## Grain bill in veto jeopardy

**WASHINGTON** — The dairy-tobacco bill, which includes a feed assistance program for drought-plagued ranchers, was approved by voice vote in the Senate late Thursday and is scheduled for debate on Friday in the House.

Supporters of the bill are predicting an easy victory in the House, although a presidential veto is still a strong possibility. However, there was some indication Friday that the administration may be backing off from its veto threat.

"Our position is that we oppose the bill, but there is no signal on a veto," said Edwin Dale, a spokesman for Reagan Budget Director David Stockman. Dale said earlier in the week that Stockman had "signaled" privately that he would recommend a veto.

But the spokesman said Friday that Stockman will not make a recommendation to the president before Congress passes the bill.

Bernie Brenner, a spokesman for House Agriculture Committee Chairman Rep. E. "Kika" de la

Garza, D-Mission, said President Reagan will find it politically troublesome to veto the bill.

The legislation has the support of the dairy lobby, Democrats and many key Republicans including Rep. Tom Loeffler, R-Hunt, and Sen. Jesse Helms of North Carolina.

"Will (Stockman) have the weight he usually has because of the politics of the bill?" asked Brenner.

A presidential veto would apparently leave drought-stricken ranchers who are expecting federal feed assistance twisting slowly in the wind.

Congress is expected to adjourn for the year on Friday. Many ranchers, who have presided over parched lands since summer, cannot wait until January or February for some form of cattle feed.

U.S. Agriculture Secretary John Block has the authority to implement an emergency feed program, but all indications are that he will not sell the federal grain surplus to ranchers unless forced to do so by Congress.

Block has said the feed assistance amendment could cost as much as \$1 billion.

• **Education and Awareness;** Ron Logback, chairman. This task force will help develop community resource lists, sponsor seminars and workshops on drugs and alcohol, establish information centers, provide news releases, and establish a speakers bureau. The committee divided into sub-groups to work on each task. The next meeting of the task force will be at 9 p.m. Dec 14 at Big Spring High School.

• **Teens Against Drugs;** Peter Porras, chairman. TAD will work closely with school systems to review school policies and curriculum and make recommendations. TAD will form parent-student self-help groups and teen work service programs. Those organizing

• **Alternate Student Activities;** permanent chairman to be chosen at the next meeting. The task force plans to start a petition to raise the legal drinking age to 21 years of age. It is also plans to investigate what activities are available to Big Spring youth at present and whether youth would support a teenage night club. In addition, the group will survey students on what activities they go out of town for. ## F-16 crashes near Fort Worth

**FORT WORTH, Texas (AP)** — A pilot ejected to safety Friday as his F-16 jet crashed into a building on a farm about six miles north of Carswell Air Force Base, authorities said.

The building caught fire, but no one on the ground was injured in the crash, said Maj. Robert Lake, a Carswell spokesman.

Lake said the pilot, Lt. Col. Jerry K. Sharp, 42, of Grayville, Ill., started a second fire in a field near Eagle Mountain Elementary School to attract the attention of rescuers, and schoolchildren were evacuated as a precaution.

Sharp was taken by Air Force rescue helicopter to the base hospital, but the pilot was not believed to be seriously injured, Lake said.

Carswell security police cordoned off the immediate crash site, and some traffic on roads in the area was diverted.

The F-16 was one of two planes en route to Carswell from Nellis Air Force Base in Nevada on a routine training flight. The second jet landed safely at the base, Lake said.

Roger Knox of Haslet said he and Mark Oldham of Saginaw were

riding in a truck checking a nearby field of wheat when they saw the planes.

"One of them popped and red smoke came out and the pilot ejected and the plane went down," Knox said. "When the plane hit the ground it was just black smoke, lots of black smoke."

The men drove to the area to check on the pilot, but a Carswell helicopter already was circling over the pilot by the time they arrived. Knox said he saw the pilot walking away from the spot where he came down.

## Director examines nuclear aftermath

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** — Nicholas Meyer, the director, says the motive behind "The Day After" on ABC was to get people talking about the consequences of nuclear war.

"This film is supposed to promote discussion," says Meyer. "It's to get people involved in a dialogue."

Calling the film apolitical, Meyer says, "To me this movie is a gigantic public service announcement, like Smokey the Bear. All the rhetoric between the United States and the Soviet Union is lethal. There's a lot of heated rhetoric, but nobody's talking about what would happen when they start to push the button. That's what this movie is about."

"The Day After," to be broadcast Sunday night, focuses all of its attention on a single American community, Lawrence, Kan., and what happens to that place when nearby Kansas City is obliterated by Soviet missiles.

The movie stars Jason Robards, Jobeth Williams, Steven Guttenberg, John Cullum, John Lithgow and Bibi Besch.

As devastating as the destruction is, the survivors find themselves caught in a more frightening nightmare of radiation poisoning complicated by contaminated food and water. People are murdered for a slice of bread and looters are summarily executed by firing squads.

"The movie takes the position that you can't survive a nuclear war," Meyer says. "It can't be limited, it can't be protracted, it can only be fatal. There may be people who are breathing at the end of the film, but that's not living. They just haven't died yet."

