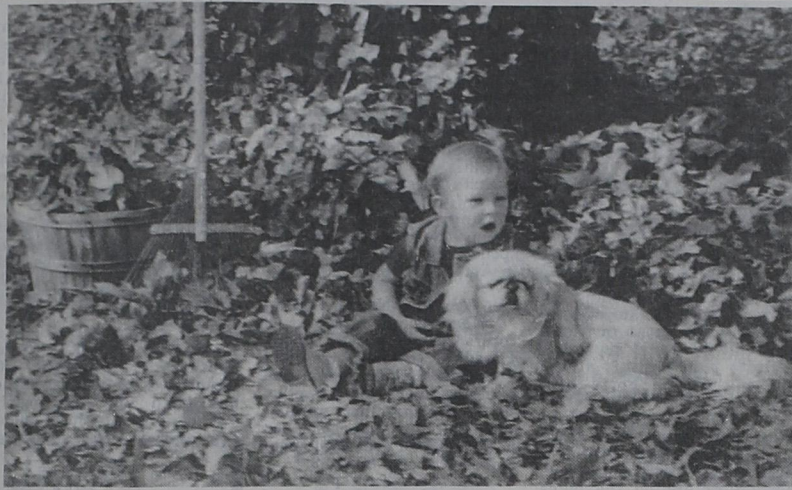

Ye editor had tuned in to a TV show called "Perspective," on Amarillo College's Public Broadcasting channel 2 the first part of this week.

Film maker Oliver Stone, who had made a trip to Amarillo, was the special guest on the program. He began what was to be a question-and-answer session by saying: "I would first like to ask you a question."

He proceeded to ask the young folks (it looked as though there were at least 20 or 30 students) what the initials "A&M" stood for in the college abbreviation WTA&M.

Two or three of the students made a stab at enlightening their visitor. One said he thought it stood for "Arts and Mines," or maybe it was Agriculture?--

When Ye Editor and the Good Ole Girl were in journalism school, our instructors told us to practice writing our news stories so that a junior-high school age youngster could understand them. That was thought to be the "average intellect of our readers."

At the time, we thought this was a little bit severe. Now, we're pretty sure that the junior high school yardstick may be somewhat too high (as the average reading mentality).

In fact, it is Ye Editor's humble opinion that the learning of cursive writing in the lower grades might be completely abandoned, if not for the fact that these youngsters might need to know how to sign a check.

We have known for some time that many people graduate from college without much of a command of the English language. They haven't been given writing assignments, such as book reports, essays and the like.

70 Yrs Ago-Nov. 4, 1927

Tommy Gallaway, son of Mr. and Mrs. T.W. Gallaway, who is attending the Tech College at Lubbock, came over to spend the weekend with his parents and his many friends here. This is Tommy's second term at Tech and he reports that he is getting along fine with his school work and is pleased with the college.

65 Yrs Ago-Nov. 11, 1932

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce, with headquarters at Stamford, and in which Friona, as a representative, is pushing the move for the reorganization of county government in Texas and will offer and support a definite plan for this at the meeting of the Forty-third Legislature.

Quite a number of sportsmen from various parts of the Panhandle as well as a number of local shooters have been busy around the lakes in this locality since the duck shooting season opened Tuesday of last week.

55 Yrs Ago-Nov. 13, 1942

W.L. Edelman, local representative of the Magnolia Petroleum Co., reports no clues as to the perpetrator of the burglary of his filling station one night last week.

Saturday, November 28 has been set as the date when the judging committee will visit the candidates for the 1942 Gold Star award, the most cherished of 4-H medals. Three clubs have entered candidates. They are Tomilou Turner of the Friona 4-H Club; Barbara Foster of the Oklahoma Lane Club and Laura Seaton of the Lazbuddie Club.

45 Yrs Ago-Nov. 6, 1952

Attending the State Convention of the Farm Bureau in San Antonio Monday will be several members of the Parmer County organization. Going as voting delegates will be Earl Stevenson, Aubrey Ellison, Melvin Sachs, Ralph Smith, T.E. Lovett, and Ernest Anthony. Raymond Euler, Service Representative, will also attend.

The juniors of the Friona High School are working this week in preparation for their three-act comedy to be given here in the near future. "The Campbells Are Coming" is the story of a granddaughter who returns home from college "sophisticated" and announces to all that her fiance Kingstom Campbell and his mother are coming for a visit.

