

## Two ACU students shot here

Two Abilene Christian University students remain in Malone-Hogan Hospital today after being injured in a shooting here Saturday night. James Bruce Walker, 19, of 907 W. Second St., remained in "stable but very critical" condition at Malone-Hogan Hospital this morning after suffering gunshot wounds in his left forearm and the left side of his neck, a Malone-Hogan spokeswoman said. Walker is awaiting transfer to Lubbock General Hospital in the afternoon so that his neck, which still has a bullet in it, can be examined by a neurosurgeon, the spokeswoman said. Ira Hopper, 18, of Abilene remains in stable condition at the hospital after suffering gunshot wounds in his chest and his right upper arm, she said. Big Spring police arrested a suspect Sunday morning in connection with the shootings, which happened about 11:25 p.m. Saturday in a residential area near the intersection of 24th and Johnson streets, according to police reports. Sammy B. Johnston, 19, of 2107 Runnels was arrested at 1:39 a.m. Sunday in the 1100 block of 11th Place in connection with the shooting. Johnston remains in jail after being denied bond by Municipal Judge Melvin Daratt, according to Lt. Alvis Jeffcoat. Jeffcoat said both parties were arguing back and forth from their cars when the shooting occurred, but no other details were known.

## Man sought in killings found shot in Paducah

**PADUCAH, Texas (AP)** — James L. Jenkins, wanted in the ambush slayings of two Minnesota bankers, "stuck the shotgun in his mouth" and killed himself, and his son, also sought in connection with the killings, led authorities to the body, a sheriff said. Steven Jenkins, 18, told authorities Sunday night his father had been threatening to shoot himself, Cottle County Sheriff Frank Taylor said. He said the younger Jenkins was willing to return to Minnesota voluntarily. Jenkins and his son had been the objects of a nationwide search since the bodies of two Buffalo Ridge State Bank officers were found Thursday on a vacant farm near Ruthton in southwestern Minnesota. Authorities said the victims, Rudy Blythe and Deems "Toby" Thulin, had been shot to death. The bank had foreclosed on Jenkins' farm four years ago and Steven Jenkins said his father held a grudge that may have prompted him to shoot the bankers, Taylor said. Authorities found a cache of weapons in Jenkins' pickup, Taylor said today. The weapons included an M-1 carbine, sawed-off shotgun, .22-caliber pistol, machetes, bayonets, grenades and "things of that nature," he said. Taylor said Minnesota authorities were expected to fly to Paducah this afternoon to interrogate the younger Jenkins. The teen-ager "has indicated he will waive extradition. We haven't offered him that right yet, but I don't see any problems," the sheriff said.

Authorities found the body of James Jenkins, 46, about four miles north of Paducah on a dirt road near an abandoned farmhouse, Taylor said. The elder Jenkins "had stuck the shotgun in his mouth and blew his head off," Taylor said. "His son came in saying they had run out of money and his father was talking about shooting himself. By the time we got to the farm he was dead," Taylor said. The younger Jenkins drove into Paducah in the same white pickup police had been looking for in four states. He walked into the police station unarmed at 6:30 p.m. Sunday. The sheriff said the younger Jenkins was extremely upset, but behaved like a "perfect gentleman" and showed no surprise upon find-

ding his father dead. Jenkins told Taylor he and his father had eluded the manhunt by taking backroads from Ruthton into South Dakota, obtaining a pair of South Dakota license plates for the truck, and proceeding to Texas by driving during the day and hiding at night. Lincoln County, Minn., Sheriff Abe Thompson issued felony arrest warrants Saturday for Jenkins and his son, accusing each of them with two counts of second-degree murder. Thompson, saying, "I'm glad it's over, because there's an awful lot of people up here who will sleep better," said he would fly to Texas today to bring the younger Jenkins back to Minnesota. ## Death of C-City student leaves school in 'state of shock'

**COLORADO CITY (AP)** — The death of a 15-year-old student who suffered a fatal head injury during a football game has left this West Texas city's high school "in a state of shock," school administrators say. Mourners filled St. Anne's Catholic Church on Saturday to pay homage to Dion G. Alvarez, who died Thursday night of head injuries he suffered during a Sept. 22 junior varsity game between Colorado City and Wiley. Alvarez, who died at Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene, never regained consciousness after he was injured.

Colorado City coach Tom Ramsey said that Alvarez's 13-year-old brother, Bo Alvarez, was one of seven students who have asked permission to try out for the team since the death. Elsa Alvarez, the boy's mother, said she would discourage Bo from playing — but would not forbid it. "We don't want to build a fence around him," because of his brother's death, she said. Funeral director Doyle Kiker said the turnout at Saturday's service for Alvarez was the largest he could recall in 50 years. Mourners numbered more

than three times the capacity of the church. Most also attended the burial at the family plot. "The entire community is saddened by this tragedy which took such a young and promising life," Kiker said. Alvarez, a defensive end on the junior varsity team who also excelled in track, was injured during the third quarter of the game against Wiley. "He was blocked about the knees and just went down to the ground," Ramsey said. "He stayed down, and the coaching staff went out to help him."

