Friona ISD Enrollment Shows Gain

Enrollment in Friona Schools on September 2, 1997 stood at 1,256 students, according to figures released by Superintendent of Schools Hal Ratcliff.

This compares to 1,239 on the Tuesday following Labor Day in 1996, or a net gain of 17 students.

The largest class in school is the freshman class with 115 students. Friona High School's enrollment was 377, which was the largest enrollment for FHS in the past 12 years.

Enrollment figures by campus were: Primary 230; Elementary 374; Junior High 275 and High School 377.

Friona-Littlefield: Playoff Contenders Meet In '97 Opener

When last the Friona Chieftain varsity football team was competing, several thousand of their fans trekked 400 miles to Texas Stadium to watch their team do battle

in the state Class 3A semi-final contest.

The "Cinderella" Chieftains of Coach James Morton, who had never before advanced past the second round of the playoffs, had parlayed their skill and dedication to make the fifth round, winning 13 consecutive games in the process. Friona's five post-season games were one more than FHS had had in all its previous grid history combined.

Littlefield had been the only team to beat Friona in the regular season. The Wildcats scored three first-half TDs to grab a 21-0 lead, and then held off a second-half rally for a 21-14 win.

The 1997 Chieftains have looked more than ready for the "real season" in their two scrimmage games. Friona out-scored Canyon, 5-2, then whipped Springlake-Earth 9-2 last Friday at home.

Friona is returning 17 of 30 lettermen from the 1996 team that went 13-2. They have six offensive and five defensive starters returning. The coaches have been watching their "talent pool" during workouts and the scrimmages to plug the holes left by last year's seniors.

The Chieftains lost two backfield mates, Kyle Grimsley and Andy Kendrick,

who ran for 1326 and 1003 yards rushing, and Grimsley passed for another 1294 yards. These two players also scored 208 of Friona's 454 points.

But senior Aaron King has looked sharp in the scrimmages at QB and newcomer Matthew Kendrick, a junior, has led a half-dozen candidates battle for a couple of backfield spots.

Senior Daniel Cuevas, who was the third-leading rusher with 811 yards in '96, returns.

Wide receiver Angel Vega seems to have picked up right where he left off a year ago. He has caught five passes and scored four TDs in the two warm-up games. One of his TD came on an intercepted pass runback.

Littlefield fared very close to Friona on returning players, with 13 lettermen; seven offensive and six defensive starters back from last year's team that was 9-1 for the season before losing to River Road, 19-6.

Kelly Peel is Littlefield's returning starter at quarterback. Peel got to start as a junior when the Wildcats' senior QB was hurt in a pre-season scrimmage.

They have an outstanding noseguard (215-pound Rodney Patton), who also is their

starting fullback." Coach James Morton said. "It's the typical Littlefield team. They stay mainly on the ground, and try to control the ball. They're sound on defense, and look to be somewhat bigger than last year," Morton added.

The Chieftain mentor said the Wildcats scrimmaged Lubbock High and Caprock.

Coach Morton said Wednesday that the team had had a good week of workouts. "We've tried to fine-tune our offense and defense. I feel that things are shaping up. It should be a good opening game for both teams," he added.

Friona has no particular injuries, although wide receiver Vega has been

exercising his hamstring muscle, which was strained in last week's scrimmage. Vega has been limited on contact work this week, but the muscle is responding, Morton said.

Kickoff is at 8 p.m. at Chieftain Field. Better get there early. Good seats might be hard to find.

Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

65 Yrs. Ago-Sept. 9, 1932
Friona Schools opened Monday with total enrollment of 550. There were 198 in high school on the opening day and 352 in the grade school, making a total of 550, or an increase of 50 over last year's total enrollment.

Coach Bill Stevens of Friona High School reports that he has about a half hundred good husky boys who are aspirants for the 1932-33 football squad.

Mrs. Bertha Harry, Merele and Ruth moved to Lubbock Saturday evening, where they will remain at least during the coming term of school.

55 Yrs. Ago-Sept. 4, 1942

Both the Lakeview grade and high school students will attend the Friona schools this year. The trustees of the Lakeview school district called a mass meeting of the patrons of that school for a discussion of the teacher situation and the state aid set-up of the district, and when it was learned that they could not maintain a two-teacher school, they voted to bring all pupils of the district to the Friona school this year. One additional teacher was required in the grade school in order to take care of the added enrollment.

45 Yrs. Ago-Sept. 4, 1952

First load of 1952 milo was delivered last Thursday, August 28 at the Santa Fe Grain Company. N.A. Curry brought in the load of over 9,000 pounds, receiving \$3.00 per hundred. Curry farms west of Friona on the former Lonnie Baxter farm.

Twenty-seven Friona FFA members, with director J.T. Gee, have returned from a trip through New Mexico and Colorado, spending nights at Cannon City, Salida, Denver, Colorado Springs, Colorado and Raton, New Mexico.

