the Lebanese

Greece gave Nixon money, book reveals

WASHINGTON (AP) - Former President Richard M. Nixon received secret campaign contributions from the military government of Greece in his 1968 election campaign, according to a

new book by a prize-winning reporter.
The book, "The Price of Power," by
Seymour M. Hersh, also reports that Henry A. Kissinger may have blocked a Senate investigation of possible Central Intelligence Agency involvement in the political donations.

The book, scheduled for publication June 13 by Summit Books, suggests that Kissinger courted both sides in the 1968 presidential campaign. Hersh reports that Kissinger not only gave secret in-formation about the Vietnam peace talks to Nixon but offered Democrat Hubert Humphrey data he could use to discredit Nixon.

Asked about his role in the 1968 campaign on ABC television's "Nightline," Kissinger called Hersh's report "a slimy lie.

An aide in Nixon's New York office, Nick Ruwe, asked to comment on the, or Hersh allegations, said, "Former President Nixon only comments on his own Hersh says the Greek campaign con-

tributions were confirmed by Henry J. Tasca, a career Foreign Service officer during the Nixon administration, in secret testimony before the House Intelligence Committee in 1976.

Such contributions were legal in 1968. On Sept. 22, 1970, the Nixon ad-

ministration lifted an embargo on arms shipments to Greece that had been imposed after a military junta seized power in 1967. The junta, strongly criticized for its human rights record, collapsed in 1974 and parliamentary elections were held.

Hersh says Tasca, who died in 1970, testified that Greek-American businessman Thomas A. Pappas served as a conduit for the campaign contributions. He quotes Elias P Demetracopoulos, a Greek journalist who moved to Washington after the junta took power, as saying the money amounted to "hundreds of thousands of dollars."

Pappas, who has homes in Boston and Athens, could not be reached for comment

Demetracopoulos charged in interviews in 1975 that money from the Greek central intelligence agency, known as the KYP, had been funneled into the Nixon campaign.

"In an interview Wednesday, Demetracopoulos said he knew the money came from the KYP "through the same sources who tipped me off about the transaction in the first place."

Hersh says Tasca's information which was financing the Greek intelligence operations at the same time, was aware that some of its funds were being returned to the United States for use in its presidential election.'

Rebels vow to kill U.S. advisers

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) - The most radical leftist guerrilla band in this war-torn nation has vowed that all U.S. military advisers working with the Salvadoran government will 'return to the United States in coffins.'

The warning Wednesday came from the Popular Liberation Forces, which took responsibility last week for the murder of Lt. Cmdr. Albert Schaufelberger, 33, of San Diego, Calif., deputy commander of American military advisers in El Salvador.

Schaufelberger, in charge of security for the military group, became the first U.S. adviser killed in El Salvador when he was gunned down May 25 while waiting in his car for a woman friend at Central American University.

"All the military advisers sent here will return to the United States in coffins," the rebel group said in leaflets sent to local radio stations.

They said Schaufelberger's murder was a warning against "the bellicose Reagan administration so that it does

The leaflets said the U.S. advisers, now numbering 51, "have invaded our soil and massacred our compatriots every day." They said the guerrillas "will be implacable with them, until it achieves their total withdrawal from our beloved homeland."

Editorial

A leaner, more effective defense

The United States must remain strong, in order to be secure. It must have an effective defense in order to deter potential aggressors and to protect its interest.

A sound defense requires modern weapons of all varieties. They must be as sophisticated as those of any other nation. And they need to be practical, which means that military personnel must be able to operate them and they must be durable.

A sound defense also requires highly trained personnel in sufficient numbers to cope with emergencies. And, of course, there must be an efficient organization with qualified leadership.

THIS YEAR, PRESIDENT REAGAN asked Congress for a 10 percent increase in the military budget. He argues that the United States is behind the Soviet Union in its military capability and must add new weapons systems in order to be able to deter Soviet aggression.

Congress must decide whether the president's request is reasonable or whether it would purchase unnecessary or ineffective armaments.

