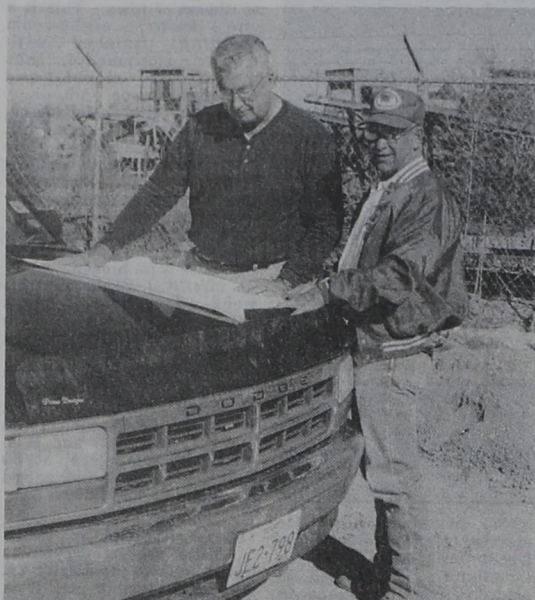

## Hometown Telephone, Cable Service Coming

Friona Communications Network, a division of WT Service, Inc., a wholly-owned subsidiary of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative of Hereford, will offer local telephone and cable television service beginning early next year.

According to Thomas Hyer, WTRT manager, "Telephone and cable television service will be via fiber-optic technology-for top-notch clarity and quality. Cable TV subscribers will have a wide selection of channels to choose from."

The projected in-service date for the FCN project is February 16, 1998. Engineering firm for the project is Hicks & Ragland of Lubbock.

WTRT's construction crew has already installed 13 miles of fiber-optic cable from the Summerfield central office of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative all the way to Friona.

Additional miles of cable are currently being installed in alleys in Friona by construction crews from the Fishel Company of Phoenix, Arizona, the firm contracted for that portion of the project.

Applications for service from FCN are presently being taken as crews work behind residences and businesses in the city. Future dates to sign-up for service from FCN will also be announced.

Customers won't have to deal with a distant corporate office when paying their FCN bill, or if they have a service

problem. FCN is opening a hometown business office right in Friona-in the old Porter Building at 1010 Columbia.

"The Cooperative has wanted to offer telephone service in Friona for 22 years. We have telephone service all around Friona, and the location fits our existing

facilities well. We're able to move into this market thanks to provisions in the Telecommunications Act of 1996 that encourage competition in local service," says Hyer.

"Our decision to enter the Friona market was easy-given that a majority of the businesses in Friona, and many individuals, have requested that we extend service to them," Hyer added.

Addition of state-of-the-art digital switching equipment at WTRT's Summerfield central office was required in order to offer service to Friona.

Thanks to that equipment, Friona customers will be able to take advantage of all available custom calling options including caller ID, call waiting, call forwarding and conference calling.

New equipment at the Summerfield central office will also permit WTRT to offer caller ID to all of its exchanges sometime in the first quarter of 1998.

"We're excited about this expansion into Friona. FCN will strive to give its customers quality local service that's affordable," says Hyer.

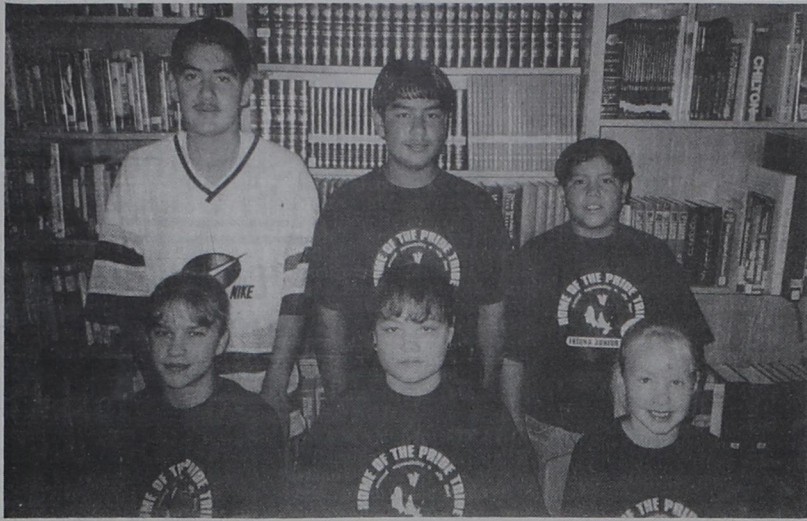
## VFW Chicken Dinner Is Back! Sunday October 19

**70 Yrs Ago-Oct. 14, 1927**

Mr. and Mrs. E.S. Euler and children moved last week into their new farm home southeast of town. This is a one story, eight-room building, finished with modern equipments, thus making a model and comfortable home.