40 Yrs Ago-Nov. 7, 1957

The Friona Band attended the ENMU Homecoming in Portales Saturday. They marched in the homecoming parade, competing with 17 other school bands from this area. The Friona Band was named the winner in their division.

A firm located in Friona this year is demonstrating the beneficial aspects to the city from a local agriculture devoted to other crops besides the traditional grain acreage of the Parmer County farms. The firm is Friona Growers and Shippers. The crops include potatoes and carrots.

35 Yrs Ago-Nov. 8, 1962

The Friona City Council voted Monday night to accept bids for a second overhead water storage tank for the city. In order to provide for a site for the new tower, the council voted to purchase on option lots belonging to Raymond Jones which is just outside the present northern city limits.

Funeral services were held in Friona Monday for Mrs. Fred Carson, 39, killed in a head-on automobile collision near the city last Saturday. Mrs. Carson and a Kentucky woman, Maxine Spencer Banks, were each killed when the automobiles they were driving collided on U.S. Highway 60, two and one-half miles southwest of Friona.

30 Yrs Ago-Nov. 9, 1967

Final approval was given at the City Council meeting Monday for the increase in rates by Southwestern Public Service Company, along with the adjustment in the

electrical franchise rate to the city from two to three percent of annual gross dividends.

Friona is faced with an acute housing problem, in the form of a big potential population increase, Friona Chamber of Commerce members told local builders this week. Members of the Chamber, along with building representatives met with officials of Missouri Beef Packers Tuesday to determine approximately how much housing would be required when the giant place is opened and begins production in April of 1968.

25 Yrs Ago-Nov. 9, 1972

Near-record numbers of voters turned out in Friona Tuesday to help re-elect President Richard Nixon and Commissioner Tom Lewellen of county precinct number one. Lewellen won re-election in a landslide over challenger Forrest Osborn, 838-432.

15 Yrs Ago-Nov. 7, 1982

at Jones Stadium in Lubbock Wednesday. The band is under the direction of Jim D. Parker.

Friona won a three-way coin toss between themselves, Dimmitt, and Muleshoe, Friday night, and will represent district 2-AAA in the playoffs.

10 Yrs Ago-Nov. 7, 1987

A Christmas shopping promotion has been launched locally by the Friona Chamber of Commerce.

Thirteen retail merchants are participating in the 1987 promotion, during which \$600 worth of Friona script will be awarded in a drawing December 22.

The temperature sign at Friona State Bank recorded another high in the 80s recently, as beautiful weather has been enjoyed locally. The rain began here Friday

morning, perhaps heralding some lower temperatures, but it has been nice while it lasted.

5 Yrs Ago-Nov. 7, 1992

Parmer County voters gave their support to President George Bush in the general election on Tuesday, by a 4 per cent margin. Bush received 1,829 votes to 637 for Bill Clinton (21.0 per cent) and 564 for Ross Perot (18.6 per cent).

For the second time in just over two weeks, a fatal accident happened at the Santa Fe Railway crossing about 1.4 miles southwest of Friona last Friday, October 30. Ben Marquez, 52, of Bovina, an employee of Parmer County, was killed when he backed his road grader onto a track and was struck by a Santa Fe train.

and had to punt! Vega's 51-yard kick went into the end zone for a touchback.

Perryton was determined. The Rangers converted three first downs. A third and seven play from their own 34 was vital in two regards. Friona defender Rudy Torres sustained a serious injury on the tackle, and the injury allowed the clock to stop.

Torres had stopped Duke a yard short of the mark, but on fourth down Adkison ran nine yards to keep the drive alive.

Five plays later, with time winding down, Perryton slot-back Coby Haberthur ran a reverse, coughed up the ball as he was tackled, and King pounced on it with only 26 seconds left in the slugfest.

That allowed Friona to get out of Ochiltree County with their undefeated season record intact at 9-0. It's the first time a Chieftain grid team has ever achieved the 9-0 plateau.

In winning, the Chiefs also put a game in the "win column" for the 22nd time in their last 23 games.