40 Yrs. Ago-Sept. 5, 1957

The barrack-type structure at the intersection of Seventh Street and Columbia

Avenue, known as the FFA barns, and in recent years the scene of fairs and community activities, is to be sold and removed from the lots it occupies in Friona.

35 Yrs. Ago-Sept. 6, 1962

Construction work started Tuesday on a farm-to-market road connecting Parmer and Deaf Smith County highways. The new road will begin on State Highway 214 six miles north of Friona, and will extend north and east 7.951 miles to FM Highway 1058, connecting Friona with the "Harrison Highway," which runs east and west in Deaf Smith County.

Sunday evening at 7 p.m., Rev. Ervin A. Binger

will be installed as pastor at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Rhea Community.

30 Yrs. Ago-Sept. 7, 1967

Twenty-nine girls are entered in the 1967 Maize Queen Contest, just one short of last year's record entry list. The contestants will be featured on Cotton John's Farm & Home Show on Channel 4 Amarillo at 12:30 Saturday. Other Maize Days officials will be featured on the show.

Wilson & Co., Inc., Chicago-based subsidiary of Ling-Temco-Vought, Inc., will establish a multi-million dollar major beef processing plant in the Panhandle Country of West Texas near Hereford, its first such operations in Texas. Roy V. Edwards, Wilson & Co. president, said August 30 that the plant will be built on a recently purchased 400-acre tract approximately three miles from Hereford.

25 Yrs. Ago-Sept. 7, 1972

E.E. (Dutch) Sparkman was presented a plaque and watch which he was given by the City of Friona and city employees, respectively, on the occasion of his retirement last Thursday after 20 years of service to the city.

Three entrants were added to the 1972 Maize Queen's Contest by the

September 1 deadline, making a total of 26 girls in this year's event.

20 Yrs. Ago-Sept. 4, 1977

R.L. Fleming, long time mayor and resident of Friona, handed the city council his resignation Wednesday and was honored with a coffee on Friday as he begins his retirement. Fleming held the mayorship of Friona for nearly seven terms, over 13 years, and has lived in Parmer County for 24 years.

Enrollment throughout the school system stands at a present total of 1324 compared to 1333 last year at this time.

15 Yrs. Ago-Sept. 5, 1982

The construction work continues at the new Allsup's store on East Highway 60. The brick work was finished this week, and pouring concrete is still underway. Barring delays from the weather, an October 1 opening date is projected for the store.

Fourteen girls have entered the 1982 Maize Queen Pageant.

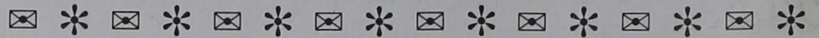
10 Yrs. Ago-Sept. 5, 1987

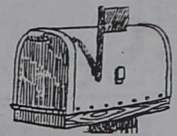
VLynda Wilcox, daughter of Terry and Varla Wilcox, was named "Little Miss Friona" at the pageant Tuesday evening.

The days were long and the weather was hot but the memories of being with and around my many brothers and sisters is what I most cherish. I always looked forward to Fridays because on that day, my brother-in-law, Joe Hernandez, would take us, between eight and ten family members, and drive us to Hereford to see the wrestling matches. Boy, was that fun!

My parents, Santos and Josefa Garcia, had a very large family, 21 in all. It was necessary that we all work in order to make ends meet. Back then, Friona had so much to offer the migrant population.

It was because of these hard times out in the hot sun that I decided that this would not be the type of life that I wanted for myself as I became older.

continued to obtain a Master's Degree.

As I look back, I truly feel that this could not have been accomplished if it would not have been for the experience that I had in Friona. As I read the Friona Star that was recently sent to my office, I experienced such a great feeling which was the creation from Friona, Texas. Keep up the good work!

'PLEASANT SURPRISE'--MORTON

Chieftains Humble S-E As Offense Clicks

Coach James Morton probably described last Friday's scrimmage against Springlake-Earth the best.

After his young troops had scored almost at will, in virtually every manner possible, and held the vaunted Wolverines in check most of the evening, Morton had this to say in the dressing room: "If this doesn't get you excited, you may need to see a doctor!"

"I was really surprised (about how well we outplayed them) to be honest about it. I thought we executed much better than the previous week. The kids improved dramatically."

The Chieftains outscored their guests, nine TDs to two. A score of 8-1 might be more accurate, as each team took a turn at trying the high school "sudden death" rules, each getting the ball on the other's 20-yard line, and both scored.

For the most part, Friona kept heralded QB James Williams in check, but with FHS reserves on defense, the third-year starter finally managed to break a 56-yard scoring run, after Friona had built an 8-0 TD lead.