Robert Hines McFarland, son of Mr. and Mrs. J.B. McFarland, had the misfortune to get his foot badly hurt last Saturday. While working with a row binder his foot was in some manner caught by one of the levers and severely mashed. No bones were broken.

Mrs. A.O. Drake was this week despending sweet potatoes to her neighbors from the surplus supply she has raised in her garden.

Leon Hart, whose farm is north of town, sold the bulk of his last year's corn crop last week. The corn was purchased by J.O. and H.G. Jones, of this place, at 50 cents per bushel and netted the sum of about \$200.

**55 Yrs Ago-Oct. 16, 1942**

Since the armed forces have claimed practically all the eligible young men from this territory, many positions have been taken over by women. Our entire force of rural mail carriers is now composed of ladies. Our local bank is wholly in charge of ladies. Our local drug store is now served by two ladies, where a few months ago, all the employees were men. Another lady, Mrs. Wright Williams, is in charge of Uncle Sam's rationing business in Friona.

**45 Yrs Ago-Oct. 16, 1952**

Something most unusual in the "Trade at Home" campaign ideas is being launched in the Star this week—that of a page message in which twelve merchants of the town cooperate in sponsoring. Beside the advertisement of each firm is a caricature of the firm

manager drawn by Hut Hutson, Amarillo cartoonist.

Mr. Tom Jarboe, sixth grade teacher for the second year in the local schools, left Tuesday for induction into the Armed Forces at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. Mrs. Jarboe accompanied him.

**40 Yrs Ago-Oct. 17, 1957**

The Friona city commission Monday night authorized rate increase on two utilities, telephone service and natural gas. Effective date of the phone increase is the "next billing period," according to the ordinance, and the gas rate increase is due December 1, the ordinance is dated.

**35 Yrs Ago-Oct. 18, 1962**

Grain sorghum farmers in Parmer County were all but winding up what had been termed one of the fastest and smoothest grain harvests in the county's history before rains early Wednesday brought end to the ideal weather which has blessed the season for more than a week.

C.D. Nolan of the Lazbuddie community delivered the first bale of cotton ever to be ginned at the Friona Farmers Co-op Gin on Tuesday of this week. The bale weighed 475 pounds.

**30 Yrs Ago-Oct. 19, 1967**

Work was progressing smoothly at Missouri Beef Packers this week, as officials hailed the "Indian Summer" weather as a God-send to their construction work. "We hope it continues like this until about next April," jokingly remarked Doyle Elliott, building superintendent. Elliott pointed out that workmen have finished the floor in the rendering room of the big plant. A large concrete parking area has been completed at the construction site, and work was progressing on a concrete roadway leading from the railway crossing to the plant

**25 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 19, 1972**

Plans for the formal Open House of the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union in the new location at the corner of Sixth and Euclid have been finished. October 15-22 is International Credit Union Week. Open House will be held from 2-5 p.m. Sunday, October 22.

**20 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 16, 1977**

The mercury flirted with the freezing mark in Friona this week, but at week's end farmers and gardeners are still looking for the first freeze of the season. The temperature dropped to a low of 35 on Tuesday morning and was just a degree warmer on Wednesday. As of Thursday, October 13, 263 bales of cotton had been ginned in Parmer County.

**15 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 17, 1982**

The trio, Jackie Morgan, Joy Morton and Cynthia Smith, were the only contestants to correctly pick as many as 18 games on the contest slate, and they captured the three weekly cash prizes. Morgan claimed first prize, missing the actual score of the tie-breaker game, Friona-Tulia, by eight points. Joy and Cynthia were both 12 points from the game score.

Recently five members of the Texas Plains Chorale traveled to Nickel Creek Ranch in Texas to an annual Music Festival hosted by David R. Ligon. Ligon has hosted a musical festival for country musical lovers on his ranch since 1972. The Chorale members were treated to a rare musical experience.

The music festival features great country music by musicians that love to perform and enjoy performing with others. They have a great admiration for one another's talent and high regard for expertise when excellence is demonstrated.

When a jam session begins, it goes on for hours from evening into early morning. After a few hours of rest, it will begin again with freshness and for the sheer love of doing it. Old and new songs are sung—some with seemingly endless verses as the singer tells his story. Banjos, guitars, fiddles, bass fiddles, digeridoo (Australian Aboriginal pipe), in the hands of many others join in on a song that a singer is compelled to report.