The movie, which was filmed on location in Lawrence and Kansas City, has been a center of controversy since it was announced two years ago. Antinuclear groups, through demonstrations and other means, are using the movie to focus attention on their own activities.

The film was completed early in 1983 but was held up by ABC while its four hours was trimmed back to two hours and five minutes. Many scenes of horror have been eliminated, but viewers also will not learn much about how the war began — or who started it.

The latest line of dialogue eliminated from the film was about the deployment of Pershing II missiles in Europe, an event which, incidentally, is supposed to happen just a few days after the movie is broadcast. "That line was written 2½ years ago," says Meyer. "I don't think any of us made the same connection that people who objected to it did. We thought we were reflecting the situation as accurately as possible."

This week's answers by Bob Miller, Howard County attorney.

**Q. Should marijuana be legalized in order to get the "problem" above ground?**

**A. No,** the problem is presently above ground concerning use of drugs and alcohol, and it requires strong law enforcement plus the community support by jury verdicts and peer pressure to educate the people of the harmful effects of drugs and alcohol.

**Q. If you try to help a person who has an overdose, can you be sued if the person dies?**

**A. You can only be sued if you are negligent in the treatment provided to the overdosed person.** Negligence is determined by the trier of fact of what an ordinary and prudent person would do under similar circumstances. There could also be a cause of action for failure to provide reasonable help to an overdosed person and that person dies. Anybody can be sued for practically anything and the result is determined by the jury as to whether or not there is negligence or not.

 But running a newspaper route is a job she takes seriously. "This is a business. And you have to act like you're the boss. I mean I try to run it on schedule, keep proper books, and organize collections. I try to get my new customers to pay yearly. Most of my old friends pay by the year, too. But I have a few who want me to come by to collect — they like some company. One told me the other day he wouldn't hear all the latest gossip if I didn't come by the collect.  
 "I'm pretty tough on setting a deadline for collections. After all everybody wants his paycheck on time."  
 This "tough" collector looks after her friends along her route. When a member of the family passes away, Pauline delivers the Herald free for a month. If she notices a few days papers collecting at the door, she'll pick them up and check to see if the resident is on vacation or ill. Her 75 mile route takes about 2 1/2 hours

**How do we repeal this decision?**

**A. It is not a question of repealing the decision, it is a question for law enforcement to abide by the procedural due process in search and seizure and to enforce the laws according to the guidelines of the United States Constitution.** Therefore, in order to obtain the evidence which will be admitted into trial, it is necessary that the police follow in a step by step manner the requirements of a valid search and seizure as well as all other aspects of due process of law. Hopefully, the Courts will uphold such searches and manners of arrest when the police have followed the dictates of prior Court decisions.

**Q. Why do we have to shoulder the 100% of this problem as children and parents. It would appear that we have gone soft on point of sources that know suppliers or made excuses why this is not a good time to prosecute or punish. If there is a snake in our midst, why not kill it?**

**A. I assume this question is asking why isn't there stronger law enforcement. I feel that the chief of police is enforcing the laws and has made cases which will soon develop to show there is strong prosecution. However, to have strong prosecution is only one step; the direction of punishment. It is further necessary that we have strong juries, strong judges to convict and punish.**

## Lech misses meeting king

**OSLO —** Lech Walesa, leader of Poland's outlawed Solidarity labor union movement, says his main regret about not coming to Oslo to pick up his Nobel Peace Prize is that he won't meet Norway's king.

"You know, I've never set eyes on a king," Walesa told the Oslo newspaper Aftenposten in an interview in Gdansk. "A boyhood dream of mine was to see a living monarch. That was what I had been looking most forward to now."

Walesa earlier announced that he would send his wife Danuta and their 13-year-old son Bogdan to Oslo for the award ceremony on Dec. 10. The prize carries a diploma, a medal and a record stipend this year of \$190,000.

Norway's King Olav V, 81, does not participate in the ceremony, but laureates generally have an audience with him.

## Cousteau touts new boat

**NEW YORK —** Underwater explorer Jacques Cousteau is having troubles atop the waves, but is claiming success with his storm-damaged experimental "sailboat without sails."

On Thursday the ship Moulin a Vent, French for "windmill," which Cousteau has been piloting in a test crossing of the Atlantic, lost its wind propulsion mast in a storm west of Bermuda.

Two weeks ago, it was damaged in another storm east of Bermuda. "We have lost only the hardware," Cousteau said in a report to the Cousteau Society here. "The brains who conceived the system are already at

work. Give me a little time and we will do it again."

The 65-foot catamaran's 44-foot wind propulsion mast, a computer-controlled cylinder that works like a vertical wing, was lost when a weld that held it to the ship failed under the pounding of 50-knot wind.

Accompanied by Calypso, Cousteau's research ship, the Moulin a Vent is using its auxiliary engines to head toward Norfolk, Va., for repair.

## Cosby has art interest

**BOSTON —** Comedian Bill Cosby has earned his fortune making jokes but he is deadly serious about what he and his wife consider a slight to black American artists by U.S. museums.

Cosby says he won't give the Boston Museum of Fine Arts a work he owns by 19th-century black painter Henry E. Tanner for use in a major exhibition of American art that drew protests because it contained no black artist.

