Alvarez, who died at Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene, never regained consciousness after he was

HOUSTON (AP) - Financially-ailing Continental Airlines canceled 16 flights Sunday, but a company
spokeswoman insisted the carrier was 'stronge than ever'' one day after pilots and flight attendants salaries and emergency work rules.

"We know there's no way we can shut down the operation today," Henry Duffy, president of the 34,000 -member Air Line Pilots, Association, said

to regulate the tempo of the heartbeat. When that pac ing structure malfunctions the heartbeat slows markedly and there may even be periodic seconds
long interruptions in beating. A heart rate of 70 may drop to only 40 beats a minute or less. The combination of the very slow beating (pumpings) and the beat inter
ruptions can cause the symptoms you reported - diz ruptions can cause the symptoms you reported - diz
ziness, momentary confusion, etc. At those times the brain is not receiving sufficient blood to nourish its