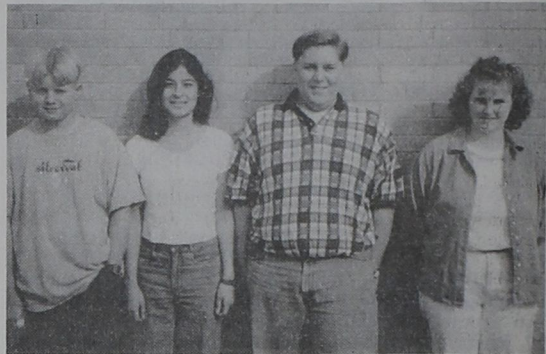

"This has been our goal, deep down, especially to be undefeated in district. Now we have the chance to do it," said Coach James Morton.

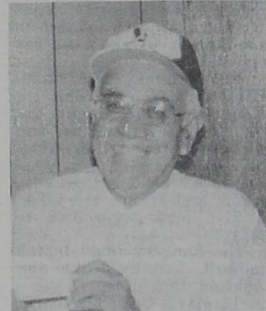

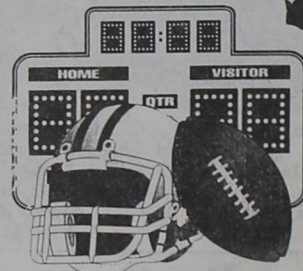

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Beet Growers Eye Bumper '97 Crop

Sugar beet harvesters are lifting high yields from fields as north as Dalhart, as far south as Plainview and west all the way to Clovis, New Mexico. And with harvest about one-third completed, growers and Holly Sugar Corp. feel this year's crop could be one of the best in recent years.

Kenneth Frye of Hereford, president of the Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association headquartered in Hereford, says approximately 18,000 sugar beet acres will be harvested in the Panhandle-Eastern New Mexico region this year by some 350 growers. That compares to about 14,000 acres harvested in 1996.

Dennis Printz, agricultural manager for Holly's Hereford processing plant, adds that when harvest is completed, yields are expected to average in the 21 to 25 tons range. Sugar content is anticipated to finish in the 14 to 15 percent range, he says.

"We have seen an increase in production in the northwestern Panhandle area," says Frye. "Farmers in Dallam, Hartley, Moore and Sherman counties will harvest about 6,000 acres of beets this year, compared to about 1,500 acres in 1996. We expect those numbers to increase substantially for the 1998 crop. And we also anticipate an increase in production throughout the remainder of the region."

Reasons behind the increase in beet acres include the fact that sugar beets can be grown using less water than other irrigated field crops. "Our work with growers and studies by the Texas Agricultural Extension Station in Bushland indicate that by using LEPA (low energy precision application) irrigation, growers can obtain good production using 30-40 percent less water," says Printz.

Frye says more and more growers are also finding that sugar beets are an outstanding alternative crop which fits into corn, cotton, grain sorghum and wheat rotations. "With the availability of new over-the-top herbicides for use on sugar beets, we will have weed control measures we've never had before," he says.

"Seed companies also expect to see new herbicide resistant sugar beet seed hybrids, Roundup Ready and Liberty, available to area growers in the next few years. This will help hold down the cost of production. And we should be able to produce higher yielding and higher quality beets."

Efforts are also underway to produce higher quality sugar beet seed hybrids which have greater disease resistance. "Joint efforts by Holly Hybrids and Hilleshog division of Novartis seed are aimed at developing hybrids specifically for our production area," says Printz. Seedex, another sugar beet seed company, has also seen promising results in its regional seed research.

Sugar prices still remain strong this fall and area growers will receive an 80 percent initial payment from Holly. Overall payments to regional growers from Holly will be in the \$15 million to \$20 million range for this year's crop.

"Sugar beets offer us as strong of a return per acre as any crop we produce," says Frye, "plus we have a guaranteed market for the crop through Holly. Those are other reasons why sugar beets are a good alternative crop."

With better irrigation techniques, better weed control and other production methods and better seed hybrids for Texas, Frye and Printz see a strong increase in

beet acres for next year.

"We are already working with many growers who are eager to plant beets for the first time or add them to their current rotation," says Printz. "We are also receiving inquiries from farmers in northern states interested in producing beets in our area. With all that interest, we see a great future for sugar beet production in our area."

"The Hereford plant remains as Holly's finest processing facility nationwide. And we remain committed to working with farmers in this area."

Other Economic Benefits
Holly processes beets into refined sugar sold under the Holly and other food manufacturer names. Major customers include Gerber, General Mills and other large food manufacturers which demand the high quality sugar that Holly produces in Hereford.