The museum should include works by more than one black painter, Cosby said in a statement issued Thursday in New York by spokesman David Brokaw.

"Many black artists of great value have been ignored by the mainstream critics and curators," he said. "Black was not beautiful up until now."

Museum director Jan Fontein said in response: "The museum is committed to vigorously pursuing the possibility of adding a painting by Henry Tanner to the New World Exhibition."

# Mattox accused of using scare tactics

**AUSTIN (AP) —** The bond chief of a prestigious Houston law firm testified Friday that Attorney General Jim Mattox threatened "war" if the firm did not stop trying to subpoena his sister and secretary. Mattox was charged with commercial bribery after a partner in the firm accused him of threatening to use the power of the state to cripple the firm's municipal bond business.

Wiley Caldwell, who heads the bond division of the Fulbright and Jaworski law firm, said he did not record the June 15 conversation but did take notes. Caldwell and Tom McDade, whose accusations led to the indictment against Mattox, were called to court by Mattox's attorneys Friday to give depositions.

A trial date in the state's case against Mattox has not been set. In the meantime, lawyers are allowed to take depositions from the witnesses.

"Mattox was obviously quite angry," Caldwell testified during the pre-trial hearing. "He was upset; he was mad. He said he was upset because McDade had said his testimony was ludicrous and had tried to subpoena Mattox's sister and secretary."

The law firm tried to question the women in connection with a lawsuit filed by South Texas rancher Clinton Mangas against Mobil Oil Corp., which the firm represented. Mattox represented the state's mineral rights interests on Mangas' side.

Mattox "said he was sick and tired of this treatment and it would either stop or he would threaten war or a complete breach," Caldwell testified. "He promised war if he didn't get it stopped. He told me that unless I could get the matter straightened out I could forget any relationship with his office. The context was sufficient to include the bond business."

Caldwell spent just over an hour on the witness stand Friday morning discussing his legal background and describing how the municipal bond business works. Government bond offerings, usually prepared by law firms, require approval of the attorney general's office before they go on the market.

Mattox is accused of threatening last June 15 to withhold approval of bond proposals prepared by Fulbright and Jaworski unless McDade stopped trying to interrogate Mattox's sister in the civil suit.

Mattox, indicted Sept. 13 on a charge of commercial bribery, has denied the accusation.

"People say we should say who started the war," the director says. "If you're living in Lawrence, Kan., you'll never find out who started it. Do you think somebody's going to come on the radio and tell you?"

Meyer, who previously directed "Time After Time" and "Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan," says he was very reluctant to become involved in a movie about nuclear war. "It wasn't something I enjoy being interested in," he says. "I didn't want to deal with it. I wanted to continue to make movies that I think will give people pleasure."

He says he had a movie of his own he wanted to direct when he was persuaded to take on "The Day After."

"Originally, it was to be two parts of two hours each," he says of "The Day After." "When I heard they were cutting it it really upset me because I thought it

was terrific. Then I felt it was padded. I said no one is going to tune in two nights to see Armageddon."

Meyer says he read everything could find about nuclear warfare prior to starting production. "The single most disturbing part of making this movie was the research," he says. "It was making me sick. I thought I was coming down with the flu."

"Early on I decided I didn't want a lot of well-known people or a lot of music. I can't say I had much difficulty with ABC. They said, give us one star. So Jason Robards is the only well-known star. Shooting the movie was an upper. We were all bound together by a common purpose. The cast, the crew and the people of Lawrence, we were all scared and upset, but we were scared and upset together."

## Greyhound strike continues

PHOENIX — Greyhound buses rolled in 27 states Friday with less of the violence that marked the first day's resumption of limited service, and striking union leaders predicted their members would reject a company wage and benefit reduction proposal.

Eleven arrests were reported in picket line demonstrations Friday, a sharp drop from more than 100 the day before. In Boston, demonstrators again threw eggs and taunted departing drivers as "scabs" but New York police said their biggest problem was "trying to stay awake."

In Phoenix, federal mediators and negotiators for Greyhound Lines and the 31-member Amalgamated Council of Greyhound Local Unions met late into the night and then met again Friday. The union dropped preconditions and agreed to allow its members to vote on an amended three-year proposal that still calls for wage and benefit reductions.

Council member Roy A. Golden of Kansas City, Mo., pledged to do "everything I can" to keep the proposal from being approved.

The council had voted 18-12 to offer the proposal to members, with a recommendation that they reject it, on condition that Greyhound halt service and stop using replacement personnel.

## Clark wins confirmation

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate confirmed William P. Clark as secretary of the interior Friday, rejecting complaints by administration critics that the appointment signaled a continuation of the pro-development policies of his predecessor, James Watt.

The Senate approved President Reagan's nomination of his former national security adviser on a vote of 71-18. Several of those voting for Clark said their decision was based on a belief that the president was entitled to the secretary of his choice, not because of agreement with administration policies.

Clark also had many supporters in his own right. Senate Majority Leader Howard H. Baker Jr., R-Tenn., urged support for Clark, arguing "he has gained the trust and confidence of the president of the United States."

Sen. James A. McClure, R-Idaho, chairman of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, said Clark was "not only qualified ... he represents a unique opportunity for progress. Judge Clark represents an opportunity to still these troubled waters with his calming presence."