His death left the high school "in a state of shock," school administrators said. "Morale at school is very low ... this is one of those things that is very tough to go through," Ramsey said. Students learned of Alvarez's death during what would have been a pre-game pep rally for a game against Clyde. Dispirited students said prayers, sang their school song and went back to classes. After the funeral, students announced that they plan a car wash, a walk-a-thon and other projects to help the Alvarez family pay medical expenses.

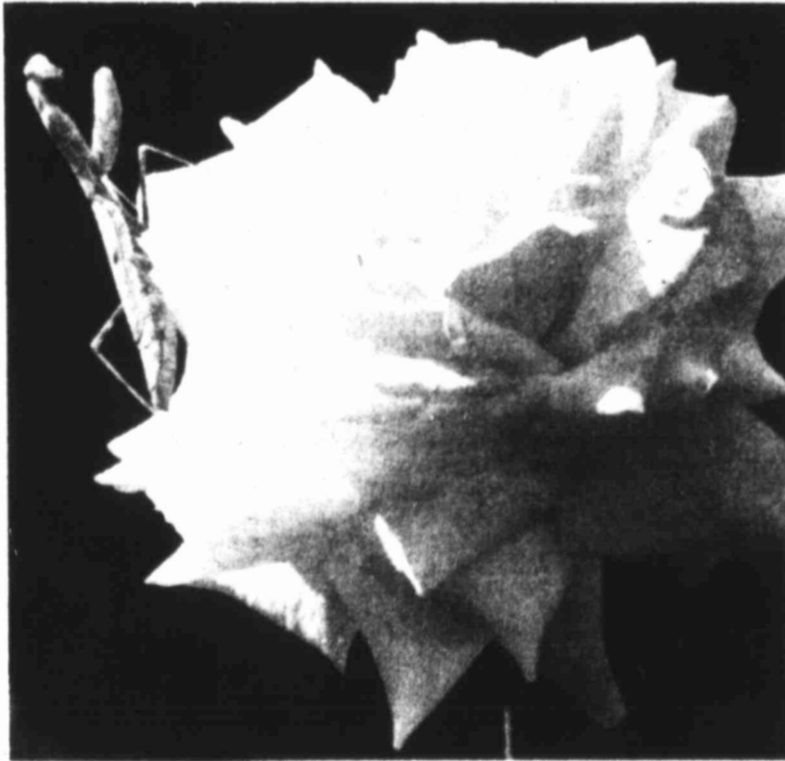
## New bank owners expect no trouble

**ODESSA (AP)** — New owners of a bank financially exhausted and forced to close because of heavy losses on recent energy loans say they envision an easy ownership transition that will allow business to continue as usual today. The U.S. Comptroller of the currency declared the National Bank of Odessa insolvent, ordered it closed at the end of business Friday and granted a new charter to Independent Bankshares Inc., an Abilene-based bank holding company. The bank reopened today as First State Bank of Odessa, N.A. "Business will continue as normal," acting bank president Brad Stephens said. Acting Comptroller of the Currency H. Joe Selby said Friday that the bank failure was caused by "increasingly heavy losses on energy-related loans."

The bank lost \$18.98 million during the first six months of this year. The National Bank of Odessa was the second to fail in Texas in about two months. Metro Bank of Midland was ordered closed by the State Banking Board on July 29. It reopened the following Monday under new owners and a new name, Mid-Cities National Bank. Stephens said the new bank will acquire all of NBO's 18,000 deposit accounts totaling about \$81.89 million.

None of the former NBO bank clients will lose any of their deposits, even those accounts that exceed the \$100,000 FDIC insurance limit, Stephens said. He also said the new bank will honor NBO checks. He said all of the failed bank's

## Cuban doctor haunted by nightmares of trial

**MONAHANS (AP)** — The Cuban doctor charged with injecting air into the vein of a mortally wounded Monahans man said he still is haunted by the attempted murder trial that absolved him of any guilt. Dr. Juan Perez-Valladarez, 56, said bad dreams of the February trial held in his adopted hometown often keeps him sleepless. A bleeding ulcer that nearly killed him after the tense trial ended also frightens him. Perez, a slight, soft-spoken man, was the first physician to stand trial of attempted murder by air injection in Texas. "My nightmares still haunt me," Perez said, holding his hands tenderly over his troubled stomach. "I dream about that trial and about the Bay of Pigs." In 1962, Perez was a virulent anti-Communist who bobbed in a boat off Cuba for 16 days during the unsuccessful U.S.-supported invasion. Now, he is a popular family physician who was charged with pump-

ing 20 cubic-centimeters of air into the vein of a mortally wounded man on Nov. 4, 1961, by a gunshot blast to the forehead. Two nurses testified in the trial that Perez was tired the night he gave emergency room treatment to oilfield worker Michael Hoffman, so he tried "to hasten" the victim's death. Hoffman, 28, died 40 minutes after he was shot once at point-blank range during a barroom brawl in this West Texas oil and ranch town of 9,000. An Odessa pathologist testified the injection was not the cause of death. Emergency room nurse Brenda Rowan, who still works at Ward Memorial Hospital, testified that when Hoffman was brought in, Perez had complained he had "had a hard day" and "wasn't going to wait around all night" for the victim to die. But a jury of 12 that included 10 of Perez's patients found the small-