The plant employs some 250-300 area residents. The annual payroll is about \$4.75 million. Every year Holly pays about \$700,000 in school, county and hospital taxes. It spends about \$16 million on materials needed to operate the plant, and much of that is with area businesses.

Texas is the only state that produces both sugar beets and sugarcane, grown in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. Overall, the sweetener industry provides more than 13,200 Texas jobs. With the addition of the corn sweetener industry, there is \$876 million in economic activity from the industry in Texas.

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for November.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

The Texas Department of Health is charging fees to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

Influenza and pneumococcal vaccines will be available.

The vaccinations are available at the WIC Office, 704 Main St. in Friona, on Friday, November 21 from 10 a.m.-12 noon and 1-3:45 p.m.

Vaccinations will also be administered at the EMS Office, 109 Third Street in Bovina on Monday, November 10 from 10 a.m.-3 p.m.

Funds Are Available Locally For JTPA

The Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) has funds to help residents of Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro counties receive job training. The program help eligible applicants with college or place them with local businesses for on-the-job training.

Businesses participating in the on-the-job training will be reimbursed for part of the cost of employing new workers through a contract. Training positions must be full time and develop skills of the person to be trained.

Vocational college in certain occupations can also be paid for by JTPA. The program targets youths through age 21 and persons 22 or older who also will benefit from new or additional training.

Current students as well as new ones are encouraged to apply for financial aid. Many medical technical, clerical and management programs are covered.

Person who wish to apply for the program and those interested businesses may contact Aruna Lewis at the Texas Work Force Commission in Hereford at 364-8600.

Lewis will be in Parmer County Tuesdays from 9 a.m. until 12 noon on the first floor of the Farwell Courthouse.

JTPA is made available by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission as administrator for the Panhandle Work Force Development Partnership. Applicants must meet the income guidelines or targeted group status in order to qualify.

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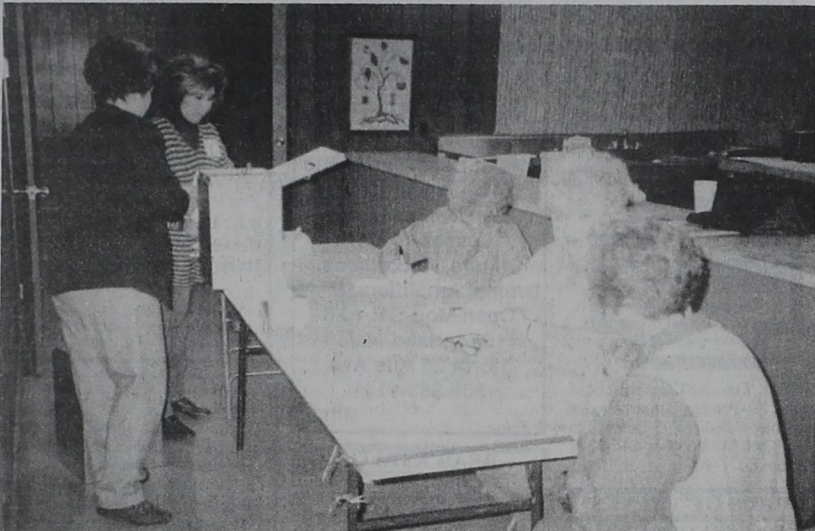

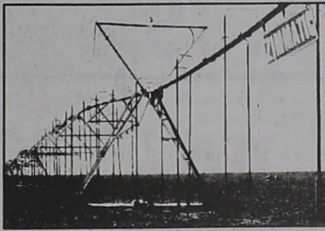

Care For Contact Lenses

Keeping your contact lenses clean is essential for your comfort and overall health of your eyes. Before handling them, always wash your hands and always keep the lens case clean so you can safely store them. Briefly, here's how to clean the various types:

The easiest to care for, hard lenses should be cleaned daily by using a commercial contact lens wetting solution.

Gas-permeable hard lenses should also be washed daily in a cleansing solution and then stored overnight in a conditioner. Once a week, clean them with an enzyme solution. Rinse with distilled water, never tap water.

More fragile soft lenses must be cleaned each day with a surface cleaner especially designed for soft lenses. Disinfect them either daily with a disinfecting solution or every other day with heat. Once a week, apply an enzyme treatment, rinse with saline, and disinfect to neutralize the enzyme.