## Strangler gets life sentence

LOS ANGELES — Angelo Buono Jr., convicted of killing nine women in the Hillside Strangler case, escaped the death penalty Friday when the jury in California's longest criminal trial recommended he be sentenced to life in prison without parole.

The 50-year-old automobile upholsterer, clad in a blue prison jumpsuit, showed no reaction. But a defense lawyer expressed surprise at the verdict ending the 2-year-old trial.

"I've always had the feeling that if he was convicted, the natural punishment would be death because of the nature of the crimes," said attorney Gerald Chaleff. "(But) we are a civilized society and a civilized society should not be taking other people's lives."

The victims in the killings were as young as 12 and most had been sexually assaulted before they were murdered.

In each of Buono's convictions, jurors had found the special circumstance of multiple murder that would have permitted the death penalty.

Prosecutors said they believed jurors opted for life in prison instead of sending Buono to the gas chamber because that was the punishment given the chief witness, Buono's adoptive cousin, Kenneth Bianchi.

Ahead of the storm system, strong winds were gusting out of the south at 25 to 35 mph, occasionally reaching 45 mph.

# U.S. credit line upped to \$101 billion

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House, on vote of 214-186, sent to President Reagan on Friday a bill which tacks \$101 billion onto the government's line of credit and likely will push the national debt to \$1.49 trillion by spring.

The measure renews federal borrowing authority after the government had operated on a cash-only basis for nearly three weeks. White House spokesman Larry Speakes said "The president will sign it."

Congress' last major fiscal action before leaving town for a two-month vacation came as efforts to reduce soaring budget deficits were left in shambles on both sides of the Capitol.

The Senate, by voice vote Thursday night, accepted the compromise plan raising the limit on government borrowing from its current ceiling of \$1.389 trillion to \$1.49 trillion.

The government has been operating on a cash-only basis since Nov. 1, when the existing ceiling on borrowing was reached. The day before, in a token protest of \$200 billion an-

nual budget deficits, the Senate refused Reagan's request to raise the debt limit to \$1.615 trillion.

Since then, sales of U.S. Savings Bonds have been suspended and sales of other government securities have been disrupted. But thanks to an unusually large cash balance, the government has been able to keep paying its bills.

Reagan administration officials have estimated that the new debt limit will cover federal borrowing needs only into next April, meaning there will have to be another increase next year.

Little by little this week, there has been a disintegration of plans to reduce the budget deficits which have swollen the national debt. On Friday, legislators finally gave up.

The Senate Finance Committee waited until the last day of the 1983 session before it abandoned efforts to write a deficit-reduction package that would have included about \$150 billion in tax increases and spending cuts over

four years. When it became obvious that the package would not be approved, the panel instead voted 16-1 to direct its staff to prepare a new bill by Feb. 15.

Sen. William Roth, R-Del., who opposes any tax increase, voted present when the roll was called. Sen. Steven Symms, R-Idaho, another opponent of raising taxes, voted no. He said government spending cutters should "go after this budget like we went after Grenada. Maybe the Marines could take this committee."

Sen. John C. Danforth, R-Mo., criticized the president for adamantly opposing any tax increases and some Democrats for closing the door to any further spending cuts. "These deficits are going to be the foremost issue before this country next year," Danforth said.

"All of us deserve the scorn of the country if we only summon up rhetoric" and do nothing about the deficit, said Sen. Malcolm Wallop, R-Wyo.

## Bell seeks interim rate hike

AUSTIN (AP) — Southwestern Bell officials, concerned about revenue they say they'll lose when the company becomes independent next year, were expected Friday to ask the Public Utility Commission to approve interim rates.

The telephone company has a \$1.36 billion rate hike request pending with the commission, but that case is not expected to be resolved until spring.

On Jan. 1, under a court order making it independent of American Telephone & Telegraph, Southwestern Bell says it will lose about \$870 million a year in long distance tolls. Company spokesman Dale Johnson on Friday would not release the amount of the interim rate hike that would be sought, but he said the company wants to recover the lost revenues.

"We likely will file a request for interim rates late this afternoon," said Johnson. "The primary thrust is to recover lost long distance revenues."

PUC Administrative Law Judge Jacqueline Holmes will decide whether to grant the interim rate hike. Her decision can be appealed to the three-member commission.

Rick Hainline, PUC spokesman, said the commission could force Southwestern Bell to make refunds if the interim rates are higher than the final rates approved in the \$1.36 billion case.

State law allows utility companies to unilaterally set so-called bonded rates while a rate case is pending. However, the timetable in the law does not allow Southwestern Bell to collect bonded rates until late February.

PUC General Counsel Allen King predicted the request for interim rates would be fought by several parties in the case.

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## Oil firms aid transplants

HOUSTON (AP) — Thirty-eight oil-related companies are sponsoring a nationwide emergency air transportation program to help deliver organ transplants, it was announced Friday.

The program, known as Oil Industry Lifesaving Flights, or "OIL Flights," is touted as the "first formalized national effort to make incorporated or chartered aircraft available for transplant-related purposes," OIL Flights said in a statement.

The program is slated to begin Jan. 1.