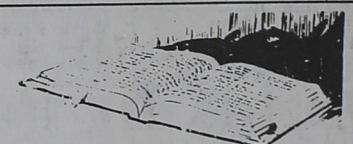

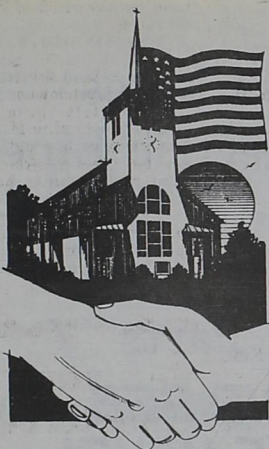

About 170 men had paid \$450 each to fly to Washington D. C. They were at the airport with back packs and snack cakes, looking forward to a weekend of

Promise Keepers praise. Nobody seemed to know that the charter aircraft was not going to show up for the 2 p.m. departure.

There was no time to figure out why the plane was canceled. The challenge was to find another plane to take the men to the D. C. rally.

Some time around 8 p.m. that evening, Mr. Hickman, president of 1st State Bank in Canyon, found a plane for which he had to "guarantee" \$68,000. When you have a bank behind you, that part is easier.

Instead of leaving on Friday afternoon, the replacement plane could not leave until Saturday morning and it had five less seats than the other one. No matter also that the new Saturday flight would arrive one hour after the rally began.

The 170 men who had arrived for the ghost flight did not know for a long time whether they would go to Washington or whether they would ever see their \$450 again.

While Hickman and his helpers worked frantically to find another plane, the Promise Keepers prayed and sang hymns at the Amarillo Airport.

Some, like the contingent from Friona, came back home for the Chieftains-River Road football game. All the men were told that if they could find another plane, they would somehow be notified. (Thank God for cell phones.)

Waide Messer, pastor at First Baptist Church, was ex-officio leader of the Friona group, some of whom were on the canceled flight and the others, including Messer, were on an earlier Saturday flight.

Breathing a huge sigh of relief and crediting Jesus with "kicking Satan's butt", Hickman found a plane. Close to 10 p.m., Delton Lewellen's cell phone rang in the stands at the Chieftain football game.

Time to re-gather the flock and head back to Amarillo. The new flight was to depart at 10 a.m. Saturday morning, land at nearby Baltimore, Maryland airport, and deliver the Parmer County Promise Keepers to the rally one-hour after it began.

Since the men were split on two flights and wanted to be together in Washington, D. C., Delton gave Brother Waide the other end of a two-way radio. Waide and his young son Matthew were split up. Matthew was in the care of Delton, so Waide was anxious to meet up with Matthew and Delton in D. C.

As Brother Waide tells it, "I turned on the radio and listened a couple of times

when I thought they should be there but nothing but static. Then, an hour or so into the rally, we were gathered with a large group in prayer. We were kneeling, praying silently, when the radio in my back pocket crackled."

"In the midst of our silence, the voice of Delton Lewellen rose over the group. 'Waide, we're here!' They had found each other in the sea of men.

Banker Hickman stated in an interview in the Canyon News, "We watched Jesus kick Satan's butt."

Perhaps you think that is irreverent. Remember, Promise Keepers was started by a college football coach. Kicking Satan's butt is a man thing.

Promise Keepers has been prominent in the media just recently, in spite of being formed seven years ago. Time Magazine had Promise Keepers on the cover.

Quoting from Time: "The seven-year-old organization boasts annual revenues of \$87 million, a two-story brick headquarters in Denver and 360 paid staff members. It is out to retake male responsibility--and reestablish male leadership--in a country that it sees as badly detoured from a godly and natural course, falling into the snares of poverty, illegitimacy, drug abuse, juvenile delinquency and disease because American men have forsaken Christian values."

(Wait a minute. Billy Jeff Clinton has been telling us how great things are in America.)

Promise Keepers president Randy Phillips said: "We are reaping the harvest of women who have cried out to God to do a miracle in men."

In fact God has been cried out to real often lately. Getting thousands and millions of people together to profess and confess is the current fad. For example:

\* The Million Man March two years ago in which the mainly black men pledged to be better husbands, fathers, and better men in general.

\* Promise Keepers' promise to "practice spiritual, moral, ethical and sexual purity" plus six other promises. Almost a million of them gathered in D. C.

\* Women Of Faith was organized by a man named Stephen Arterburn who is co-founder of a chain of psychological counseling clinics that offer therapy from a religious perspective.

Over 30,000 women attended the 1996 WOF conferences (called Joyful Journeys) and it is estimated that more than 165,000 women will attend the 1997

conferences.