For example, the Army asks for huge new M-1 tanks that have broken down in tests and need frequent refueling. The Navy wants expensive new aircraft carriers that would be vulnerable to enemy rockets.

The F-16 airplane would cost nine times more than original estimates. The Tomahawk missiles would cost roughly five times estimates.

Almost every new military system developed in recent years has been far more costly than original bids have indicated. Many of them are so complicated that operating manuals run hundreds of pages, and troops are unable to repair and maintain them in the field.

In short, much of the Pentagon's money goes for complex equipment that is costly and impractical.

CONGRESS SHOULD REVIEW Defense Department purchasing methods, whether new technology is really better than simple weaponry, whether proposed weapons systems will work and how much duplication is built into the budget.

If it forces the Pentagon to justify each part of its budget, it probably can cut billions of dollars from the request. It also can create a leaner and more effective defense establishment.

Structure of the House

WASHINGTON — The favorable vote on funds for the MX missile traces the new structure of power in the House of Representatives. The levers of control have moved from top to middle management.

Leadership, once that change has been understood, becomes possible, if not easy. In national security matters, it is more than ever clear that President Reagan's problem lies not with the Democratic Congress, but within his own administration.

The way the House worked before the post-Watergate reforms of the mid-'70s was well known. Here is a classic description by Prof. Nelson Polsby of the University of California:

"In the old days ... a president could strike a bargain with the congressionial leadership, and the leadership could deliver the Congress. Committee chairmen ruled the roosts ... once a committee chairman committed himself to cooperation with the president, the president's task of assembling a majority in Congress was greatly simplified."

THE WATERGATE election of 1974 brought to the Congress some 70 Democratic freshmen. They were young, competent and sasy toward their seniors. They pushed through a series of reforms that eroded the power of committee chairmen and other leaders. For a long time, the newcomers showed their mettle by opposing, and often defeating, proposals advanced by the leadership and the committee chairmen — often on behalf of the president, and sometimes in the

area of national security.

Under Presidents Ford and Carter, the House came to be known as a headless body. Here is a typical description, from a 1979 issue of Time magazine: "Congress has become a catfight of centrifugal

energies, a fractured, independent crew that in its less disciplined moments approaches the opera buffa standards of the Italian Chamber of Deputies."

Since then, the reformers have become keen on governing. If taken into a project at the beginning, instead of being left out or merely asked to go along, they are prepared to serve as leaders, not banana peels. Which is what happened in the case of the MX funding.

DEMOCRATIC leaders, and particularly the arms control enthusiasts in the media, lined up hard against the MX after the Reagan administration came to office. All the Democratic presidential candidates opposed it. So did Speaker Tip O'Neill and his chief lieutenants. A particularly formidable foe was Joseph Addabbo, chairman of the Defense Subcommittee of the Appropriations

Committee.

Brent Scowcroft, the chairman of the president's MX commission and the architect of its recent MX proposal, sought out Les Aspin, a liberal Democrat from Wisconsin, who worked in the Pentagon before entering the House in 1970. Gen. Scowcroft emphasized that the MX commission wanted small, mobile weapons with a single warhead that could open the way to an arms control deal with Russia.

On that basis, Aspin was able to recruit a pro-MX contingent of younger congressmen, many of them Democrats. One was Albert Gore of Tennessee, an arms control expert with close ties to Speaker O'Neill

With these onetime wreckers now playing a constructive role, four senior Democrats — Majority Whip Tom Foley, Majority Leader Jim Wright, Deputy Majority Leader Bill Alexander and the leader of the Democratic Caucus, Gillis Long —

swung over to support the MX. Speaker O'Neill, thanks to a strong pitch from Gore, agreed not to oppose the project.

As a result, Addabbo was beaten in his subcommittee and in the full Appropriations Committee. Tuesday the full House voted to approve MX funding, 239 to 186. Democrats supporting the measure numbered 91, and included Foley, Wright, Alexander and Gillis Long.