Under the program, the aircraft will be made available for organs, donors, recipients or surgical teams. When a transplant center requests help, the OIL Flights

center in Houston will make the arrangements, he said.

As of Friday, Coffman said the 38 companies involved in the operation had a pool of 45 aircraft in 17 cities in 11 states from California to Florida and Texas to Illinois. Money raised for the program would be used to arrange for transportation where corporate aircraft were unavailable or where special life support systems were needed, he said.

Not only did the teams play give-away, they couldn't hit a shot. Howard hit 36 per cent from the floor for the game (27-75) while Temple came through with 29 per cent (19-66). That was for the game. In the second half alone, Howard dipped to 30 per cent (11-37) and Temple to 24 per cent (7-29).

The difference in the ballgame was Alex Provincio. The Hawk Queens forward hit 10 of 15 first half shots and played a key role as HC turned a one-point game into a 12-point halftime lead.

"Alex played well on offense," Stevens said. "I wanted to see if they could play post defense. Watching them last night (Thursday), they seemed to put pressure outside and weren't concentrating inside."

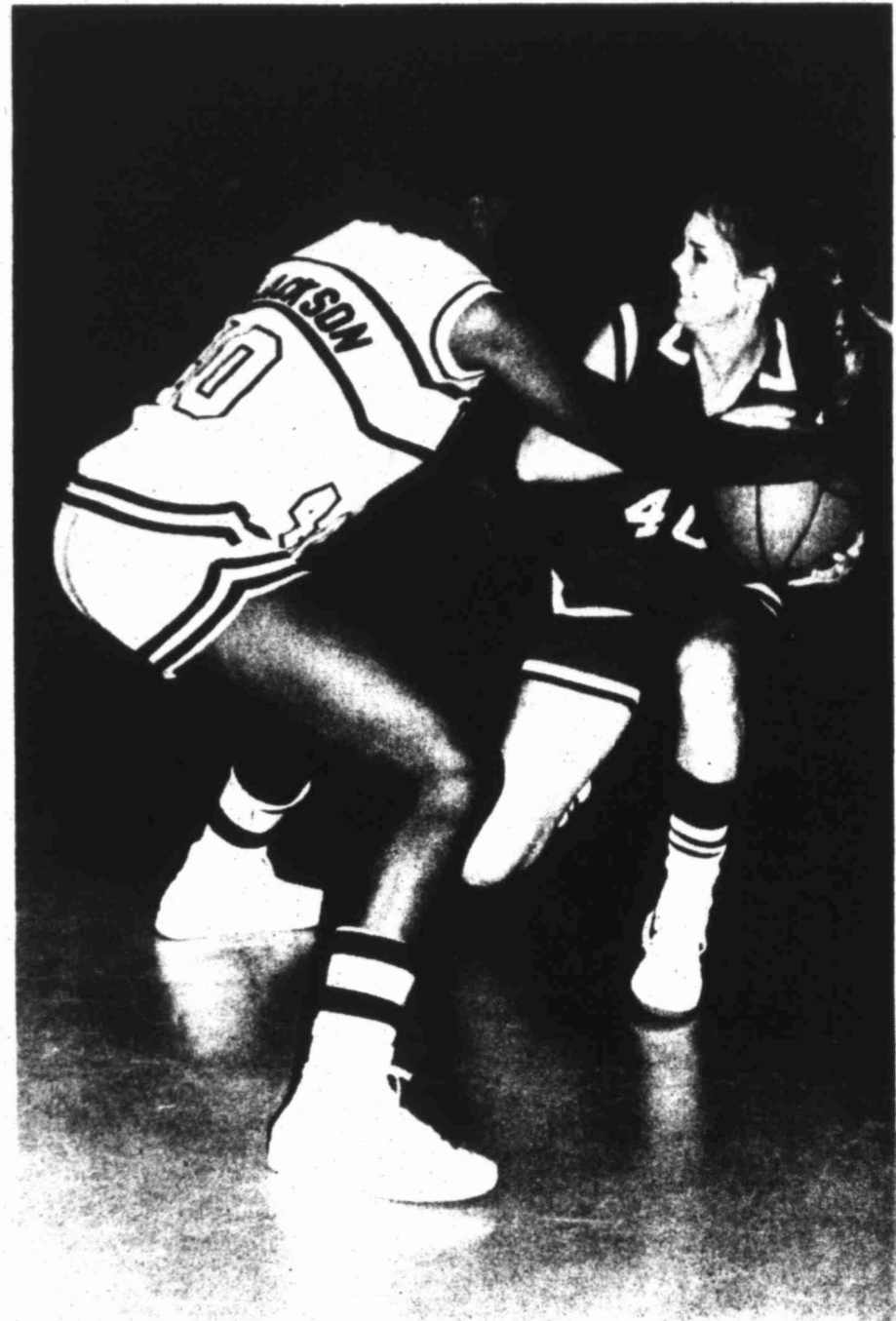
The plan worked as the Howard freshman scored 20 points. She finished the game with 27 as the Temple put a double-team on her in the second half and the Queens were unable to work the ball her direction.

# Bears block way of UT hopes

A Cotton Bowl berth and a share of the Southwest Conference football title will be on the line Saturday when the Texas Longhorns meet Baylor at Austin.