Williams was S-E's leading rusher in '96, with 1,611 yards in 13 games, averaging 9 yards per carry. Williams, chosen as "Player of the Year" on the South Plains last

season by the Lubbock paper, completed 30 of 88 passes last year for 715 yards and only three interceptions.

A charging pass defense led by Quint Ellis and Matthew Kendrick, and a secondary featuring Angel Vega and Aaron King, held Williams to just three completions. Ellis had a pair of quarterback sacks, and Kendrick whacked a would-be Springlake receiver, whose ears may still be ringing from the big hit.

Vega scored three touchdowns: a 56-yarder on a pass reception; a 50-yarder on a pass interception return, and a 70-yarder on a pitchout sweep as Friona controlled the scrimmage from start to finish.

On the fifth play of the scrimmage, King lofted a pass in Vega's direction. Vega, who gained 852 yards receiving in '96, good for 11 touchdowns, caught the ball over the middle and was off to the TD.

Still controlling the ball, it took the Chieftains only seven plays to score again. Operating on his own 47 yard line, King kept the ball on the option, and outran his defenders 53 yards for a TD, making it Friona two TDs to nothing.

Next, the Chieftains had more of a "drive," going 75

yards in seven plays in mostly "average" gains. King to Vega again worked for 19 yards, Jeremy Roth gained ten yards and Jesus Mata got the score from two yards out and it became 3-0.

Springlake hadn't even had the ball yet and trailed by three TDs.

The Wolverines were held so well that the ball had to come back to the starting point (their 25 or 30) four times in a row.

Adding insult to injury, Vega stepped in front of a Williams pass and returned it 40 yards for a TD, making the score 4-0. S-E finally got a 35-yard pass completion, and moved to Friona's 23 yard line.

This was where Ellis charged through on third down to nail Williams for a ten-yard loss, squelching Springlake's scoring threat.

After a short "halftime" break, Morton was looking at some of his younger players, and he liked what he saw when (23) James Evans ripped off a 69-yard run on the second play for Friona's fifth TD.

On their next foray, Hugo Rivera ripped for 30 yards, being wrestled down just short of the goal. Teammate Tony Duran went over from a yard out for Friona's sixth score.

Reverting to game-like conditions, Friona posted a business-like, 70-yard scoring drive. King to Vega clicked for 45 yards to get the Chieftains close, and Kendrick got the TD from four yards out. Vega kicked the PAT.

The Wolverines were three downs and out, and Friona put the ball in play at their 30. Vega took a pitchout and skirted left end, and was up the sidelines in no time, 70 yards for a score. He added the kick for good measure to cap off the eighth score.

After S-E got their score on the "overtime" practice, the Chiefs duplicated it when Kendrick ran 14 yards around end to wrap up the evening.

Morton singled out for their defensive work Jeff Hamilton, Rudy Torres, and Luis Ramirez, the defensive ends. "Tackle Perry Hanes had a tremendous game. Matt Kendrick's big hit stood out," Morton said.

Out Here

MEMO TO: Amarillo Globe News Circulation Department. Effective immediately please send a couple of hundred additional copies of the Globe News to the Farmer County news-racks each Saturday for the next 15 Saturdays.

Tonight, Friday, September 5, 1997, begins the most significant celebration in small town America. The official opening of high-school football.

From 5A to six-man, and every level in-between, hearts pound and bands play as groups of young athletes realize the culmination of off-season conditioning and two-a-day workouts.

School colors are plentiful when home-team fans and visitors assemble for the annual fall.

Horns honk, buses are decorated with banners, and school flags fly on Main Street.

Take any highway in any direction on any Friday night and you will pass caravans of parents and fans with "go get 'em" messages scrawled on their vehicle windows.

The young men who play this game begin as awkward tykes in 7th and 8th grade and progress, through years of coaching, training, heartbreak and joy, until they reach the ultimate high school dream of being "on the varsity."

Over the years I have often wondered why an otherwise sane person would select high school coaching as a career.

To many boys and girls, their high school coach is the most influential person in their lives, outside of parents and grandparents. Ask any of the bubbas and bubbettes in Farmer County, they can tell you who their coach was.

Might not be able to tell you who the President was during their high school days,

or remember the Sunday School teacher, but any high school athlete remembers their coach forever.

During my junior and senior years (56-57) at Hillsboro High School, our football team went to state both years. The coach's name was Pug Galiga.

I played basketball and baseball in high school. Old Coach Galiga didn't much care for us boys that didn't play football. He couldn't understand why several of us worked out for basketball everyday, even during football season.

I went home dirty and sweaty many times after a workout because Coach Galiga didn't appreciate us taking up locker room space while "the football boys" were in season.

Then there was my coach David Dewitt. A basketball player at Baylor University who earned the nickname "Dizzy" because of his speed and antics on the basketball court.