THE MX IS still a long way from home. Many votes lie ahead. But a majority in the House and in the Senate is clearly available as long as the administration supports the arms control emphasis implicit in the Scowcroft report. That emphasis, made explicit by Congressman Gore, asserts that the ratio of offensive warheads to launching situs tean the tkept latter level which denies to either the U.S. or Russia a first-strike capability. In other words, the ratio can be vulnerable to each other's deterrent.

Problems arise because the administration as a whole does not accept that position. On the contrary, the Defense Department, and especially the Air Force, keep talking as though they want to develop a first-strike capacity for the U.S. As to the president, he seems unaware of the argument. At one point, in fact, he told the Scowcroft commission: "I haven't read your report, but the MX is one of my best friends."

With the president so detached from the big issue, opposite views are bound to persist within the administration. As long as they do, doubts and suspicions will remain in the Congress. And with the Congress uncertain, the Russians have no incentive to do anything but play propaganda games in arms control.

My husband has left me

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: My husband and I have had troubles for years, but finally he has packed his bags and left to go live with another woman. I am angry and depressed, and just don't know what to do. Can you offer me any hope? — Mrs.

DEAR MRS. L.N.H.: I do not know whether or not your husband will ever return to you, although I pray that your marriage will somehow get on the right track and you and your husband will discover the joy that God intended marriage to be. But I can offer you hope of another type — and it may be that God will work in ways you could never imagine to bring healing to

your marriage.

God wants to help you in this situation. He wants to help you overcome the bitterness and anger that you feel, and he wants to encourage you. He loves you, and he knows that anger and depression will never help you deal with your problems — they only make them worse. Listen to what the Bible says: "Cast your cares on the Lord and he will sustain you" (Psalm . 55:22).

Or again, "Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7). God wants you to take this problem and put it into his hands. He wants you to learn to trust him and look to him for strength. The first step you need to take, therefore, is to admit to God that you are angry and depressed, but that you want to commit this whole situation to him and seek his will and strength.

But more than that, you need to commit not only this problem but your whole life to Jesus Christ. Your letter indicates that you have never paid much attention to God. But God sent his Son into the world to offer you forgiveness and new life. Invite him into your heart by faith, and learn the joy of knowing that Christ is with you every moment of the day.

Then get involved in a church where Christ is preached and you can meet other Christians. You may well find some of them who have a similar background to you, and they can help you deal with the problems and adjustments you face. Whatever the future holds, learn to trust Christ.

Slush fund for 'distinguished visitors'

LIVING IT UP: The Pentagon's lavish expenditures on creature comforts aren't limited to our own generals and admirals. Foreign brass hats are treated with equal extravagance.

Buried deep in the Pentagon budget is a \$12 million slush fund earmarked for "emergency and extraordinary expenses." They're extraordinary, all right. In 1981, at least \$1.3 million was doled out to show visiting dignitaries a good time in this country,

While the Pentagon officially lists \$381,055 in outlays from the slush fund for "Distinguished Visitors," my reporter Rhonda Quagliana found that this greatly understates the amount that was actually spent wining and dining the foreign poohbahs.

The visitors were responsible for their own transportation to the United States, but once they got here, U.S. taxpayers paid close to \$1 million for carting them around in military aircraft. The bills also covered meals, booze, hotels, laundry, phone calls — even engraving for photo albums.

An eight-day grand tour by Japanese Admiral Tsugio Yata and three aides cost \$21,576 in airfare around the United States, plus \$3,865.52 for their room, board and miscellaneous expenses. They stayed in such plush hostelries as the Stanford Court in San Francisco and the Watergate in Washington.

Four New Zealand military guests of the Army cost the tax-payers \$1,572 for three nights at the Stanford Court.

One night at the Waldorf Astoria

in New York cost \$550.23 for four Tunisian guests.

One dinner for four Spanish military officers and their

American hosts at the Windows on the World in New York cost \$483.06. The Navy spent \$345.50 on a guided tour of Disney World for the commander of the Royal Saudi Naval Forces. A Navy spokesman would not say how many of the 12-member party were Saudis and how many

were U.S. escorts.