However, Southern Methodist still has an outside shot at earning the New Year's Day slot. The Mustangs need to beat Arkansas Saturday and then hope the undefeated Longhorns lose to Baylor and Texas A&M.

No. 2 ranked Texas is 6-0 in the SWC and 9-0 overall.

Sixth-ranked Southern Methodist, which plays Arkansas in Little Rock at 11:35 a.m. in a nationally (ABC) televised game, trails the 'Horns by a game.

Should SMU and Texas tie the 'Horns would get the bowl because they beat the Mustangs.

Meanwhile, SMU is expected to accept a Sun Bowl berth opposite Alabama after Saturday's game against the Razorbacks. It will be played on Christmas Eve.

Texas was a 13-point favorite over the Bluebonnet Bowl-bound Bears,

who are expected to accept a bid for a New Year's Eve date against Oklahoma State following the game.

SMU rated a 7-point choice over the Razorbacks.

In other games, Texas A&M was a touchdown pick over Texas Christian in Fort Worth and Houston was

stingy.

Texas' defense has yielded just one touchdown in the last five games.

The 'Horns have allowed an average of only 188.3 yards per game, best in the nation. Texas also leads the country in defending against the pass (87.2 yards) and against scoring (7.8).

Baylor has the SWC's top offense at 411.6 yards per game and quarterbacks Cody Carlson and Tom Muecke are 1-2 in passing.

"Our football team, although it's very young, is not intimidated by playing the No. 2 team in the nation in their own back yard," Teaff said.

"But that's not to say we don't respect them. Like you have respect for any great person, team or champion of any kind, we have respect for the University of Texas football team.

"It should be a great matchup with our very productive offense and their stingy defense."

"Their defense is so good it shouldn't be called the Texas Longhorns," said Baylor Coach Grant Teaff. "They should be called the Texas Scrooges. They are

They're stingy."

So why isn't Teaff overly apprehensive? Perhaps because he also said, "This is without question the most electrifying offensive unit we've had at Baylor."

Illinois Coach Mike White is looking forward to the Northwestern game, not just because the Wildcats are only 2-8.

"Selling the Chicago area has been a tough sell, me personally and our football program," he pointed out.

"I can see there are differences between downstate and the Chicago area."

For the second year in a row, Washington State has a chance to knock Washington out of the Rose Bowl, provided UCLA also beats Southern Cal.

"I know a lot is going to be played up about last year's game (a 24-20 Washington State victory)," said Washington Coach Don James. "But last year's game is history. What happened last year is not going to make any difference. If any of our players think any different, they're making a huge mistake."

Washington State has been overlooked by the bowls despite a 6-4 record and a four-game winning streak.

"This is Washington State-Washington; I don't give a hoot about the bowls," said Cougars' Coach Jim Walden. "I'm glad they (Washington) are waiting. We're coming. We're not afraid. I'll let Washington worry about their bowl aspirations. The Washington game means a great deal to us. It would give us seven wins, and that means that our program is growing by leaps and bounds."

Despite narrow losses to Pitt and Penn State in its last two outings, Notre Dame has a chance for a 7-4 record, which would be the most wins in Coach Gerry Faust's three-year tenure.

# Bowl bidders hold final breath

The bowl committees will be officially issuing their invitations and unofficially holding their breath against the possibility of some upsets Saturday as the college football season ends for many teams.

Six members of The Associated Press Top Twenty are idle — No. 1 Nebraska, No. 3 Auburn, No. 5 Miami, No. 7 Georgia, No. 12 Florida and No. 16 Alabama. All but Miami still have at least one regular-season game remaining, but Nebraska and Miami are in the Orange Bowl, Auburn in the Sugar, Georgia in the Cotton, Florida in the Gator and Alabama in the Sun.

Second-ranked Texas can clinch a trip to the Cotton Bowl by beating Bluebonnet Bowl-bound Baylor at home. Fourth-ranked Illinois, which will represent the Pac-10 in the Rose Bowl, visits Northwestern, while No. 6 Southern Methodist, assured of a spot in the Sun Bowl but still clinging to a slim chance at the Cotton, meets Arkansas at Little Rock.

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# College Roundup

Eighth-ranked Michigan entertains No. 10 Ohio State in their annual Big Ten windup. But this time, there is no Rose Bowl berth at stake; the winner goes to the Sugar Bowl and the loser goes to the Fiesta against Pitt. Rounding out the Top Ten, ninth-ranked Brigham Young, headed for the Holiday Bowl as the Western Athletic Conference champ, entertains Utah.

In the Second Ten, Gator Bowl-bound No. 11 Iowa entertains Minnesota; No. 13 Clemson visits South Carolina; No. 14 West Virginia, a Hall of Fame Bowl entry, is at Syracuse; Washington State at No. 15 Washington, the leader in the Pac-10 Rose Bowl race; Penn State, reportedly in the Aloha Bowl, at No. 17 Pitt; No. 18 Boston College, headed for the Liberty Bowl, against Holy Cross at Foxboro, Mass.; Holiday Bowl-bound No. 19 Missouri at Kansas, and No. 20 Maryland, which faces Tennessee in the Florida Citrus Bowl, at North Carolina State.