I remember very clearly that we played to make Coach Dewitt proud. We wanted so bad to execute good plays, good passes, and good shots so Coach would be proud.

Of course we wanted to win too, but as long as we were playing our best for "Coach", losses didn't seem quite so serious.

I've never been a coach, but my guess is that the number one challenge that faces all coaches is gaining respect.

And look how many people a coach has to try and earn respect from. The players, the other coaches, the school faculty, the team managers, the PTA, the parents, and the fans.

A week ago Thursday, I took my camera over to watch the Bovina Mustangs scrimmage the Vega Longhorns. In taking

pictures for the paper I prowl the sidelines trying for those two or three great action shots to use in next week's edition.

This day the scrimmage started at 6 p.m. I figured to get some good daylight shots, so I went to the Vega side of the field to put the sun at my back.

A football scrimmage is chaotic at best. All the players and coaches are on the field at the same time. After every play the coaches swarm to the pile, grabbing players, patting butts, yelling praises laced with criticisms.

When Bovina marched down to the two-yard line, I slid behind the end zone, hoping to catch a close-up action shot of a Mustang touchdown.

The Mustang back did score on the next play. I got the shot. But the reaction of a Vega coach caught me by surprise.

I don't know a wing-T from a split end. I have no idea what Blue 28 means. I know a pass when I see one and appreciate a good defensive play. Other than that I take pictures and cheer for the boys.

On Bovina's scoring play, during this insignificant scrimmage in a small dusty Panhandle town, a Vega player apparently missed his assignment. If I understand the problem, the kid went the wrong way and allowed the opponent to score.

A Vega coach ran to the kid there in the end zone, grabbed his arm and yelled, "you were supposed to go to this side. You went the wrong way. You've turned into a dadburned COWARD."

He said some other things but I only remember hearing the word "COWARD". The young player's shoulders were slumped as he trotted slowly toward the bench.

The coach was running back to the field, no doubt

with a feeling of pride in himself at how good a coach he had surely become. Called the kid a coward. That ought to make a player out of him.

I was mad about that all the way back to Friona. Must still be mad about it, since I am writing this a week later.

I can't conceive of any circumstance under which a coach can justify calling a young player a coward.

I am confident, having been around them often, that Coach Morton and Coach Ortiz would never use the word in teaching one of their young men. Nor would their coaching staff.

Coaches do have to coach tough. It is not easy teaching teenagers. This building character and winning ball games is a constant challenge.

Chances are that the young men playing for the Friona Chiefs and Bovina Mustangs this year will remember Coach James Morton and Coach Bobby Ortiz forty years from now. And the memories will be fond ones, just like mine are for Coach Diz Dewitt.

And you know what? This year I plan to return to Hillsboro High for my 40th class reunion. It has been 40 years since my last basketball game at HHS, but they tell me that David Dewitt still lives there. I can't wait to see him again.

As tonight kicks off another exciting high school football race, I pray that all coaches will build character, win some games, and be remembered.

I especially pray that young men like the one from Vega will realize that in coaching, and in life, there are sometimes people who try to make up for a lack of ability in themselves by calling others cowards.

As the good coaches say, son, shake it off and let's play football.

The exhibit features twenty-five items from the City of Lubbock's collection of 156 articles. This is the largest public collection of Buddy Holly memorabilia in North America.

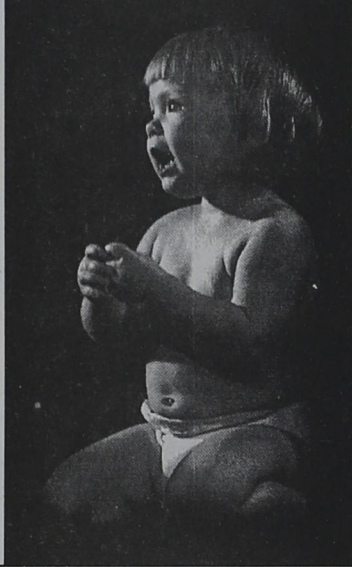

Basic, old-fashioned glass is the most scratch-resistant, but it's heavy and dangerously breakable. Alloy resin plastic, standard for most lenses, weighs half as much, though lenses may be thick. High-index plastic is thinner and lighter, which makes it more comfortable for strong prescriptions. It's less shatter-resistant and may cause some distortion of peripheral vision, but it blocks 100 per cent of ultraviolet light. Polycarbonate plastic is toughest of all, though it's thin and lightweight. It blocks all ultraviolet rays, but it's not available in some progressive lenses and may be damaged by some solvents. New studies recommend the use of polycarbonate lenses in every day glasses for children, adults who play sports and anyone with vision in only one eye.

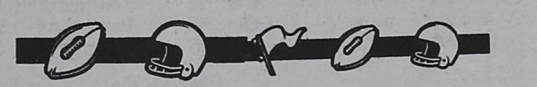