THE EYES HAVE IT: The Air Force requires 20/20 vision for its pilot trainees. Anything less is an automatic washout. But here's an operation, called radial keratotomy, that will give near-sighted people the coveted 20/20 vision

Unfortunately for aspiring pilots, the Air Force considers radial keratotomy to be still an experimental surgical procedure.

This is despite the fact that some 500 doctors have been performing the operation since 1978 and consider it a safe, long-term correction of nearsightedness.

An Air Force spokesman explained that the military doesn't want to invest time and money training individuals whose vision may deteriorate later, and said, "We can get plenty of pilots who have proper

But one expert in the surgical procedure, Dr. Frederic Kremer, told my reporter Kelley Griffin that persons who have uundergone radial keratotomy face no greater risk of deteriorating vision than anyone else.

DIPLOMATIC DIGEST: In the years since the United States severed diplomatic relations with Iran, Vietnam and Cambodia, their embassies and other buildings in the Washington area — almost 30 in all — have been vacant and lacking maintenance. Many of these structures now need extensive repairs, so the State Department is negotiating with the Treasury to release some of the countries' frozen assets for repairs and upkeep.

Classroom transformed into student Congress

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Strange doings on Capitol Hill: A boa constrictor curls beneath a congressman's desk. A rock 'n roll bumper sticker adorns the speaker's podium. Ted Kennedy is 17 again - and wearing a dress.

The president has seen it all before and might even be to blame for this punkera Potomac.

His name is Steven Teel, and each semester he transforms two Berkeley High School political science classes into a small-scale Senate and House - complete with vociferous debate and

'Jedi' takes Silent Partners

lead in ticket sales

HOLLYWOOD (AP) -After a record launch last week, "Return of the Jedi" rocketed past \$41 million in ticket sales during the Memorial Day weekend, making it look like a long, dry summer for the movie

competition so far.
''Jedi,'' the much-anticipated final chapter in George Lucas' "Star Wars' trilogy, rolled up \$30 million in box-office sales from Friday through Monday. Its six-day total: \$41.1 million.

That surpassed by far the \$25 million, seven-day record set by another spaceman, "E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial," last summer, said Barry Glasser, director of West Coast publicity at 20th Century-Fox, where executives were smiling all the way to the bank Tuesday because of the massive "Jedi" numbers.

'It's unbelieveable. We're not even finished with the week yet,' Glasser said, noting that "E.T." set its mark at 1,271 movie screens, compared with the 1,002 screens on which "Jedi" is playing -15 of them around the

A distant No. 2 for the weekend was "Blue Thunder," which stars Roy Scheider as the pilot of an ultra-sophisticated police grabbed \$6.2 million at 1,555 theaters for the four days. Columbia Pictures







Evert-Lloyd in finals, easily

Higueras downs Vilas in quarters

PARIS (AP) — Chris Evert Lloyd outstroked Andrea Jaeger 6-3, 6-1 Thursday and reached the final in the French Open Tennis Championships.

She is bidding to win the title for the fifth time. But this was the first time she had reached the final since

The wind blew around the center court of Roland Garros stadium, but it seemed to bother Jaeger more than Evert Lloyd.

Jaeger won the first two games, but Evert warmed up and won 12 of the next 14.

However, the rallies, mostly from baseline to baseline on the slow red clay, were often closely

Jaeger had three break points in the sixth game, and another break point in the opening game of the second

French Open

Also playing for a place in Saturday's \$70,000 final were unseeded Jo Durie of Britain took on Yugoslavia's Mima Jausovec, the 1977 champion here, who also is unseeded this year.

John McEnroe, the last of 27 American men who entered this \$1.3 million tournament, was humiliated Wednesday by 18-year-old Swede Mats Wilander, the defending champion. Wilander posted a 1-6, 6-2, 6-4, 6-0 quarterfinal upset over McEnroe, who dropped 23 straight points in one stretch of the match.

No. 5 seed Wilander plays his semifinal match Friday against either No. 4 seed Guillermo Vilas of Argentina or No. 8 seed Jose Higueras of Spain. The Vilas-Higueras quarterfinal duel was halted by darkness and rain Wednesday with Higueras leading 6-2, 6-7, 6-1, 4-6 and 2-1, 15-0 in the final set. Higueras went to win the final set 6-1 to oust Vilas, the 1977 champion.