Meanwhile, Tennessee visits Hall of Fame Bowl invitee Kentucky, Peach Bowl-bound North Carolina entertains Duke, Independence Bowl hopeful East Carolina is at Southern Mississippi for a night game; Virginia Tech, another Independence Bowl possibility, visits Virginia; Bluebonnet Bowl-bound Oklahoma State is at Iowa State; Independence hopeful Air Force visits possible Liberty Bowl participant Notre Dame, and UCLA, with a shot at the Rose Bowl but a better chance at the Aloha, visits crosstown rival Southern California.

Watson shares lead at Japanese golf event

MIYAZAKI, Japan (AP) — Citing better play from tee to green, British Open champion Tom Watson went into Saturday's third round of the \$425,532 Dunlop Phoenix Golf Tournament in a tie for first place with Hsieh Min Nan of Taiwan.

Watson shot a par 72 Friday, matching his opening-round score for a 144 total. Hsieh shot a 71 after an opening-round 73, also for a 144 total.

"The course was easier today," Watson said. "The wind was not as much of a problem. I played better today from tee shots to the greens, but the greens are very fast."

Watson and Hsieh were one stroke ahead of Hawaiian Open champion Isao Aoki of Japan and Chen Tze Ming of Taiwan after two rounds over the 6,991-yard Phoenix Country Club course.

Larry Nelson, the 1983 U.S. Open champion, led with a 71 after the first round but skidded to a 75 Friday for a 36-hole total of 146. Nelson was tied with Chen Tze Chung of Taiwan and Kikuo Suzuki of Japan. Chen shot a 74 and Suzuki a 69.

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# Houston, N.C. State meet in Finals 'rematch'

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) — North Carolina State and Houston open the college basketball season Saturday in the fifth Hall of Fame Tip-Off Classic in a "rematch" of last season's NCAA finalists.

NBC will telecast the game, starting at 2:30 p.m. EST.

"What rematch?" said N.C. State Coach Jim Valvano, whose team won the 1983 championship 54-52 on a last-second shot, ending Houston's 26-game winning streak. "We lost a lot of points, but they didn't lose Akeem (Olajuwon). Only the uniforms will be the same."

"We even lost our senior team manager. We have trouble getting our towels on the bus."

What the Wolfpack really lost from its 26-10 club were its three key players — backcourtmen Derek

Whittenburg and Sidney Lowe and 6-foot-11 Thurl Bailey.

N.C. State was unranked in the preseason poll, while Houston was ranked No. 3, mainly because of the 7-0 junior, Olajuwon, who showed great improvement last season and was named the most valuable player of the Final Four.

"I don't feel a lot of pressure," said Valvano. "We're not even picked in the top half of our own conference (Atlantic Coast). But we have good team players and a good foundation."

"Houston is one of the top 10 teams in the country. Akeem is awesome, a great offensive and defensive player. They lost a great player in (Clyde) Drexler and a good one in (Larry) Micheaux."

Coach Guy Lewis of Houston said he was concerned

about rebounding because of the loss of forwards Drexler and Micheaux.

"Right now, the only consistent rebounder is Akeem," said Lewis. "That wouldn't be so bad if I knew he would be consistent. He hasn't been in the past. He has been this fall, and to me, that is the biggest improvement he has made. The rest of our rebounding corps has been very sub-par for a Cougar basketball team."

Also returning for Houston, nicknamed the Phi Slama Jama fraternity because of its dunking ability last season, is forward Michael Young, 6-7, a senior who was switched to guard last season; 6-5 swingman Benny Anders, and guards Alvin Franklin and Reid Gettys. Two 6-8 freshman forwards who will see action

are Braxton Clark and Rickie Winslow.

N.C. State also has a dunker of some renown in Spud Webb, who's only 5-6. A transfer from Midland (Texas) Junior College, Webb has a 42-inch standing, vertical leap, which enabled him to record 49 dunks and 37 blocked shots last season.

Webb has taken over as N.C. State's point guard position and will team with Ernie Myers, a sophomore who averaged 18 points while filling in for the injured Whittenburg midway through last season.

Cozell McQueen, 6-11, and 6-7 Lorenzo Charles, who scored the winning basket in the NCAA final, will be joined up front by 6-7 freshman Bennie Bolton as starters.

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# Tower criticizes border aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — A task force established by President Reagan to help provide economic assistance to Southwest border communities "has functioned ineffectively and slowly with an overemphasis on public relations," a House committee said in a report released Friday.

The report, by the Government Operations Committee, said the task force "has not contributed much in the way of new federal solutions or assistance" to border communities whose economies were devastated by last year's peso devaluations, which sharply curtailed retail sales.

An administration spokesman responded that some members of the committee "apparently misunderstood the purpose" of the task force and that "real progress is being made" in providing federal assistance to the border.

Reagan announced establishment of the multi-agency task force in August after Sen. John Tower, R-Texas, urged him to assist the economically-troubled border region. Reagan appointed Vice President George Bush to chair the task force.

At a news conference Friday, Tower also said he was "not satisfied with what's been accomplished" by the task force. Tower declined to be more specific, but said that "really, I think there's a lot more that has to be done."

