
served as executive vice president of the Friona Chamber of Commercee, has resigned her position effective October 24, and has accepted a similar position at Stephenville.

The Chieftains wallopped the Mules last Friday at Muleshoe, 45-6. Friona's bigplay offense gained most of their yardage-258 yards-on just four plays, as the FHS offense was clicking like a well-oiled engine.

Friona scored on the third offensive play of the game, and never looked back. The team posted a 45-0 lead just 1:47 into the second half, and Coach James Morton pulled his-play weapons out of the game for the rest of the way.

It was third down and eight to go after Friona took the opening kickoff. Quarterback Aaron King dropped back and lofted a long spiral downfield.

Receiver Angel Vega was well-covered, but managed to make a leaping catch, coming back to the ball. His defender tried to make a hit but went out of bounds. Vega dashed the rest of the way into the end zone for the score, which covered 63 yards. Vega's first of six kicks was perfect. The Chieftains had taken a 7-0 lead only one minute and 33 seconds into the game.

The Mules tried to answer, and did make a pair of first downs before having to punt. Friona put the ball in play at their own 21 yard line. The team put together a 79 yard, seven-play scoring drives.

Quarterback King had the big play, a 40-yard scamper on the keeper play. That moved Friona to Muleshoe's 25-yard line.

King then hit big Quint Ellis for a 15-yard gain to the ten. It looked like Matthew Kendrick had a TD on the next play, but a penalty flag brought the ball back to the 15.

Two plays later, King found Vega in the end zone, while rolling out. A Muleshoe defender got a hand on the ball, but Vega caught it on

Friona's defense forced a punt, and Vega showed yet another facet of his talents. He fielded the ball on his own 40, picked up some blocks, and headed up the west sideline. A defender drove Vega out of bounds at the Muleshoe eight, or he would have had his third touchdown of the quarter! Vega's punt return was 52 yards long.

Instead, the Chiefs put the ball in play at the eight. Two plays later Kendrick crashed up the middle for ten yards for his first TD of the game. Vega's kick made it Friona 21, Muleshoe 0. This was the first play of the second quarter.

Muleshoe got a 49-yard run from their runningback, Gilbert Vela, moving to Friona's 30-yard line. But the Chieftain defense forced a fumble.

A few plays later, King hit Kendrick over the middle, and Matthew raced all the way to Muleshoe's 10, only to learn that a foul had rubbed out the play. Two plays later, King's arm was hit as he tried to pitch out, and it marked the first possession Friona had failed to score.

Muleshoe drove to the Friona 17, but the Chieftain defense again turned the Mules away empty-handed. Jeff Hamilton, Christian Candanedo and Luis Ramirez came up with big defensive plays on the series. Ramirez tipped a fourth-down pass away from the defender to give the ball back to Friona.

This was another of those "quick drives." Jesus Mata ripped through for 14 yards to the Friona 33.

Kendrick took the handoff and burst up the middle. He found himself in the Muleshoe secondary, and the Mule

About 170 men had paid \$450 each to fly to Washington D. C. They were at the airport with back packs and snack cakes, looking forward to a weekend of

Nobody seemed to know that the charter aircraft was not going to show up for the 2 p.m. departure.

There was no time to figure out why the plane was canceled. The challenge was to find another plane to take the men to the D. C. rally.
Some time around 8 p.m. that evening, Mr. Hickman, president of 1st State Bank in Canyon, found a plane for which he had to "guarantee" \$68,000. When you have a bank behind you, that part is easier.

bank behind you, that part is easier.

Instead of leaving on Friday afternoon, the replacement plane could not leave until Saturday morning and it had five less seats than the other one. No matter also that the new Saturday flight would arrive one hour after the rally began.

The 170 men who had arrived for the ghost flight did not know for a long time whether they would go to Washington or whether they would ever see their \$450 again.

while Hickman and his helpers worked frantically to find another plane, the Promise Keepers prayed and sang hymns at the Amarillo

sang hymis at the Amarino Aiport.

Some, like the contingent from Friona, came back home for the Chieftains-River Road football game. All the men were told that if they could find another plane, they would somehow be notified. (Thank God for cell phones.)

Waide Messer, pastor at First Baptist Church, was exofficio leader of the Friona group, some of whom were on the canceled flight and the others, including Messer, were on an earlier Saturday flight.

Breathing a huge sigh of

Breathing a huge sigh of relief and crediting Jesus with "kicking Satan's butt", Hickman found a plane. Close to 10 p.m., Delton Lewellen's cell phone rang in the stands at the Chieftain football

cell phone rang in the stands at the Chieftain football game.

Time to re-gather the flock and head back to Amarillo. The new flight was to depart at 10 a.m. Saturday morning, land at nearby Baltimore, Maryland airport, and deliver the Parmer County Promise Keepers to the rally one-hour after it began.

Since the men were split on two flights and wanted to be together in Washington, D. C., Delton gave Brother Waide the other end of a two-way radio. Waide and his young son Matthew were split up. Matthew was in the care of Delton, so Waide was anxious to meet up with Matthew and Delton in D. C.

As Brother Waide tells it, It urned on the radio and listened a couple of times

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when I thought they should be there but nothing but static. Then, an hour or so into the rally, we were gathered with a large group in prayer. We were kneeling, praying silently, when the radio in my back pocket crackled."

"In the midst of our silence, the voice of Delton Lewellen rose over the group. 'Waide, we're here!." They had found each other in the sea of men.

Banker Hickman stated in an interview in the Canyon News, "We watched Jesus kick Satan's butt."