Vilas made it to the final last year but lost to Wilander, who became the youngest man to ever win a Grand Slam title.

The other men's semifinal will be settled by two Frenchmen when Yannick Noah, the No. 6 seed, plays unseeded Christophe Roger-Vasselin. The Frenchmen have never met as professionals.

Lloyd had defeated Jaeger 14 times in their 17 professional meetings since 1980, the year Jaeger became the second youngest player ever to win a pro tournament at age 14 years and eight months. Jaeger, who celebrates her 18th birthday Saturday, last beat Lloyd in the semifinals in Paris a year ago before losing the final against Martina Navratilova, this year's top seed, who was eliminated in the fourth round.

Lloyd is one of the very rare players who have won titles in all four Grand Slam tournaments. She has amassed a total of 14 singles titles at the French Open, Wimbledon, U.S. Open and Australian Open — the

On Wednesday, Wilander won the 23 points in a row after McEnroe disputed a call in the third set. The Swedish teenager then allowed the 24-year-old lefthander to score points only seven times in the final set before trouncing him in two hours and 20 minutes.

A day earlier, top seed Jimmy Connors fell to Roger-Vasselin, a 25-year-old ranked 130th who has never won a professional tournament. Roger-Vasselin and Noah are attemping to become the first Frenchman to win in Paris since Marcel Bernard took the title 37 years ago in 1946.





ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Rick Honeycutt has gone from woeful to wonderful in just one short year for the Texas Rangers.

He lost 17 games in 1982 but rediscovered his sinker in the off-season and has bloomed into the Rangers' ace. Honeycutt cruised to a 7-4 victory over

the Kansas City Royals Wednesday night, earning his seventh victory in 10

He snapped a four-game Texas losing streak and the victory was only the third in the sinking Rangers last 12 games.

"It feels good for me just to beat anybody let alone a great team like Kansas City," said Honeycutt. "I thought last 'year would never end."

Pro footballer qualifies in 2 events

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas Christian's Phillip Epps made a decision a year ago to trade possible Olympic gold for a National

Football League contract. He is living comfortably with that decision but the track-or-football dilemma remains for Southern Methodist's Michael Carter and Tennessee's Willie Gault, two key performers in the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships, which resumed today at the University of Houston.

"For me it was the right decision and I don't look back and regret not being able to go to the Olympics," Epps said Wednesday after qualifying for the finals in two events. "I wanted to play football and run track.

"I couldn't do both forever. It came down to a financial decision and for that reason, only. That's where it's at now — money.

After playing wide receiver for the Green Bay Packers last season, Epps returned to TCU to complete his final year of track

Although he is allowed to compete during the collegiate track season, his status as a professional football player will keep him out of the 1984 Olympics.

Epps ran a 20.6 to qualify for the finals in the 200 meters and ran the opening leg on the Frogs' 400-meter relay team that led qualifiers into the finals with a 39.01 clocking. He also was a 100 meters hopeful in today's qualifying.

Carter, who has never lost in five NCAA indoor and outdoor national meets, is expected to battle Oregon's Dean Crouser for the shot put crown and Gault is a contender in the 110-meter hurdles, 100 meter dash and anchored the Volunteer 400-meter relay team into the finals Wednesday night.

Gault, a senior, says he has no problem jug gling football and track but will have to weigh putting off a pro football career for a chance to compete in the Olympics.

NCAA Track

"I've been doing this for seven years, play ing football and running track," said Gault. "I am mentally strong enough to do several

Gault was drafted in the first round by the Chicago Bears as a wide receiver, but the lure of Olympic gold will have a lot to do with Gault's decision.

'There are a lot of great wide receivers in the National Football League, but there's something aout a medal winner in the Olympics that stands out."

Carter, a junior, has struggled with the demands of a dual career in football and track throughout his collegiate career. Some track experts believe Carter could be the best ever in the shot put if he gave up football and con-

centrated on track With an Olympic year approaching, Carter has not decided if he will play football his senior year at SMU, one of the top-ranked teams in the nation last season.

