## Woman with 21-year-old headache happy with appeals court ruling

## Some sugar for diabetics

## may be safe, study says

Any sweets made with ordinary table sugar have
traditionally been taboo for diabetics. The theory is
that they are absorbed too rapidly, resulting in very high blood levels of sugar.
Diabetics are told to ofrgo sugary goodies in favor of
starches such as potatoes, spaghetti and bread. All starches such as potatoes, spaghetti and bread. All
these foods belong to the broad category called car bohydrates. But it was thought that the starches were absorbed more slowly and did not reach such high
sugar levels in the blood sugar levels in the blood.
Researchers at the Unive thesearchers at the University of Minnesota tested
this idea on diabetics and healthy people. They found that table sugar is not absorbed any more quickly than
starch. Dr. John P. Bantle, who directed the study, says this
means it does not make any difference what kind of carbohydrate that diabetics eat, as long as they do not
consume too many calories. "If they chase to substitutut a piece of cake for their
mashed potatoes, it probably isn't going to have any mashed potatoes, it probably isn't going to have any
bad effect on their blood sugar levels," he said in an
interview. The American Diabetes Association recommends bohydrates. It suggests that these people restrict their use of plain sugar, also called sucrose.
An estimated 10 million people in the United States have diabetes.
The study.
The study, published in Thursday's New England
Journal of Medicine, was conducted on 22 diabetics and 10 healthy volunteers.