The Government Operations Committee report said that of 34 federal grants announced

by the task force for the border region, "a substantial number" were not really directed at border communities suffering from the peso devaluations.

Many of the grants were actually to states, with no indication whether the money would reach border areas, or to cities some distance from the border, the report said.

"In all probability, all or almost all of the announced grants would have been approved in any event...since most of the grant applications were in the processing chain before" the

report created the task force, according to the report.

Shirley Green, a spokeswoman for Bush, said that the purpose of the task force was "to expedite federal assistance into the area to provide jobs and encourage long-term economic diversification."

"...From its inception it was not anticipated that additional federal funds would be appropriated," she said, adding that the federal effort "will provide substantial short and long term assistance to this area."

The committee report was adopted earlier this week by the Democrat-controlled committee, with Republicans in opposition. Rep. Judd Gregg, R-N.H., told Democratic members that the report was "fundamentally flawed" and said "it is weak, it is political."

The report was also sharply critical of the "peso pack" program announced in August by the Small Business Administration, under which direct and guaranteed loans and other assistance were to be made to border businesses.

The report said that as of August, 1983, the SBA had "provided loan assistance to only 373 small businesses in U.S. border cities, although it has received over 2,400 inquiries."

It also said the interest rate on the peso pack loans had run as high as 14 percent, "far higher than could be paid by small border businesses which had lost substantial sales."

# Jackson kicks off Texas campaign sweep

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — The Rev. Jesse Jackson brought his presidential campaign to San Antonio in an attempt to forge black and Hispanic voters into a "rainbow coalition," which he hopes could lead him to the White House.

"The old minorities in coalition are the new majority," said Jackson, the eighth Democrat and first black to enter the presidential campaign.

He met briefly with City Council members Thursday night and later addressed a packed crowd at a rally sponsored by the League of United Latin American Citizens.

Jackson told the enthusiastic, and mostly black, audience that his campaign "is not about one person running for the White House."

"It's about a massive infusion into the political process of those who have been locked out," he said. "The Democratic Party cannot lock out blacks, Hispanics and women and expect to win."

Jackson staged an impromptu voter registration drive after the speech, signing up about 30 local voters, and also collected several thousand dollars for his campaign

efforts.

The candidate criticized President Reagan, accusing him of a reversal of the Robin Hood process — "taking from the poor and giving to the rich."

Jackson also said that blacks and Hispanics in Texas aren't getting their share of the political pie, noting that last year's statewide Democratic ticket included not one black or Hispanic.

Jackson spent the night in San Antonio and planned to leave this morning for campaign appearances in Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and Austin.

# Groom convicted for killing bride

PEARSALL, Texas (AP) — A South Texas man has been convicted of misdemeanor homicide in connection with a traffic accident that killed his new bride, who was still in her wedding dress.

Jurors deliberated more than five hours Thursday before convicting Martin Popham, 20, of Pleasanton.

His 21-year-old bride, the former Cindy Gibbon, died minutes after the couple left their Feb. 26 wedding reception at a Pleasanton church.

The jury deliberated one hour this morning before sentencing Popham to six months probation. He could have received up to a year in jail and a \$2,000 fine.

Prosecutor Alger Kendall told jurors that Popham had been drinking for more

than seven hours when the couple's truck hit an oak tree, a utility pole, a parked car and a chain-link fence.

"He's the one who killed Cindy," Kendall said. "It doesn't make any difference that he got up on the stand and said he loved her. He knew he was drunk."

Members of the Gibbon family testified that Popham had been drunk and belligerent, but his relatives said he did not appear to be intoxicated.

Defense attorney Roy Barrera Sr. of San Antonio argued that the state did not prove who was driving the truck at the time of the accident.

Popham testified Thursday that he could not remember the accident or events that occurred late in the reception.

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Florene Oats' niece sent her a graduation announcement, but it arrived a little late for Mrs. Oats to buy her a gift — 34 years too late to be exact.

The envelope, delivered earlier this week by the U.S. Postal Service, carried a postmark of 1949, a 5-cent stamp and a Midland postmark.

Mrs. Oats' niece, Peggy South Martin, is a grandmother.

"It was a shock," Mrs. Oats said with a laugh. "I just had to sit down and think about it. I was so astonished."

"The only problem is to find the appropriate gift for her."

A spokeswoman for the Postal Service in Fort Worth was at a loss to explain how the graduation announcement, which was supposed to have been mailed in 1949 from Madill, Okla., ended up going through the Midland post office Saturday and then to Mrs. Oats' home — all on a nickel stamp.

Mrs. Oats said she contacted her niece, who now lives in Hurst, and both had a good laugh while reflecting on the postman's creed, "Neither rain, nor snow, nor..."

WASHINGTON (AP) — A crib and pull toy that may present a choking hazard to children is being recalled by its manufacturer, the Consumer Product Safety Commission announced today.

Janex Corp. of Oceanport, N.J., has agreed to replace the "Musical Rock-A-Bye Railroad" toys with a redesigned version, the commission said.

The toys were manufactured between August 1982 and August 1983.

The toys are made of plastic and have a small ball of wood or plastic that can be pulled out and swallowed.

The toys are sold in toy stores, department stores and baby stores.

Parents are urged to check their cribs and pull toys for the recalled toys.