"I'll have to sit down and just decide what I want to do," Carter said. "All the decisions weigh against the other. I'll just have to decide which I like best.

North Carolina State's Betty Jo Springs won the only finals event Wednesday, charging into the lead on the final lap to win the women's 10,000 meter run in an NCAA meet record 33:01.02 time.

Springs broke from the pack to take the lead at the first turn on the 25th and final lap to break the former meet record of 33:36.51 set last year by Kim Schnurpfeil of Stanford.

"My plan was to sit back and let the other girls do the work and hopefully rely on my kick and it worked," Spring said. "There are times in a race when you don't feel quite right and there are times when I felt sluggish. You just hopefully try to stay in there and not let the other girls get away frm you.

Dinah Anderson of Big Spring captured the Junior USA Body Building Championship for women last weekend in Birmingham, Ala., as she defeated regional winners from across the nation.

Miss Anderson, 30, won her middleweight division in early competition, then took the overall crown by defeating the lightweight and heavyweight division

The Junior USA contest is only one of three national titles available for female bodybuilders.

Lobby douses Shaw's firefighting bill

AUSTIN — State Rep. Larry Don Shaw's efforts to modernize rural fire department equipment has apparently fallen victim to some lastminute parliamentary procedures and some heavy insurance industry lobbying

The Big Spring Democrat's legislative proposal, moments before it was to be heard by a Senate committee today, was suddenly "tagged" by Sens. Bob Vale, D-San Antonio, and John Leedom. R-Dallas.

Senators can use tags to demand 48 hours advance notice of committee consideration of particular legislation.

The tag wouldn't clear the proposal for consideration by the Senate Economic Development Committe until Saturday morning. However, the Texas Constitution requires lawmakers to follow a '72-hour" rule that prohibits House and Senate lawmakers from taking final action on any non-committee

approved legislation. That rule goes into effect at midnight Friday, nine hours before Shaw's proposal could even be considered. The only salvation would be a sudden removal of the tag by both senators, an unlikely prospect.

"It's dead - deader than a door nail," Shaw said.

Shaw's plan, already cleared by the House, sought voter approval of a constitutional amendment proposal that would let Texans decide whether the state should establish a fire department emergency fund.

Money from that fund would provide grants, loans or other financial assistance to public fire departments to purchase needed equipment and facilities.

The fund would be fueled with an increase in the state's tax on fire casualty insurance premiums from 1.25 percent to 2 percent. Up to 1 percent of the total taxed premiums

could be directed to the fund under Shaw's proposal.

Shaw said the fund is needed because rural and volunteer fire departments are unable to keep up with the skyrocketing cost of fire-

fighting equipment. Both Shaw and the proposal's Senate sponsor, Ray Farabee, D-Wichita Falls, said heavy insurance industry opposition killed the proposal

This bill passed the House 136-0," Shaw said. "I think you can read between the lines. Apparently people in the insurance industry didn't like it so they got it killed. We're just postponing a problem

that's already getting worse."

Farabee agreed, saying, "In the House, the insurance groups apparently weren't familiar with it. I guess they hadn't learned about it there, but they sure did when it got over here (the Senate.)"

Vale said he leveled the tag because a large number of calls within his district from constituents "upset about a tax that would be paid by everybody...I'm concerned when I hear about a tax to be used only in a few areas and not where most of the tax is going to come

Bauer racial imbalance being corrected, school officials say

Staff Writer Recent student registration for the new Bauer Magnet School shows the racial imbalance at the north side school will be corrected in the fall, according to Big Spring Independent School District Superintendent Lynn Hise.

In a progress report to the school board, Hise said the magnet school's enriched extended-day program has drawn interest from 237 students from across the district. Due to limited space at Bauer, only 141 have been accepted at the school, with 93 being placed on a

Hise said the new students, plus the fourth and fifth grade gifted and talented students who will be housed at Bauer in the fall, will give the school an acceptable racial balance

Hise said preliminary reports show the school will have a 56 percent minority makeup and a 44 percent Anglo enrollment

SCHOOL OFFICIALS said they were confident these figures would satisfy the recent agreement with the U.S. Justice Department to rid the district of traces of a dual school system.