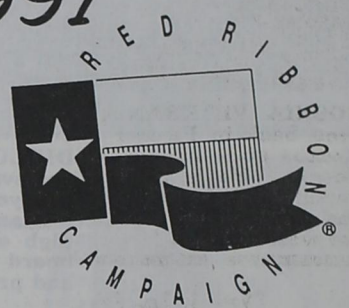

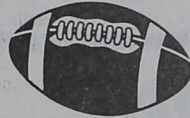

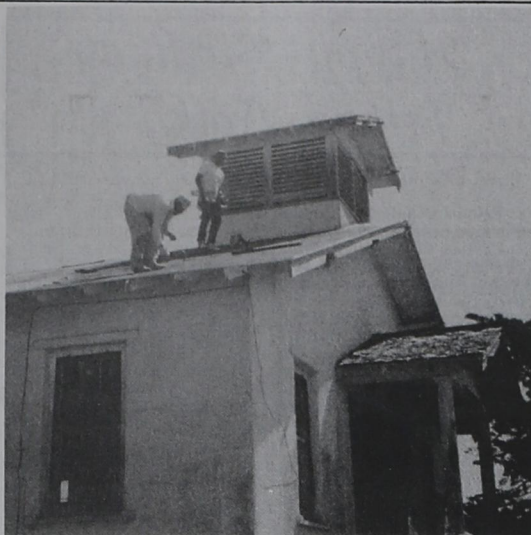
•The board also was informed the Average Daily Attendance (ADA) for the

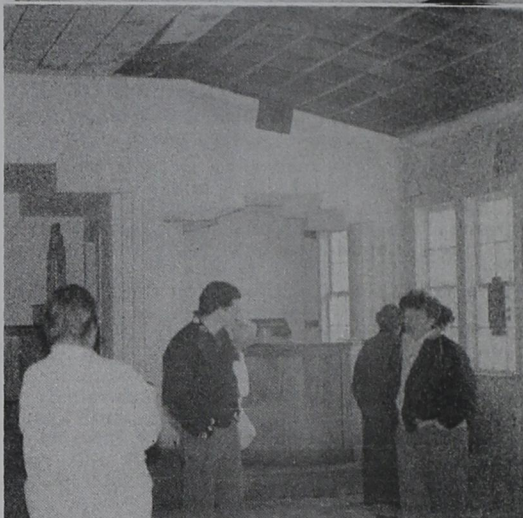
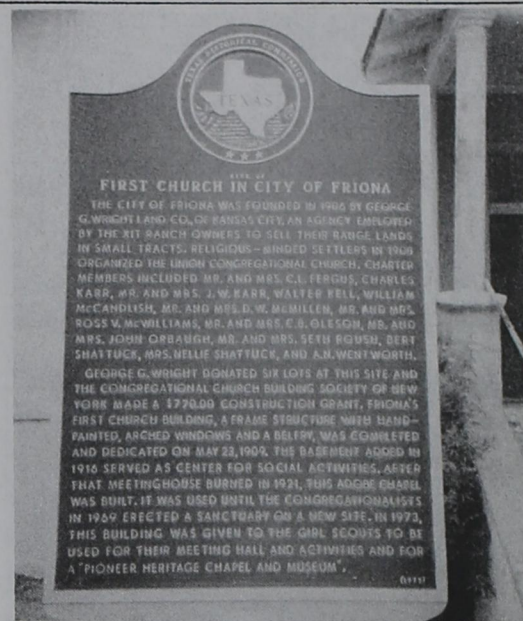

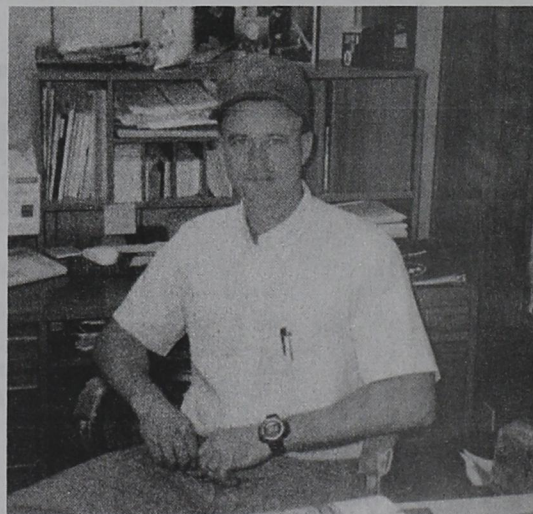

## YOUR EYES

### Eye Exercises



One way to keep your eye muscles strong and to help eliminate tension around tired eyes is to get into the habit of exercising your eyes.

Begin by sitting in a comfortable position with your back straight and relax. Look straight ahead and imagine you are looking at an enormous clock. Without moving your head, look at twelve o'clock and then shift your eyes to look at six o'clock. Repeat this three times, then blink several times before closing your eyes to relax a minute or two.

Then look to the right to three o'clock and shift over to nine o'clock. Do this three times, followed by blinks, and then close your eyes to relax.

Next, work your way around the clock, starting by looking at twelve o'clock, then moving to one o'clock, to two o'clock and so on. When you reach twelve again, blink several times and then rest your eyes. Then go counterclockwise.