"I would think the government would certainly be pleased with those figures," said board president

Hise said Bauer would have a total enrollment of 312 students in the fall with 214 signed up for extended-day

In addition to the enrollment report, Hise also told board members that the Bauer computer lab will cost \$33,500, which will be paid from state and federal

THE LAB will consist of 22 terminals, 10 of which will be microcomputers complete with software for a variety of programs. The other 12 terminals will be for computer assisted instruction in basic subjects. Computer assisted instruction is already available at Goliad Middle School and Runnels Junior High.

Hise said the district has in storage 16 terminals left over from the Goliad and Runnels programs. This means the district will not have to buy the 12 terminals needed for the computer assisted instruction program. However, the district must purchase the 10 microcomputers.

The board yesterday rejected bids from four companies on the microcomputers because it said the bids were too high. The district will again advertise for bids in the near future.

Hise's report estimated that transportation for students to and from Bauer probably will involve two more bus routes with an additional bus and driver. Hise estimated the cost at between \$16,000 and \$20,000.

Big Spring man suffers severe shock; hospitalized in Midland By RICHARD HORN

A Big Spring man is in serious condition at Midland Memorial Hospital today after suffering a 7,200-volt electrical shock while working on power distribution lines in Midland Wednesday morning

Weldon Trammell, 34, of 3703 LaJunta was working at 9 a.m. at the intersection of Big Spring Avenue and Golf Course Road in northwest Midland when the accident occurred. He touched an energized line that sent the electricity

Bradley, office manager of H.G. Caldwell Electric Co. of Big Spring. Trammell, a lineman for the company, was a member of a six-man crew doing contract work for

into his head and out his left arm, according to Carl

Texas Electric Service Co. "He was holding a neutral line in his hands and he accidently raised his head up into the energized wire,' Bradley said this morning.

Bradley said Trammell was in a "cherry picker" (an elevator platform) at the time of the accident. He said other crew members brought Trammell down to the ground and called an ambulance.

The Emergency Medical Service unit of the Midland Fire Department responded to the call, according to EMS chief Dean Williams. He said Trammell suffered

burns on both of his hands and on the top of his head. Trammell was unconcious when the emergency unit arrived, but he regained conciousness and was able to communicate en route to the hospital, Williams said.

"He had no problem breathing," he said. "The man is lucky as the devil. He was pretty disoriented, but a shock like that usually messes up the heart. His heart was in stable condition.

Trammell is in the critical care unit of the hospital this morning, according to a hospital spokesman. A doctor could not be reached for comment on his

"Externally, he is in good shape," Bradley said, "but with an injury like this, you never know what kind of internal problems there may be.' Bradley said Trammell was on oxygen for a short

time Wednesday afternoon. "Right now it looks real good," he said. "He is rational and he knows people. The doctors say there

doesn't appear to be any brain damage. "It's amazing, considering what he went through," Bradley said. "The voltage in your house is 120 volts he had 7,200 go through him.

Trammell has worked with Caldwell Electic Co. since March 1981. He has a wife and two sons in Big

Big Spring's unemployment rate falls for first time in months, figures say

Big Spring's unemployment rate has declined for the first time in three months, according to Texas Employment Commission figures

April's statistics showed the city as having an 8.6 percent jobless rate — two-tenths of a percent below March's rate. Previously, the rate had risen 1.8 in January and 1 percent in February.

Local TEC supervisor Joe Wallis said the declining rate may be a trend, but he is remaining cautious in his

"Hopefully, it's beginning to turn down, but we'll just have to wait and see what happens when the graduating seniors hit the job market." Wallis said. Wallis said his office had already begun to see an inyear's statistics show that the jobless rate climbed 1 percent in May, perhaps due to students entering the

job market.

April's statistics show the labor force increased from 17,954 in March to 18,006. The number of persons employed increased from 16,372 to 16,449.

While more persons were in the job market and more were employed over last month, the number of persons out of work decreased from 1,582 to 1,557, according to statistics.

Texas and the nation as a whole experienced a decrease in unemployment as the state rate dropped from 9 percent to 8.1 percent. The national figure fell from 10.8 percent to 10 percent.

Group hopes to unite north side

In one week a new community center will open on the north side of Big Spring that a recently formed organization, named People and Community Development (PACD), hopes will become a social and information center for

neighborhood residents Marianne Brown, president of PACD, said the idea for the community center surfaced while she and her husband, Chestnut Brown, campaigned this spring for his election to the Big Spring school

"We found that people had a mistrust, a misunderstanding of how the government works," Mrs.

Brown said. "Most of all they needed a place to go for answers to their questions.

Of the 1,200 voters registered in Precinct 4, which encompasses the city's north and west sides, only about 100 voted in the last city election, Mrs. Brown said. Her husband was defeated.

"They could have made their man, but only 100 turned out to vote," Mrs. Brown said. "They have a voice; they just have to get off their duffs and not sit down and

PACD's members believe one reason so few voted was apathy generated by not knowing or caring how "the system" works. They hope that by providing a center

and a staff to answer questions and act as an intermediary between citizens and city organizations they can encourage more people to become civically involved.

Currently, the only places to congregate for north side residents are in churches or restaurants. PACD members decided they needed a neutral place in which to hold meetings.

"When some people are down, church is the first thing they turn against," Mrs. Brown said.
"They're asking 'Why God, why did he do this to me?' We needed some place neutral."

Brown, a federal prison industry foreman, asked the city council for the former Northside Day Care Center at N.E. Eighth and Runnels

"Everyone said 'They'll never let you have it," Mrs. Brown said. 'They (city council) were all for

it. They were just wonderful." Council members said PACD could use the building rent free for six months if PACD pays for utilities and insurance. After six months they will renegotiate the contract based on how many persons participate in the center's programs.

Mrs. Brown said she is not sure how people will react to the center.

"I think it's going to be rough,"

she said. "But if two try, they spread the word. As one member said last Saturday, it's better to try and fail than to never try at all."

PACD is in the process of becoming a certified non-profit organization so that any donations will be tax deductible. Members also are asking for donations to furnish the building.

So far all money has been used to repair windows and fixtures that have been vandalized while the building stood empty, Mrs. Brown said. She said they need "everything," particularly a stove and refrigerator, folding chairs and reception room seating.





Man kidnapped, freed

It was not business as usual yesterday for Roy Lee Powell.

The owner of Al's Trading Post at 2607 W. Highway 80 was robbed at knife point yesterday morning at his shop, bound with a shoelace, driven about 180 miles away from Big Spring and dumped near the junction of Interstate Highways 20 and 10.

Powell told police last night, about 14 hours after he had been abducted, that a black male walked into his business at 10 a.m. and flashed a butcher knife at him.

The man robbed Powell of \$250 cash, five watches, five rings and five knives. Then he tied Powell's hands with a shoelace from a pair of sneakers at the store and took him for a ride in a truck. Where did they go?

"Good God, all over the country," Powell said this morning. "He got himself lost and me too."

Powell said they went to various spots in Lomax, Midland and Stanton.

"He finally kicked me out on a service road on Interstate 10, about three miles from Interstate 20," Powell said.

Powell said he walked back to Interstate 20 and four miles west before he caught a ride to Pecos. There he filed a report at the sheriff's department and called his Pecos issued an all points bulletin at 10 p.m. for the

kidnapper's arrest. No one has been arrested in connection with the case.

Someone gave Powell a ride to Odessa where his wife and a friend picked him up and brought him back to Big Spring.

"I got to bed at 4:30 this morning, trying to get all this (police reports) done," Powell said. His experience didn't keep him from work today,

"I'm up and going again today," he said.


Tammen refused to comment on the matter when contacted this morning, but Smith said this morning that the Mitchell County Life Science Church was no longer in existence.






